### **REFLECTION - "MUSTN'T GRUMBLE..."**

To start with, I mustn't grumble that I can't write about Spring as Caroline wrote about it in the last issue of the magazine! - even though it seems obvious to me, as I write, that Spring starts today. The sun is shining, the sky is a clear blue, the hills gleam in various beautiful shades and people are enjoying sitting or lingering in the sun. So what shall I write about? Maybe grumbling is a good topic.

I like to think that I don't grumble much... though I do complain about my sore toes (new shoes) and the mud that has caked my bicycle's mudguards (too much rain) which means that pedalling over to Rode is harder work than usual (aging joints). Grumbling seems to start at a very early age. My youngest grandchild grumbled loudly in no uncertain terms last Sunday when given the chips that he had asked for, but then deciding he'd rather have the rice that the rest of us were having!

Is grumbling a sin? We are currently in the middle of Lent and most of the bible readings we seem to be having in church are about sin. Jesus was tempted to sin in various ways in the wilderness but remained free... and the parallel is often drawn between Jesus' wilderness journey and the people of Israel escaping Egyptian captivity. One of the things that happened as the people of Israel travelled through the desert was that – although free at last – people started grumbling. They were thirsty, they were hungry, and the miraculous manna from heaven did not seem enough. Their circumstances were so much better than when they were in captivity but they still grumbled.

So what about us? Our lives are not always easy but we have our freedom, and we recognise afresh how very special that is in our world, given the circumstances of many others. I remember having lunch outside a pub with a dear friend of mine who died quite young. We were looking across a valley at a beautiful view while a flotilla of multicoloured hot air balloons were drifting across the sky in the sunshine. At this sight my friend, though aware of various sorrows, declared, "There is a God in Heaven, and he loves us!".

Let us also realise that we can make a difference! I was struck by a recent piece of news about an ageing rock star (even older than me) who filled in the ruts in the road outside his property so that his Ferrari could get through. Presumably instead of just grumbling he got on and did something, however questionable his motivation! At the present time many people are acting to help refugees in various ways, many giving gifts or donating money, others planning to open their own homes. We can all make a difference! And if God is for us who can be against us. God is so much for us that His son died on a cross for crimes He did

not commit so that we might find life through Him, whoever we are. That is what we remember at Easter.

So as we notice any glimpse of beauty and freedom in our daily lives, let's rejoice this Easter time. Let's remember that we can be forgiven our grumbling and let's pay attention to our many blessings.

### H.V. PARISH RESPONSE TO THE UKRAINIAN REFUGEE CRISIS

There can be little that has occupied our minds and hearts more in the past few weeks than the plight of those who are either enduring life in the war zone that is currently Ukraine, or who are endeavouring to escape to safety in neighbouring countries. The UK government have responded by offering to accept refugees to this country, not only those who have family and friends to whom they can go but also those who are not in such a fortunate position.



In response to this, Hardington Vale Parish propose to look at ways in which they can support refugees who in the first instance may be those who are due to begin arriving from Ukraine who may be placed in our area as well as those who have offered to host them. Following consultation with the leadership team, the Rector, Caroline, has registered the parish as a group with the Sanctuary Foundation Organisation, who, along with other charities, will be supporting the government initiative to encourage UK individuals and organisations to offer accommodation for individuals or groups of refugees fleeing Ukraine.

We are aware that there are several individuals within our parish who have already expressed willingness to host those needing a place to stay and who have signed up with the government scheme and / or with other organisations such as Sanctuary Foundation. We have also started to research what is already in place to support refugees who have arrived in our region in the past to see what may be needed, what we can learn and what we may be able to do as a group and as individuals to help.

### The proposal is to:

- Appoint coordinator(s) to liaise with the parish leadership team and PCC supported by a community / area support group (based on those who those who have expressed interest). Currently Andraea Dawson Shepherd will coordinate for Laverton and Mary Morrison for Norton St Philip. There will be a coordinator for the Rode area confirmed in due course. Other parish areas may also like to put names forward.
- 2. Continue to research what other groups and organisations exist who may already be working in this area and to communicate / coordinate with them.
- 3. Offer to create a list of existing and potential sponsors who may be receiving individuals and groups into their homes.
- 4. Provide appropriate help, support, guidance and information for sponsors if needed and for refugees concerning available benefits, services, health and education.

- 5. Offer to identify needs and to coordinate volunteer helpers and possibly back-up hosts.
- 6. Publish information about what we are trying to do and to be a point of contact for sponsors, refugees, volunteers, government and charity groups.
- 7. Provide opportunities for Refugee groups to meet up, support each other and socialise together.
- 8. Check with food and clothing banks as to their needs and access for refugees in need.
- 9. Assess what provision could be made locally to provide essential items. 10. Create list of useful volunteer roles for which people could sign up.

### BETTER BUS CHARTER FOR SOMERSET

We need to do something about improving our buses in Somerset.

Our county currently has the second lowest level of bus journeys per resident of all the counties in England and Somerset's bus services have the very lowest level of passenger satisfaction in the country.





Residents of Somerset experience this every day, whether it's with difficulties getting to health services, reduced opportunities for those seeking work and further education or just the limited (if any) evening and Sunday bus services.

As a result, we see ever increasing numbers of cars on our roads which causes higher levels of local air pollution and increase our carbon emissions.

Somerset Bus Partnership was formed just a year ago to campaign for better bus services across our county and already we have a Somerset-wide network of 115 town and parish transport representatives who share our passion for better buses.

Somerset residents have every right to expect better, but it will need funding.

We have developed a Somerset Bus Charter and invite not just Councillors but community groups, churches and residents to join with us and endorse it. Get in touch - somersetbuspartnership@gmail.com

#### THE SOMERSET BUS CHARTER:

**BETTER BUSES FOR ALL OUR COMMUNITIES -** We need a core network of frequent, high-quality services linking our towns and main villages with enhanced weekend and evening services. Also we want an extension of the demand-responsive 'Slinky' bus services, available to all and with longer operating hours.

**AN INTEGRATED TRANSPORT NETWORK -** We need bus routes to link with local railway stations with timetables that offer improved connections between buses and trains.

We also want to see the introduction of integrated ticketing across the county's different bus operators and with trains too.

**PROMOTION OF EXISTING AND NEW SERVICES -** We should be promoting the bus as an important way by which we all can address the climate emergency in Somerset (transport accounts for nearly half of all carbon emissions in Somerset).

To enable more to go by bus, it is essential that current bus timetable information is shown at all main bus stops and bus times information is available in libraries and at other information points.

**AN AFFORDABLE TRANSPORT SERVICE FOR ALL -** We should make bus travel more attractive through cheaper fares especially targeted at young people up to the age of 25. Plus, for everyone, a new, all-operator, countywide value ticket.

**CLEANER BUSES -** We want an accelerated transition from diesel buses to zero emission buses.

**MEANINGFUL FUNDING OF BUS SERVICES -** We need Somerset's bus budget to be brought progressively up to the average for similar rural authorities in the Southwest.

### A LETTER TO YOU FROM LINDA OLIVER...

Dear Resident, the last time I wrote to you in this way was back in March 2019, when, because of personal reasons, I had decided not to stand for re-election as a Mendip District Councillor.

Here I am in 2022 with the same dilemma. Do I stand again and continue the work I have been doing for over 8 years as a County Councillor, albeit in a different role? The election on the 5<sup>th</sup> May is for a different Somerset-wide role. It is to elect Somerset Unitary Councillors, who will have a 5-year term.



It is with much sadness and regret that, while I am passionately committed to being the community champion and voice for residents in Frome North Division, I cannot realistically continue to do so for another 5 years.

I would have loved to have been part of the New Somerset Unitary Council and be involved with the Local Community Networks. It's going to be an exciting and challenging time and right up my street.

My reasons for not standing are purely about family. I have spent 6 years as a Mendip District Councillor in the area, including 2 years as a councillor in Kent, over 8 years as a County Councillor in Somerset, and before that was a Parish Councillor and Chair of the local Parish Council. During that time, I have not been around for my family and friends, nor taken care of my own health.

Something needs to change. I do not want to share my personal issues with you in detail, but it is now time that I focus on these. I cannot do that if I have committed to a further 5 years representing residents of Frome North. I know that there would be a time I could not deliver my commitment to you.

I will miss the work involved, and working with parish councils, residents, and the officers. I still have some outstanding pieces of work, and I will make sure all the relevant details and contacts are passed on. I will miss the implementation of my last of 4 highways improvement schemes I submitted. The last one is to improve visibility and reduce speed limits at the Cuckoo Lane and Gypsy Lane junction in Frome. The final implementation of the scheme is likely to be in August. I will naturally not be able to resist following with interest the implementation of this highway's improvement scheme, and all the other areas of work that are ongoing.

The good news for me is that Dawn Denton is going to stand for election in Frome North. Some of you may know Dawn, who lives in Frome and runs her own Content Marketing and Training business and has frequently spoken at local business events. We have been working together and I am reassured that continuity will be maintained. She would be a good champion to represent you. This makes it so much easier to pass over the reins to someone equally committed to representing you with a strong voice for the villages and the part of Frome that is within the Frome North Division.

### **RODE DRAINAGE PROJECT - MARCH 2022**

Work on the Rode Drainage Project has been continuing.

The project team has been working through the tender process with a view to appointing a contractor to undertake the proposed infrastructure works.

The programme for the works will be confirmed once the contract has been awarded. It is, however, anticipated that work will commence within the next few months.

Some work has already been completed. In October 2021 a new field drain was installed between Green Park Pond and Green Park Lane. Sediment traps were installed at the upstream and down-stream extents of the pipe.

The new field drain will minimise the sheet runoff across the field. This will reduce the mobilisation of sediments and soils ending up in the flood attenuation ponds and migrating downstream to the culvert beneath the A361.

This project is led by Calm Engineering, on behalf of Mendip District Council and partners:

We also planted donated trees – a couple of locally grown oaks as well as a walnut tree from Walnut Close courtesy of an industrious, albeit forgetful squirrel. Thanks to all who helped on the day particularly the design team of Averil Morrow, Eilish Michell, Sharman Flindall (fantastic cakes Sharman!), Becky Clarke and, of course Pat Restorick who worked her magic with the teas.

Somerset Coronavirus Support Helpline: A single phone number continues to be available for anyone in Somerset who needs Coronavirus-related support. 0300 790 6275, is open seven days a week from 8am to 6pm.

**Local Government Reorganisation:** Following the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) decision to support the move to a single Unitary Council across Somerset the Structural Changes Order were

approved by the House of Commons Committee on 23<sup>rd</sup> January and will now go before the Lords on or before 14<sup>th</sup> March. The first elections to the new authority together with Somerset Town and Parish elections will be held on 5th May 2022. **County Council Revenue Budget:** Highlights of the 2022/23 Somerset budget include: An extra £18 million investment in Adults Social Care (13% increase), an extra £12 million invested in Children's Services (13% increase), an additional £8.4 million identified to invest in schools and £48 million in capital projects, including roads. Additionally there is a major investment in supporting the commitment to create a zero carbon Somerset by 2030 with £7.8 million allocated to reduce energy use in council buildings and £1 million invested in the electrifying the council fleet and building a charging infrastructure in the county. The County Council's share of Council Tax is proposed to rise by a two per cent with a further one per cent rise under the social care precept. For a home rated Band D for



Opportunity Boost Scheme: A new grant has been launched to help people in Somerset overcome financial barriers when seeking employment and returning to work. The Opportunity Boost Scheme will provide grants worth up to £500 to help with the cost associated progressing into work, such as transport costs, childcare, work clothes, learning resources and training courses. The funding for the scheme has been provided through the Somerset Recovery Fund, and the initiative is being delivered in partnership between Somerset County Council and Citizens Advice Somerset. To qualify, applicants must be aged 16 or over, not be entitled to any other financial assistance for job seeking, and had a pre-Covid salary of less than £25,000. For More information visit

Council Tax this is equivalent to a rise of 78p a week.

Half Term and Easter food support: Somerset County Council is again working with schools to provide food vouchers to families eligible for Free School Meals to combat holiday hunger over the February half-term and Easter holidays. The Council has helped provide food vouchers to those children in need of support during the school holidays since October 2020, providing a much-needed boost to families who have felt the impacts of the coronavirus pandemic. The allocation for February half-term and Easter provides vouchers worth £15 per pupil for the week and includes additional funding so that schools can also allocate vouchers to families who are in need of support but do not qualify for Free School Meals. Ukraine: In addition to flying the Ukrainian flag and lighting County Hall in Yellow and Blue the County Council are offering extra support to Ukrainian members of staff and residents in Somerset. The Council stands by, ready to support the national humanitarian aid effort to relocate refugees displaced by Russian aggression.



### **'COUCH TO 5K'**

I'm not sure what made me think 'maybe I could do that' when I saw Brandon's advert for a course in Rode on Facebook. Possibly it was because my dog walking activity had reduced as our little dog had passed her 15<sup>th</sup> birthday. Anyway, I decided to give it a go, not really thinking that I would make it to 5k.

'Couch to 5k' is a course designed to enable you to build up to a run of 5 kilometres over a period of about 10 weeks. You start very gradually with 1 minute running and 1 minute walking over a period of 20 minutes. The amount of running gradually increases until you run continuously for 20 minutes. You then increase the running time until you can do 5k without stopping. Brandon organised group training sessions each Monday evening for the 6 of us who signed up and then it was up to us to do 2 more sessions each week.

Despite having never really done much running and not being very keen on it, I found that I was quite enjoying the sessions. I felt good afterwards and it gave me a sense of achievement. Over the weeks the increase in my fitness was very noticeable. The culmination of the training was to participate in a 5k Parkrun, but I didn't want to do it. However, I was persuaded by the others and found myself joining them at the Frome Parkrun on Saturday 18th March along with around 200 others. I have to admit that it was a struggle, but I did get round and apparently came 2nd in my age group (there were probably only 2 of us in the group!) The rest of the Rode group did really well and made good times.

Thanks to Brendon Quentin-Hicks for running the course and for his support which, along with the encouragement of my companions, enabled me to make it. I've just got to keep on running now!

### **SWP APRIL CHANGES**

Somerset Waste Partnership

All change - later summer hours at your recycle sites.

April marks the switch from winter to summer hours for Somerset recycling sites. Sites are open the same days as in winter, including all 16 open every Saturday and Sunday 9am-4pm year-round. But instead of winter's 9am-5pm on weekdays, summer hours - when a site is open - are 9am-6pm from Friday 1 April. Sites switch back to their to winter timetable from Saturday 1 October 2022. All site details here:

All change - one day later collections for your Easter card, plastic, foil. Everyone's collections change for Easter. Good Friday 15 April pick-ups move to Saturday 16 April and with no collections on Easter Monday 18 April, all Easter week collections are a day later, including Friday collections taking place on Saturday 23 April.



Good news: almost all Easter egg packaging can be recycled in kerbside collections: glitter-free card in black recycle box, while clear plastic trays that hold the eggs can join aluminium foil in your Blue Bag. PS: Next bank holiday with 1 day later collections is on Monday 2 May.

Got lots of anything? If time and transport or help, drop it all off at a recycle site. If safe to store, put out over time.

Waste less time; do more online - For details of what Recycle More collects and what materials go in which containers, see somersetwaste.gov.uk/recycle-more.

To check all your collection days - recycling, rubbish, garden waste - click on My Collection Day at somersetwaste.gov.uk (tip: postcode gap AB12 3CD). Useful to see all the changes for your collections after bank holidays, over Easter or around the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

And via My Waste Services at somersetwaste.gov.uk, you can:

- Order any recycle container free Log missed collections after 7pm
- Order paid bulky waste pick-up Sort clinical/assisted collections
- Get recycle site van/trailer permit Send comments about services
- lacktriangle Pay for asbestos/plasterboard

My Waste Services is available 24/7 so no reason to wait to make that call, and no need to sit waiting for an answer.

### NO MOW MAY

Spring is in the air, and the sound of lawns being mowed is a frequent addition to the birdsong!

That first mow of the year can be very rewarding - the garden is almost instantly turned from a rather scruffy looking "field" to a neat and tidy lawn. However, that early cut is definitely NOT rewarding for wildlife - in particular bees and other pollinators which are critical to food production (around a third of all the crops we eat rely on invertebrates for pollination). These creatures rely almost entirely on wildflowers to survive. However, in the UK we have lost over 97% of species-rich flower meadows since the 1930s.



As a result, in order to help protect wildlife, the charity Plantlife started the "No Mow May" campaign several years ago – and whilst private gardens cannot substitute ancient wild meadows, we can do a huge amount on a small scale to reverse critical habitat loss.

And the good news is we can do this with little or no effort, saving energy (and money) in the process....because one of the best ways to encourage wildflowers in the garden is simply to forget the lawnmower and just let your grass grow.



Leave a patch of lawn to its own devices during spring and summer, and the chances are that at least some wildflowers will appear in your new mini-meadow. Not only will it attract wildlife into your garden, but it will look lovely too – a powerful reminder that we should value what's left and support all efforts to restore wildflower meadows.

Try to resist cutting until at least the middle of July — or even into early September if you can. This gives the wildflowers a chance to complete their cycle of growing, flowering and setting seed. The exact timing of the first cut depends on the year and the weather, but a later cut will help species like knapweed and orchids to spread, while earlier cuts can help control competitive species, such as common hogweed. If you get more invasive plants like nettle or dock, it's best to pull these up by hand.

What comes up in your no-mow mini-meadow depends very much on what you start with....the average lawn is usually home to what many would describe as 'weeds', but many of these so-called weeds will grow into lovely wildflowers. Indeed, there seems to be a growing realisation that our gardens shouldn't necessarily be pristine "weed-free" environments....I read an interesting article in the Guardian a few weeks ago entitled "How I learned to love weeds — and why you should, too" by Alys Fowler....thoroughly recommended!

When you finally cut your "no mow" area aim to cut the grass down hard to a few centimetres in height, but leave some strips or edges uncut as refuges for insects. You might need a scythe or a strimmer for that first cut, but after that a standard mower will be fine. If it's a small enough patch you might even get by with a pair of garden shears. Our experience last summer was that a couple of hours with the garden shears, and then a mow, was all that was required. The cut area will then probably need a week or two to "green up".

Incidentally, the Parish Council has also discussed the potential to reduce the mowing of the land it owns. Apart from the Playing Field, the areas of land under PC ownership are individually rather small, and therefore it was decided to experiment with one of those small sites for the coming year.

Plus - the "Section 106 Land" (which is the new extension to the playing field) will be another area acting to restore the invertebrate population in the village.

### **DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT APRIL 2022**

By the time this goes out there will hopefully be a glimmer of light at the end of the dark tunnel that is the war in Ukraine, the shocking and bewildering event that will have been to the forefront of all our minds over the last weeks.

I want to start by expressing my solidarity with the people of the Ukraine – and with those people in Russia who are being deceived by their government about the appalling events that are taking place on their doorstep.

More recently some of the news coverage has turned to the resulting fuel crisis and the way the war has highlighted our reliance on fossil fuels. If ever there was a time to turn our backs on fossil fuels and invest in renewable energy the time is now. However, rather than seizing this opportunity, the UK government has, in the first instance, moved from a relationship with one despotic state, Russia, to nurturing its relationship with another despotic state, Saudi Arabia.

Meanwhile the climate crisis shows no signs of going away - it has simply been overshadowed by other events. With so many local matters that usually take up the majority of my time it is often easy to lose sight of the fact that I was elected on a Green Party ticket. And, although the Green Party is not a single-issue party, I wholeheartedly believe that the climate crisis is the most pressing issue of our time.

Some of you may have seen the coverage of 3 young men who locked themselves onto goalposts during football matches last month.

I would like to echo some of the bold statements made by Louis, 21, who locked himself on at the Everton v Newcastle match. This was his plea to us all,

"It's time to look up, time to step up and not standby. It's time to act like it's an emergency. We face a cost-of-living crisis, a housing crisis, a fuel crisis and a climate crisis. Our government is betraying us by funding new oil fields in the North Sea. New oil means destruction of our children's future. It means suffering for the poorest and the most marginalised in all regions."

This was reiterated by a more establishment figure, Baroness Camilla Cavendish, in the Financial Times, "This is the moment to 'go big' on green energy, rather than doubling down on fossil fuels. We'll never get a better opportunity to tackle climate change and to guarantee energy security at the same time. We need to fast-track more wind and solar power and to redouble efforts to improve the storage and transmission of renewable power, we need insulation for our 'damp and draughty houses' and a wider push to improve energy efficiency. Yes, it will be hard but 'defending freedom has its price.'" (Quotation from The Week.)

There are many ways to step up and get involved. It is up to us all.

For our shared garden, we feel a little behind in the growing season - we have started seed sowing (sweet peas and tomatoes were the first priority - with at

least 10 varieties of each, and have done some ground preparations, which feels good, but I know there's a lot we want to do. We still need to replace the glass panes that blew out during Storm Eunice, but we have one intact greenhouse we can use now for propagation. Our daffodils have started to bloom and the tulips are coming on nicely - I'm excited for the parrot and peony types to flower especially!



An insight from one of the shared garden owners on the scheme:

"The benefits for the landowner are that they have a share of the produce that are grown, their vegetable plot is kept tidy, they have someone new to talk to and it is good to know that in some small way that they are helping someone."

Spring is finally here and it has been wonderful to feel the sun again after such a wet and windy time. The cool of early morning and even a light frost has then resulted in a beautiful day. Wildlife is very busy but the birds particularly, nest building ready for the first broods.

There is a blackbird that is singing at the top of his voice outside my bedroom window from about 4.30am but I don't mind, his song is spring. He also sings in my garden perched in the Hazel tree in the evening. From there he can see the best hedge to build a nest. He is quite tame already.

I love that there is birdsong even though the new builds next door disrupted

things for a while; all their wild and free space to build nests and roam, gone. But they are learning to live with this new development. There was evidence of not only birds but badgers, foxes, hedgehogs and rabbits in the orchard for as long as I have lived here. But some are returning. Recently I saw boxing hares in a field on the Rudge Lane. Last summer, one bounded down the lane towards me. It felt surreal to just stand there as it passed me!

We are, at last ready to plant our Spring Barley and Field Beans. We have a new Claydon Drill (yellow) and you will see Shaun busy drilling around the farm.



This is a fantastic piece of kit, direct drilling which gives the seed a great chance to germinate and appear above ground. Soon Shed Field, Brickyard and Barbara's Field will be spread with FYM and ploughed ready for the maize to be drilled. The maize is a different drill and will be arriving late April/early May, once the ground is prepared.

The clocks will be forward by now and the celebration of Easter, and what it means, is fast approaching.

### **RODE LADIES GROUP**

On February 23<sup>rd</sup> Pat Banwell welcomed members to their first meeting since September 2021. She said no subscriptions would be collected since sufficient funds were available for now. There was still a vacancy for Secretary and anyone interested should speak to Pam George or Pat to find out more. The Annual Programme had not been produced yet due to uncertainties about the future.

Pat then introduced Mr Ian Williamson whose talk and slide show on The Silk Road was in aid of St. Margaret's Hospice.

The Silk Road is an ancient Eurasian trade route spanning some 4,000 miles. In 2018 Ian joined a 35 day tour organised by Oasis Overland Truck Trips to travel to the Chinese border, through Kazakhstan, Tajikistan, Uzbekistan and Turkmenistan.

In Bishkek, the capital of Kyrgystan, the two guides met seventeen trekkers from different countries and familiarised them with their home for the next month the overland truck - custom built to handle the rough terrain and varied climate encountered in Central Asia. For security purposes the safe for storage of money and valuables was always to be referred to as "the fridge".



The adventurers were split into four groups to rotate the different daily tasks which included shopping and cooking, erecting the tents for sleeping in, and collecting firewood.

Their bumpy expedition took them through the Ala Archa National Park, and around Lake Issy-Kul (the seventh deepest lake in the world and the second largest saline lake after the Caspian Sea). Then they enjoyed two days living in yurts by the beautiful Song Kol lake at an altitude of 10,000 feet. The next leg of their sometimes perilous journey took them via Samarkand and Moinak, across the desert to Aksu-Zhabagly, then Khiva with its numerous museums and mosques. In Turkmenistan they saw the crater which has been burning gas for 70 years despite efforts to extinguish it.

For Ian his journey ended abruptly at the border to Iran where he was denied a visa due to his UK nationality. However, he has kept in touch with his Oasis guides and plans to go on other such expeditions.

### **RODE & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB**

In March we had a talk on Hedgehog Awareness from Laura Batt from the Prickles Rescue Centre. Hedgehogs have been added to the Red List for British Mammals classified as vulnerable to extinction and could disappe



classified as vulnerable to extinction and could disappear from our gardens in the next 10 years. Numbers have declined because of the increase in road traffic, lack of habitat and numbers killed by badgers.

We can make a difference by making sure our gardens are hedgehog friendly, good for hedgehogs and good for us by keeping slugs at bay. Pesticides and metaldehyde slug pellets are poisonous to hedgehogs, so please try to use organic methods. Access to gardens has become tricky for hedgehogs with the use of garden fences, particularly ones with concrete base boards. Small gaps can allow hedgehogs to progress from one garden to another on their nightly foraging trips, they can travel up to 1-2miles a night.

A shallow dish of fresh water and food such as specialist hedgehog food or cat/dog food or muesli moistened with water ( not milk) might bring regular visits from a hedgehog. Food can be put underneath a plastic crate to keep it safe from pets, with 12cm square hole cut in one side and weighted with a stone. A small wild area will provide hedgehogs with natural food , shelter and a nesting area. Hedgehog homes can be bought or constructed with information from the British Hedgehog Preservation Society

There are a number of simple ways to make a garden safer for hedgehogs. We all know that bonfires may conceal hedgehogs but compost heaps may attract them and need to be turned carefully. Hedgehogs are good swimmers but ponds need to have a shallow area or a 'ladder' to make sure hedgehogs can get out if pools have steep sides. Fruit, pea netting or football nets can cause a hazard when hedgehogs get tangled. Laura had a number of products for sale to help with providing funds for the Prickles charity.

On Monday 11th April we will welcome Sally Morgan to talk about Climate Change Gardening, 7.30pm in Rode Village Hall, all welcome.



### **PARISH RECIPE**

### POTATO GNOCCHI WITH SAUSAGE AND KALE

This dish is really simple and quicker to make than sausage and mash - no peeling potatoes or making onion gravy.

If you don't have any kale there are plenty of other green vegetables in season that you can use, tender stem broccoli, cavalo nero, chard or spring greens would all work just as well.

### Ingredients for 2 portions:

3-4 Good Quality Sausages, skins removed

1/2 Dried Chipotle Chilli, chopped

A big sprig of Fresh Rosemary, needles removed from the stalks

3 Cloves of Garlic, roughly chopped

2 Fresh Tomatoes, roughly diced

100g Kale, leaves roughly torn up

200g Frozen Potato Gnocchi

Extra Virgin Olive Oil

Extra Virgin Rapeseed Oil

A good grating of Grana Padano

A good twist of Black Pepper

A generous pinch of salt

You'll need a large non-stick frying pan for this dish and a large saucepan for boiling the gnocchi.

### **Method:**

- 1. Fill your saucepan with lots of water, a generous pinch of salt and bring to the boil.
- 2. Remove the skins from the sausages and break them into little meatballs.
- 3. Heat the frying pan, add a splash of oil and fry the sausages on a medium to high heat.
- 4. After a minute, add in the chopped dried chilli, the rosemary needles and the chopped garlic.

- 5. Once the sausages have browned a little, usually around 2 minutes, add in the chopped up fresh tomato. Cook for a further couple of minutes until the tomatoes start to break down.
- 6. Now add the picked kale leaves and mix in with the sausages.
- 7. The kale will take a couple of minutes to sweat down, time to cook the gnocchi. Cook them in the salted boiling water, straight from the freezer. They will take a couple of minutes.
- 8. Whilst the gnocchi are cooking, add a small ladle of the cooking water to your pan, this will create a little steam that will finish cooking the kale.
- 9. Once the gnocchi float to the surface they are done. Scoop them out, straight into your pan and gently mix with the sausages and kale.

Done.

Serve on warm plates with a good grating of Grana Padano, a twist of black pepper and a drizzle of extra virgin olive oil.

# MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL

ON TUESDAY 8th MARCH 2022 AT 7.30 pm

### **UNCONFIRMED**

### **Present:**

Cllr Andy Pickett (AP) – in the Chair, Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Elaine Butler (EB). **In attendance:** Cllr Linda Oliver, Cllr Barbi Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk and 6 Parishioners

### 1. Public Participation:

Deep concern was expressed over the danger the trees on Merfield, that ran alongside The Mead, were causing; a number of branches had come down during storm 'Eunice' two of which fell into the road. Action on these trees was requested.

There was still no 20mph limit within the village and the Parish Council (PC) was asked to chase up its installation.

Parishioners were concerned over the large number of accidents that had occurred at the Bradford Road/Rode Hill junction. There had been five since Christmas 2021 and it had been fortunate there had been no fatalities. This junction had been of concern since 2018.

It was noted that an appeal was to be lodged against the rejection to the planning application to build on Barbara's Field and the PC was asked to continue to oppose this. Church Lane was highlighted as already a problem road before any extra traffic generated from a development.

The question posed to Mendip on 5G did not meet the concerns that had been expressed at the last Parish Council meeting and Rode was requested to endorse a precautionary principal.

- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr Mike Salmon.
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 8th February were approved.
- **4. Declarations of interest:** AP said he had interest in planning application 2021/0071/OTS (Barbara's Field) but this had been cleared by the Clerk.
- **5. Report from County Councillor:** Cllr Oliver said she had tried to chase up the officer dealing with The Sportsman but he was on holiday until next week. Caroline Murray would be chased up as she had been going to chase up Wessex Water on this issue. This would be put on the next agenda.
- <u>**6.** Report from District Councillor:</u> Cllr Lund's report had nothing specific for Rode.

# 7. Actions from previous meeting:

i. Trees: Merfield/The Mead These trees are on private land and Somerset County Council are unable to do much, but could issue a Section 154 if branches or trees could fall into the road requesting the owner to do something. It was noted the Somerset arboriculturist had inspected the trees prior to the storm and said no work was required. The branches which came into the road during the storm were significant around 150mm in diameter and 6m long. Cllr Oliver requested photos and the report from the local expert on these trees and she would pursue this with Somerset.

**Parish trees:** Clerk reported that an inspection, by an independent tree expert, had been made and his report was expected soon. Verbally he had reported that the trees were generally in good condition.

- ii. Clock: The Clerk had obtained a cheaper quote for scaffolding up to the clock (£650) and the meeting agreed the repairs should now be carried out using this cheaper quote. The Cross Keys had cleared the putting up of the scaffolding.
- iii. Footpath from Church Farm to Playing field: The path was still to be completed and Autograph had agreed to improve the top section which had already flooded. It was hoped this would now be completed by the end of March. Under the S106 agreement a Path Maintenance Committee should be formed and Andy Fussell and Autograph would be reminded of this
- **iv. 5G**: The response from Mendip was noted. Any planning application should include a 50m clearance radius round any 5G mast and if any mast was proposed in Rode this would be ensured. Glastonbury had set up a committee to look into 5G and after two years had not reached a unanimous decision to support 5G, so had agreed to adopt a precautionary principal. It was noted Mendip is to consider two applications at its meeting next week and this would be monitored. After discussion it was agreed that, having only heard one side of the argument on 5G and the PC having limited technical knowledge on the issue, the PC would maintain a watching brief on 5G. The PC would not send any further questions to Mendip.
- **v. Grit bin:** It was reported that the residents of Providence Place were unable to agree a position for this. Therefore, at present this would not be progressed.
- vi. Mead development: Further information would be gathered.
- vii. Coach House, Rode Hill: No retrospective planning application had been submitted. It was agreed the time limit for doing this would be checked.
- **viii. Fingerposts:** The Clerk reported that the three-finger post could not be refurbished in this financial year and it was agreed to now request all three posts were done together.

### 8. Highways:

- a) Bradford Road/Rode Hill junction: Cllr Oliver reported that she had sent information on the recent accidents to the small improvements team and road safety team and awaited to hear from them. It was agreed that the small improvements made by Somerset had not resolved the problem at this junction and the PC agreed that something more should be done. It appeared that some accidents on these crossroads were not reported and those that did not result in injury probably did not get logged. It was agreed that a site meeting with Somerset should be sought with a group from the Parish Council (and The Scrivens) at which the issues could be clearly demonstrated. Cllr Oliver and the Clerk would seek to get this organised.
- **b) Memorandum of Understanding:** This still had to be completed and a meeting would be arranged in the near future. An additional SID on the Bradford Road on the Bradford side would also be sought.

### 9. Planning:

### i) New applications:

None

Concern was expressed that Mendip were not automatically sending new applications to those on the contact list surrounding a new application. AE and PR agreed to continue to ensure these people were aware of new applications.

### ii. Mendip decisions:

**2021/2641/TCA:** Reduce height of apple and birch tree – 7 Langham Place. Approved

**2021/2867/TCA:** Reduce height and lateral branches of plane, yew, maple, three cherry, hazel and two ash trees – Langham House. Approved.

### iii. Other:

It was noted that the Developer was applying for Mendip's refusal of planning application 2021/0071/OTS for 49 houses on 'Barbara's Field' to go to appeal by inquiry. It is up to the appellant to show that Mendip's decision was wrong and they would have to challenge Mendip's reasons for rejection. The Parish Council would keep a close eye on this and would be given time to make further comment. Anyone can comment but it was emphasised the comments should be focused on the reasons for rejection and not to raise other issues.

- **10. Climate Emergency Group:** JM reported that questionnaires to ask all resident what they want to do with regard climate change were being printed. These would be hand delivered with residents' names on them to be completed and hopefully returned by the end of the month. The PC agreed to fund the printing of these.
- **11. Playing Field Constitution:** AP reported that he had met with the legal advisor and Steve and Amanda Eyles to amend the first draft Constitution and a new draft would be reviewed when available.

- **12.** Queen's Jubilee Celebrations: The celebrations to be held on Saturday  $4^{th}$  June on the playing field were discussed and the Parish Council agreed to fund the children's food, mugs and entertainment along with further contributions to a total of £5,000. This type of celebration rarely occurred and it was important to try and ensure it was a success.
- **13. British Spring Clean:** Rode had signed up to take part in this event which was taking place between 25<sup>th</sup> March and 10<sup>th</sup> April and would be organising a village clean-up on the afternoon (2.00pm 4.00pm) of Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> April, with tea on the playing field afterwards. The PC agreed to fund further litter-pick sticks and bags.
- **14. Buses:** PT reported that discussions regarding the funding Somerset is bidding for are still ongoing. However, services should keep going. Worryingly passenger numbers are still low following covid and the rapidly increasing fuel cost are both of concern.
- **15. Elections:** Nomination papers are now available for the Parish Council elections and these have to be back to Mendip by 5<sup>th</sup> April. A notice of the elections would go up once the government had finally approved that they could take place a year early.
- **16. Annual meeting:** A date could not be agreed at the meeting and the Clerk agreed to check on availability of both the Memorial Hall and the Chapel. [Clerk's Note: I have been informed that due to elections this meeting has to take place between 9<sup>th</sup> May and 23<sup>rd</sup> May.]

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
