REFLECTION

"Count your blessings" - When a child and grumpy about something, my parents might say "Count your blessings!" It sounded rather like a rebuke, the close relative of "pull yourself together". Maybe as a result, the whole idea of "counting blessings" wasn't something I've ever properly unpacked/ understood – the phrase remains like a single word, a rebuke when applied to me.

The other day we took one of our grandchildren for a special outing to an animal farm near Chew Magna. We followed our satnav (never wise!) which, near our destination, told us to turn left into a road which was actually signed as not suitable for motor vehicles (but I didn't notice this at the time!). The road was very narrow, with no room for turning, and wound down a steep hill. At the bottom of the hill a ford presented itself which we had little option but to cross... and we have had quite a bit of rain recently! The stream was very swollen and as we crossed it, the bottom of our car became partially disconnected. We continued to our destination dragging something noisily with us. Even more noisy in our heads was the fear our day was now going to be dominated by worries about getting the car repaired, spoiling special time with our grandson.

As we drove into the animal farm two of the farm workers turned and looked at the noisy car approaching them. As soon as we stopped they came up to point out the problems they could see. However, they were not just head-shaking, teeth-sucking observers – they then immediately offered help. They were able to jack the car up, they disconnected the offending item, and secured the rest of the car. We did not have to ask for help, it was freely offered to us, and they asked for no recompense.

We had a lovely day with our grandson and he enjoyed the whole thing – the action of those men, a real blessing, had helped make our day. When we got home there was a letter telling me that I had strayed into the non-congestion zone in Bristol last month and I had to pay a fine – which made me realise I'd just done it again that same day!. But at least I could pay all those debts at once and it still felt like a day of real blessings!

St Paul, writing to the Romans, said, "... when I come to you, I will come in the fullness of the blessing of Christ" (Romans 15:29). These are powerful and encouraging words. The challenge to me is not only to become more aware of and to count my own blessings, but also, like Paul, to seek how to bless others. While I may feel that the chances of this are limited by my human nature, anything becomes possible through a relationship with Christ.

MARCH/APRIL UPDATE FROM BETHANY BOWERMAN

As explained previously I receive news from Bethany, the daughter of our former Associate Priest, Andy. Her latest news, see below, will I hope, be both heart warming and of interest to those who knew them. *Caroline Walker*

Hi all! Sorry it's been a bit of a while since my last update. We've been in South Korea for just over 2 weeks now and it's all been pretty busy. The last few weeks of the lecture phase in Kona were amazing, with my mum coming for 10 days to visit me.

We had a week of teaching on Biblical Worldview which was probably my favourite of the whole 3 months. It was philosophy focused and their teaching style was different to the others we'd had, with group discussion and Q + A after each lecture. The topics discussed included: communicating with Christ, origin, destiny, meaning and morality. One of the main skills they were teaching on was how best to ask questions in order to have conversations beyond a surface level.

We also had our Love Feast which is a meal you have all together as students and staff to celebrate the end of lecture phase and I had a last supper with my roomies/room staff.



My friends from England did a three legged race in Kona to raise funds for Outreach.

Mum's Visit - While my mum was in Kona she was able to come to some of my classes, meet my teammates and just spend time with me. It was a great way to prepare before outreach and fully experience the Hawaiian island.









It was so good to see her and get to explore the island together, going to the beach and seeing the sunset on top of Mauna Kea as well as the incredible stars.



Cherry Blossoms, Seoul - We arrived in Seoul at the end of March just in time for the last cherry blossoms - so beautiful to see, especially by the Han

River. Since coming to Seoul we have focused on educating ourselves on South Korea's history, both in terms of religion and politics. We went to visit the Yanghwajin Foreign Missionary Cemetery. This was one of the more poignant experiences, which allowed us to praverfully remember the work the



missionaries who came before us and the sacrifices they made. I was surprised by how many British missionaries had come and pioneered ministries here.

Regular Week - The layout of our week is made up of a variation of ministries. We get one day off a week which is a great way to explore and get to know the city of Seoul. The rest of the week is spent working with the local YWAM base specifically on their Campus Ministry. On Tuesdays and Thursdays we go to different Universities to evangelise on the campuses and join with the Christian Union worship nights, helping to lead them and to meet/get to know the students. We are also partnering with a Church whilst we are in Seoul, joining their Sunday Young Adults service and leading their weekly youth nights. Our main vision is to encourage local believers and empower GenZ in wholehearted love for God and the Great Commission. Another ministry we are partnering with is Dwell House, a church focused on meeting in worship nights and prayer with the aim of revival in Korea and the empowerment of Women (Brave Love).

Already in these first few weeks God has been moving so radically amongst the Korean people. On our second night here we were at a University worship night with Dwell House and the Spirit was so present that we ended up worshipping for 3 hours straight. During this time young people gave their life to Jesus, said yes to the Great Commission and people were physically healed. This is particularly significant because in Korean Churches they are afraid of praying for healing because they are worried that it won't happen. It is also unusual for worship nights to be led without some sort of specific structure and to be a mix of denominations and ages.

Our team wasn't aware of any of this before the gathering; only after the night did our contact explain how amazing that night truly was.

This has been a running theme of our ministry nights so far in Korea. As a team we have been continually told that we have a breaker anointing over our time here, that we are to step out in boldness and faith in ways that go against the trend in Korean Churches in order to bring wholehearted faith, joyful repentance and revival.

Prayer requests:

- Pray that no performance or striving enters into our team during ministry
- Prayer for continued unity and boldness as a team to go against the culture here to allow for God to enter in and cause change
- Prayer that the hearts of those we are talking to are open to what we have to say and that we have the right words to say
- Prayer for the youth of Korea specifically in terms of mental health and suicide rates
- Thanks to God for the miracles we have already seen with 2 people healed!!

Thank you for your continued prayer and support. With blessings.

LAND AT CHURCH LANE - APPEAL DECISION

As most will be aware, around 18 months ago Mendip District Council (MDC) turned down an application to build 49 houses on land adjacent to Church Lane (Barbara's Field, and part of Brown's Ground). Last year the applicant lodged an appeal against that decision, and an appeal hearing took place in January this year. The result of the appeal was published on Friday 21st April, with the Inspector **dismissing the appeal**. The grounds for dismissal are fairly wideranging, and are supportive of both MDC's original refusal, and Rode Parish Council's submissions.

In particular, the Inspector found that:

- The proposal would result in an excessive amount of unplanned development in Rode.
- It would conflict with MDC's spatial strategy, and would be contrary to several critical MDC planning policies (e.g.: Core Policies 1, 2 and 4)
- The proposed development would adversely harm the existing openness of the site and would represent an intrusive form of development into an undeveloped rural site, resulting in the permanent erosion of open countryside.
- It would harm the setting of a heritage asset (The Old Rectory on Bradford Road).

The Inspector acknowledges that the development would bring a number of benefits but concludes that "the accumulation of harm significantly and demonstrably outweighs the benefits of the proposal." The full decision document is available on the Planning Inspectorate website (search for Appeal Reference 3292838), and on the Somerset Council website: https://www.somerset.gov.uk/planning-buildings-and-land/ (go to "view and comment on a planning application", then search for the original application reference: 2021/0071/OTS).

ST LAWRENCE ROOF APPEAL UPDATE

When we reported the position in the April edition of the Link, we had heard from 29 households. At that stage this had produced (including Gift Aid) £9,395 plus a matched donation of £9,395 making £18,790 in total.



Another month has gone by and the number of respondents has increased to 64 and the total contributions including Gift Aid and matched funding are up to £ 41,037. This is fantastic, however, we have much further to go.

We have heard from some people whom we suspect may never have been inside the church, and for which we are very grateful. However there remains plenty of scope for others to help so that the total can be pushed past £50,000 by the time we are writing a submission for the June Link.

We are also hoping to hear from any musicians who would like to take up Andy Hooker's generous offer of his venue at Christchurch House for an event.

RODE STREET LIGHT QUESTIONNAIRE - RESULTS

The Questionnaire circulated to all the residents of Rode was "Rode Parish Council are seeking approval for streetlights going off at midnight and back on at 5.30am". Results:

In favour: 128 Against: 11 Undecided: 4 Total returns: 143

This indicates that residents are strongly in favour of the proposal to turn off about half of the streetlights in Rode.

A number of comments were received, but strangely there were very few comments by those wanting to keep the lights on. Two of those wanting to keep the lights on indicated that their objection only applied to, in one case, 3 lights on The Mead and in the other case to a light in The Old Brewery. The main reason for opposition to the proposal was possible increase in crime. Another reason was to protect women out after midnight.

There was hope amongst those in favour of a return to 'dark skies' over Rode, although this is still unlikely until all lights go off. Many replies were very supportive of the proposal and even went as far as saying this was the best thing the Parish Council has done.

A couple of replies requested an 11.00pm turn off and there were requests for less bright lights (Somerset has indicated that the lights have to meet a certain specification which includes brightness, however, shielding could be available for those shining directly into houses).

Interest in this applying to the Church Farm site were expressed but these lights are still the responsibility of Autograph Homes so no action can currently be taken.

Further information from Somerset on accidents is awaited and then the Parish Council need to liaise with the Police with the final list (which will include some amendments from the list circulated, taking into account comments made) before going ahead with Somerset to get this actioned.

'DAISY A DAY'

The concept of 'Daisy a Day' has been brewing for a long time. When I became a County Councillor in May 2022, I set out to meet local charities and not-forprofit organisations who are doing amazing things in our community to find out how I can support them.



You may remember that during the election, one of my flyers that may have dropped onto your mat had the following phrases:

- "My focus is on being part of the team that is you, the Parish and Somerset Council, and other relevant organisations."
- "Ensure communities are connected."
- "My commitment to community will ensure that conversations become actions."

Over the past year, I have met with about 20 different local organisations, charities and not-for-profits, to find out what I can do to help.

Small change and community - I often look at the change that my other half takes out of his pockets. It can be up to £5 which I put into a money box ('finders, keepers'). I realised that odd amounts of money could be incredibly useful to community groups, especially at this difficult time. And 'Daisy a Day' was born.

How much can you give to charity? Imagine if everyone in a village of 500 people, gave £1 per month to a charity. That would be £500! They could even employ someone and make even more of an impact on the community. A little bit from everyone can go so far. Most of us can donate something. If you could choose 5 of your favourite local charities or community groups and give them each £1 or £2 per month, collectively, we could have an incredibly big impact on the work they do. Or imagine how £10 per month could support 5 local groups with £2 each. And the same for £20. Charities can do so much more planning if they know how much they are getting in every month.

It will take a bit of time to set up, but once it is done, you will be making a difference across your community and in a range of community groups. Times are tough, but a 'daisy a day' could be the difference you want to see in the world.

CLIMATE EMERGENCY UPDATE

"Bluebell Wood" Solar Park - The Parish Council was recently contacted by a company called Low Carbon, who intend to develop a solar farm on land in Rode. The farm is intended to generate just under 50 megawatts of electricity (equivalent to powering around 16,000 homes). Details of consultation events are on page 10.

The farm will cover just under 200 acres of land (the land in question is redlined on the map on page 23). The proposal is subject to receipt of planning permission, and Low Carbon will shortly be conducting a consultation exercise, which will include presentations in the Memorial Hall, leaflets and feedback forms delivered to all local residents, a project website, and a dedicated project email for queries. Low Carbon will be publicising the consultation events very soon.

No Mow May - It's that time of year when the lawnmowers emerge from sheds and garages around the country. However, that early cut is definitely NOT rewarding for wildlife - in particular bees and other pollinators which are critical to food production (around a third of all the crops we eat rely on invertebrates for pollination).

These creatures rely almost entirely on wildflowers to survive. However, in the UK we have lost over 97% of species-rich flower meadows since the 1930s. So, ignoring your mower over the month of May will provide a much-needed boost for wildlife throughout the summer.....whilst private gardens cannot substitute ancient wild meadows, we can do a huge amount on a small scale to reverse critical habitat loss.

And the good news is we can do this with little or no effort, saving energy (and money) in the process....because one of the best ways to encourage wildflowers in the garden is simply to forget the lawnmower and just let your grass grow!

Leave a patch of lawn to its own devices during spring and summer, and the chances are that at least some wildflowers will appear in your new minimeadow. Not only will it attract wildlife into your garden, but it will look lovely too – a powerful reminder that we should value what's left and support all efforts to restore wildflower meadows.

Ideally, try to resist cutting until at least the middle of July – or even into early September if you can. This gives the wildflowers a chance to complete their cycle of growing, flowering and setting seed. The exact timing of the first cut depends on the year and the weather, but a later cut will help species like knapweed and

orchids to spread, while earlier cuts can help control competitive species, such as common hogweed. If you get more invasive plants like nettle or dock, it's best to pull these up by hand.

PS: A small patch of land adjacent to the Memorial Hall will shortly be seeded to provide a "wild area" – the Parish Council will monitor how well the wildflowers grow....hopefully this will be a further contribution to sustaining the biodiversity of the village.

Great Big Green Week (10th – 18th June) - Plans for the Great Big Green Week are progressing. The programme of events will include the following:

- A series of talks in Rode Memorial Hall on Saturday 17th June. We're
 delighted that the headline speaker this year is Sarah Dyke, lead member for
 Environment & Climate Change on Somerset Council.
- A repeat of the "Green Open Doors" event held last year, on Sunday 18th June.
- "Veggie Week" local pubs will be promoting their vegetarian and vegan
 meal options during Great Big Green Week, and some will be offering a few
 extra special veggie treats! Pubs taking part include the Cross Keys, The Mill
 at Rode, The Foresters (Beckington), The Woolpack (Beckington) and the
 Full Moon at Rudge.

More details will be available in the June edition of The Link, on the village Facebook site, in the Climate Emergency Group newsletter, and elsewhere!

Climate Change & Civil Disobedience talk and discussion - There was an excellent turn-out for the talk provided by Di Bligh in the village hall last month. Di's presentation was both fascinating and emotional and was certainly a "call to action" for many. If you missed the talk but are interested to learn more about using non-violent civil disobedience to stop future fossil fuel exploration, then Just Stop Oil run similar talks every week, on-line. More sewage in the River Frome - The Rivers Trust publishes the data on sewage overflows for nearly all "Combined Sewer Overflows" (CSOs) and water treatment works in England & Wales. The data for 2022 has recently become available, and unfortunately it appears that the figures for the treatment works in Rode are the worst on record.

In total, according to the data published by the Rivers Trust, the facility overflowed 82 times last year, for a total of 1,248 hours.

Having contacted Wessex Water, I have been assured that the figures are not as bad as this, due to a change in the way the data is collected. The revised numbers supplied by Wessex Water are 61 spills, for a total of 775 hours.

The river can look idyllic, but unfortunately - based on the figures above (using either the Rivers Trust data, or the revised numbers from Wessex Water) - there is a serious risk of nasty objects floating around...in addition to any agricultural run-off or other forms of pollution.

Wessex Water has, however, been undertaking various upgrades to the treatment works at Rode, which are due to complete in 2024.

They advise that the upgrade works carried out during 2022 have significantly improved the site's performance and it is currently outperforming its Environment Agency effluent quality consent limits. This performance and resilience will be further improved during 2023 with the installation of additional biological treatment units, providing treatment capacity to meet 2040 targets for catchment growth.

We're hopeful Wessex Water will host a site visit this year to enable residents to view the upgrade works and question local management. THE RODE HOEDOWN IS BACK UP AND RUNNING!

Before getting into the 'whats' and 'whys' of the Rode Hoedown, I'd like to thank Elaine Butler for being the focal point for the Hoedown until recently, building interest in the event, organising volunteers, collecting



a variety of materials for the various works and generally 'encouraging' participation. Elaine has, understandably, decided that the time has come for someone else to take on this task and, for some reason that is probably related to my absence from a recent Parish Council meeting, it has fallen to me.

Frome has been running a 'Hoedown' for a few years. It started there as a way to get volunteers to clear weeds around Frome (with hoes, amongst other implements) and reduce the need to spray chemicals to maintain paths and other public spaces. In Rode, there was a feeling that we could do something similar leading to the imaginatively titled 'Rode Hoedown' (I'm providing this background, because I've been asked why it's called the 'Hoedown' and whether we should give it a new name – all ideas/suggestions are welcome.....).

The Rode Hoedown is run, mostly, on every last Sunday of the month and, during 2023, is likely to run every month from March until October – basically

while the weather is good.

However, by kicking off in March, most weeds have not had time to get established in the village. This was despite the fact that weeds had already formed a fairly sizeable 'advance party' in my small garden in preparation for the inevitable late spring assault. The absence of an obvious biological foe left me looking for something else that the first Rode Hoedown '23 volunteers could tackle and I settled on litter picking.



Sadly, as with much of the UK, we do have quite a quantity of litter in and around the village. A number of us pick litter along Straight and Crooked Lanes where litter can be a mix of decades old or recent, habitual (quick beer on the way home) waste. But, given the numbers of people volunteering for the March event, I felt that we'd get the 'biggest bang for our buck' along the stretch of Rode Hill between the Bradford Road junction and A361.

With hindsight, although I think that the end result was good, a few of the volunteers did point out that it was quite a way from the collection point and I think that they were absolutely right. I had borrowed a wheelbarrow to move some of the full sacks around. But I must really thank Sue Shannon and Jonathan Smith who allowed their cars to be filled with the 'fragrant' rubbish. Without their kind offer, I doubt that this location would have really worked.



Before getting started, people who had selflessly volunteered to give up a couple of hours of their Sunday gathered in front of the Memorial Hall to listen to me drone on about health and safety (watch for traffic, don't lift stuff that looks unhealthy or heavy etc.), adding insult to some level of potential injury.

We quickly got started and, even before we got to the intended litter pick area, people were collecting quite a lot of litter from Rode Hill between the junction with the High Street and the Bradford Road junction. It was clear that there was enough there, alone, to occupy a few of the volunteers.

In spite of my wonderfully delivered health and safety briefing that included warnings to avoid entering the ditches where there may be a risk of trips, falls, ankle injury and like, it seemed that a number of us found the ditches most interesting with a rich seam of litter to be 'mined'.

Perhaps the most enthusiastic in this respect were Jonathan Smith and Howard and Diana Russell. Moira busily kept to the 'high road' and cleared the verges.

It was also great to catch up with Dario Nucci who has recently moved to Rode and has immediately got stuck in. Thanks also to Cathy and Nick, Gill and Jeremy, Jim McAuliffe and the inestimable Mr. Salmon for their great combined efforts.

Dubious 'highlights' of the litter pick included four worn tyres found in the lay-by (just over a week later, another four were donated, but these were rapidly collected by Mendip), a powder fire extinguisher that collapsed when I tried to lift it due to corrosion, a broken Dyson vacuum cleaner, a museum piece of a TV/Video player and enough spare car parts to construct a Vauxhall/VW/Toyota 'Frankenstein' car.



In the end, we collected some 40 bags of litter plus assorted bits and pieces.



Mendip DC's waste contractor (iVerde) collected the litter from in front of the Memorial Hall the following day and also provided the litter pickers, hi-vis vests and industrial strength plastic bags.

By the time that this article is published in The Link, the next Rode Hoedown should have taken place (30th April).

It would be great to have even more volunteers for future Rode Hoedowns – the May Hoedown will be on Sunday 28th - so please do contact Mike Salmon (mikesalmon123@icloud.com) or myself (jbowlerii@icloud.com), if you'd like to volunteer or if you have ideas of work that can be done by the Rode Hoedown.

ACTION FOR NATURE...

Somerset Wildlife Trust (SWT) is encouraging the public to see their gardens and outdoor community spaces as potential habitats for wildlife. There are an estimated 124,500 gardens in Somerset — as well as ancient churchyards, school grounds, allotments, and other outdoor spaces — and they can all be hugely important for nature. We are currently facing a global climate and nature emergency, with many of our species in a significant state of decline. However, by making a few simple changes to our gardens and community spaces, we can create vital steppingstones for wildlife and allow them to play a necessary part in restoring and reconnecting habitats as part of a much bigger Nature Recovery Network.



Making our outdoor spaces more beneficial for wildlife can be simple. Suggestions from SWT include adding hedgehog holes to fences, building swift boxes, creating pollinator-friendly window boxes, and leaving patches of your grass to grow wild. There are so many ways you can make an impact in your garden or community space, and as

Bryony Slaymaker, Wilder Communities Manager at SWT, explains, every small action can add up: "Evidence has proven that if we can get 1 in 4 people taking visible action for nature, we will reach a social 'tipping point', and the majority will be encouraged to do the same. This means that by doing something great for nature and then telling someone else about it, you can help put nature back into recovery. Together we have the power to change, and we call this 'Team Wilder'".

To encourage more people to make a difference for the wildlife in their gardens and outdoor spaces, SWT is hosting a number of initiatives and campaigns that you can get involved in this year:

- Wilder Gardening Awards: Your garden, whether big or small, can be a safe place for nature to thrive. Welcome wildlife into your garden by providing food, shelter, and water, and by following the advice on the SWT website. You can then join other Somerset gardeners by signing up for a free 'This is a Wildlife Garden' plaque that you can show off to your friends, family, and neighbours! See if your garden is eligible here: www.somersetwildlife.org/garden
- Working Together for Wildlife Awards: This year, SWT is pleased to launch a new series of awards which recognise the importance of working together to reach that critical mass of 1 in 4 people, and connect up our gardens, parks, allotments, and churchyards to Somerset's Nature Recovery Network. If your community is able to work together for wildlife and take action for nature across your gardens and outdoor communal spaces, you can

now apply for an award for your street, village, or town! Find out more about what's involved here: www.somersetwildlife.org/team-wilder/wilder-communities

• Wilder Open Gardens: If you already have a wildlife-friendly garden, you can help inspire others to make room for wildlife by hosting a Wilder Open Garden. This is a chance to show off the amazing things you've been doing for nature to your friends, family, and neighbours, while also raising vital funds for wildlife at the same time. Going Peat-Free: Peatlands are vital habitats for wildlife, and it's
important they remain intact to help tackle climate change. Unfortunately,
peat extraction is still taking place in Somerset, and a vast amount of

extracted peat is turned into compost. SWT urges the public to go peat-free in their gardens by opting for peat-free compost or making their own compost at home!



• Wilder Lawns: This year, the Wildlife Trusts have partnered with the Royal



Horticultural Society (RHS) to call on gardeners to reimagine their lawns. When left to grow long, lawns can help mitigate flooding, capture pollutants, and provide important shelter for wildlife. Gardeners can help by reducing the frequency of mowing to once every 3-4 weeks, allowing small patches of their lawn to grow wild, and planting pollinator-friendly wildflowers. More

Our gardens can have an extremely positive impact on Somerset's wildlife when managed with nature in mind.

SWT are asking the public to look at their gardens in a new way this spring, and whether it's by adding a bug hotel to your garden, making your own DIY pond, or by getting involved in one of their initiatives, they are **urging everyone to start taking action for nature this year**.



SOMERSET COUNCIL WASTE SERVICES

New council, new website - Somerset Council is now up and running, replacing the 5 previous councils and taking on responsibility for all your waste services. Because each authority had been working together as the Somerset Waste Partnership, little has changed – except our online info has moved to the new council website - you'll find all at **somerset.gov.uk/waste** - you can still find and do everything you could before.



The familiar 'My Waste Services' feature, for online waste-related tasks such as ordering containers/ subscribing to the garden waste service/reporting missed

collections is on the landing page. The 'Check my collection days' feature's there too, whether you want to check online, download to print or download to the calendar on your laptop/mobile device. We'll be developing content in the coming months to make it as helpful as possible. Our @SomersetWaste social media Facebook/Twitter accounts continue as before, as do our contractors: making collections (SUEZ), managing recycling sites (Biffa).

King's Coronation - Lots of you'll be involved in celebrations over the Coronation weekend. We love parties but hate waste and ask party/event organisers to do their best to keep waste to a minimum and recycle as much as possible. Recycling's great, but reducing's even better. You can find a whole host of tips and ideas for how to cut waste/recycle more at somerset.gov.uk/waste-coronation. Say 'No' to single use and reduce food waste - it's one of the best ways of cutting your carbon footprint. Make sure your catering doesn't end in a mountain of wasted food - know numbers/encourage everyone to 'bring a dish'. The Love Food Hate Waste website has lots of ideas. Know what can be recycled in your weekly kerbside collections (see back cover for changes to collections).

Batteries: do the right thing - please don't put them in your refuse bin/leave loose in your recycling boxes/bags. They can cause fires in the trucks or at the depot when crushed, this can be very dangerous and effect the running of depots and collections. Please remove batteries from gadgets/toys/devices and put out for recycling in a clear, tied plastic bag placed on top of one of your recycling boxes. If batteries can't be removed put the whole item out for recycling as a small electrical item in an untied carrier bag on top of a recycling box.

Summertime recycling site opening - when your local site is open on a weekday, it will be in business from 9am to 6pm from now until 1 October. The year-round Saturday and Sunday hours remain 9am-4pm at all sites. Opening days vary from site to site. For information about your local sites, when they are open and what materials they take, please visit the new council website.

RODE GARDENING CLUB - APRIL REVIEW & FUTURE VISITS

On the first Monday in April we welcomed Dominic Hamilton from Painswick Garden Trust to the last of our meetings in the Hall for several months.



He explained that rococo style was both flamboyant and frivolous and in the short time between 1700 to 1750 was very fashionable. This time also coincided

with a change in the use of gardens by wealthy landowners. They became a space where the family could play, dine, entertain and party. It was a way to demonstrate wealth and impress neighbours. Benjamin Wyatt, a wealthy solicitor moved from Cheltenham to the country for his health and built a garden squeezed into a valley, with deceptive vistas juxtaposed with serpentine paths, and peppered with



charming follies to surprise and delight his guests. In 1748 he engaged a local painter Thomas Robbins to paint the garden. This was fortunate as in the 1760s landscape gardens became more fashionable. Over the next 200 years the garden altered, and buildings were lost or hidden so by 1980 it was a jungle but with the potential to be restored. Over the last 40 years this has happened. Today the gardens are famous for the displays of snowdrops early in the year, but the buildings, kitchen garden, woodland and herbaceous borders mean the garden has much to see all year. Members were encouraged to visit.

Visits - During the summer months the club organises visits on Mondays, mostly in the evening:

Monday 15th May - The first visit to a garden, meeting at 6:30 pm at 1 South View, Devizes; 'a long town garden with planting surprises'. Visits are free for members and £10 for guests. Parish Gardening

Even the most dedicated gardeners need the occasional break from their own little patch of heaven, to get inspiration from other gardens which offer a different sense of scale, planting and a sense of place that will give fresh inspiration.

I've been away on tour, visiting two iconic gardens: Sissinghurst and Great Dixter which between them inspire tens of thousands of visitors each year.

When I went to see them just after Easter weekend, they had both just reopened for the new season and visitors were pretty thin on the ground on the rather blustery, showery days when I was there. So although the April weather was true to form, it couldn't interfere with the sheer joy of being immersed in the amazing planting, the fabulous architecture and stunning wider landscapes of both gardens.

I think it's fair to say these gardens represent the pinnacle of British planting and obviously they require very significant amounts of professional and volunteer gardener support to keep the show going throughout the long visitor season. A mere mortal like me can't hope to create or copy the same style of intensive planting at home, or at least, not on the same scale.



The best thing I can do is urge you to visit them, at any time of the year, so you can experience for yourself the very special atmosphere they both have.

If you need any further encouragement, both gardens have very enthusiastic volunteers keen to chat with visitors and explain the history and identify the

lesser-known plants (essential info!).

There's also good food on offer for refuelling at coffee/lunch/afternoon teatime, although I would say that Great Dixter is somewhat rustic with tables and benches set under an open-sided barn - just a bit exposed during the April showers last week!



My final word of advice is to save your pocket money for visiting the nursery at Great Dixter - they appear to do all the propagating on site and sell many of the fascinating and unusual plants you'll see in the garden as well as lots of more familiar favourites.

The range is significantly better than the surprisingly limited offerings at Sissinghurst, which does however offer a fine range of tea towels and biscuits...



Dorothy House Trek Vietnam 2024

Dorothy House is embarking on only its second international trek, this time heading to Vietnam in April 2024. The Hospice is looking for a group of intrepid adventurers looking for

their next major challenge! With a project at a rural community hospital and a trek through the Pu Luong Natural Reserve, this is an opportunity to cross something incredible off the bucket list whilst also raising vital funds for Dorothy House.



Participants have to raise £3,900, with at least half going directly to Dorothy House Hospice to allow staff and volunteers to continue to deliver outstanding end of life care to patients and their families. It costs £202.95 to fund a compassionate, skilled and experienced Hospice at Home Carer to provide care overnight, enabling a patient to stay at home at the end of their life, meaning someone taking on Trek Vietnam could fund overnight care for several patients and their families.

Terry, whose wife was cared for by Dorothy House in 2020 and received care from our Hospice at Home Carers, and is already signed up to take on Trek Vietnam, had this to say about his decision: "Apart from thinking Dorothy House was a place where people go to die, I knew little of the organisation. All that was to dramatically change when in 2020 my wife was diagnosed with MND. Struggling to cope and to take on board the inevitable consequence of this illness, plus dealing with the challenges of looking after a terminally ill and increasingly frail wife, it was recommended I approach Dorothy House Hospice Care. The support they provided, on a mental and physical level, cannot be overstated. I will never forget their outstanding care, helping me to accept that my wife would not be with me for much longer. We then had what became daily visits from their carers, which enabled her to remain at home until the end. She finally died in January of 2022, but their support continues, and will do so for as long as I need it."

Leaving the UK on 20th April you'll fly to Hanoi, spending some time there before heading out to Mai Chau to a community hospital. Once there, you'll take on a project within the palliative care unit of the hospital working alongside the local team to improve facilities. Tasks could include activities such as repainting, gardening, decorating and other hands-on refurbishment type tasks. After a few days with the staff and villagers around the community hospital, you'll head off to the Pu Luong Natural Reserve where the trek begins. With 4 days of trekking ahead, you will cross various terrain, staying in local villages in traditional stilt houses, and getting to meet the local people of the region. You will then head back to Hanoi for a free day in the city and a farewell dinner before heading back to the UK and landing on April 30th.

The trek is graded moderate to challenging. You will be trekking for 5 consecutive days, over varying and sometimes challenging terrain. You will cover approximately 15-20km per day which will take around 6-7 hours. Those wanting to take part should get training, walking as much as possible, but it will be very achievable for anyone thinking about it.




