Asha is our international charity meaning 'hope' in Hindi, Asha has been helping the slum dwellers of Delhi since 1988, when Dr Kiran Martin started treating cholera victims who

were too poor or culturally constrained to seek help elsewhere. Now over 700,000 residents in 95 slum colonies have access to essential medical care and treatment with Asha, as well as a wide range of other support and benefits to help improve peoples' lives and bring them 'hope'. asha-india.org



Our national charity is Safe Passage. Every year thousands of unaccompanied child refugees arrive in Europe in search of safety. They find themselves stuck in squalid camps or sleeping rough on

city streets unaware of their legal right to travel safely through Europe. Safe Passage is there to help child refugees access their rights. The headquarters of Safe Passage are in London. safepassage.org.uk



Focus Frome is our local charity. Focus Frome works with GP surgeries, drugs and alcohol agencies, churches, housing associations, schools, universities, the police, social services and other counselling agencies. They offer counselling to all and have funding available for those who are on a low income. focusbath.com

NEWS FROM SAFE PASSAGE UK, HV'S NATIONAL CHARITY

Hardington Vale Parochial Church Council supports Safe Passage UK, a charity helping child refugees access legal routes to safety. During the period of this support, news channels have brought us information from Afghanistan, Libya, Italy, France, Greece, Ukraine, Poland and the Kent coast about displaced persons trying to



reach a place of greater safety. Safe Passage concentrates on child refugees. (For more information refer to www.safepassage.org.uk/how-we-work.)

In January 2021, the Government closed refugee family reunion from Europe, leaving only the 'entry clearance immigration rules' which are so restrictive that many child refugees no longer qualify. However, three groups led by 26 young refugees and asylum seekers have been working together as Young Leaders. They are working to protect and defend human rights, and be a voice for the voiceless. They believe that the Government needs to make fundamental changes in policy to ensure that people fleeing war and persecution can access safe routes to sanctuary. Through workshops and discussions they have agreed on eight recommendations:-

- Act fast to save lives, by providing more safe routes to sanctuary for refugees.
- Offer the same protection to people fleeing war and persecution regardless of how they travelled to the UK.
- Agree a deal with the EU to strengthen family reunion. The UK should work closely with countries in the EU to ensure the process is faster and smoother.
- Make urgent changes to refugee family reunion under the UK's Immigration Rules. Ensure that all refugees have the right to be reunited with family members, no matter how they entered the UK.
- Expand the proposed resettlement scheme to other countries beyond the Middle East, including Africa and Europe.
- Introduce a new route to the UK specifically for unaccompanied children from Europe.
- Listen to those directly affected before taking decisions that have an impact on so many lives.
- We invite the Government to meet with us and others with lived experience of these issues to discuss our recommendations.

LAND AT CHURCH LANE - APPEAL HEARING

The Hearing in relation to the proposed development on Barbara's Field took place on 24th and 25th January. It was initially scheduled for one day, but the extent of the issues required nearly two full days.

The main parties to the Hearing were Waddeton Park (the promoter of the scheme, acting on behalf of the landowners) and Mendip District Council. Rode Parish Council was an "interested party".

Given the very significant level of opposition from villagers, the Parish Council believed it was appropriate to make the strongest possible representations to the Hearing, and therefore commissioned a local planning consultancy (Context Planning) to assist - both in the preparation of our "Statement of Case" and also to attend the Hearing and represent our views. This was essential, given the significant resources available to the Appellant (who employed a leading barrister and multiple experts). A number of Parish Councillors attended the hearing, as did Barbi Lund, our District Councillor, who made valuable contributions, and to whom we are very grateful.

Both our advisors and the Parish Council believe we have done as much as we can to make the case for rejection of the appeal. The Inspector will make a site visit, sometime in the first half of February, and will hopefully publish her decision by the end of the month, or early in March.

A NEW POSSIBILITY FOR RODE...

The Rode Community Project is an initiative by three Rode organisations: Rode Memorial Hall, Rode Scouts and Rode Playing Field.

Their task is to explore the feasibility of creating a new community building for Rode to be located on the Playing Field that will provide much improved facilities for each of the three organisations and hence better serve the residents of Rode.

It is a medium-term project that if successful might see a new building being completed in 2 or 3 years' time.

In the meantime, each organisation will continue to maintain their existing buildings and ensure they continue to provide the same services/venues and facilities for village residents.

An example is the Playing Field Pavilion where work will start shortly with the expectation of bringing the Pavilion back into full use in the next month or so.


Alison Hughes did an absolutely excellent job of choosing a balance of Carols, Poems and Readings, some serious and some...well not... and was well supported by the Readers.

EMERGING FROM HIBERNATION

Winter is truly a time for hibernation. Having battled a virus since December 11th I have found it so much easier to rest during the cold spells. But there are flickers of spring, which is wonderful. I know daffodils are coming out earlier every year, so I look forward to seeing a splash of yellow in the next month or so, emerging from the mulch, and providing positive inspiration for all aspects of life.

Due to my illness, it has been a very quiet couple of months for me, but there is always a lot going on at the Council.

We have less than 50 working days until Vesting Day (when the Somerset County Council becomes the New Somerset Council). Along with reorganisation, amalgamation of the tech, appointment of new staff members and ensuring services are delivered without a hitch, there are matters of finance and budgeting to consider. The budget is going to full council in February, but will include cuts to local services and an increase in council tax. There are some disappointments ahead, but as a community, we can no doubt get through whatever is thrown at us.

As always, there is so much to celebrate. It is easy to allow the negativity of the media to dampen our spirits when we do live in a country with so many more positives than negatives.

Bus users in Somerset can now travel on most routes in the county for just £2 until 31st March, when the central government funding will be reassessed. It is hoped that this funding will boost bus use and help passengers during the cost-of-living crisis. And as the High Street brand says, "Every penny helps". The initiative will apply to most routes in Somerset, but do keep an eye on the Somerset Bus Partnership website for more info: https://www.somersetbuspartnership.co.uk/

A little reminder that if you are 50 and over, a frontline health or social care worker, pregnant, have a long-term health condition, or are a paid or unpaid carer, you are eligible for the free flu vaccine, and you can likely get the Covid-19 seasonal booster. Children aged 2-15 years old are also eligible for a free flu vaccination, which is delivered through either the GP for pre-school, or school for school age children. Parents do need to sign a consent form. If you are eligible, you can book your seasonal Covid-19 vaccine using https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/coronavirus-vaccination/book-coronavirus-vaccination/ or by calling 119.

Stay safe on the roads during the cold weather — only 20% of Somerset roads are gritted. This doesn't mean they are fully safe, only marginally safer than not being gritter. All information about gritting is available online, which also includes a map (you need to zoom into the map to get the necessary information about gritted roads): https://www.travelsomerset.co.uk/gritting/

Spring flowers may be nodding their heads, bringing with them the hope of warmer days, but we still have a month or two of winter ahead and the cost-of-living crisis isn't going



away quietly! Below are some practical solutions that can make a big difference, or call me and I can connect you to the right services for you and help make this winter a little less harsh.

Petrol Costs - There are some great resources to find the nearest, cheapest fuel prices e.g. petrolprices.com/ - has a handy downloadable app as well.

Community Larders/Fridges - These are popping up all over the county where you pick up free food and household items, with no appointment or referral needed and there is one in Frome visit hubbub.org.uk/the-community-fridge.

Somerset County Council Household Support Fund - This fund offers short-term urgent financial help to people in Somerset struggling to afford essentials such as buying food, paying for utility bills, or other items such as beds and white goods. It is an online application that I can help with if needed: somerset.gov.uk/somerset-household-support-fund/

Somerset Warm Spaces - These are local community hubs open in the day providing a warm place to be, company and often tea and biscuits! We are delighted that nearly all our 30 Talking Cafes are warm spaces. The website sparksomerset.org.uk/find-warm-welcome has a full map where you can find your local 'Warm Space' or call me to find out where your nearest one is.

Community Building or Community Group Support - CCS (The Community Council for Somerset) has dedicated professionals who help community/charitable groups and hubs such as Village Halls to cope with increased overheads/grant finding/sustainability. THE CLIMATE EMERGENCY CHALLENGE - 2023

As January ends and the days are getting longer, the post-Christmas slump is (hopefully) over and we can start to <u>properly</u> look forward to 2023. And what better time to re-calibrate those New Year Resolutions?!

Climate-related actions are especially relevant this year, given the precarious state of the planet....as the UN Secretary General said at COP27 in November "We are on a highway to climate hell with our foot still on the accelerator".

Here in Rode many villagers expressed a wide range of very positive intentions when completing the Climate Change Survey back in March last year, with nearly 50% of respondents aiming to reduce meat consumption, for example (the table below shows those intentions):

If you <u>did</u> plan to take steps to reduce your carbon footprint, now would be a great time to assess how you fared.

But, looking ahead, what can we do individually to keep up the good work? There are numerous sources of advice on the internet, and some excellent resources for checking your own carbon footprint. One of the best I've seen is Carbon Savvy (https://carbonsavvy.uk)

Here are three Rode-related suggestions for your 2023 Resolutions:

- **1. Take the bus!!** Not only is this a great way to reduce your carbon footprint, it will also help sustain our vital local bus services. And for the next two months single journeys are only £2.
- 2. Buy more locally-produced products from local outlets. We are extremely lucky to have some great local producers whether that be Fussell's, the Village Baking Company, Louisebees, Ping Coombes, Bianco Piz, Choc-on-Choc...I could go on the list is a long one! We also have wonderful local outlets (the Post Office and Village Store, The Cross Keys, The Mill, Somerset Foodie, White Row Farm, and so on). Buying locally reduces food-miles, keeps our hard-earned cash in the local community, and helps support local jobs.
- **3. Seek out Rode's sustainability pioneers.** We have a bunch of local electric vehicle and e-bike owners, houses with solar panels and heat pumps, retrofitters, re-wilders, etc, etc. If you're thinking of starting your own journey towards carbon neutrality it will be worth seeking them out (drop me a line for contact details).

Thinking collectively, the Climate Emergency Group met at the beginning of November to consider (amongst other things) our plans for 2023. We agreed the following objectives:

- 1. Support local bus services. The results of the Climate Change Survey we conducted back in March showed that the provision of good public transport was by far the biggest single issue that villagers wanted to see prioritised. This autumn and winter local bus services are much improved but there is a real danger that this could be very temporary, with government funding likely to be withdrawn at the end of March. Once again it is a case of "use it or lose it", and we will work with other groups to help increase local utilisation of bus services (in particular, the D2).
- 2. Work to deliver public EV charging points in Rode, Norton St Philip and Beckington (and generally support the transition to low carbon transport). Rural villages like Rode/NSP/Beckington have a higher than average proportion of homes without access to off-street parking, and hence public EV charging points are vital to encourage the transition to lower carbon transport in such communities. The costs and infrastructure issues are significant, however, meaning we almost certainly have to work with Somerset County Council to achieve our goal.


- 3. Continue to inspire change through community events. We held a successful first "Big Green Weekend" event in September, and we are tentatively planning something similar for 2023. We also plan to hold a series of public talks on some key environmental issues (topics initially being explored include: recycling, insulation, electric vehicles, and waste water treatment).
- 4. **Support the provision of safe walking/cycling routes**. We will work with Beckington PC to support their project to better link Rudge/Beckington to Frome and investigate the best way to incorporate Rode (and potentially Norton St Philip) in this link.
- 5. **Improve communication**. Look to better communicate the opportunities for carbon-reduction in our local communities (e.g.: show-casing best practice, highlighting initiatives, publicising events, etc). We hope to have a new website in 2023, which will be a huge help....but we'll also aim to use existing channels such as The Link, other local parish magazines, Facebook, Instagram, The Leveller, etc.

Plus – we now have a monthly newsletter – drop me a line (email address below) if you'd like to be on the distribution list, or go to: mailchi.mp/4b503e0ba2oc/initialsign-up and fill in your details.

We are a small group, and therefore the capacity to deliver projects on our own is limited.

Primarily we aim to "initiate, inform, educate, encourage..."

But we can also act as a focal point for residents to come together to deliver projects as a community.

For some of us, an interest in plants, or maybe a particular plant, can become, shall we say, become a bit of an obsession? Some of us may recognise a certain glazed look that crosses the face of friends and family as we enthuse about a newly-discovered variety that seems to have been bred specifically for our delight. Plantaholics...we are many in number. But Galanthophiles are in a league of their own. They are properly nuts! I'm not one of them...yet.

I've just ordered another delivery of snowdrops "in the green" - absolutely the best way to plant large numbers of the earliest of spring bulbs. They'll arrive in early February to be planted out as soon as they arrive. I tend to buy mine from Clare Bulbs in Suffolk after a tip off from Sara Jocelyn, Laverton gardening guru. Placing an order always entails a long chatty telephone conversation with Andy the owner. And very helpfully, he offers only the singles and doubles - no endless humming and hawing needed. Just singles and doubles of perfect white snowdrops. But if you suspect the early signs of Galanthophilia, local supplier Avon Bulbs has more than 100 varieties available to order from mid-January and a website with lots of advice including a whole glossary of terms specific to the snowdrop genus!



As the years go by, if they're happy, most small groups of snowdrops will bulk into larger clumps and then you have the pleasure of dividing and spreading your stock further and further. Last year I benefited from clumps divided by my neighbour Diane Rossiter and hope I can start dividing and spreading my own stock next year. Marvellous.

However I've just been reminded of a very local and specific danger: the annual Snowdrop Festival 13-19 February in Shepton Mallet, once home of the 'Snowdrop King', master breeder James Allen. On my first visit a few years ago, I was enchanted by the names given by breeders to their different varieties, quite apart from being drawn to the delicacy of the flowers and their exquisite markings. Reader, I bought lots and lots. Luckily the prices in Shepton Mallet are generally quite modest and don't require a government health warning, but the danger of getting carried away is real. In February 2022 a true Galanthophile spent a world record £1850 on a single bulb. Clearly once you're hooked, you're truly hooked.

So I to plan go to Shepton Mallet Snowdrop festival this year, taking limited cash and endless will power with me. I shall not get hooked. I shall not.

Jennifer was born at Chatley Farm, Norton St Philip on 10th September 1930. Her family moved to Chickwell Farm, Hemington during the 1930s.

Jenny attended Laverton school and then went to Frome Grammar school.

William and Jenny were married in September 1958 and moved to Langham Farm. Jenny was a full time mum as well as a farmer's wife, helping with egg collection, havmaking, milking as well as running errands and fetching spare parts.

Jenny was an excellent cook and baker and always had a fresh sponge or fruit cake to go with a cup of tea if anyone called. Her shortbread, profiteroles and puddings were a delight.

When the children were of school age Jenny became involved with fundraising for Rode school. Every school fair saw her behind the cake stall with many of the items for sale made by her - she always made an eye-catching showstopper to draw the crowds in!

Every year the village of Rode held a fete with competitions; Jenny loved entering these and encouraged Sue and Helen to take part. Rode also had a carnival and for several years she put together a float on a farm trailer.

Once a month there was a baby clinic in Rode village hall and Jenny helped Nora Sparey and Jan Fleigel run this for many years, weighing babies and listening to the new mothers' problems. Their combined experience was a Godsend for many of the young mothers.

Another monthly event that she loved was Rode W.I., she was Secretary and Social Secretary for many years.

Jenny was one of the women in the village who would always volunteer to help, they never needed to be asked. Rode has lost many of these ladies in the past few years.

While the children were still at Rode school she was persuaded to do cookery classes for the children at the school.

When Jenny found that she had a bit more time for herself she got a job at Woolverton House Hotel, welcoming guests and general duties. But she really enjoyed being involved in weddings at the hotel, throwing herself into flower arranging, setting up tables and generally overseeing everything.

She loved her flower garden and could often be found out there 'just doing a bit of deadheading, pruning or planting'. Many of these flowers and shrubs were used in flower arrangements for Tellisford church, family occasions or just in the house.

She was always keen to help out in the village and for many years organised the delivery of the parish magazine 'The Link'. She only gave up delivering her 'area' about $2\,^{1}\!/2$ years ago.

In 1995 at the age of 65 Jenny had open heart surgery for a hereditary condition. She recovered well from her heart op and Jenny, true to form, was for many years a committed volunteer fundraiser for the British Heart Foundation organising fundraising events and standing outside supermarkets with her collection box.

Soon after this William and Jenny retired from the farm and moved to Rode. She absolutely loved being there, she had great neighbours, a large garden and could walk to the post office, shop and village hall.

Jenny has always had great affection for Tellisford church: her parents had been married there in 1926, she had been christened there and all her children had been christened there. Both she and William attended the Sunday Service when it was held there and she was also part of the monthly flower arranging rota. William bought flower arranging a pedestal for her to use, which has now been donated to the church.

The aim for 2023 is to increase the audience numbers for these concerts so please do spread the word to your friends and colleagues. I look forward to welcoming you to these wonderful events.



Untold Tales

Another of Anthony Battersby's occasional articles about his over 30 years working on the operational development of child immunisation programmes in remote and difficult parts of the world...

FISHING AFGHAN STYLE

In 1990 I went to Afghanistan to help organise a cross border immunisation programme that was to help children avoid catching diseases like diphtheria, whooping cough, polio, measles and TB.

Afghanistan was at war at the time and I had to have a party of fighters to protect me.

We crossed the border from Pakistan in the very early morning before it was light.

I had to be hidden under a burqa, that is the costume that women wear and which completely hides your appearance (see photograph on the right, mine was also blue).

Once we were across the border I could take it off, which was a relief because they are really hot and stuffy.

The only way to see out is through a sort of screen which goes over your eyes. Afghan women have to wear these things all the time. This is what they look like – see photograph on the right, mine was also blue.

We travelled for 13 hours until we reached somewhere safe to stop for the night. It was near a lake and had natural hot springs.



I cannot tell you how lovely it was to get into that hot water and wash off the dust and dirt of the journey. I had been sitting in the back of a Land Cruiser sitting sideways with all the windows covered and closed. I was exhausted and very very hot.

After a couple of days we reached a place called Chak. This used to have a hydro electric plant which had been installed by the Germans before World War II.

My Afghan guards said, "When we get to Chak we will be able to have fresh trout". I was very surprised because the land there is very dry and dusty and the streams are very small.

Nonetheless when we found the old hvdro station. which had long since stopped working, there was big pool beautiful cool green water with lots of fish swimming in it.

"How do you catch them?" I said. "Do you use a fly or a worm?" They laughed, "Neither" they said, "We use gun-cotton." I did not think this was very sporting, but there were about 20 of us to feed including our hosts and they seemed to have a plan.

The plan involved taking a large block of gun-cotton which had a hole in the middle of and stuffing the hole with detonator that could be fired by electricity.

Once the detonator was stuffed into the hole they connected it to a long wire and chucked the gun-cotton into the water; there was a big splash and it sank to the bottom

They then connected the wire to a battery, bingo, nothing happened, no bang, no dead fish, no supper. So the gun-cotton was pulled out of the water and the detonator was examined and every one around and there were about 30 gave an opinion about why it had failed. After a bit they removed the detonator and began hitting it with a rock.

This is a very very bad idea and I removed myself from the vicinity in case the detonator exploded, but it did not and so was reconnected and again chucked in to the water, again nothing happened.

Then they thought maybe the battery is flat, it was a big battery out of a truck so this seemed to me unlikely. But they were keen to try something else. How about we hook the wires up to a bicycle dynamo? A small boy on a bike with a dynamo came cycling by and was immediately stopped and the wires connected to his dynamo. The boy had a Chinese bike stand that allows the back wheel to lift completely off the ground; my old bike had such a stand. The bike was put on its stand and the gun-cotton we again chucked into the water. The boy got on his bike a peddled like crazy, but no bang no nothing and so after more detailed discussion they decided that the gun-cotton technique was not going to work.



The only other idea was to shoot the fish with their AK47s. The pool was about 20m wide and surrounded by concrete walls about 4m high. All my guards stood on top of the wall and blazed away into the water below. This made a great deal of noise and churned up the water but did not result in any fish being killed.

So I never did get any fresh trout. Supper was the usual tough goat stew.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 13th DECEMBER 2022 AT 7.30 pm

CONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), and Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM).

In attendance: Cllr Barbi Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk and 5 parishioners.

- **1. Public Participation:** There were problems with the playing field pavilion and a company had come to inspect the subsidence and quoted a cost of £12 -15k to repair it; a builder had turned down the job and a further company had quoted £12k+ to repair the subsidence but warned that the repair could upset the balance and result in further work. However, a builder had been found who could do temporary repairs for £3 -4k but these would probably only last for between 3 and 5 years. As a result of this a long-term solution was to be investigated with the playing field, memorial hall and scouts to look for a single hall solution to replace the current pavilion/Memorial Hall/Scouts hut. The Playing Field Committee had approved this; the Memorial Hall had agreed that a single hall in the right place was the way forward. The Scouts had met and also voted in favour of a joint project. The Parish Council were asked for their permission to explore this possibility and to also put someone forward to be on this group. It was agreed that any new building would need to be sustainable (unlike the current buildings) and therefore JM agreed to join the group to also bring his environmental knowledge to the group.
- **2.** Apologies for absence: Cllr J Bowler, Cllr A Pickett, Cllr A Boyden (County Councillor) and Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 15th November were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.
- **5. Presentation on Speed Watch:** Ashley Reay (AR) and Rex Eastment were welcomed to the meeting. AR, the Mendip Co-ordinator for Speedwatch, said that Rode had been one of the founder members of Speedwatch and continued to supply good data. Currently Rode used SIDs to gather data on traffic and speeds and the police do not accept data unless there is a community Speedwatch in that area. New equipment is now becoming available AutoSpeedWatch which captures numberplates and speeds of vehicles and is able to spot repeat offenders without anyone being present at the roadside. This enables repeat speeding offenders to be caught and can result in the police writing or visiting offenders. Somerset police have now agreed to the use of AutoSpeedWatch. A trial is currently in operation to evaluate AutoSpeedWatch and this will continue until around September 2023. This equipment is solar

powered and therefore only works in daylight but as it is permanently located in a single place it can gather continuous data of speeding vehicles (limit for speeding set by equipment and does not gather any information on vehicles within the set speed limit) for that location. The cost of the equipment is around £550, with extra solar boost panel at £95 and ongoing cost of about £150/year (first year free). A permanent location post has to be agreed by Somerset Highways prior to installation. Additionally, a Code of Conduct for the use of and use of data from the AutoSpeedWatch has to be agreed.

The meeting considered the benefit to Rode with two locations being identified – Rode Hill and Bradford Road. It was agreed to purchase an initial AutoSpeedWatch device for Rode. Cllr Bowler would be asked to take this forward with Malcolm Wood (Rode Speedwatch Co-ordinator).

- **6. Report from District Councilior:** Cllr Lund reported Mendip car parks would be free from 17 December up to Christmas. Somerset Waste Partnership had circulated collection dates for the Christmas period. It was also noted that Mendip Council was winding down its business and had cancelled a number of meeting due to lack of business.
- **7. Report from County Councillor:** Cllr Denton had sent in a report which highlighted the following information: Somerset was on course to overspend by £22.5million this year; a unified council tax scheme was to come into force for next year to help those on low income/pay; Somerset was looking for landlords to take in Ukrainian refugees and a business survey to discover current business challenges was being conducted.

8. Actions from previous meeting:

- i. Trees: Merfield/The Mead: Cllr Lund said that she still had not heard from Bo Walsh and she agreed to write to David James on this issue copying in Bo Walsh. The meeting thanked her taking this action.
- **ii. Slip road onto A36:** Cllr Denton had received the stills and was to progress with Sara Davis on how SCC could support an approach to National Highways.
- **iii. Ultrafast broadband:** Limited information was available although Gigaclear had indicated it would start work in Rode in mid-January.
- iv. Footpaths to Church Farm: The Clerk was still to progress.
- **<u>9. Climate Change Group:</u>** The rewilding of the area by the Memorial Hall was held over to the January meeting.

10. Highways:

- **i. Drainage:** JM had tried to find a start date for the work but still awaited a response. [Note: following the meeting JM has been informed work will start on 24 February, after the Beckington work.]
- **ii. Street Lighting:** The process for turning street lights off overnight had been circulated and lights could be turned off from midnight (or other agreed time) until dusk at a cost to the Parish Council. Certain lights at junctions would have to be kept on. Consultation with parishioners and the police would need to

be carried out prior to any action by Somerset. The meeting agreed that this should start and the Clerk was requested to get a map of all lights in Rode.

11. Planning:

i) New applications:

2022/2303/TCA: Magnolia tree remove rotten branch and reduce crown by 1.5m – 9 High Street. No objections

ii. Mendip decisions:

2022/1846/TCA: Fell birch tree – 1 Hughes Court, High Street. Approved **2022/2921/HSE:** Conversion of existing garage to form extension – 69A High Street. Approved

iii. Other:

2021/0071/OTS: Appeal ref: 3292838: Development of Barbara's Field off Church Lane to build up to 49 dwellings. It was reported that PT, JM and Cllr Lund had had a useful call with Nikki White at Mendip regarding the appeal and had managed to get an extension to 12th January for comments. A recommendation had been made for Rode PC to contact Context Planning for their help in fighting the development.

JM had made contact with Context Planning and a quote for their work had been received and accepted (by email) by the PC. Context had visited the site to help gain an understanding for their work. It had become clear that the planned access road had to use some of Brown's Ground which was a designated Local Green Space which is equivalent to the Green Belt with regard to planning. It was also seen that there would be some visual impact from the proposed development. Context had agreed to produce a statement for the PC for submission to the Inspectorate. It was agreed to have another call with Nikki White before the next PC meeting at which the Context statement would be agreed prior to submission to the Planning Inspectorate. The Hearing date had been set for 24th January.

12. Playing Field Constitution: Discussions on the invoice were held over to the January meeting.

13. Buses: PT reported that the bus company had agreed to adjust the timetable for the D2 to take into account the extra time buses required to come through Rode. A new timetable would start on 22nd January. This would require the printing of a new timetable and the meeting agreed to fund this. No gritting had taken place through Beckington and Rode and currently buses were unable to go through Beckington due to an icy hill. It was agreed that the Clerk would contact Cllr Boyden on the lack of gritting of the bus route for him to take forward to the appropriate authorities.

The meeting agreed to sign a letter to the Transport Minister to request an extension to the Bus Recovery Grant.

14. Website: An invoice for the start of the work had been raised and once this was paid work on the new site would commence.

15. Financial matters:

i) Annual Donations: The following donations were agreed to be paid in January:

Hardington Vale £650, The Chapel £350, Mendip Community Transport £150, Citizens Advice Mendip £100 and Tim Lynch (Christmas lights electricity £50)

- **ii) Precept:** The Clerk had received the form for completion; there was some discussion whether a further increase should be requested with Somerset cutting service due to financial problems. It was agreed to keep the increase to that agreed last month but to seriously consider the 2024 figure in early autumn 2023.
- ii) Payments: The following payments were agreed:

Contribution to buss fighting fund £250.00
Zonkey Solutions (new website) £1,197.00
Clerk Salary (Including back pay) £388.05
HMRC PAYE £95.00

16. Any other business: The grit bin at the foot of Church Lane had become depleted following the snow and it was agreed to ask James Osborne if he could get extra grit to fill it.

17. Date of next meeting:

The meeting closed at a arm

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 10th JANUARY 2023 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP) and Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB)

In attendance: Cllr Barbi Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk and 2 parishioners.

<u>1. Public Participation</u>: Concerns were expressed over the drains along Crooked Lane which were blocked, this was resulting in water creating potholes in the road. The Clerk was asked to report this to County Roads.

- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr A Boyden (County Councillor) and Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 13th December were approved.
- **4. Declarations of interest:** None.
- **5. Report from District Councillor:** Cllr Lund reported Mendip was winding down its operations before it ceased to exist from 1st April. Many meetings had not taken place.
- **6. Report from County Councillor:** Cllr Denton had sent a report indicating Somerset had an overspend of over £23million for the year. There was good news that the £2 flat rate bus fare had now started on all local buses.

7. Actions from previous meeting:

- i. Trees: Merfield/The Mead: Cllr Lund apologised for not sending a letter to Mr James but she would do so.
- ii. Slip road onto A36: Cllr Denton had reported that SCC would nudge National Highways on this issue.
- iii. Ultrafast broadband: No further updates had been received.
- iv. Footpaths to and from Church Farm: The recent rains had highlighted the poor quality of the 'rural' path connecting the estate with the village. Autograph Homes were keen to hand over the running of the estate, which included this path, to a Church Farm management company. However, the current path would require costly improvements to make it suitable for all weathers and any management company would be reluctant to take this on. JM pointed out there was a travel plan as part of the agreement to build Church Farm and he had been trying to find out if the Council had approved this yet. It was agreed JM and Cllr Lund would discuss this further and try and progress with Mendip. The PC had not been party to the S106 agreement and therefore had difficulty in resolving this issue. There was a suggestion that the PC could become an agent on behalf of Mendip and consider starting arbitration proceedings on this issue.

It was agreed that JM would report back in a couple of weeks to see if any progress had been made with Mendip before any further action is taken. The condition of this path through the playing field land was also in very poor condition but it was agreed to take no action until the main part of the path was sorted. The use of bark chippings might be considered to improve this section.

8. Climate Change Group: AP had tried to make contact with Adam Woods regarding the rewilding of the area by the Memorial Hall but not had any response. Cllr Lund was seeing him this week and would try and chase him up.

9. Highways:

i. Speedwatch: JB had tried to contact Malcolm Wood and agreed to try again to progress.

- **ii. The Sportsman:** Somerset Council had sent an email saying the site would be adopted in the Spring. However, concern was expressed that the issue of drainage on Clay Lane which was thought to be covered by the S106 agreement for this development had not been carried out. This was an old agreement probably around 2007 and the PC did not have a copy of the S106. Cllr Lund agreed to see if she could find the relevant documents from Mendip.
- **iii. Street Lighting:** Following the last meeting it had been determined that Rode had 70 street lights, of these around 16 were at road junctions and would probably have to be left on after midnight. There were ecological reasons for improving darkness and also climate reasons for reducing energy use and therefore consideration for turning off some street lights was favoured. It was agreed the village would initially be consulted over turning off 30 street lights and if supported and successfully carried out the remaining 20 could be considered for turning off. This would also reduce the initial costs to the Parish Council. The Clerk agreed to draw up a list of lights proposed for turning off.

10. Planning:

i) New applications:

2022/2374/FUL: Erection of 3 dwellings and associated access – The Bell Inn, 13 Frome Road. The meeting agreed this should be objected to on the same grounds as the previous proposal to build 4 dwellings (2021/2297). The refusal would be amended to reflect the Inspector's ruling regarding the Mendip housing plan.

ii. Mendip decisions:

None

iii. Other:

2021/0071/OTS: Appeal ref: 3292838: Development of Barbara's Field off Church Lane – erection of 49 dwellings and associated access. The case prepared by Context Planning objecting to the proposal to develop this site had been circulated prior to the meeting and was endorsed by the meeting as a very good document. This would be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate as the Parish Council's objection to the planning application. JM was thanked for organising this and liaising with Context. The meeting agreed that Context had done a very good job and agreed they should also attend the Hearing (24th January) to help put the PC case. The funding of Context at the Hearing was agreed.

Discussion was held over a possible S106 agreement should the appeal go in favour of the developer. It was agreed that the PC must this time be involved in any S106 agreement to ensure the possible 'donation' of Brown's Ground did not become a financial burden to the PC and that certain work was carried out on this land by the developer as part of any S106.

2021/2297/FUL: Appeal ref: 3305951: Erection of four dwellings and creation of access – The Bell Inn, 13 Frome Road. The developer had appealed to Mendip as no decision on the planning application had been made within the set timeframe. It was agreed to resubmit the PC objection to the original

proposal to the Planning Inspectorate with amendments made to the 5-year housing supply.

- **11. Playing Field Constitution:** AP had spoken briefly to Steve Eyles regarding the invoice and he agreed to follow this up.
- <u>12. Buses:</u> PT reported that the new timetables should start on 22 January with most times of buses changing to reflect the requirement for time to be allowed on the D2 route for it to come through Rode. It was noted that apart from Saturdays there were no evening buses back from Frome to Rode.

The PC had sent a letter to the Minister for Roads, Buses and Places to request an extension to the Bus Recovery Grant. PT said that he was more hopeful that an extension to this grant could be made.

- **13. Website:** Zonkey had acknowledged receipt of the initial payment and were working on the new website. It was agreed that the village sign should be the Rode logo and it was possible art work already existed for this.
- **14. Councillor Resignation:** The meeting noted the resignation of Elaine Butler from the Parish Council due to family reasons. It was agreed the Clerk would let Mendip know and to advertise the vacancy on the noticeboard and put an article in The Link. The vacancy would also be put onto the village Facebook site.

15. Financial matters:

16. Any other business: A concern had been expressed that the tree on PC land on Halfpenny Lane was interfering with overhead cables. It was agreed that the Clerk would investigate, although it was thought the survey last year had not identified any problems, and if necessary, get a quote for work.


