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Follow the Star!

As we get to the end of this year and look back, we realise it has been quite a year in the parish, in the country and in the world!

In February, Russia invaded Ukraine and since then 80+ Ukrainians have joined our community - and how they have enriched our lives!

In June we had wonderful village celebrations for the Queens Platinum Jubilee, and then in September, just four months later, we mourned her loss - and we gained a new King.

In October we got our third Prime Minister and fourth Chancellor of the year.

So that's...one Russian invasion, two sovereign monarchs, three prime ministers, four chancellors and as I write this at the end of November, we are now travelling full speed towards Christmas... five flu-free turkeys?

I wonder what is on your Christmas wish-list? Integrity in public life and politics? An easing of the economic crisis? A faster response to the climate emergency? A better resourced NHS? We live in difficult times.

The first Christmas, in the year zero, was a dark time for Israel. Ordinary Jewish people had to work extra hard to pay the taxes demanded by the occupying Roman forces – you could say they had a cost-of-living crisis – the future looked bleak. Into this darkness a new light appeared in the sky.

Wise men - scientists, who lived in the east saw the star and searched their writings for an answer to this sign - they may have read the Jewish scriptures and found the verse in Micah 5:2 which talked about a new king – 'out of Bethlehem...will come a ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times.'

So, they followed the star to Jerusalem and asked King Herod '*Where is the one* who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him.'

The wise men from the east saw the sign in the sky and interpreted it as a sign of the times.

How do we interpret the signs of the times? Who do we listen to for guidance, for truth? I know I have a tendency to check my BCC News app several times during the day and then sometimes, just when I should be thinking of getting ready for bed, I find myself checking in just one more time. Do we listen non-stop to social media? Do we get overdosed on news and the opinions of politicians and influencers?

The Christmas message is that there is hope - in the cacophony of fake news and noise there is a message of truth that we can believe in - in the middle of the darkness and despair there is a light that we can follow.

As we travel through the Christmas story we see how all kinds of people - from the unmarried teenager to the humble carpenter, from the wild and woolly shepherds to the wise and wealthy scientists – how they listened to the angels, searched the scriptures, followed the star and found themselves in front of a baby.

In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.' John 1:4-5

I pray you enjoy this Christmas season, that you listen out for the good news of the angels, that you follow the sign of the star, and that you receive the gift of the baby who became man – Jesus Christ - God made flesh. I pray that you can begin 2023 with hope. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!

POTENTIAL HOUSING DEVELOPMENT IN RODE – LAND AT CHURCH LANE

In January 2021 an application was made to Mendip District Council (MDC) to build 49 houses on land abutting Clay Lane and Church Lane (known as "Barbara's Field"). The application was unanimously opposed by Rode Parish Council (RPC), and over 160 villagers wrote to MDC objecting to the development. There were no letters of support.

In August last year MDC, the local planning authority, turned down the application, citing several material reasons for refusal, which can be summarised as follows:

- The site is in open countryside, would result in an excessive quantum of development, and the harm caused by the development would demonstrably outweigh the benefits;
- The proposal would result in an unacceptable degree of visual encroachment into the countryside and harm the rural character of the site;
- Public benefits that would outweigh the harm to nearby listed buildings and the Rode Conservation Area have not been demonstrated.

Additional reasons for refusal related to the absence of an adequate surface water drainage strategy, and no legal mechanism to secure contributions to local services, etc.

Earlier this year the applicant decided to appeal that decision and has submitted a revised application. This is substantially the same as the original, albeit the proportion of affordable homes has been increased from 30% (15 houses) to 40% (20 houses). The applicant believes that the development has a number of merits (providing affordable and age-restricted homes; much of the existing Brown's Ground would be open to the public, offering health and wellbeing benefits for the community; enhancing biodiversity). They also believe that the benefits of the proposal would outweigh the impact on the landscape and nearby heritage assets.

The appeal process has now commenced, and the Planning Inspectorate is holding an Informal Hearing as part of this process. The Inspector will automatically receive all the documentation submitted in relation to the original application – so any letter you wrote last year, together with the Parish Council's submission, etc, etc, will be seen and read by the Inspector.

However, if you wish to make additional comments, or modify/withdraw any previous representation, you can do so online at <u>acp.planninginspectorate.gov.uk</u> You will need to log in (or register) on the site before you can add your comments, and enter the Case Number (which is **3292838)**. Alternatively, you can send your comments to: The Planning Inspectorate, Room 3D Eagle, Temple Quay House, 2 The Square, Bristol BS1 6PN quoting the appeal reference number **APP/Q3305/W/22/3292838**.

The deadline for submissions has been extended to 12th January 2023. All the documentation is now available on the MDC website - (go to the section "view and comment on planning applications" and search for application ref 2021/0071/OTS).

Any objection to (or support for) the application should ideally be based on issues of planning law. It is probable that the Inspector will also want to understand all the "on the ground" issues – be that traffic, visual intrusion, impact on rural character, or any other matter residents feel strongly about.

The Parish Council's original submission (accessible on the Mendip website using the same reference as above) lists out many such issues. The applicant's "Statement of Case" sets out alternative views and argues that the development should be allowed to go ahead.

Both Mendip District Council and Rode Parish Council remain opposed to the development and will argue strongly that the original decision to refuse the application was correct. In addition, both MDC and RPC are planning to attend the hearing, which is likely to take place in February.

PLAYING FIELD PAVILION IS SHUTTERED

Following a structural survey of the Playing Field Pavilion, the Playing Field Committee has been advised that the Pavilion is in such a perilous state that it should be closed to everyone.

An engineer is set to visit and review the situation. A report is expected in early Decembers advising on what repairs would be needed to allow the Pavilion to be opened again. It will advise on the nature of the work needed, an estimate of costs and will suggest a timeframe for the work.

In the meantime, the front area of the Pavilion, including the front porch and main reception area, will remain closed to everyone. The toilets along the side of the building are still acces rear of the Pavilion.

At the time of going to press the latest news was that Mendip are still in discussions with Montel (the contractor) around some last minute insurance/legal issues.



The programme will obviously slip, but it is still hoped to complete the work by the end of January.

"WHAT WOULD A WISE PERSON DO?"

Philosophy is my life guide. I have done quite a lot of studying recently looking at wisdom, reason, and the nature of justice. A good question to prompt ideas and action is, "What would a wise person do?'.



I have found this to be incredibly powerful. It does not imply that I am wise and know the answers, or even that my wisdom is another person's wisdom. But the very act of pausing to consider the question, in itself, is wise. Keeping this concept, front of mind in my personal life, when I am working or writing, and in my role as a Councillor, has given me clarity and helped me remove the emotional attachment that can often hinder progress and growth.

On to Council matters....

Top of the Somerset Council's to-do list at the moment is to focus on the less than 100 working days left before the County Council and the District Councils become the Unitary Authority of the New Somerset Council. It is an interesting time as there is still so much to do. The Local Community Networks (LCNs) are still taking shape. The public consultation and the pilot schemes are now being reviewed and we await the outcome – the size, population, roles, and responsibilities. I know there is concern about how they will function, if they will get funding and their organisational structure, but I also know that nothing will be 'set in stone'. There will be a chance to put a local stamp on any LCN initiative and make each network as relevant to the community as needed – no matter how large or small. I share so many of your concerns about these LCNs, but I believe this is also an exciting time for possibilities and opportunities that can come from creating something new. Let's optimistically wait and see.

The CEO of the Somerset Chamber of Commerce, Emma Rawlings, knows that the County Chamber has neglected our corner of the county for a while. She is looking for opportunities to connect the county supply chains and networks with more businesses here. Introducing Emma to local businesses, entrepreneurs and the self-employed has opened the conversation for many more connections.

The Frome Chamber of Commerce is 'rising from the ashes' of the pandemic too and has some brilliant events and plans for 2023. Please sign up to their newsletter on their website: fromechamber.com/

The Frome Town Council, too, has a wide range of connection opportunities, training, and support for businesses of all sizes. Sign up for their newsletter for continued engagement: frometowncouncil.gov.uk/your-business/

As the winter sets in, the Council has fully stocked the Salt Barns and has our 23 Somerset gritters on standby. They have already carried out a trial run across the county's network. The team is prepared to treat 900 miles of road. But this year a call is going out to farmers across Somerset to support the Council's winter services with snow ploughing duties should conditions become challenging. Farmers are paid for any of this work they undertake.. If you can help, please contact somerset.winter@milestoneinfra.co.uk. Last year Somerset's fleet of gritters went out on 59 occasions covering 45,000 miles to help prevent ice from forming.

As the festive lights bring some sparkle to the darkest of the winter months, I reflect on the journey I have been on this year. It has been challenging, painful, happy, and wonderful, all at the same time. I have loved, laughed, and learned. But most importantly I have got to meet so many in the Frome North area. I have shared the amazing things that are happening in our communities. And it has been an utter privilege to support your parish councils and represent you in the council chamber in Taunton.

May 2023 bring you as much 'gold, frankincense, and myrrh' along with the joy and wisdom that the magi can muster.

UKRAINIANS IN H.V. – FINAL UPDATE AND REFLECTION

Well, another month has passed and things are moving on for our Ukrainian visitors living in the Hardington Vale parish. The community group established back in the spring in order to facilitate the arrival of so many Ukrainians into people's houses and families in the local villages has run its course now.

So from the end of this year we will no longer be the point of call for organising and overseeing things in the way we have done up till now. It has been a fascinating, rewarding and at times challenging experience for all four of the committee members, and an experience which none of us will forget, nor want to. And it has produced a tremendous display of community togetherness in so many ways, reminding me somewhat of the feeling of community that was engendered during the pandemic.

Looking back - In the spring it seemed an almost insurmountable mountain of bureaucracy we had to overcome to get the first fleeing refugees into the community, and this caused quite a lot of moans and gripes at the time. But looking back at it all now, I have a certain sympathy for the authorities, being suddenly thrown into this totally unforeseen situation of dealing with thousands of new arrivals spread across the country. And for us, after the first few applications had been navigated, the system became easier to understand. We quickly developed our own approach, meaning for instance that a visa application for a new potential guest now took maybe 2 hours instead of the initial 15-16 hours.

That does seem so long ago now, though it is in reality just nine months. In the meantime, our guests all successfully arrived and settled in with their hosts in this initially strange unknown country where people speak a language only a few could cope with.

Since then, a few have returned to Ukraine, more and more have moved, or are in the process of moving, into their own accommodation in the locality. Many have managed to find employment in a variety of positions in the area. The children have on the whole settled into their new schools and have quickly learned to speak English in the way that children do and are quite comfortable with it now. In the meantime their parents and grandparents, with the aid of the intensive series of English classes that were established early on, have increased their language skills steadily, up to the point in most cases where they can carry on a conversation without the aid of Google Translate! Those who are still not very confident or arrived later in the process, continue to have lessons, twice a week in Frome and Norton St Philip.

My own Ukrainian guests here in Rode continue to enjoy and marvel at the welcome they receive everywhere in the community. For example they spent a lovely evening attending the Rode Roxy screening of Downton Abbey, a show they already knew back in Ukraine. They even collared themselves a raffle prize! It is a film that so many people in other countries regard as a view of how life in Britain really is. So they asked me afterwards, 'Where are all the aristocrats in Rode?' I'm not sure the film gave them a true picture of life in Britain these days!

Fundraising - Whilst we are not at present actively fundraising, we are continuing to receive donations to help those who will be moving into rental accommodation which will need to be furnished and equipped. One weekend in November, the Arts and Crafts exhibition took place in Norton St Philip. One of the exhibitors, Alan Carter decided to donate the proceeds of work sold to the local fund for Ukraine. He and we would like to extend heartfelt thanks to the great generosity of villagers who between them donated £655.

Also, with regard to employment, a small number of Ukrainians have been finding employment helping local villagers in their homes/gardens. They still have some availability, for more information please get in contact with Mary Morrison (07717 473884 or dmarymorrison@btinternet.com).

I should at this point give a warm thank you to the other three committee members, Andréa Dawson-Shepherd, Mary Morrison and Dave Walsh, for the immense amount of hard work they have all put in over the past nine months (not to mention their support given me at occasional times of high stress!). We will all certainly be continuing to help in the future, though more in the background now that local authorities have set up systems to help Ukrainians, employing a couple from their own community to manage and coordinate this.

In Conclusion - So, as the year draws to a close, we can look back on 2022 with a certain amount of satisfaction that we were able to achieve our initial goal of offering help to those who were thrown into sudden turmoil by Russia's invasion of their country in February. Most of the Ukrainians I speak to are desperate to return to their country, but that is not a possibility at the moment, and it is difficult to see when it might be. So for the time being they will make their lives here in the UK, and dream of one day being back in their homeland reunited with family and friends left behind there, and of helping to put the country back together again.

SOMERSET BUS PARTNERSHIP WELCOMES FLAT RATE FARE PROPOSALS

Somerset Bus Partnership welcomes the Government's plan to provide up to £60 million, to enable bus operators to cap single adult bus fares at £2. The £2 flat fare comes in from the beginning of January and will continue through to the end of to March 2023. Most bus operators are expected to adopt the scheme.



This means millions of people across England will save money, at a time when many households are suffering massive pressures from the rising cost of living. The move will help people travel for work, education, shopping and medical treatments and provide a much-needed saving in daily expenditure.

The current average single fare for a 3-mile journey is estimated at over £2.80, meaning that the new fare will save passengers almost 30% of the price every time they travel.

In addition, Somerset County Council currently plans to introduce a \pounds 1 single/ \pounds 2 return bus fare in Taunton, as part of its Bus Service Improvement Plan. Somerset Bus Partnership welcomes this initiative but emphasises the need to procure further funding to enable this flat rate fare to be extended across all of Somerset.

Somerset Bus Partnership Co-Chair, Peter Travis, said, "Bus usage declined in Somerset in the last decade, and even more so during to the pandemic. We need initiatives like these to restore and improve passenger levels. Encouraging people to choose buses over cars helps to reduce carbon emissions. It is estimated that the Government's £60 million will reduce car journeys by at least 2 million and cut pollution and congestion for all of us."

Somerset Bus Partnership will continue to work closely with Somerset County Council to encourage bus use and ensure implementation of the Bus Service Improvement Plan across the county.

BUS WALKS!

For the first time in many years Rode now has pretty decent bus services – in particular, the new D2 timetable offers hourly services to Bath and Frome for most of the day during the week, around a dozen services on a Saturday, and even a sprinkling of buses on a Sunday. Going towards Frome, these are supplemented with the Faresaver X34, meaning a total of nearly two dozen buses to Frome on a weekday!

This may, however, be only a temporary phenomenon, as without government support (which could be withdrawn at the end of March) many of these frequencies are at risk. Once again, it really is a case of "use it or lose it".

As we head up to Christmas there are countless opportunities to let the bus take the strain, save money, and enable everyone to enter fully into the Festive spirit! The Bath Christmas market runs until 11th December, Bath Rugby are at home on three dates in December, and there are countless other events in Bath and Frome, all easily accessible by bus - check out www.welcometobath.co.uk and www.discoverfrome.co.uk

And the bus is a great way to explore the beautiful countryside beyond Rode. We recently checked out two easy walks, using Midford as the start point. In each case, take the D2 towards Bath and alight at the Hope & Anchor pub....


Walk 1: Midford to Wellow, and on to Norton St Philip. The full walk is just over 5 miles and should take no more than a couple of hours. It also offers the opportunity for a pub stop at the halfway point in Wellow (the Fox & Badger, which sells Butcombe, plus decent guest ales, and has a great food menu).

You can probably do this walk without wellies or walking boots as it follows firstly National Cycle Path 24 almost all the way to Wellow, and then Norton Lane and Wellow Lane to Norton St Philip. There's a small stretch on the road into Wellow where you need to take care, but otherwise it's very easy. Once in Norton you can pick up the bus back to Rode – and if you have time, grab a drink in either The George or the Fleur de Lys...both very handily placed close to the bus stop! [NB: The first mile or so of the cycle path section from Midford is closed on some Saturdays in December and January, and is also out of bounds for dogs]

Walk 2: Midford to Bath. This takes in the Two Tunnels route – you can either do the whole route, which finishes in Twerton, or opt for a slightly shorter walk, leaving the route after the first tunnel and heading into the centre of Bath (from where you can catch a bus back to Rode). The latter option makes a walk

of approximately 4 miles and should easily be accomplished in around an hour and a half.

The start point again is the bus stop at the Hope & Anchor in Midford. Exit the pub car park at the back and you'll see the disused Midford platform on the old Somerset and Dorset Joint Railway (which featured in the classic 1950s film "The Titfield Thunderbolt"). The route follows the "Two Tunnels" path of the old railway line most of the way into Bath, and is initially part of National Cycle Route 24, before becoming route 244. The first mile or so takes you along a wide, leafy path, with views up to Midfield Castle on your left, and across towards Monkton Combe on your right. Soon you reach the viaduct at Tucking Mill, where there are numerous options to explore different routes (a gate on your right, just before crossing the viaduct, leads down to the reservoir, from which there are footpaths to Monkton Combe, Combe Down, and points further north and west).



Keeping on the Two Tunnels route you shortly reach Combe Down Tunnel - the first and longest of the tunnels. At 1,672 metres it is the longest traffic-free tunnel in Europe! It's reasonably well lit, but a torch can come in handy.

Once you're out of the tunnel you have a couple of options – keep on the Two Tunnels track to the end (in Twerton), or take a path on your right shortly after exiting Combe Down Tunnel, and make your way to Widcombe via Lyncombe Vale Road and Lyncombe Hill. There are several decent coffee shops and pubs in Widcombe and the area around the station – which make for great places to rest whilst waiting for the bus back to Rode (the Forum Coffee House is excellent and literally a minute's walk from the bus station. Both The Ring of Bells and The White Hart in Widcombe always seem friendly, and serve great food).

There are, of course, many variations to these routes. One such is to take a slight right turn shortly after starting Walk 2. Here you follow National Cycle Path 24 towards Monkton Combe, past the school playing fields, under the viaduct, and soon thereafter link up with the Kennet & Avon tow path (National Cycle Route 4). You can either turn right and head towards Bradford on Avon, or carry on towards Bath – eventually reaching the city at Sydney Gardens (and if you continue along the tow path you'll reach Widcombe, just behind the bus station).

PRACTICAL ADVICE

Pubs opening times: it's worth checking before setting out. For example, both the Fleur de Lys in Norton and the Fox & Badger in Wellow have restricted opening hours in the early part of the week.

Bus Times: Again, worth doing a little planning before setting out. But best of all, download the Firstbus app...you can then check both bus times and the real time location of the next bus by clicking on the "Plan" option at the foot of the home page...then go to the map and click on the bus stop you want to use. You will then get a list of the next buses and can also track where the bus is, as it approaches your stop. This can be very handy if you're waiting in the pub by the stop!

The holly and the ivy... so familiar, especially at Christmas time, that we rather take them for granted. In fact if we think about them at all, it's likely to be coupled with a grim determination to rip out the infuriating tendrils of ivy that



creep out from tiny hiding places, matched only by even greater efforts at prising it off our walls and fences. It's just everywhere, isn't it? And when it comes to the holly, well it's fine when it can be appreciated from a distance, although even then it can feel a bit overpowering and Gothic when it gets out of hand (which it does, frequently). How we curse the holly prickles as we work it into a Christmas wreath. So I'm guessing neither would probably rank in most people's top 5 favourite plants. Cue this little plea: can we give the holly and the ivy a little bit more appreciation beyond their moment of glory in the Christmas wreath?

Here's the science (sorry-not sorry): holly seeds require morphophysiological dormancy in order to germinate. Translation: the seed needs a period of chilling temperatures before it can germinate later in spring, generally it needs up to 3 years of this temperature pattern before germination can happen. And as we all know, each year the birds will probably have stripped the tree of its berries well before any strays might fall to the ground, so it's a minor miracle that any berries hang around long enough to germinate in 2-3 years' time. One of the best places to see them en masse is at Kew Gardens - there are more than 30 different species growing in the Holly Walk. Planted in 1874 it is one of Europe's most comprehensive holly collections. It's a (surprisingly) interesting exercise comparing different types of holly leaf and berry as you wander through the Walk and (in my humble opinion) it can hold its own against the more showy parts of Kew Gardens and its collections, although nothing beats diving into the Palm House on a cold winter's day. I urge you to visit. I love watching birds darting in and out of my holly tree – I'd not be without it in the winter months.

As for the maddening ivv...I've a terrific book called, you guessed it, "Ivies" by Jane Fearnley-Whittingstall. It is a real eve- opener in terms of the sheer variety /attractiveness of ivies, she easily makes the case for them deserving more respect/appreciation and to be used far more extensively in the garden than we generally think possible or desirable. So many tones of green/lime/yellow/white, they work brilliantly as ground cover, trailing from pots/planters, climbing up obelisks, disguising unsightly structures and generally look very chic in a Parisian courtyard garden kind of way - if used in sufficient quantities and the necessary bravado/commitment to that elegantly restrained look. But most of all, ivy provides a brilliant habitat for all kinds of wildlife and is a vital source of nectar for the pollinators, long into the dark, cold months of scarcity. So ivy is a hero plant after all. And then there's the wreathmaking, which neatly brings me full circle. Happy Christmas!

RODE & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

For our November meeting Nicholas Wray, the Curator at the University of Bristol Botanic Garden came to talk to us about the Landscape and Gardens of Sicily. He has visited Sicily many times and his interest started because he was keen to add some of the 3000 varieties of olive to the Botanic Garden's collection.



Olives originate from the Caucasus mountains along with vines and pomegranates but have been grown in Sicily by Arab and Greek invaders for centuries. As pomegranates ripen they split and turn inside out to make the seeds available for dispersal often by birds. Citrus medica or citron has been grown since 300BC and produces large thick-skinned fruits, the more usual citrus plants followed much later, both originate in India. Sicily is the largest island in the Mediterranean with a population of 11 million and grows half of Italy's winter salad in polytunnels, swapping to melons in the summer.

Nicholas recommended visiting in spring or autumn as summers are brutally hot. Much of the landscape is covered in 'macchia', thorny, bitter herbs and shrubs and succulents that can survive the hot temperatures and lack of water. Visiting the continuously active Mount Etna takes one through the various kinds of vegetation, fruit trees, deciduous trees, shrubs, grasses as one ascends to the ski pull used in winter when snow is common at the higher levels.

Zisa Castle in Palermo on the north coast, created by Arab labour for the Crusaders of the Middle Ages showed how they were able to use water to cool buildings and a modern garden has used a range of plants from around the world. Sugar cane was grown and was so valuable that Turkish pirates would raid the area to steal the crop and the locals fortified their houses to withstand the pirates.

The Botanic Garden was founded in 1779 and had connections with Kew from the earliest days. Seeds for new plants that would struggle in the English climate would be passed to Palermo to be grown on. The False Kapok with large, brilliantly coloured flowers came from South America and the Moreton Bay Fig from Australia.

Villa Malfitiano and its English style garden was built for the Whitaker family who had made a fortune importing Marsala to Britain from Sicily. Villa Borghese stood on the edge of a large freshwater lake, but the area was plagued with malaria which Mussolini promised he would cure. He drained the lake and malaria disappeared but so did the fish which had been the villagers' source of

food. After the war a garden was created on the lakebed to provide work for the local population by the English owners of the villa. Nicholas was thanked for giving us a vivid and informative evening which was thoroughly enjoyed.

Bristol Botanic Garden in Stoke Bishop is open on weekdays throughout the year.



If it's not suitable for further use it will be stripped and sold with proceeds fed back into the campaign. DonateIT have received over 2,500 devices since they started in 2021, diverting 5.5 tonnes of IT from ending up in landfill.

Every year that one laptop is kept working by extending its life saves 300kg of CO2e (embedded carbon).

The organizers will be running this event from 10am until 1pm on Saturday 3^{rd} December in the car park behind Frome Town Hall.



Please take a few moments to read the below alert: A resident received a call from someone who claimed to be a London police officer working in Paddington station (which closed some time ago). Fortunately, the resident became suspicious and hung up, but we want to remind you to be wary of callers who claim to be a police officer

working in a serious crime fraud unit in London or from another force. They claim that your bank account has been compromised or that the bank card has been cloned. The purpose of these calls is to get people's bank account details. The offenders may also say that they are investigating your bank and need help to test the cash for counterfeit money. Victims are asked to withdraw a considerable amount of cash which will then be collected by a courier for "testing".

These criminals can be very convincing and will sometimes pass your call to another "department" which is another fraudster. They may also ask you to contact 101 or 999 to confirm their identity. In this case the culprit doesn't hang up, so the line remains connected at their end, any other call you make is answered by them. If asked to do this, hang up and wait at least 5 minutes before making a call or use another phone i

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 15th NOVEMBER 2022 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM) and Cllr Andy Pickett (AP).

In attendance: Cllr Barbi Lund, Cllr Adam Boyden, Hugh Williams – Clerk and 7 parishioners.

<u>1. Public Participation</u>: The Remembrance Day service on Sunday had gone well with a good attendance by the various Scout groups, the Army and a bugler; it was suggested letters of thanks were sent to the army and the bugler. This was agreed. A question was raised as to whether next year the service should be held outside again and it was generally agreed it should be (weather permitting). The Parish Council (PC) thanked Howard Russell for organising the event.

Thanks were given for the PC in getting the hedge overhanging the pavement cut.

Concerns were raised over the appeal by the developers to reverse Mendip's decision to refuse planning application to build 49 dwellings on Barbara's Field. The PC was encouraged to continue to oppose the development and residents asked what they should do to oppose the housing. Question was asked how comments should be made.

Concern was expressed over bright street lighting on all night. (This was carried over to the December meeting due to lack of time).

<u>2. Apologies for absence</u>: Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)

3. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 4th October were approved.

4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Planning: It was agreed to take the planning appeal (Appeal reference: APP/Q3305/W/22/3292838 – Barbara's Field) item first as requested by the Parishioners. The Chair said that there was some surprise that the developers had not raised anything substantially new in their appeal apart for challenging Mendip over its decision. It was agreed JM would double check the appeal documents to confirm this. As all the current comments would be taken forward to the informal hearing there was no requirement for anyone to resend their comments and only if they had new points or information should they make comments to the Planning Inspectorate. There was some confusion on how any extra comments should be made. [Clerk's Note: Comments should be made acp.planninginspectorate.gov.uk through the website: and after registering/logging on put the number 32922838 in the 'Search' box and then

click on 'Make Representation' to get to the comment section. Or send comments in writing.]

Mendip was going to robustly defend it refusal and the PC would continue to reject the planning application as it reflects the views of Rode residents. It was agreed that JM, AP, PT and Cllr Lund would take part in a 'Teams/Zoom' call with Nikki White at Mendip next week to agree the best way forward for the PC on the appeal. It was noted that it was expected the hearing could take place in February 2023.

6. Report from District Councillor: Cllr Lund reported the judicial review of the housing development in Norton had been completed and the judgement was due before Christmas. Mendip was looking for tree wardens and if anyone was interested they should contact Mendip. Mendip had a Greenspace consultation ongoing which ended on 25th November, this had all the green spaces for each town and village shown but it appeared not to include the S106 land by the playing field. It was agreed the PC would review this and comment as necessary.

<u>7. Report from County Councillor:</u> Cllr Boyden reported that there had been 600 responses to the LCN survey but the consultation had not been conclusive with regard to the make-up of the individual LCNs. Further work on this would be done in January. Each LCN would be given a budget to help it operate but it was confirmed planning would not be transferred to the LCNs. There were moves to try and form purely rural LCNs, with the aim of having a rural 'view' which did not include Frome, it was agreed there were pros and cons to this.

Unfortunately, First Bus (including the D2) had not updated its website for the new bus timetables or put them up in bus stops, this should be resolved this week.

He said that he and Dawn Denton were still trying to meet with Sara Davis at Somerset to discuss road issues including the Bradford Road/Rode Hill crossroads.

There were a number of initiatives to help people with the cost-of-living crisis and energy costs. A new Scrutiny Committee for the Environment had been set up with a wide remit covering most climate and environmental matters.

8. Actions from previous meeting:

- i. **Trees: Merfield/The Mead:** Cllr Lund agreed to chase up Bo Walsh to see if the letter had been sent to the owners of Merfield.
- **ii. Books of condolence:** It was agreed to ask Frome Museum to store the two books condolence books.
- **iii. Slip road onto A36:** The videos had been sent to Cllr Denton who is to approach Sara Davis on the best way to proceed.
- **iv. Ultrafast broadband:** The base and box had been fitted by Gigaclear and the box has now been wired up. PT reported he had received an email which indicated that Voneus were still interested in bringing full fibre to

Rode and Tellisford and other small villages and this indicated Gigaclear might not proceed. This was noted and Gigaclear would be asked for an update. [Clerk's Note: I have had email which says Gigaclear will start with offering people the chance to order in January with a small number being connected each month – with a note this is subject to change!]

v. Grass cutting: It was agreed that the grass at the end of the High Street opposite the Memorial Hall should be included in the contracted grass cutting area. Thanks were given to John Griffiths for having cut it for many years.

9. Climate Change Group: JM reported that the Group had held a good meeting on 1st November, with concerns raised over buses in the villages and what could be done to help their use. The need for safe walking and cycling routes to help minimise car use were discussed. The Big Green Weekend was considered a success, in particular the visits to showcase good climate initiatives. The Group would look at holding a future weekend event with showcases and talks; also, occasional evening talks would be considered.

AP had spoken to the Flindalls and they had agreed the rewilding area should continue. Whether the area should be covered to kill the grass or the top removed prior to seed sowing in the Spring would be explored.

10. Highways: The drainage work had been delayed due to an aspect of the contract needing to be resolved. This had only come to light just prior to work starting. Hopefully this will be resolved in the near future.

11. Planning:

i) New applications:

2022/2164/HSE: Erection of rear conservatory – 15 Marsh Road. No objection.

ii. Mendip decisions:

2022/0932/VCR: Variation of conditions 9 (roads), 13 (land access), 17 (drainage), 20 (trees), 24 (noise), 25 (environmental management), 29 (land parking), 34 (refuse and recycling), 35 (ecology), 38 (land materials) and 49 (housing land sample panel) of permission 2011/3124 – Church Farm. Refused. It was reported Autograph would probably appeal this decision.

2022/1753/TCA: Fell magnolia tree – 31 Lower Street. Approved

2022/1877/**TCA:** Reduce apple tree by 2.5m and spread by 2m; reduce magnolia by 3m and spread by 1m – 17 High Street. Approved

ENF/2022/0168: Outbuilding in garden of 14 Nutts Lane. No enforcement action to be taken.

<u>iii. Other:</u>

Planning Forum: Each village had a page showing information on it under the Mendip Plan. It was noted that the information on Rode's buses was incorrect and the number of houses needed to be checked and the Chapel referenced. The Clerk agreed to comment.

12. Playing Field:

a) Constitution: The constitution had not been finalised. However, a legal bill had been sent to the PC which was far higher than expected. It covered some work which the Solicitor had carried out which was considered unnecessary. It was agreed AP would speak to Steve Eyles about the bill and look to reduce it and also split it with the playing field.

b) Pavilion: A surveyor had inspected the building and declared it unsafe. Therefore, it could no longer be used. Discussions were held over the possible future of all the halls in Rode and whether all could be combined, but this would be a long-term option. However, the main current concern is what could be done to get the pavilion open again and the Playing Field Committee would investigate options.

13. Church Farm: Information had been received regarding a blocked footpath from Church Farm and investigations revealed that the new path had also not been designated as a footpath. Footpath FR13/1 should also be rerouted as part of the S106 agreement and it was agreed Autograph Homes would be approached to get this done and the 'new' path designated.

14. SALC survey: The meeting had no comments to make on the Health and Wellbeing survey.

15. Buses: With many buses coming through the village it was reported that bus drivers were complaining that the extra 9 minutes it takes to go through Rode had not been added to the timetables so buses arrived late at each end of their journeys. There was concern that once the Government subsidy was withdrawn the D2 service would end. PT reported that Frome, Beckington, Rode, Norton St Philip and Hinton Charterhouse had set up a fighting fund to promote the D2 route. This group would try and get businesses and entertainment places to promote what can be done on the D2 route. He asked for Rode PC to help with this by giving some funding. The meeting unanimously agreed to donate £250 to the fighting fund.

16. Allotments: No update, awaiting for Allotment Chair to come back to MS. **17. Website:** JM had circulated an outline proposal for a new website for village, groups, parish council and businesses to the PC. It was agreed this should now be progressed with Zonkey to start work on developing a new website. This would help as the current one was experiencing problems with many virus software programmes warning that the site was unsafe and people should not go on it.

<u>18. Financial matters:</u>

i) Account update: The Clerk had circulated an update of the accounts to the beginning of November which currently indicated the Parish Council should break even or make a small profit this financial year.

ii) Precept: Discussion was held over the level for next year, the PC had to balance the cost-of-living crisis against inflation and the possible need to build

up a reserve for any major project. It was agreed to raise the Precept to £24,990 for 2023/24. **iii)** Payments: The following payments were agreed: Frome Printing (bus timetables) £160.00 **Eagle Grounds Maintenance** £777.40 Cross Keys Rode (Remembrance Day food) £100.00 Wreath (Remembrance Dav) £25.00 SALC (training) £50.00 Clerk Salary £224.58 HMRC PAYE £56.00 J McAuliffe (Big Green Weekend)* £240.00 *(£160 to be refunded to PC by Beckington and Norton St Philip)

19. Any other business: A request had been made to either find space on PC land for a bench or a bench on which a plaque could be placed in remembrance of Duncan McLennan the past chair of the Memorial Hall Committee. It was agreed that probably the best solution would be a new bench undercover outside the Memorial Hall as there was space there.

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
