REFLECTION

Freedom, oh freedom! Hey think about it (thanks Aretha Franklin)! Today – as I write – is England's "Freedom Day"! Today is a day when most of the restrictions that have been with us for so many months may now be relaxed. We can hug each other, visit each other without restriction, go dancing, play football, and remove our face masks – unless the place or organisation we are entering would rather we didn't.



However, in my case there is a slight snag! I have been 'pinged' – told via the NHS app that I have been near an infected person – and will have to delay these freedoms until the end of this week.

Inevitably the very notion of Freedom Day fills us with a longing for the way things were before the pandemic struck. For instance, I can get on a train and go to Newcastle if I need to, we might at last be able (more easily) to visit our daughter and her family in America, once again.

But what does it mean to be free? I am sitting in front of a laptop waiting until a computer program I am working on finishes running. I am free, but in a sense bound to a laptop. Most of us are bound by our mobile phones — responding to calls or work demands or the latest news at any time of day. I am bound by a deadline for the article I am presently writing. I have to read corrections to a thesis I am examining. I am bound by convention, by my lifestyle, by finances, by needs of the family, by the maintenance requirements of the house, by the washing up or ironing, grass that needs cutting, even hair that is getting shaggy.

In John's Gospel we read that Jesus said to some strict Jews who were listening to Him: "If you continue in My word... you will know the truth and the truth will make you free." (John 8: 31). What can that mean? Think about it!

I know what it doesn't mean. My wife once went to a Service in a large church in south-east England. The Service involved a stately procession. At the front of the procession a gentleman walked swinging a censer with elaborate ceremony, out of which incense poured. At the end of the Service, he remarked to Beth: "We are the only church in this city who know how to worship properly"!

But Jesus' sermon on the mount describes a Kingdom which is upside down. He says that the 'blessed' are the poor in spirit, the mourners, the gentle, those who hunger and thirst, the merciful, the pure in heart, the peacemakers, those who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness. We are blessed even if people insult and persecute us, and falsely say all kinds of evil against us. We might look at

these words and say "steady on!". But among all the other things Jesus said we find these words: "Come to Me you who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest." True freedom can be found in Him, and He alone is where we find rest.

CHANGING PLACES (NEW CONSTITUENCY BOUNDARIES)

The Boundary Commission has been charged with reviewing the exiting constituency boundaries to ensure that they are consistent with present population. The rules for sizing a constituency include the number of people (68,000 electors plus or minus 5%) and the geographic area (no greater than 13,000 square kms). Frome and Somerton's electoral population is 85,866 and although the constituency is large (it takes and hour and a half to drive from end to end) its area at 2,230 sq kms, meets the criterion for geographic size. However, it is significantly larger that the target for numbers of electors.

To address this issue the Boundary Commission is proposing to split the constituency into two: Glastonbury and Somerton to the south, and Frome to the north. It is also proposing to add part of the constituency of Northeast Somerset to the Frome constituency, as shown in grey on the map.

This adjustment will add the towns of Radstock and Midsomer Norton to the constituency as well as the villages of Oakhill, Gurney Slade, Chilcompton Hinton Charterhouse and Wellow.


The resulting constituency population will be 70,202, thus meeting the population rule.

These two new constituencies will come into existence in time for the 2024 election.

SOMERSET WASTE SERVICES



Six weeks to support waste services -Somerset Waste Partnership (SWP) has reluctantly decided to suspend garden waste collections for six weeks from Monday 2 August.

Collections are expected to restart from Monday 13 September. Should that date change, we will let subscribers know.

We apologise for this temporary measure, which is essential to maintain rubbish and recycling collections.

Suspending garden waste collections allows us to redeploy staff to support vital rubbish and recycling services. It will not get the services back to normal, but it will help minimise disruption.

Subscribers do not need to do anything. Their subscription will be automatically extended by eight weeks, including an extra two weeks for the disruption, especially at this key time for gardeners. Garden waste collections will continue up to and including Friday 30 July. From that date, SWP will not return for missed collections. Garden waste sack collections cannot be booked during the suspension. What subscribers can do:

- Recycle sites. All 16 Somerset recycle sites take garden waste.
- Reduce waste. Mow and prune less this summer; let it grow.
- Mulch. Use grass cuttings to retain moisture and reduce weeds.
- Aid nature. Add branches to your "wild corner" to help useful bugs.
- Compost. More on composting, including bargain compost bins, here: somersetwaste.gov.uk/home-composting
- Do not put garden waste into rubbish or recycling containers; do not fly-tip.

If essential to get in touch, the form is the quickest way to make contact.

If you cannot use the online form, **DO NOT** contact your district council – it is **NOT** involved in managing the garden waste suspension. Instead, call o1823 589900– the dedicated garden waste service 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday.



You can cut missed pick-ups - Help your crews get more done:

- Sort materials into the right containers; have all out by 6am.
- Stack boxes in windy weather to reduce waste being blown around.
- Squash, flatten and (if safe) crush all except glass and aerosols so crews can collect more before having to return to their depot to unload.

After a pandemic year in which crews worked far longer hours with heavier waste loads, the LGV driver shortage and COVID self-isolation of staff have badly hit services. We have apologised for the recent delays to many collections, and we are working hard with collections contractor SUEZ to maintain services. But there is no quick fix. Somerset is not alone; many councils face similar pressures.

Delays and disruption are frustrating but would ask for your patience. From training to recruitment - see: suez.co.uk/en-gb/join-our-team-in-somerset - everyone is working hard to improve services. For latest news, visit somersetwaste.gov.uk/service-update.

Chair. As you probably imagine it's been an interesting and often challenging time to be part of a team running a facility that is so important to our lovely village. I did agree to be Chair for three years and that time is now nearly up.

We're now facing problems keeping the charity running. At our AGM, scheduled for October this year, it is more than likely we'll be looking for a new Chair, Secretary and Treasurer leaving the Board of Trustees with just 4 members. Our Declaration of Trust requires the charity to have a minimum of 7 Trustees. therefore, unless we have people come forward to take on these roles, the charity will be suspended and control handed to Rode Parish Council as landowner, in November.

Like many charitable organisations, finding people to volunteer to run things is problematical. I appreciate that people are busy with their own lives and, dare I say, tend to take small charitable organisations like ours a little bit for granted. Anyway, please come and volunteer help to manage and maintain this invaluable Rode village facility.

Booking the Pavilion and Playing Field:

I've touched on this before I think but just a reminder that residents can hire the pavilion for small parties and even the playing field itself for larger events.



We charge a hire fee because we're a charity and need to maintain the property. That said it's really not expensive at \pounds_5 per hour for the pavilion and $\pounds_{7.50}$ per hour for short term, exclusive use of the playing field.

Rode residents even get a 20% discount but I'll leave you to do the maths. Suffice to say at those prices the facilities are a bargain. Email: rodepfbookings@gmail.com.

On a similar note, if you wish to use part of the playing field to run a small commercial venture such as an outdoor yoga session, personal training etc. then please do get in touch about making a donation to playing field funds.

RODE COMEDY FESTIVAL RETURNS SEPTEMBER 2021...

Rode Comedy Festival launched last September in response to the catastrophic effects of the pandemic on the comedy industry.

We saw an opportunity to run a small and accessible open-air Covid safe comedy festival, making up for months of restrictions on performances, and large events.



Working with our friends Emma and James Burton at Pitch Perfect Camping, and the team at The Cross Keys Rode, the concept took off, and became a sell-out success hosting big name comedians. Headliners for 2020 included stadium level comedians whose national tours had been postponed – including Russell Kane and Russell Howard. 

LATEST SCAM NEWS 21/07/2021 9788 Somerset Areas - Partnership with supermarkets helps police protect victims targeted by fraudsters in gift card scams. Fraud Protect Officers launched the initiative in April after a noticeable rise in scam cases where victims were being asked to purchase gift cards. In most cases requests for



gift cards are part of a bigger scam - victims unwittingly giving thousands of pounds over time. These scams normally start by fraudsters trying to gain their victim's trust, this can happen over a period of weeks or months. Having gained the victim's trust, they will ask them to purchase gift cards for them, typically inventing a time-critical reason why they need the victim to help them. Once the victim has bought the gift cards, they are then asked to provide the individual number on the vouchers. The fraudsters may drain the value of the card, but typically sell the gift cards on. They will usually then ask the victim to go and buy more for them. Fraud protect officer Amy Horrobin said: "In a large number of these cases, sadly, the victim is taken in by the scam because they are trying to help others, whether that be someone they believe to be a love interest, or a reputable agency. Its brilliant people are increasingly wary that they shouldn't hand over banking information or transfer money to people they don't know but it means fraudsters are coming up with more elaborate ways to steal victims' cash. People don't tend to associate gift cards so readily with scams. If vou've been a victim, please report it."

We've seen an increasing number of crimes involving the purchase of Steam cards - Steam is an online platform where people can download/play games. Proactive work has led to staff at Sainsbury/Argos stores recognising several customers as a potential fraud victim and to refer these incidents to us, allowing us to investigate/support the victim. Incidents reported to us include:

- A shopper had made several Steam purchases totalling £140 They had been contacted by several people via a gaming app who claimed to be single mothers unable to feed their children. In total victim parted with approx £2,000.
- Over weeks a customer bought several Steam gift cards then tried to buy a £500 voucher. She was a romance fraud victim, conversing online with someone in USA with a fake profile who wanted to marry her she sent a total of £4,000.
- A shopper attempted to purchase £500 Steam gift cards having been phoned by someone claiming to be a police officer, claiming a car had been found in Wales with paperwork linking the vehicle to them and that it also contained drugs and guns. The fraudster said that unless gift cards were bought then the woman could be arrested.

Under-reporting is a real issue with these crimes, victims wrongly believe nothing can be done or they feel embarrassed by what has happened. We urge anyone in this situation to report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or at http://www.actionfraud.police.uk.

Parish Ecology

THE IMPORTANCE OF TREES

With growing awareness of the climate and ecological emergency we are more and more conscious of the importance of trees. England is one of the most tree-depleted countries in Europe with only 10% woodland cover compared with 38% across the EU and 31% across the world. We long ago cut down our trees to clear farmland, to build ships to create an empire and to make charcoal for the industrial revolution - now we have to work differently and better.

- The first reason that trees are so important is that they capture carbon dioxide as they grow. Carbon dioxide is absorbed by leaves and trapped in the structure of the wood helping to slow global heating. The more mature a tree is the more effective the carbon capture. So, in addition to planting lots of saplings, we need to protect the big specimens that are doing the heavy lifting until the youngsters can start to have an impact.
- The second reason is that woodland, especially native broad-leaved woodland, is a hugely rich and diverse ecosystem and an important part of the landscape we need to protect and expand the remnants that we have left. Woodland will help to protect us from flooding, which is predicted to become more common (recent flooding in Germany is another startling signal), but climate is only one part of the crisis we face. We have to respond to the way our wildlife is being depleted by habitat loss and poisonous chemicals. We need to think not just about individual trees but about protecting, managing and expanding our richest and diverse woodlands so they can support bugs, reptiles and mammals.
- And the third reason is that trees are vitally important for our physical and mental health. We need to see trees, including big mature trees, not as an inconvenience but as assets to the community and take far more care to preserve them for everybody's benefit. Some mature trees are covered by Tree Preservation Orders but most have no protection and developers tend to think that planting a few replacement saplings in "mitigation" will cover their commitment to biodiversity. Trees are part of the richness of our living environment a lack of trees constitutes a significant deprivation.

The government has just published The England Trees Action Plan 2021-2024 which says that local authorities will help to create a strategy for woodland and trees and should appoint a local tree officer to create partnerships, develop a woodland and tree strategy and monitor the way it enriches our environment. Let us hope this seed is given the time and resources to mature fully and that we see a more strategic approach to the preservation and expansion of the trees and woodland across the towns, villages and countryside of Mendip.






SUMMER READING CHALLENGE

Somerset libraries are calling for children to sign up to read six books this summer and become 'Wild World Heroes', as part of the Summer Reading

Challenge 2021.

The theme Wild World Heroes was inspired by nature and developed in partnership this year with charity World Wildlife Fund (WWF) and encourages 4-11-year olds to borrow and read any six library books over the summer.

This year's challenge takes place in Wilderville, where our young heroes live. Wilderville is a pretty cool place but the heroes have been noticing some problems. Helped by their trusted animal companions, they are ready to take action to save the natural world.



As children read library books for the Summer Reading Challenge, they will collect transformation stickers – some with mysterious smells. By adding these stickers to their fold out map of Wilderville, young readers will fix the environmental problem in each area and make Wilderville a better home for everyone. On completion of the challenge, they will receive a medal and certificate for reading all six books.

To take part in Wild World Heroes, all you need to do is sign up at your nearest library, where you will be given a bookmark to start your Summer Reading Challenge adventure.

Wild World Heroes launched in July at libraries across Somerset Libraries and runs until 10 September.

Parish Gardening

It's been a hot last few weeks of July, feeling like the south of France at points, wonderful for harvesting but made gardening quite challenging. I have really enjoyed the incredible blue skies and golden hour sunsets that we've been having, during one week we were so lucky to see a barn owl fly near our growing plot twice as the sun was going down!

AUGUST GARDENING:

- Watering it's the most important gardening job at this time of year either first thing in the morning or late in the evening when the temperatures have dropped. It is better to water a good amount less often, than a small amount of water frequently as this will encourage deep roots making the plant more resilient against dry conditions. However, if we are experiencing a heat wave, then plants need to be watered often and with a generous amount to avoid the plants and its soil drying out. If you are planning a holiday, depending on the time you go and how sensitive your plants are to drying out, you may need to ask for help with watering or to set up some irrigation. In addition, if you have a pond make sure it's topped up if the level drops in dry spells.
- Weeding try to keep annual and perennial weeds at bay as soon as you can
 to stop them from spreading near to or on your chosen plants. Perennial
 weeds like bindweed and ground elder are an ongoing problem, as they root
 from the smallest of white roots. But keeping on top of it, removing as much
 of the root as you can will help keep them in check.
- Deadheading deadheading flowers such as roses, penstemon, echinacea, delphiniums, lupins, dahlias, sweet peas, cosmos etc. will encourage the production of more flowers. So the more you cut, the more you'll get of these flowers to enjoy.
- Cutting back herbaceous perennials such as hardy geraniums, campanula
 and alchemilla mollis will be in need of a cut back at some point soon, if not
 already. Hardy geraniums will regrow and should re-flower at least once
 before the frosts come.
- Pruning wisteria should be pruned twice a year (summer and winter) to keep it in check and to promote good flowering. The summer prune is repeated as required as the wisteria stems just keep growing. Lavender should be pruned back after it has finished flowering, and it is recommended to be done on the 8th day of the 8th month, however in practice I find this is much too early as the bees (and us gardeners) are still enjoying them, so I tend to prune them around the end of September but go with whatever suits you and your plant.
- Harvesting you can cut back herbs now that they have put on a lot of growth, and you can either hang them up and dry them or freeze them in ice cubes to preserve and have them to use when you need them.

- Plant support certain plants may need a bit of extra support if they've put on a lot of growth and haven't yet had it, either from an appropriate type of stake or by tying the growth onto supports such as trellis.
- Hedge cutting you may have already started cutting your hedges but cutting a beech hedge now will look neat until next summer. Before you cut any hedge, do check for nesting birds. If you want your hedge to flower and fruit, such as pyracantha, hawthorn, blackthorn, then avoid cutting until after you or the birds have harvested in autumn or later or carefully prune away any new long growths. Using an old sheet or a tarpaulin underneath where you are cutting can be very handy to catch the clippings, which makes picking up and keeping tidy much easier.
- Lawn keep cutting your lawn regularly if you want to keep the grass as full as possible but raise the blades during any prolonged dry spell.
- Saving seed after flowers are pollinated they will set seed, and when they ripen you can then either directly sow (or scatter) straight away, or you could dry and then store them and sow as you wish next spring.
- Wildlife keep cleaning and topping up water containers for birds and hedgehogs who really need additional access to water when the weather is so warm and there hasn't been much rain. And if you can put food out too that would be great.

Shared Gardens – All 3 greenhouses now planted – the tomato house was first, second cucumbers, luffas, aubergines and cucamelons, and the last one (which was the potting greenhouse) planted with abutilon and more aubergines. With



the rain and then all the sunshine, everything came on leaps and bounds in July - incredible to see – the nictotiana, helichrysum, statice and sweet peas are romping away now, the courgette plants are huge and we're harvesting courgettes, both round and various straight ones, we've had our first few tomatoes and



yellow mangetout as well. The purple 'Sugar Magnolia' sugar snap pea flowers are absolutely beautiful, and the peas are now coming on nicely and filling out. Would you be interested getting involved in the Garden Share scheme across the parish? You can share your garden with others or have more space to grow vegetables, fruits and flowers! I'd love to hear from you if you are interested....



Parish History

Below is the second of seven articles originally published in the Link in 1976.

THOSE WERE THE DAYS... Farleigh Hungerford

So named by the Hungerford family whose descendants, in an almost unbroken line, owned the Castle and most of the land in Farleigh and Tellisford from 1370 until the turn of this century, i.e. more than 500 years. During one of the breaks in Hungerford succession, the Estate was bought by the Houltons of Trowbridge, who built themselves a "new Castle" in 1805 (now Ravenscroft School) and as the old one became an ancient monument, its preservation was put into the care of the now Department of the Environment in 1915, and as such it attracts thousands of tourists each year, from near and far.

In the early 1900's Farleigh was a favourite rendezvous for Bath society who

drove out in their two horse breaks to the popular Tea Gardens beside the stream, where there are now watercress beds. On their way along the lane below the castle, they would have passed the busy cloth factory in Mill Yard, which employed many women from Rode and Tellisford (I wonder how many of us today would cheerfully walk from Rode to Farleigh to work a hard 12-hour shift, then walk home again, six days a week and all for a few shillings payment?)

Eventually the Bishops moved from the lower Tea Gardens into the Hungerford Arms and built a terrace behind the pub to accommodate their previous tea-total clientele.

The final demise of the cloth factory more or less coincided with the steady increase of motorised patrons, so when the building was demolished the stone was used for the foundations of what is now the car park for the Hungerford Arms.



Parish History

The Parishes of Tellisford and Farleigh have been linked as long as any resident can remember, and during the last war when the Rev. Baker was the incumbent, living at Tellisford House, the Farleigh Rectory was requisitioned as living-quarters for the Army unit then based in Wingfield.

Luckily, the bomb which landed in the Rectory garden was successfully defused, but it was a major operation taking a week to complete – during which the pub and all nearby cottages were evacuated.

Incidentally, the author of "Rock of Ages" is believed to have lived at Farleigh Rectory, though the actual rock which inspired the hymn is thought to be near the entry to Wookey Hole.

Good support was given to any local events such as the Institute Garden Parties on the lawns at Farleigh House, and the Harvest Suppers held in the Chapel (next to what is now the Post Office), where residents still remember the vast pumpkins, fed on sugar-water, produced by the late Mr. Walter Broadway - the largest of which would not go through the door when the great night arrived!

This gentleman in his youth provided the village with a taxi service to Trowbridge by means of his one-horse wagonette, which carried up to seven passengers plus luggage each morning, either for shopping or to catch the 9 a.m. train for London - the prime purpose of the trip being to deliver his milk churns to that train, for which he received $4^1/2$ old pence per gallon.

When the Village School (opposite the Church and next to the then grocery shop) closed in 1933, some of the children went to Freshford but most followed their beloved Schoolmistress, Miss Barrow, to her new School at Laverton indeed so popular was she that when she died in 1964 at the age of 80, her many pupils and friends gave the cover which now graces the font in Farleigh Church to her memory.


Over a rain affected seven weeks Holly and the team took 47, 4–7-year-olds, through their first steps to becoming the cricketers of the future!





MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON MONDAY 12TH JULY 2021 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon - Chair (MS), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Elaine Butler (EB)

In attendance: Cllr B Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk, and 2 members of the public

1. Public Participation:

Concern was expressed over the junction of the High Street and Rode Hill with parked cars near the junction making it difficult to pull out into Rode Hill safely, (see minute 9a below).

A question was raised as to whether there had been any update on the planning application for Barbara's Field or the Inspector's Hearing on the Local Plan Part 2. It was reported that there had been no news from Mendip or the Inspector. Concern was raised that with agency staff being recruited to replace the Planning Officer vacancy this planning application might not get the careful consideration it required. Should the planning application be approved it would still have to go to the Planning Board, if rejected it would not. Cllr Lund agreed to ensure noise from existing businesses was considered by Mendip. It was noted that the Parish Council (PC) had employed a Traffic Consultant to send a holding letter while it gathered further information to submit following Somerset Highways not raising any concerns over traffic exiting from the Barbara's Field development, (see minute 9b below).

The state of The Bell was of concern, it was a listed building that was falling into disrepair.

The width of the pavement on Church Lane up from Nutts Lane was of concern as it was considered too narrow and this should be investigated further, although who was responsible for it was unknown.

2. Apologies for absence: Cllr Steve Eyles and Cllr L Oliver

3. Presentation on West Wiltshire Bypass: Residents from North Bradley presented an outline of the bypass they were promoting to link the A36 with the A350 to take traffic off the A361 around Rode, Southwick and North Bradley. Although most of the road would be in Wiltshire they were seeking support from neighbouring councils that would be affected by this new bypass. A number of questions were raised and they were reminded to consider the wider impact of this road and to address the possible increase in traffic just because it was a

better road. The PC, in principle, said it would support the scheme but would reserve its final judgement until the full plans come out, which it realised could be some time.

4. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 7th June were approved with the following amendment to the final sentence of 9d) which should have read: 'An offer of an email exchange with the Highways (Ben Sunderland) had been agreed by Cllr Oliver and it was agreed to accept this and include members of the PC and interested residents.'

5.Declarations of interest: None.

6. Report from District Councillor: Cllr Lund reported that there were new grants available from Mendip for a Community Fund and a Climate and Ecological Fund. Also there had been a large number of apologies from SWP about missed refuse collections but they were having trouble finding qualified drivers.

7. Actions from the previous meeting:

i) **Hoedown:** The village Hoedown carried out in June had been partly rained off, but strimming of grass at a number of road junctions had been carried out. The next Hoedown was on 25th July but currently there were only a few volunteers, notices would be posted soon. Matthew Lucas had been employed to strim back some undergrowth around the village and the PC agreed that his services could be used along with Clive Harrington's offer to do major clearance twice a year. The costs of these services were agreed provided these costs did not exceed £3,400 a year; as the Lengthsman was no longer employed. Any additional costs would require further approval.

It was agreed the Clerk approach Somerset to get someone out to check on who was responsible for gullies/pavements etc. on Marsh Road, an offer had been made but it had been delayed during lockdown.

The Chairman agreed to approach Cllr Oliver to find a contact to approach at Somerset for possible financial contribution as Rode was undertaking work previously done by SCC.

- ii) **Eagle Ground Maintenance:** The Clerk confirmed that the agreement was for them to only cut the grass down the Barrow Farm path. It was agreed that for the 2022 contract this would be taken off their contract.
- iii) **The Bell:** Contact had been attempted with the manager but no response received. It was agreed AP would check on the requirements, if any, for maintaining a listed building. Further pressure on the manager of The Bell would be considered.

- iv) **Jubilee Clock:** David Hornsey had made contact with Peter Watkinson to carry out repairs but these still had to be done. This would be followed up.
- v) **Trees:** The Clerk had contacted Andy Fussell regarding the trees along Clay Lane but had not had a reply. He agreed to chase this up, with possibly contacting Mendip enforcement. He still had to make contact regarding the tree on The Mead and AP agreed to chase up the report by the tree expert. A branch on the willow on Halfpenny Row had been cut down as it was in a dangerous condition.
- vi) **The Mill:** Tellisford PC had been in contact with the owner regarding furniture on the island and Mendip Enforcement Officer had been informed. The lighting appeared to comply with requirements.
- vii) **Riverwalk sign:** The new signs had been ordered and were to be delivered to Jim Ryan to install.
- viii) **Doctors Practice:** The Clerk had written to the Beckington Practice but had not had a reply. The PC had been approached by Mendip Health Connections asking what was in place in Rode but the Chair had asked her to come to present what she could offer to the PC; this offer would hopefully be taken up in the near future.
- **8.** Climate Emergency: JM reported no progress in forming the Working Party, however we may be setting the bar too high for people to come forward. PT had asked Cllr Lund to make a presentation, in August, to Rode village on Extinction Rebellion. This would hopefully generate interest in the options a Climate Emergency Working Party could get involved in within the village.

9. Highways:

- a) A meeting with Sara Davis had taken place on 21st June, with Cllr Oliver, MS, JM and EB. This had been a very productive meeting with the group walking the village. The following had been agreed:
 - i) positioning of 30mph speed limit signs and village gateway sign 50m before the Parkgate Lane junction on the A361
 - ii) 20mph speed restriction within the village to cover: High Street, Lower Street, Marsh Road, Church Lane, Clay Lane, Fairfield, Walnut Close and Nutts Lane. The meeting confirmed its support for this and the Chair would relay this to Sara Davis who would then approach the police for their support.
 - iii) Agreement for extra 30mph signs on Rode Hill, along with new post for SID. Additionally, double yellow lines on both Rode Hill and the High Street for 25 metres around their junction.
 - There should be a memorandum of understanding between Rode PC and SCC regarding the use of SID within the village, it was agreed to ask Sara Davis for a copy of this.

There was currently no agreement to extend the 20mph limit beyond the Crooked Lane junction on Straight Lane.

Thanks were expressed to Cllr Oliver for setting up this meeting.

- b) AP reported that new data had been collected at 5 periods for traffic along the A361 and entering and exiting the village on Church Lane. This showed far more traffic came into the village by this road than exited it. Increased traffic from the proposed Barbara's Field development would severely impact on access from the A361 into the village due to width of Church Lane. It was agreed the PC would review the proposed letter by the Traffic Consultant and if no objections were received this would be submitted to SCC and Mendip Planning.
- c) The Clerk had again emailed SCC regarding the adoption of The Sportsman, but had not had a response. It was agreed he would contact Cllr Oliver to see if she knew of a more senior person at SCC to contact on this issue.
- d) During the meeting with Sara Davis it had been noted that a sign on the fingerpost at Straight Lane/Parkgate Lane was broken. It was the responsibility of the PC to get this repaired if not SCC could remove the sign. It was agreed this should be repaired and it would be investigated further.

10. Planning matters

a. New applications:

2021/1212/VCR: Application to vary condition of planning permission 2018/2015/VCR to allow for variation of some elements of approved boundary materials – 3 Frome Road. No objections.

2021/1295/HSE: Erection of free-standing carport and formation of associated access – 41A Church Lane. No objections, leave to planning officer.

2021/1402/HSE: Installation of garage door to carport – 6 St Lawrence Lane. No objections, leave to planning officer.

b. Mendip decisions:

2021/1001/HSE: Erection of garden pod – 3 Stable Close. Approved with conditions.

- **11. Calm Engineering and drainage:** JM reported that there was an update by Calm Engineering in The Link, which said modelling of the drainage capacity was underway. There had also been a request from Calm for any further information on water flow/flooding in the village from residents.
- **12.** Church Farm access to village/footpaths and playing field: The path from the site to the playing field was still to be started although Autograph had said it would be complete by mid-July. It was agreed that if the path was

not completed within 10 days a letter (prepared by AP and EB) would be sent (by the Clerk) to Autograph and copied to Mendip.

A meeting of the Playing Field Committee was to be held on the following evening and the situation regarding the Declaration of Trust would be raised.

- **13. Parish Council website:** The village website (rodevillage.com) has been amended to include a Parish Council section and the Clerk was to be given a lesson later this week on how to update this section by George Berry.
- **14. Unitary Authority:** The Chair reported no decision had been made yet. The spreadsheet being prepared by Frome Council had still to be circulated.
- 15. Conservation Area/Neighbourhood Plan: To be progressed
- 16. Bus services: PT reported that Somerset had received a government grant to develop a bus improvement plan and had appointed consultants to do this. A meeting was due to be held tomorrow with 30 parishes from across Somerset attending and should anyone be interested they were encouraged to attend. A meeting with the Somerset consultants was to take place next week.

17. Financial matters:

- i) The current balance stood at around £50,000
- ii) The VAT reclaim (£2,141.63) from the HMRC had been received.
- iii) The following payments were agreed:


