REFLECTION

Oddities and Misfits - My daughter in London gets a Vegetable Box once a week called Odd Box. It comes crammed full of delicious fresh fruit and vegetables and also recipe ideas. She has a limited choice in what she can have.

There is also a leaflet explaining why these items are "odd" and not fit for supermarket shelves i.e. too small, too large, wrong shape, etc., etc. If these vegetables don't fit the exact norm, the supermarkets throw them out to join the mounting and iniquitous mound of food waste.

Thankfully Odd Box scoop them up and deliver to grateful customers. They deliver in Bath and if there was enough interest in our village I think they would come out with vegetable boxes to us as well.

Jesus often mixed with people that polite and strict society of his time would have considered odd...misfits...outcasts. In other words people who were cast out. He loved them and enjoyed their company. He could see their potential where others couldn't or wouldn't. Consequently he was severely criticised for it by the teachers of the law and the religious elite. After one such encounter in Luke chapter 15 Jesus told three of his most famous stories; the parables of the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the lost (sometimes called prodigal) son.

They all tell of something lost that is found ; a sheep that has strayed: a coin that has been forgotten somewhere and a son who rejected his home and family and only came back when he was desperate and starving. He told these stories to illustrate the fact that God loves everyone regardless of perceived merit, or alternatively being seen as a misfit or a bit odd. We are all loved by God without conditions. And let's face it there are times when we all feel a bit odd or a bit of a misfit, or a bit lost, and the good news is that the creator has love and room for us all.

Jesus came to show us who God is and explicitly said if we look at him we will see the character of God, or the creator or the divine spirit, or whatever name you choose. This is why Jesus is such good news.

If you ever have the urge to find out a bit more about him start with the gospel of Luke in a modern translation. You might well be surprised to find out how relevant his life and stories are to our present predicament, and how great is God's love and compassion for us all.

MAKING DECISIONS

I am sure you know people who make decisions simply because they are 'anti' something else. I find this difficult to comprehend. I prefer to use positivity to weigh up my options and then make a choice because I am in favour of or 'pro' something else. In my role as a Somerset Councillor, I have very little opportunity to make decisions that will impact lives. Our Conservative Group is in opposition, so with only currently 35 votes in a council meeting of potentially 110, we do not have the power to change much.

But, since 1st April this year, I have been on the Planning East Committee. This is basically the old Mendip Planning Board. It is not its own entity as part of the District Council anymore, but a regional department of the Somerset Council. It functions as it did before, but just with different email addresses, letter heads, titles, and website.

I found my first planning meeting very difficult. I tossed and turned the night before and ruminated for days afterwards. Had I made the right decision? Was there something I missed which would have swayed me the other way? I have to keep in mind, 'You can't please everyone all of the time.' I realised I need to reflect more deeply on my values. If I am clear about what I stand for and

believe, decisions are so much easier, aren't they? I broke it down to understand my process and what drives those who are applying for planning.

Firstly, I believe in the individual taking responsibility for themselves and their decisions. People submit planning applications to protect, provide for and enhance their own lives, families and of those they love. But when individual rights override those of the collective, the individual needs to take a step back. Community is what drives me, how I live my life and decisions I make. The 'greater good' forms the foundation of who I am.

We, as a human race, are arrogantly and single-mindedly, living without enough consideration for our planet. In the UK are really showing the way in our long-term thinking. But we do need to acknowledge that there is always more to do, and that our decisions need to align with our commitment to our planet. All my life I have been the one in the room that follows all the rules. As a child I got annoyed with my mother driving the wrong way in a parking lot, and a friend making a paper airplane when we were supposed to be doing sums in a quiet classroom. Rules and laws keep us safe, make things fair and give us freedom to live our lives more fully. Yes, I have broken rules and laws, (as we all have), but I was devasted when I got my first (and only) speeding fine while on holiday in Australia, and my first (and only) parking ticket in the Wells parking lot. I am a 'goody two shoes' and bloody proud of it.

Many decisions in my role on the planning committee are based, more importantly, on law, regulation, policy and strategy. If we do not follow what we have written in our 'statute books', there will be anarchy. And that is not a pleasant idea. So, how do I align my values with my decision making on the planning committee?

- I use the law and policy to guide me.
- I consider why the person (or organisation) has put in a planning application.
- Does this impact our planet negatively?
- In this situation, what is the greater good?

I have noticed that my Conservative colleagues and I often vote the same. Not because we've discussed a planning application before (which would make us pre-determined - thus not allowed or even legal), but because we share the same values. The weight we place on each of our values will be different, but when I look across the room at the officers, and other planning committee members of different political colours, I think to myself, what do they 'hang their hats on'?

From 3rd July, please complete an online form when requesting a GP appointment. This applies to on the day and routine doctor's appointment requests. All nurse and health care assistant appointments will still need to be booked via the telephone.

On our website homepage https://beckingtonfamilypractice.co.uk, select 'Contact us Online'. This will open a link to a short form for you to complete with some details for the reason of your appointment request. You are also able to complete this on someone else's behalf, for instance children or someone you are caring for. Should you not have access to the internet or have difficulty with the new system, you can still call reception on either 01373 830316 or 01373 464731 and a member of the team will be able to fill this out on your behalf.

All medical issue request forms will be reviewed and assessed by a doctor or advanced nurse practitioner on the day. You may receive a text, phone call or be invited to come for an appointment at the surgery. Please ensure you keep your phone with you and be aware that phone calls from the surgery will display as 'No caller ID'.

Please remember that if you need urgent assistance then call 999 or for non-emergency queries out of hours call 111.

THE RODE HOEDOWN – WEEDS AND LITTER!

So...having missed the last issue of The Link to report on the Hoedown, I thought I should provide a brief report on recent events.



To recap, two Hoedowns have taken place since the last report: $30^{\rm th}$ April and $28^{\rm th}$ May.

The April Hoedown focussed on Litter Picking again. We cleared the stretch of road between The Mill and the old Bird Garden entrance and between the Bradford Road and Rode Hill crossroads down to the layby near to the Rode Hill Fishery. Ultimately, we managed to fill more than a dozen bags that were kindly collected by idverde (Mendip District Council's waste management contractor)

For May, we had people litter picking and weeding. The Hoedown actually kicked off somewhat earlier than normal as Gill and Jeremy cleared the tall grass around the Bradford Road and Rode Hill crossroads to improve visibility in the morning.



The remainder of the May '23 Hoedown crew consisted of stalwarts Moira and Dario and new arrivals to Rode, Elizabeth (Lizzie) and John. Along with members of the Memorial Hall committee, we made short work of clearing the weeds around the Memorial Hall car park. Unfortunately, I didn't take any 'before' pictures. But the pictures below show the end results.





The opportunity was also taken to improve visibility by cutting the tall grasses at the junction of the High Street and Rode Hill.

It would be great to have even more volunteers for future Rode Hoedowns – the July Hoedown will be on Sunday 30th - so please do contact Mike Salmon (mikesalmon123@icloud.com) or myself (jbowlerii@icloud.com), if you'd like to volunteer or if you have ideas of work that can be done by the Rode Hoedown.

We are currently planning to renovate the old telephone box containing the books and defibrillator.

As that will involve sanding and a couple of coats of bright red paint, it's likely that this will be done separately from the Hoedown. Again, volunteers for sanding or paint coat 1 and paint coat 2 would be greatly appreciated.

An idea for a future Hoedown is to clear the village orchard in readiness for picking fruit and also to make space to plant new trees/bushes to replace those that had not survived.

CLIMATE EMERGENCY UPDATE

Great Big Green Week - During June we held a number of events as part of Great Big Green Week, the UK-wide celebration of community action to tackle climate change. This included:

- A series of talks in Rode Memorial Hall on Saturday 17th June,
- A repeat of the "Green Open Doors" event held that we first held last year,
- Guided visits to Tellisford Mill,
- A focus on our local pubs and the great "veggie" options they provide,
- Plus the Scouts' fantastic Litter Pick.

The three excellent presentations in the Memorial Hall were well attended (around 40 visitors at peak), and the talks elicited lots of audience interaction, which was great to see. The "headline" speaker was Sarah Dyke (Lead Member for Environment & Climate Change on Somerset Council) who provided a comprehensive overview of all the actions that Somerset Council is taking to address the climate



emergency. We also hosted a talk from the Centre for Sustainable Energy (on the practical steps to take to make your home warmer, more energy-efficient (and therefore cheaper to heat), and less carbon-intensive. Then Terry Pinto (an "Eco-Architect" based in Frome) provided a fascinating look at a whole range of local projects, show-casing low carbon housing. If you missed the talks but would like a copy of any of the presentations, drop me a line [my contact details are at the foot of this article].

It was great to see the Scouts doing such an excellent job – not only tidying the verges and the playing fields, but also contributing to the reduction in greenhouse gases (as a good proportion of the litter collected can be recycled).

The guided visits to Tellisford Mill were once more very popular, with all three tours being "sold out". The feedback from attendees was very positive, with a high level of support for the expansion of hydro power in the UK. The Mill at Tellisford produces around 280 MWh of electricity per annum, and there are a number of potential new hydro sites being investigated locally (e.g.: at Clifford Farm, Beckington).

Finally, a big "Thank You" to all those who took part – whether that was hosting your property for visitors, helping at the Memorial Hall, delivering leaflets, litter-picking, attending the events yourself, or simply choosing a "veggie" option at the pub instead of meat...

RODE DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENT WORKS

The main aims of the Somerset Rivers Authority (SRA) funded work in Rode have been to reduce flood risks to more than 25 properties (in Long Street, High Street, The Brewery plus the primary school) and nine roads, and to enhance parts of the local environment through techniques of Natural Flood Management (NFM).

This project grew out of an earlier SRA-funded programme of investigations into sub-catchments across Mendip that could benefit from extra maintenance. Work in Rode has been delivered by Montel Civil Engineering Limited on behalf of the former Mendip District Council and designed by Calm Engineering.

The works commenced in March 2023 and included.

- removal of debris, jetting and CCTV
- replacement and repair of culvert soffits
- structural lining of drainage pipework
- replacement of drainage pipework
- root cutting and root removal
- clearing ditches and improving connections

We are pleased to announce that the project team has now completed all scheduled contracted works to successfully deliver the agreed outcomes to reduce the risk of flooding to residents and properties in Rode. Below are some interesting details of some of the contracted works being completed:

High Street - The site team have worked in various locations on High Street to replace gully connections and carrier drains, remove and replace lengths of damaged pipes and jet clean and install structural liners to existing pipes.



Lower Street - Prior to Montel commencing on site, CCTV investigations of the culvert were completed which discovered the footway above part of Lower Street was held up by a timber beam construction.

To improve this section, Montel's site team were required to remove the degraded existing timber beams and replace them with concrete units, to provide a long-lasting structure. This area was subsequently resurfaced, and the footway reopened.



In addition to: Clearing highways ditches along Crooked Lane and clearing roots and installing structural liner to the existing pipes in Church Lane.

We would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank the local community and express how grateful we are for the patience and cooperation you have shown in the lead up commencement on site and whilst the project was underway and traffic management measures were in place.

The project and site team have worked extremely hard to achieve maximum efficiency to complete the contract to the highest of standards in the fastest possible timescales within the required budgets.

RODE CRICKET CLUB – UPDATE

Having missed the deadline for June's edition (sorry Editor!), there are six matches to report on this month.

Sunday 14th May: First game of the season was, as it was last season, away to Stour Provost in Dorset.

We were blessed with a brief interval of fine weather among the spring rains. Rode batted first on a small ground and had high expectations with a strong batting line up ... but rather subsided to 86 all out of just 26 overs (it was supposed to be a 40 over match).



Notable performances among this carnage were 28 from Adam Kwasnicki, 11 from Lawrence Gripper and 15 from Julian Wotton. Stour Provost made short work of the total and we were back in the Cross Keys for an early pint!

Wednesday 17th May: Our first home game was against Heytesbury and Sutton Veny Cricket Club, a team we did not play last season, but who have a strong reputation, so expectations of a win were limited.

One of the great aspects of restarting Rode CC last season was the number of father/son combinations in the team as we gradually hand over to the teenagers as they come through.

However, an unexpected pairing of Lawrence and Peter Gripper featured in this game, as father Peter, visiting son Lawrence, agreed to play for the first time in some years to help us out with the numbers for this match.

HSVCC batted first, making a total of 108 in their 20 overs, restricted by good bowling from Julian Wotton (1 for 8 off three overs), James Pickett (1 for 11 off 3 overs), a superb 1 for 4 from 4 overs by William Wotton, and 1 for 13 off 3 overs by the author.

This represented a gettable total, and Rode, playing the ever more popular "Bazball" style of cricket raced to 74 for 2 after 10 overs, well ahead of the required rate. James Pickett (20), Julian Wotton (32) and Oliver Fussell (20) were the key architects of this great start, but once they had departed we regularly lost wickets and runs dried up.

We were, however, still in it as the final over started - 2 wickets in hand and just 2 runs needed. Young William Wotton scored a single off the first ball of the over, but second ball saw for our number 10, clean bowled. Peter Gripper – having kindly performed the role of scorer throughout our innings until that point – strode out to the middle with 4 balls to go, 1 run required, 1 wicket in hand. With all the calm confidence that only experience gives, Peter nonchalantly pushed the first ball he faced into the covers, the fielder fumbled it, Peter ran through for a single and the match was won!

A great moment and a superb – if nervy – win was ours! The Australian dressing room in Edgbaston was not as jubilant as we were that night as anyone who was in the 'Keys will attest.

Wednesday 31st May: Frome Incidentals were the next opponents at the Rode Playing Field fortress. Again, we fielded first and Frome Incidentals set a challenging 147 of their 20 overs, Julian Wotton's figures of 2 for 14 off 3 overs the pick of the bowling, well backed up by son Nicholas' 1 for 10 off 2 overs. James Pickett and Lawrence Gripper opened the innings, and James – having hit a blistering 81 off 58 deliveries for Horningsham the previous Sunday – carried on where he left off with 24 off just 10 balls (first three were dots, next 6 all went for 4). Just when it seemed the opposition had no answer, he went for a 7th consecutive boundary off the tenth ball, fell just short, and was caught on the boundary rope. James Goldstraw hit a superb 40 not out, but again little resistance from the middle and lower order left us some 30 runs short of our target.

Wednesday, **7**th **June**: Witham Friary were one of just two sides we managed to beat last season, so we had a proud unbeaten record to defend for this season's fixture here in Rode.

On this occasion, we batted first and absolutely dominated the bowling, ratcheting up 135 for 2. James Pickett (48) and Rich Page (20) opened, getting us off to a great start before Julian Wotton (43 not out) and Ollie Tucker (9 not out) saw us through to the end of our 20 overs.

Witham started well with their opener scoring a blistering 46 before the author (1 for 20 off 3 overs) managed to beat him in the flight with one, clean bowling him. James Goldstraw (1 for 25 off 4 overs) and Greg Love (1 for 19 off 3 overs) were the other wicket takers as Witham resisted but fell well short at 112 for 4 (a run out being the 4th wicket).

Two wins from 4 matches for Rode – terrific start to the season!

Wednesday, 14th June: Poplars were the next opponents at the Rode Playing Field. Batting first – and batting superbly – they racked up 168 for 6. Young George Bunce took 2 for 17 in 2 overs, Nicholas Wotton 1 for 25 off 4 overs, Rich Bealing 2 for 17 off 2 overs, and Harry Medlicott 1 for 12 off his one over.

This total was very daunting, but Rode put together a creditable 140 for 8, thanks to a terrific 38 from Harry Medlicott – a name to watch for the future!

Wednesday 21st June saw the return fixture against Frome Incidentals, who as a nomadic team play only away fixtures, so this was our 5th home game in a row! Having been outplayed by them back in late May (see above) we had "realistic expectations" on ourselves!

Sure enough, batting first we slipped to 50 for 6 off the first 10 (Bazball not working on this occasion!) before sensible and effective batting from Nick Wotton (6), Charlie and Chris Blanchett (15 not out and 6 not out respectively) and Rich Bealing, showing some remarkable and brutal strength, smashing 5 boundaries (three 4s and two 6s) in his rapid 28. This took us to 110 for 9 off our allotted 20 overs – significantly more than we had feared just one hour earlier.

Excellent opening bowling from William Wotton – as is increasingly expected from this young man – with just 1 run from 2 overs, well supported by his father Julian (1 for 14 off 4 overs), put the pressure on Frome Incidentals from which they never recovered.

In truth, they showed brilliant spirit in giving all their team a proper role in the game, including one of our young players, George Bunce, who had kindly agreed to play for them due to them being a player short and who batted very sensibly and effectively for his 9 off 18 balls. As a result of this approach, their big hitters came in with the required rate up around 8-9 per over, which set up a grandstand finish. In the end, they reached 99 for 9 off their 20 overs giving Rode their third win of the season!

So, as we reach the midpoint of the summer, Rode have won three, lost three. Watch this space to see if we can improve that win rate...

Big thanks to all our players for their efforts and great spirit in which all our games are played – then discussed/dissected/replayed in the pub afterwards!

On Monday 12th June twenty one members and guests visited Kettle Farm Cottage in West Ashton. We were blessed with a fine evening as we assembled outside the garden, which despite being at the end of the lane and surrounded by fields, had limited parking. The garden, of approximately two thirds of an acre, has been designed and developed by Jenny from a field and comprises a curvaceous lawn surrounded by well stocked and varied herbaceous borders which can be viewed either from the lawn or a peripheral path around the whole garden.

RODE - Further to last month's information about Commander Arthur Mayne Noad this month we have the contents of a letter he wrote to his mother Emily, at Southfield House, Rode, when he was a young man. The letter was written in 1835 by then Midshipman Arthur Mayne Noad RN whilst on duty in the Mediterranean Fleet.

The letter has been painstakingly transcribed by Peter Harris, our Rode historian – our thanks Peter. A copy of the original letter was sent to Peter by Dave Collins, a descendant of Arthur Noad's cousin Thomas Collins.

Salamis May 25th 1835

My dear Mother,

Your letter of March reached me by the last packet, and I intended to have answered it by the same boat. But the Admiral ordered us to sea immediately much to our annoyance as it was the night of the Naval ball and would hear of no excuse. <u>Go you must.</u> We took despatches to the Dardanelles for Lord Ponsonby and waited 7 days for his answer. We amused ourselves by examining the ruins of ancient Troy.

We were then directed to join H M S Portland at this place for further orders. But we fell in with her at sea and ordered to proceed to join the Admiral at Malta keeping a good look out not to miss him in the night in case he should have left Malta for the Piraeus. We fell in with the Admiral and Squadron at the entrance of the Archipelago, making the best of their way to Salamis to be present at the Coronation of Othon King of Greece, which was intended to have taken place on the 1st of June, but I believe it is now postponed for some time longer, the Crown not being ready, in fact I believe he has not sufficient Funds to purchase it. However the Regency expired on the 1st and he will be proclaimed King.

I have been very much amused since our arrival here, wandering over the Ruins of the Ancient Temples, the Acropolis etc, all of which are now being cleared of all rubbish and guarded, to prevent any further mutilation by the curiosity of strangers. They are also making great improvements in the City of Athens which was a complete heap of ruins a few years ago and is in fact little better now. But they are building in every direction and in about ten or twelve (years?) it will be I have no doubt a very flourishing place.

The Greeks do not seem to be fond of their King, they think that he favours the Bavarians too much, they do not like his having two or three Bavarian regiments in his pay, they have not been accustomed to such high taxation as is found necessary at present to pay their way, which they say is taken from the "lean Greek and given to the fat Bavarian." We are under orders for Smyrna and sail half an hour after the arrival of the Packet. She has been due here 5 days and great fears are entertained for her safety.

With regard to my drawing, I will endeavour if possible not to draw before September next, tho' June and December would suit me better, however I will

give you timely notice should I be obliged to. All Government Bills are paid now the last weeks of March and September. I am glad you have let the land so well, and hope all your hopes will be realised. We expect to have a visit tomorrow from the King, as the Medea Steamer is ordered to be ready to embark him. May 26th The long wished for Packet has just arrived safe and sound having been detained in England till the 8th May, which fully accounts for her late arrival. I expect we shall soon be off. I am delighted to hear that Aunt Creswell is so much better and sincerely hope that the change of scene will restore her to her former self. I should like much to hear from poor Mary but that I suppose is quite out of the question when you write her be sure to remember me kindly to her. I hope Sydney has well considered, before he gives up one concern to embark in another, but I think there is very little fear of his doing so rashly, as he has a calculating genius. I daresay he would rather settle anywhere than in Exeter. What does Uncle C say to it, does he approve of it?

When does Mary Anne's Marriage take place? I suppose soon give my kind love to her and wish her joy for me, is it settled where they are to live? as soon as anything turns up you must let me know all particulars. I am sorry to hear that Aunt Maria still continues poorly but hope the summer and a few pleasant excursions will bring her round again. I saw Caroline a few days before we left Malta she was quite well and looking much better than I have seen her for some time, she kindly gave me half a quire of paper with views of Malta, the first of which is the "Double Calesse" which is a very uncomfortable kind of carriage – it jolts one almost to pieces, the next letter will be a view of the Grand Harbour. Capt. Hunn and Family are also well, they gave a grand ball to all the officers of the Army and Navy the night before the departure of the Fleet. They kept it up till 5 o'clock when the officers of the squadron went onboard their respective ships, the signal was made to proceed to sea. They all desired to be kindly remembered to you. I must now bid you adieu! (as the band has just sounded to Quarters) with kindest love to all friends at Road and its neighbourhood, by the bye you did not tell me who they have at Beckington for a curate God bless you my dearest Mother

and Believe me as ever Your Affectionate Son

Arthur Noad

May 29th Our sailing orders have been countermanded and I do not know now where we shall go. Yesterday being the day appointed for the celebration of His Majesty's Birthday we all fired a Royal Salute and received a visit from Othon King of Greece. It was one of the prettiest sights I ever saw, immediately on the Steamer appearing in sight with the Grecian Standard at the Main, all the ships manned yards and fired 21 guns. It was one continued roar, the different coloured flags and now and then a peep of the men on the yards thro' the smoke had a very pretty effect. The English Fleet consisted of Caledonia120, Edinburgh 74, Malabar 74, Revenge 74, Canopus 84, Thunderer 74, Vernon 52, Medea

Steamer Hind cutter, and last tho' not least, the Brig. The French, one 74, one Frigate, one Corvette, and two brigs. Only fancy all these Vessels firing at the same time. If he had been the greatest Monarch in the Universe he could not have had greater honour paid him.

He is a very gentlemanly young man, well made but not handsome, about 5ft. 7. He was highly delighted with his reception. June 2nd I went vesterday to see the King proclaimed. It was a very warm day, so I went on shore rather early and rode slowly up to Athens in company with 1st Lieut. We arrived just as the procession was about to start and had a full view of His Majesty. He was dressed very plain in sky-blue uniform with silver Epaulettes, he was proceeded by his household and officers of state, all in sky-blue uniforms and a body-guard of Lancers. The procession passed thro' two files of soldiers under Triumphal Arches which extended from the Palace to the Church a distance of about 3/4 of a mile. They went into the Church where the King (tendered) his oath and the regency resigned their office. Te Deum was then sung and 101 guns fired by the artillery. He then returned to the Palace where he was received by all the officers of the Foreign Powers, who tendered him their congratulations. I felt very much for him poor young Man. It must have been a very fatiguing day for him, he was incessantly bowing and scraping to the Multitude as they passed. In the evening the Town was brilliantly illuminated and 101 guns again fired. Such a gay scene had not been seen in Athens for many a day. But by far the grandest Sight was the shipping which were all dressed from one end to the other with different coloured flags of all Nations and of all sizes (firing together 21 guns, it made a tremendous uproar) all assembled to do honour to His Majesty the first King of Modern Greece.

I believe I have told you all the news. We do not know where we are going but rather expect to remain here for the next Packet. The Admiral is so very close that we seldom hear many hours before we sail. He is obliged to be so, for we are very well watched. The Packet sails for Malta today so I must bid you once more adieu wishing you health and happiness.

Although born and raised in Frome, his career as an Engineer took him all over the world as far afield as Calcutta and Colombo, the USA and Australia.





It is distressing to worry about being stung by an angry wasp. When the wasp turns out to be a peeping tom, it's not much better. Is not an English man's home his castle?



159 is a short code phone service that connects people safely to their bank's fraud prevention service. Many banks currently implement it. On calling you'll be taken through an option menu in which each bank signed up to the service is read. You're then able to use your phone keypad to be put through to your bank to speak to them about your concerns/protect your money. When to call 159:

- Someone contacts you claiming to be from your bank even if they do not seem suspicious.
- You're contacted by someone claiming to be an authority figure such as the police and told to transfer money, even if the request seems genuine.
- You receive a call about a financial matter and it seems suspicious.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 13th JUNE 2023 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon (MS) – Chair, Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB) and Cllr Moira Punt (MP)

In attendance: Hugh Williams – Clerk, Cllr Dawn Denton (County Councillor) and 1 parishioner.

<u>1. Parishioners Participation:</u> There was still speeding up Straight Lane and a request was made to extend the 20mph speed limit beyond the Crooked Lane junction. The 20mph limit had been agreed to cover the village and the TRO to do so was due to be raised within a couple of weeks. The Chair reported that extending the 20mph limit further up Straight Lane had been raised with Somerset in the past but rejected on the grounds this was a rural road and could set a precedence for all rural roads in Somerset. However, it was agreed to approach Somerset again about extending the 20mph limit. A request was made for the SID to be put up again on Straight Lane near The Mead.

Concern was expressed that there was no strimming of the edges of the playing field when the grass was being cut. The frequency of cutting was erratic and members of the PC requested to see the contract with Eagle Grounds Maintenance along with areas that should be cut. (Clerk agreed to circulate).

<u>2. Apologies for absence</u>: Cllr J McAuliffe and Cllr A Boyden (County Councillor)

3. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 9th May were approved.

4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Actions from previous meeting:

- **i.** Christchurch graveyard grass: Contact with PCC still had to be made for a contact at the Diocese to discuss the grass cutting frequency which was currently too frequent.
- **ii. Hoedown:** The Hoedown on 28th May had again concentrated on litter picking and weeding of the Memorial Hall car park and cutting of grass at

Rode Hill junction. A full report should go in The Link along with reminder of the next Hoedown planned for 25^{th} June.

iii. Defibrillator: Concern had been expressed this was not working properly. The Clerk agreed to contact Lizzy Etheridge. (Clerks Note: New pads have been ordered and should be installed in a few days.)

6. County Councillor's Report: Cllr Dawn Denton said she had circulated an update to the PC but the main issue was the formation of the LCNs (Local Community Networks). The first meeting was due to be held in July and there was to be a premeeting this Friday and she asked for issues to raise. The Chair said that he was concerned that initial contact had been made to Parish Clerks and not to the Parish representatives on the LCNs. There was still little clarity about what the LCNs were going to do but of greater concern was the Parish Council representation. Meetings up to now had had a decreasing number of Parishes represented as Frome dominated the meetings with many representatives present all of whom could speak. Although Frome and the Parishes had only one vote each, in reality, Frome dominated the meetings; possibly only one person from each parish/town should be allowed to speak at each LCN meeting. Cllr Denton agreed to take these concerns to the premeeting.

<u>7. Climate Change Group:</u> Thanks were expressed to Jim McAuliffe for arranging the speakers for this Saturday and the open houses for Sunday. There would be three speakers in the Memorial Hall this Saturday and people were encouraged to attend. It was hoped donations would cover the programme leaflet printing costs.

8. Highways:

i. 20mph speed limit and village gates: The Chair had spoken to Sara Davis (Somerset Highways) and agreement from Beckington for the location of the gates had been finalised. Autograph Homes were to be contacted to ensure they paid for the gates as previously agreed. TRO for speed limit should be raised in two weeks.

ii. Bradford Road/Rode Hill junction: Somerset had confirmed that work should start during w/c 26 June with the installation of rumble strips. This would be followed by the installation of vehicle activated signs.

iii. Street Lights: The Clerk reported that the information had finally been sent to the Traffic Management section of Avon and Somerset Police and response was awaited. The Clerk was asked to chase this up in the near future.

iv. A36 Slip Road: Cllr Denton reported that Somerset was still chasing this up with National Highways.

<u>9. Planning: i) New applications:</u>

2023/0919/TCA: To fell elder and ash situated on top of wall – 36 High Street. No objections.

2023/1015/HSE: Single storey rear extension – 1 Fairfield. No objections.

ii. Somerset decisions:

2023/**0625**/**TPO:** To reduce the height of oak tree by 1.5m and branches by 2.5m and two ash trees by 1.5m in height and branches by 1.5m – Langham House. Approved.

10. Buses: The flat rate £2 fare had now been extended until the end of November and it would then rise to £2.50 until November 2024. This was good news and it looks as though relatively low bus fares will be maintained. It was also reported that Somerset had agreed that should fares rise 18 to 25 year olds would be protected with continued low fares; this would only be implemented if general bus fares rose. The meeting again thanked Peter Travis for all his work on ensuring a good bus service for the village.

<u>11. Paths</u>

i. Path round children's play area: The Clerk reported that he had had a quote (£6,000) to put in a permanent gravel path. However, the meeting agreed this cost was too high and with possible redevelopment of the pavilion and general play area this should not be done. It was however, agreed that the situation would be reviewed in September/October to possibly put down wood chippings to ensure the path could still be used.

ii. Path from Church Farm: There was concern over the maintenance of this path beyond the Church Farm estate area. The question was raised should the Church Farm Management Committee maintain it. Somerset had indicated that there was no legal action that could be taken to improve the path, however it was agreed Cllr Denton would ask Somerset about its ongoing maintenance.

iii. Path from allotments to Barrow Farm: It was agreed to approach Matthew to cut this path.

iv. Path 13/1: It was reported this was blocked. Inspection has revealed that the path is still useable but it has been altered now so that it enters the Church Farm development at the rear and not by the A361. Part of the original path is now cultivated but the new route is fine.

v. Verge by Church Farm: Andy Fussell would be approached to strim this and also cut back the hedge on the A361 again, but this would have to wait until August.

<u>12.David Warburton MP</u>: The Clerk had sent an email to David Warburton again but had had no response. It was agreed that another final attempt should be made to get him to meet with Councillors. (Clerk's Note: David Warburton has now resigned as MP for Somerton and Frome).

13.Conservation and Neighbourhood Plans: AP said he still had to speak to Peter Harris about listed buildings and requested this was delayed for 3 months.

14. Bluebell Wood Solar Farm: There were mixed feeling from Parishioners on this proposal. The largest concern had been over the possible location on the triangular field on Bradford Road, although Low Carbon had indicated this might be removed from the final proposal. There was concern over the grading of the agricultural land on which the Solar Farm would be built and this would be key to the viability of the proposal. The official planning application was awaited.

15. Financial matters:

i. Income and expenditure: The income and expenditure for 2023-24 had been circulated and was approved.

ii. Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) 2022/23 Form 3: Section 1, Annual Governance Statement was approved and signed off. iii. AGAR Section 2, Accounting Statements 2022/2023: This was approved and signed off. It was agreed to submit this return to PKF Littlejohn for external auditing.

iv. Payments: The following payments were agreed:

A Aked (internal auditor)	£30.00
SALC (training)	£30.00
Eagle Grounds Maintenance	£792.00
Clerk Salary	£254.35
HMRC PAYE	£60.40

16. Any other business:

Truespeed: The Clerk reported he had been approached by Truespeed regarding using a pole on Parish Council land to bring fibre broadband to Rode. Truespeed said work to bring the infrastructure to Rode should start in 2 to 4 months. There was no need for residents to commit to fibre to their homes before Truespeed went ahead.

17. Date of next meeting:

The next meeting would be held in the Committee Room at the Memorial Hall on: Monday 10th July at 7.30pm


