
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Welcome to the September Climate Emergency Group Newsletter


Apologies that this month's newsletter is slightly late, and slightly shorter than normal - but hopefully no less useful.

Proposed Solar Farm in Rode

The planning application for the proposed new Solar Farm in Rode was due to be submitted in July, but has been delayed, and is now expected to be lodged with Somerset Council towards the end of this month. Low Carbon (the company behind the application) has made a number of changes to the indicative plans which had been made public earlier this year. These changes include the removal of the "triangle" (the land bounded by Rode Hill, Bradford Road, and the A361), which had been a concern raised at the consultation event held in May. Other feedback included comments in relation to:

Use of agricultural land

- · Working with local schools
- · Clean renewable energy to the local area
- Increasing biodiversity

In total just over 70 local residents attended the consultation event, with 38 opposed to the development, 28 supportive, and 8 neither supportive or unsupportive.

Provided the application is lodged by the end of this month, the October Newsletter will contain a lot more information about the proposals. And the issue is the major agenda item at the Climate Emergency Group's next meeting (October 17th).



Buses!

More good news regarding local bus services...Both Firstbus with the D2/D2X and Faresaver with the X34 have made changes to their timetables, with effect from last Sunday (3rd September). There are a host of small adjustments to nearly all bus times - but the really important news is that all services are retained throughout the winter, including the much expanded range of D2 services to Bath, and the new D2X, which were introduced at the time of the last timetable change in April.

Plus - there are also a few extra buses!

via NSP, Rode and Beckington to Frome (en route from Bath). These are essentially repositioning journeys that First had previously run along the A36 but which they are now running through the villages. These will be useful for anyone needing to get into Frome early, either to get to work or perhaps to go for an early morning dip in the Frome swimming pool.

Also, on Saturday nights, there are now a couple of really late-night buses back from Frome (again these were repositioning trips that previously went along the A36, but will now be coming back through Beckington, Rode and NSP), thereby enabling local residents to get a bus back home after a late night event in Frome, especially at The Cheese & Grain - the last bus from Frome now leaves Market Place at 00:28.

September is the annual CATCH THE BUS MONTH, and Somerset Bus Partnership is organising nearly 30 events across Somerset this month - meaning there will be more such events in Somerset than in any other county! If you missed their stand in Frome Market Place last Saturday, look out for them at the **Frome Cheese Show on Saturday 9th September.**

Huge thanks to Peter Travis, whose suggestions to Firstbus resulted in the additional services, and who campaigns tirelessly for improved public transport across Somerset (in particular in this part of the county). And, of course, thanks are due to Firstbus for taking those suggestions on board. As ever with our bus services, it's a case of "Use it or lose it"....and if you're not a regular bus user, this month is the perfect time to get into the habit! Single fares remain at £2 until the end of October.

♣ ★ ♥ Somerset Tree Strategy 2023 - 2033

As part of the <u>Somerset Tree Strategy</u>, Somerset Council is appealing to local landowners to support the goal to increase the county's tree canopy by providing suitable safe places where young trees native to Somerset can thrive. The Council is also looking for suitable sites that could accommodate raising trees from seed. This starts with a small space the size of a table to host seed trays and in the second year, would need enough space to host the seedlings in pots.

If you have pockets of land that you want to convert into a copse or woodland (or know of someone who does), Somerset Council can provide support with free trees and advice on planting and care.
