

I receive news from Bethany, the daughter of our former Associate Priest, Andy. Her latest news, see below, will I hope be both heartwarming and of interest to those who knew them.

January 2023 - A little over four weeks ago I was about to begin a discipleship training school with Youth With a Mission.

Since then I have been welcomed into such a kind hearted community where my British accent has been surprisingly popular and learnt so much more of who God is as well as who he says I am. I've come to see the power of the Gospel in a new way and am continuing to grow in hearing God's voice for myself.



Each week so far there has been a different teaching focus including titles such as: Freedom, Pure Heart and Cultures of Revival. During Father Heart of God week I was particularly impacted by the truth that God doesn't look for the qualified but rather qualifies the willing.

In a society with a culture of comparison that's so focused on the idea of being 'good enough' it is easy to undervalue ourselves or think that we are not qualified enough to do something. However we are all called to go into the nations spreading the Good News of God regardless of our own qualifications because it is through his strength not ours.

# 'So he said to his disciples, "The harvest is large but there are few workers to gather it in" Matthew 9:37

Another teaching that specifically spoke to me was on the culture of celebration, that focused on how to emulate the life of Jesus by walking in joy, celebrating an individual's value and speaking words of life. It reminded me that Jesus lived a life of celebration bringing the joy of heaven to release life into humanity. From this the topic of choosing a cheerful heart was especially helpful as well as thinking of joy as a perspective rooted in the love of Jesus, based on eternity and firmly planted in our identity in Christ.

I'm so expectant of what else God is going to show me over the next few months, what I'm going to learn and the friendships I am going to further develop.

I've now found out where I am going on outreach, which is very exciting! I will be part of a pioneering team touring South Korea with a focus on Youth and Young Adult ministry.

This means that we will be leading a lot of youth events, meetings, small groups and services where we are involved in both the worship and teaching. We will be coming alongside young people who may have faced hardships or injustice and offer support. I'm particularly passionate about providing an alternative narrative in terms of self image and self hatred for teenage girls, through a workshop we have been learning in my track: Lifebearers.

I'd like to thank those who have supported me through prayer and financial gifting. Both are hugely appreciated,

I am very grateful for your kind messages of support and generosity. If you feel led to I'd appreciate if you could continue to partner with me in prayer particularly for the following:

- Continued growth and deepening of my faith

### LAUNCH OF ST LAWRENCE CHURCH ROOF APPEAL

We will soon be sending out full details of the above, THE HEART so will be brief in what we say here. As previously published in News from St Lawrence:

- The current best estimate of the cost is £400,000.
- The Richard Oatley Foundation have very kindly pledged £300,000.
- A further £100,000 therefore needs to be raised.

One resident has recently pledged to match aggregate donations from other residents up to a total of £25,000.

Steady progress has been made with the practicalities of the project as follows:

- The church architect has drawn up the necessary plans and detailed specification.
- An application for permission to carry out the work (known as a Faculty) has been submitted to the Diocese.
- The first phase of the work (the Chancel roof) has been put out to tender.



St Lawrence is an historic and beautiful building.

More of its history is set out by Peter Harris in this month's Link. It is 150 years since the roof received this kind of overhaul

### **RODE'S BUSES TO GET EVEN BETTER**



The Government has just announced bus funding (through the Bus Recovery Grant) is to be extended by a further 3 months through to June 30<sup>th</sup>. This is something Rode Parish Council, had lobbied the

Government to do (as had scores of other councils across the country).

The new £2 single fare will also be extended through to the end of June. As a result, First and Faresaver will maintain their current bus services through Rode, including the trial of the greatly increased D2 bus services through Rode that First introduced last October.

First has also announced that it will be introducing new late evening services (Monday to Saturday) from Frome to Rode (and onto Bath), these will be in addition to the current late evening services from Bath (and onto Frome). The current and the new evening services through Rode are because of financial support from the new Somerset County Council.

Additionally from April, First are increasing Rode's Sunday D2 bus services, both to Frome and Bath That's because more people are using our Sunday buses.

But if we are to keep Rode's much improved bus services after June 30th, then we will need to keep using our buses just as much as each of us can.



### **RODE DRAINAGE PROJECT UPDATE**

The project to undertake various vital drainage improvements in the village has unfortunately been delayed.



The initial funding allocated by the **Somerset Rivers Authority** (SRA) was insufficient to deliver the extent of works that were felt crucial to the long term flood resilience of the village. Rising fuel prices and costs of materials were partly to blame, but the extent of the required infrastructure improvements was also greater than anticipated. Fortunately, the SRA Board approved additional funding last autumn which was great news, and has allowed the full project to proceed.

It had been hoped to commence the works in November, but a number of issues pushed the start date into this year. The Rode project was then combined with a similar project in Beckington, and work commenced last month on the Beckington element which has helped to ensure costs are minimised whilst still delivering the full project scope. The nature of the work involves dealing with very old, underground infrastructure, and this can present unforeseen challenges....whilst progress in Beckington is good, it is not yet possible to provide specific dates for the Rode element of the project.

Mendip District Council has, however, confirmed that the full scope of works in Rode is not at risk, and the fact that Mendip ceases to exist as a statutory body at the end of the month will not impact delivery.



As soon as dates for the Rode project are confirmed these will be communicated to residents via letter and updates on the village Facebook site.

In his Law 631, Plato speaks of the Divine Goods of Wisdom, Self-Control, Justice, and Courage. Every day, behind the scenes at the Somerset Council, officers and members are exercising these in preparation for the fast-approaching Vesting Day on April 1st. We all have different views of these aspects of life, but what we can all agree on is that together they lead to happiness. And although happiness is a deeply personal experience, when we are happy within ourselves, we offer so much more to the community. The collective becomes vibrant, engaging and thrives when we are happy souls.

What about self-control? ### CLIMATE EMERGENCY UPDATE

**Public Transport** - One of the key objectives this year is to support the provision of good local public transport, so it's great to hear that the Bus Recovery Grant has been extended for another three months, and the £2 single fare offer will also continue until the end of June. More on this on page 10.



**Insulation** - One of the best things we can do for the planet (and our energy bills) is to ensure our homes are properly insulated. This is especially the case in a village like Rode, where many of the properties are old, and don't benefit from double glazing, well-insulated walls, or proper loft insulation.

Our own house is a particularly good example of a poorly-insulated home! So last year we took advantage of a scheme run by the Centre For Sustainable Energy (CSE) and purchased a subsidised Retrofit Survey. As a result we've made various minor, relatively cheap changes - e.g.; installing a "chimney sheep" to reduce heat loss via an open fireplace. However, to make a meaningful difference to the energy efficiency of our home we've had to start investing in the fabric of the building... the first step we've taken is to install secondary glazing. The option of replacing most of our windows with double-glazed units seemed impossible (due to conservation area legislation) - so we opted for an alternative. This should reduce heat loss through our single-glazed windows by around 70% and has been installed by a West Country based firm who've developed a system using plexiglass (a lightweight equivalent to glass used in the aeronautical industry) to provide a second layer to period windows. There are, obviously many other options in this field. Secondary glazing has had a poor reputation (either from an aesthetic perspective, or in terms of its insulating properties) we've been impressed with the results on both counts.

If you're interested in improving the insulation in your home, there are plenty of resources on-line – in particular on CSE's website (go to www.cse.org.uk and click on the "Resources" tab). Or, for a more detailed dive into the whole subject of retrofit, the Net Zero Carbon Toolkit is a good read. It was prepared primarily for local authorities (Mendip DC has adopted it), but the section on Retrofit is a very useful guide for individuals looking to make changes to their own homes www.westoxon.gov.uk/media/2ddb125k/net-zero-carbon-toolkit.pdf

**Just Stop Oil - What is it? What are they trying to achieve? Should I get involved?** Last year our Group carried out a survey in Rode to better understand villagers' feelings about climate change... nearly a quarter of the electorate replied. 98% of respondents agreed human activity is either partially or wholely responsible for climate change, and 79% agreed that we need drastic

change to avoid the worst effects of climate change. Since then we've had COP27, and this stark warning from the UN Secretary General: "We are in the fight of our lives. And we are losing. Greenhouse gas emissions keep growing. Global temperatures keep rising. And our planet is fast approaching tipping points that will make climate chaos irreversible. **We are on a highway to climate hell with our foot still on the accelerator.**"

Individuals, groups and governments around the world are reacting to the threat of climate change in different ways... e.g. in the UK, Just Stop Oil is a coalition of groups working together to ensure our government commits to ending all new licences for the exploration, development and production of fossil fuels. Their campaign includes the use of non-violent civil disobedience, which can obviously be controversial. Here in Rode some residents have decided the issues are so important that they need to join movements such as Just Stop Oil. Di Bligh is one of those, and she has offered to host a talk and discussion about the issues. So - if you're keen to understand what Di's doing and why - please come and join us. A brief history of civil disobedience and an outline of what Just Stop Oil is trying to achieve are included as is an opportunity to provide feedback, in groups and individually at the end. The Talk is at Rode Memorial Hall - **Wednesday 5th April 7.30pm**. Refreshments provided. The talk is free - should be a fascinating evening!

Another "Big Green Weekend" - As you may recall, last September we held one, organised in conjunction with representatives from Beckington & Norton St Philip. Our intention is to run a similar set of events in 2023 - the planning is just beginning. This year we aim to also work with the Frome "Great Big Green Week", which takes place  $10^{th} - 18^{th}$  June, coinciding with the nationwide event of the same name. # Parish Wildlife

#### THE BARN OWL

We all love owls. Cuddly versions are the second best sellers in toy shops (after teddy bears). Social psychologists tell us why. For an animal to be this



popular it has to be a caricature of man. It must share various features such as a vertical posture and a flat face with big eyes at the front. Let's face it everyone has a gran, great gran or elderly aunt who looks "owl-like" through their reading glasses. But the real owl isn't quite as cuddly. Underneath that fluffy exterior it hides sharp talons and a ruthless beak. These are rodent killing machines!

In Laverton we are blessed by populations of Barn, Tawny and Little Owls. We hear all of them during many nights of the year. But it's the Barn Owl's love of dusk and dawn that makes it the most visible to us. You'll rarely hear a Barn Owl coming. It ghosts quietly into view. That is why before barns were invented they were known as Ghost Owls....

Barn Owl's need three things to thrive:

- Lots and lots of field voles (with a few common shrews and wood mice thrown in). They absolutely love field voles. An average pair raising a family of owlets eats a whopping 4,000 a year.
- Somewhere to nest safely.
- No long periods of very cold or wet weather.

So, to encourage Barn Owls we need plenty of areas where field voles can nest and thrive (at least until they get caught by a barn owl!). Field voles really like rough grassland i.e. areas of fields where grass has been allowed to grow long in the summer and dies down and collapses naturally in the autumn and winter. This leaves 3-4 inches of dead grass that field voles love to burrow in and hide away. They quickly leave areas where grass is cut or grazed any lower than this.

In Laverton this winter we've seen an increase in Barn Owl sightings over areas which have been left as rough grassland. When an owl needs 4,000 voles a year it will very quickly find areas which are to the voles liking! Even the smallest areas left as rough grassland can become of interest. It's worth the effort (in fact no effort because you just leave the grass!). When a Barn Owl ghosts by hunting, you'll know why. For more information on Barn Owls visit: www.barnowltrust.org.uk/

# **Parish Gardening**

Look I don't want to scare you, but gardening - it's a dangerous business. I've just spent a few hours pruning the fruit trees and while I at the top of the ladder, I resisted the urge to reach those tantalizing out of each branches... I took a tumble from the top of a step ladder a couple of years ago and was very lucky the ground below had been heavily mulched so I had a soft-ish landing and thankfully no broken bones. But this reminds me to stop and think about some basic safety measures to prevent accidents/injuries in the garden - rather than getting all gung ho the minute the sun comes out and the chain saw beckons.

So, some simple (very obvious?) thoughts on how to look after ourselves: • Wear gloves - not just for thorns, nettles, thistles and prickles but for irritating saps from certain plants (Euphorbia, I'm talking about you) as well as those exciting finds of broken glass, tin cans and old china cups

• Think about wearing goggles to protect your eyes - yes it sounds a bit silly but so is poking out your eye on a cane and spending hours in A&E.

• Check your tools (1) - blades work better if they're clean and sharp - blunt tools can be quite a bit more dangerous than the properly sharpened.

• Check your tools (2) - put them away safely, keep the safety catch and covers on and know exactly where you've put them - don't have a general dumping container for everything so that each time you rummage in a dark corner of the garage or shed for your gardening gloves (see above) you find instead the sharp pointy end of some implement that stabs you.

• Tetanus jab - make sure you've had yours and any boosters you're due.

• Always have someone footing the ladder and definitely check, double- check that your ladder is stable before attempting work at any height.

• If you feel a slight wobble when you're standing on the 2nd rung of the ladder, get down and repeat the safety check/double-check (see above). Then give yourself a pat on the back for avoiding a trip to A&E.

• Mind your back - poor posture and over-estimating your strength or getting fixated on finishing a particularly punishing job can lead to lots of unplanned trips to osteopaths/chiropractors.

• Repetitive strain injuries - ditto. It's good to move from one job to the next fairly frequently - from weeding to sweeping, to pruning then back to weeding etc so you don't get stuck on the same movements for too long

• Sunburn - yes, it happens to the best of us and it's not always trivial...

Needed in our gardener's toolkit - Gloves; eye goggles; stable surface for ladders plus a ladder footer; watch to remind o switch activity; organised tool box to store sharp tools; blade sharpeners and tool cleaning kit; suncream and phone number of a great osteopath, chiropractor or massage therapist to keep us going. Eternal youth would also be helpful.

# **Parish History**

Given the works required to maintain St Lawrence Church, Rode, it seemed the perfect time to include an article about the history of the church.

We are very lucky to have our local history man, Peter Harris, to call on for such things and once again he has delivered. Many thanks Peter.

Part 1 follows, Part 2 will be included in our April issue.

#### The History of St. Lawrence Church (Part 1)

The earliest knowledge we have of the likelihood of a church in Rode is from the Domesday Book.

This records that in the time of both Edward the Confessor (1042 to 1066 AD) and William I (the Conqueror) (1066 to 1087 AD) a cleric by the name Rumbald (or Reginboldald) was priest of both Frome and Rode.

The present Church had at least one predecessor, as evidence of an earlier, smaller building was found during the last major restoration in 1872/4. Two fragments of Norman twisted column and a small piece of plain moulded stone (possibly from an even earlier building) were saved and are now mounted above the door on the north side of the Vestry. The earliest record of a clergyman being presented to the living of Rode is that of John de Thorendon in 1226 AD.

The listed building record considers the existing building to date from the late 14th and 15<sup>th</sup> century. It is perhaps not a coincidence that c1470, after a century of absence, the Lordship of the Manor (then held by John St. Maur) returned to Rode, making his home at Seymour's Court, just 500 metres south of St. Lawrence.

The earliest remaining parts of the church are the wagon roofs of the south and north aisles, the north doorway and the tower.

There is evidence of bells in the church as early as 1532, when Thomas Byrtt made his will leaving a cow to Rode church and some money to the bells.

At the east end of the south aisle there are the signs of a medieval chantry chapel of unknown dedication, where prayers would have been said for the souls of the departed who had given funds for such ceremonies.

Remaining features include a richly carved wall tomb, inside which local tradition has it that the remains of one of the great St. Maur family rest.

## **Parish History**

Renovation work in 1872/4 revealed a beautiful medieval mural depicting the Virgin Mary and other coloured decorations on the plaster in the area around the tomb.

piscina (used for washing А communion vessels) was found there and replaced in the wall. Overhead, on the roof beams, is a pierced boss where a lamp had hung over the altar. The Reformation, in the mid-16th Century, brought the suppression of such chantries, and the lavish decorations were covered over or removed. Indeed, in 1575, land in Rode that provided funds for fuelling and maintenance of the chantry lamp, then in the possession of Thomas Webbe (Lord of Rode Manor), was confiscated by the Oueen.

The earliest memorial in the church is painted on wood. It is to John Hellierd, who died in 1623 He was the father of Nathaniel, the priest installed at Rode in 1617. Nathaniel died 28 years later having served the parish through the turbulent period of the civil war.



On the top of the sturdy tower is a small, railed turret, known as the "King's Chair", from which (if village tradition is to be believed) King Charles II, after the battle of Worcester on 3<sup>rd</sup> September 1651, surveyed the countryside to see if any pursuing Parliamentary troops were in the vicinity.

Whether this is true or not, it is certain that our Church of St. Lawrence, and the thousands of villagers who have worshipped here over the centuries, have seen a broad canvas of our country's history unroll before them, and who knows what is yet to come?

#### RODE OVER 60'S

Meeting held on Friday 10th February, Rode Memorial Hall - The Sahara Sisters with Rachel Terry came to demonstrate and inform us of the origins and customs of this form of dance.

Rachel has lived and worked closely with Egyptian dancers in Luxor and the wider world. The ladies dressed in beautiful heavily beaded costumes performed several dances gracefully. Rachel informed us these dances (performed mainly by men) were originally forms of communication between villages who had different dialects. Then women looking for husbands. Over time many cultures developed their own versions. For example gypsies who travelled widely. The wearing of coin decorated belts showed wealth.

The straight shift style tunic dress called a "galabia" evolved to allow more movement side slits gave way to very wide gathered skirts, sometimes containing 25yds of soft very fine material.

Some members were "persuaded to have a go" they found the art of isolationkeeping the upper body still while gyrating the hips very difficult ! Many women have found benefits using these movements to their general wellbeing by reducing pain.

The ladies shared examples of costumes and explained how they are constructed, a bra like top had rubber from tyres in it to form the cups. They were very inventive, using anything they could find!

It was an informative, fun afternoon enjoyed by all! Refreshments of sandwiches and cakes were served and the afternoon ended with the raffle.

Our next meeting is our Annual Dinner to be held on Friday 10th March, 6 for 6.30pm in the Memorial Hall. Members were given acceptance forms to be completed and returned including member's contribution of  $\pounds$ 12 each towards costs, to any committee member.

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

#### MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL

ON TUES 7th FEBRUARY 2023 AT 7.30 pm

#### **UNCONFIRMED**

**Present**: Cllr Andy Pickett – in the Chair (AP), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR) and Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM)

In attendance: Hugh Williams – Clerk and 1 parishioner.

**<u>1. Public Participation</u>:** Concern was expressed over a large pothole on Crooked Lane but it was thought this might have been reported as it was now marked up. Thanks were expressed for the double yellow lines at the Rode Hill/High Street junction but a question was raised regarding the gap in one set of these. (The Clerk agreed to ask Somerset about this).

Gigaclear had been approached regarding installing ultrafast broadband and had responded this would be at end of 2023. PT commented he had just spoken to Gigiaclear and had been informed work should start in quarter 2 and be complete at the end of quarter 3 this year.

Special thanks was given to JM and all the others who had put the case for not developing Barbara's Field at the two day Hearing in January.

**<u>2. Apologies for absence</u>**: Cllr M Salmon, Cllr J Bowler, Cllr B Lund (District Councillor), Cllr A Boyden (County Councillor) and Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)

**3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 10<sup>th</sup> January were approved.

4. Declarations of interest: None.

**5. Planning** – **Appeal Hearing:** The Hearing had taken two full days, 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> January and it was thought the PC had presented a good case against the development of Barbara's Field, with JM and Context Planning doing well. There was some disappointment that Mendip had not done as well as hoped defending their decision to refuse the planning application. There was considerable concern that should the application be approved by the Inspector the S106 agreement appeared to have been prepared without any input from the Parish Council. The S106 would cover Brown's Ground and it appeared this would be given to Somerset Council with the village having no say over it. The PC could decide that it did not want to take on Brown's Ground and leave it to Somerset to retain as an open space. It was noted the Inspector still had to visit the site before making her final decision and she had been offered the opportunity to see the site from the historic buildings on Bradford Road, which she had verbally accepted. This might help her decide against the development. AP said he would be informed when she was coming to visit.

**<u>6. Report from County Councillors:</u>** Cllr Denton and Cllr Boyden had reported on road gritting in Somerset and it was clear due to budget restraints

this could become more limited. It was unclear whether the village grit bins would in future be filled free of charge. Pressure to grit the D2 bus route was still being applied but it was doubtful this would succeed in Rode.

It had been agreed that Rode would form part of the Frome LCN, which would be composed of 18 Parish Councils. Concern had been expressed that the LCN Planning Board would not have enough power with major decisions being taken by Somerset.

#### 7. Actions from previous meeting:

- **i. Trees: Merfield/The Mead:** Cllr Lund had sent a letter to Mr James regarding the trees and had a response from Mrs James who was getting a tree surgeon to look at the trees. Hopefully action would be taken. The Clerk agreed to write to Mrs James thanking her for acting so quickly.
- **ii. Footpaths to and from Church Farm:** JM reported that he had engaged with the Enforcement Officer at Mendip on the path but it had now gone quiet. He added that Autograph Homes had agreed to commit to delivering everything on the Travel Plan to the residents on Church Farm. There was little the PC could do, as it was not part of the S106 agreement, but up to Somerset to enforce.
- **iii. Hoedown:** The poster prepared by JB was approved but it was agreed that it should only have the March and April dates on it. Further Hoedowns would be arranged for the summer and autumn but it was agreed not to hold them monthly.
- **iv. Tree on Halfpenny Row:** A quote for cutting 5m off the height and removing a number of branches of the contorted willow had been submitted and it was agreed to accept this quote and get the work done.

**<u>8. Climate Change Group:</u>** It was agreed to continue to rewild the area by the Memorial Hall. AP had circulated a quote to remove the top four inches of grass/soil and it was agreed this should go ahead along with clearing the ditch at the back of the area. The soil could be put on the S106 land at the playing field. The meeting approved up to £200 for digger hire.

#### 9. Highways:

**i.** The Sportsman: There had been no S106 agreement for this development as it was less than 10 dwellings. There was a substantial sum held from this development and it was thought this could be used to improve the drainage on Clay Lane which had not been resolved.

**ii. Street Lighting:** The Clerk had circulated a proposed list of lights that could be turned off at midnight. This list ensured lights at junctions remained on and also no road would be left in total darkness. The main concern would be in winter when it would be darker for those going out before dawn. However, there were benefits to wildlife, reduced energy consumption to help combat climate change etc. with reduced lighting and it was agreed the Clerk would draft a questionnaire for approval and circulation of the village.

#### 10. Planning:

#### i) New applications:

**2023/0131/TCA:** Reduce magnolia, plum and apple trees all by 1m – 5 Lower Street. No objections.

#### ii. Mendip decisions: None

**11. Playing Field Constitution:** AP reported he had spoken to the solicitor, David Kirby, regarding the invoice and clarified it. Following discussions with Steve Eyles (Chair of the Playing Field Committee) it had been agreed the Parish Council would pay 60% of the invoice, the PC being custodians should pay the larger portion. The meeting agreed to this payment.

**12. Buses:** The new timetables had been circulated to all the village. It was reported that the Department of Transport had replied to the PC regarding extending the bus support grant saying no decision had yet been made. This was disappointing as the end of March was approaching fast.

**13.** Website: The construction of the new website was proceeding and photographs of the Councillors were being supplied. Access to the new site would be available to the Parish Council prior to its approval and it going live.

**<u>14. Coronation Weekend:</u>** There was little support to doing anything major over the weekend of 6<sup>th</sup> May as it was less than a year since the Jubilee celebrations. A possible party for children was discussed. It was agreed to discuss this again at the March meeting.

**<u>15. Conservation area</u>**: It was agreed to relook at defining the Conservation Area for Rode as currently the village centre and along the A361 were covered but there were listed buildings not in the current Conservation Area. It was agreed to try and protect the village as a whole.

#### 16. Financial matters:

**i. Yearly expenditure:** The Clerk said that the annual expenditure would exceed £25,000 again this year and that an external audit of the accounts would be required.

**ii. Grass cutting:** The quote from Eagle Grounds Maintenance was accepted but the Clerk was asked to go back to them as an extra area of the playing field would require cutting following the moving of the cricket square. AP agreed to determine this extra area.
