Church Reflection & News REFLECTION

Stamina is a quality that is in short supply at the moment. There is something about January that, for many saps our energy. The continuing pandemic doesn't help either. This is frustrating because there is a lot to be done. It's a good time of year for sorting out. Turning out drawers, cupboards and sheds and maybe getting rid of stuff. All the issues in the world that we care about are still here. The climate crisis hasn't gone away and there is plenty to do, whether lobbying, or local initiatives or changing our lifestyles. Care of our land and soil is another big issue and connected. All this takes stamina.

One person who stands out at the moment is our Queen, Elizabeth the Second. She has kept going for seventy years and is still working at an age when most of us will have long since hung up our working boots. Some will say she lives a cossetted life of luxury. Well maybe, but when she took on the task at 25, which she was born to, and did not seek, she said her role was to serve the nation. I think that history shows that she has largely fulfilled that in spite of the lack of freedom given and restrictions she has had placed upon her. There is no doubt that her strong Christian faith has sustained her. So later in the year there will be a chance to celebrate her service and stamina on the occasion of her Platinum Jubilee.

I was shown the following prayer yesterday which sums up the wise use of stamina. It is by Steven Cherry from his little book "Barefoot Ways". It's an encouragement I think and can be used to pray with or as a stimulus for thought.

" God of endurance, I pray for stamina this day There is no task for me to rush at. There is nothing I can quickly achieve, nothing that can easily be ticked off my list. I must work slowly, patiently, methodically. I must work diligently, not succumbing to the temptation to digress: a temptation I expect to face three or four times an hour. Keep me focused, keep me patient, keep me committed. Help me to pace myself, taking breaks and remaining fresh. Help me to remember that what I do today may not be much; but that it might be crucial - when seen with the wisdom of retrospection. Give me even today a hint of my future hindsight. Let it shape my judgements, my diligence, my endurance. Let it give me stamina."




H.V. CHRISTMAS CHURCH SERVICES COLLECTIONS

Scouts The date was set before the arrival of Omicron, however, due to the latest COVID figures we felt it was the best option to postpone it for now.








GET YOUR DANCING SHOES ON!



- Sent from a random email address
- Spelling mistakes
- Poor grammar
- Obvious attempts to gain your personal details



Do please remain aware of these attempts and if in any doubt, stop and check.

AN ONLINE LIBRARY OF PAST RODE MAGAZINES?

What do you think? Would it be worth the effort and some expense?

Over many, years "Rode's History Man" Peter Harris did an amazing job of amassing a hard copy collection of Rode parish magazines going back many decades, they have recently been entrusted to another.

On occasion "The Link" raided Peter's archive and featured articles from way back in a current issue. Last year as Peter and I were organising just such content for the magazine when he told me he was passing on his archive and it got me thinking...

A mass of local history just sitting there, some of it in a very frail condition and only being seen and accessed on rare occasions. How sad. How to best protect and conserve it for the future and for it to be seen? In the last six months or so I have (casually - when not taken up with other things – including a fair bit of travel abroad to see family and meet several new grandchildren!) been investigating the possibility of setting up an online library of all these magazines - this huge record of, and insight into, our community over many decades. It would be a way to preserve them and also a way to make them easily available to all and utilise Peter's many years work collating and preserving them and a window into the the history of our community. It won't be a small task!!

Coincidentally one of our Rode Parish Councillors, Jim McAuliffe, approached me recently as he had been approached about digitising all the copies of The Link to keep as an archive following a Facebook post about copies of some old magazine copies being found (N.B. if you have copies of any old parish magazines please do get in touch). On recently receiving and reading Minutes of Rode Parish Council's last two monthly meetings I discovered that the idea was briefly discussed in the meetings. So, moving forward, your thoughts on the idea will be very welcome - and if anyone would be interested in helping with the work that will be required to organise such a library were it to go ahead please do get in touch – particularly if good at scanning documents!!

SOMERSET COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

•**Pay Boost for Somerset Carers:** SCC and the NHS have announced a £4.8m investment to increase pay and recognise the vital contribution of carers in Somerset. The Council are proposing a 9% uplift to domiciliary care providers who agree to pay all their staff a minimum of £10.50 per hour; a retention bonus of £250 for those who have been working in registered



care for the last 6 months; and a £250 payment for new starters in domiciliary care. Funding for these changes has been jointly agreed and funded by SCC and the NHS, as social care is crucial in supporting people leaving hospital and in the community. There are currently a number of vacant social care roles and to find out more visit www.proudtocaresomerset.org.uk/jobs

•Appeal for Return of Healthcare Equipment: Healthcare equipment is loaned on behalf of the NHS and social care teams when people leave hospital or after illness, to help them stay safe at home and retain their independence. However, the Covid-19 pandemic has increased demand for this equipment and created shortages in supply. The priority is to collect these items of equipment: Wheeled Walkers – Toilet Seat and Frame – Shower Stools – Perching Stools. To book a free collection so that equipment can be reused to help others call Millbrook Healthcare on 0333 003 2407.

•Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans: SCC has unveiled plans for major new safe cycling and walking routes in the county to help create greener, healthier and more active streets. The Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans (LCWIPs) for Yeovil and Taunton are the first to be published – they'll be followed by plans for Bridgwater and Frome and funding has been netted to draw up plans for three other towns. Having a plan in place is key to unlocking Government funding to build the infrastructure and enable people in Somerset to choose to walk or cycle to work, school, the shops or for other short trips for the benefit of people's health and the environment.

•**Reporting faults on the Highway:** Utilising a new upgraded online system with an improved interactive map, members of the public can report a highways problem 24/7. From potholes/blocked drains/broken manhole covers, to mud on the road/overgrown vegetation/damaged pavements or cycle paths/faulty traffic lights or missing markings – they can all be reported minutes from a smartphone, tablet or computer via www.somerset.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/report-a-problem-on-the-road/

•**Reaching Carbon Zero:** As part of Somerset County Council's commitment to decarbonise its buildings Yeovil Library has undergone a transformation to make the building greener and more energy efficient. The project has seen a new air source heat pump installed to heat the building in a more sustainable way, lamps changed to LEDs, new thermally efficient windows, improved ventilation with carbon dioxide monitors, and significant additional insulation. The

measures will save approximately 27 tonnes of carbon each year. The investment is part of a wider SCC scheme to decarbonise and make the Council's buildings more environmentally friendly and will cover 12 projects including Taunton Library, Frome Library, Glastonbury Hub, and County Hall. Early estimates indicate that the delivery of the various schemes could reduce SCC's carbon output by around 27% – around 400 tonnes of carbon p.a. All the remaining projects except County Hall are due to be complete by March 2022. •Somerset Coronavirus Support Helpline: A single phone number continues to be available for anyone in Somerset who needs Coronavirus-related support. 0300 790 6275, is open seven days a week from 8am to 6pm.

I showed different styles of decoration (the "Greek" or "Half" styles, both showing a lot of the base were popular and a half style wreath is what I chose to do on my front door). Nigel and Becky Clarke kindly provided tea, coffee, homemade cake and cheese scones for all attendees, which was so appreciated and delicious too. 

A very big thank you to all of those who kindly gave Christmas gifts to our staff – these are very much appreciated and encouraged the team as COVID reared its ugly head once again in the form of the Omicron variant.

Encouragingly, although I am seeing many positive test results and in all age groups, very few of our vaccinated patients are needing hospital admission and it is a huge relief to see almost all of our older patients surviving this illness now, which is a very different scenario from a year ago. A new year and a new garden writer for The Link! As announced in our last issue Julia has now stepped down from the role. But you will still be hearing from her in the magazine with details of her great "Rode Grows and Shares" events and as we look to growing the "Shared Gardens Scheme" across the parish - as you will discover on reading this issue.

Luckily I did not have to look far to find a replacement as the Laverton Newsletter has been including regular gardening pages for some time and I am pleased to announce that "Muddy Fingernails" is very happy for The Link to also include their gardening articles. This month's article follows:

FEBRUARY 2022 GARDENING NOTES

It's quite tough isn't it, this period immediately after the New Year? It's fascinating tracking the changes in the moon, observing the sudden arrival of thick fog which then rolls down across the fields in the morning. The birds are busy at the feeder, so it's fun to watch them too for a while. But I feel haunted by those wise words about the importance of the garden having good bones, or structure.

Boy does that advice come home to me on these dank and dreary winter days.

The question of structure always comes up when planning a garden: trees, hedges, walls - all those more permanent elements that eat into the budget but are so crucial.

So if you're thinking about making any changes in your garden, try to focus on what you'll be seeing out of the window on a winter's day, when the colour is all bleached out.

Consider the shapes of evergreen hedges; the tracery of the branches of deciduous hedges; the placing of trees that will catch the low sun rays and create moments of magic. And a beautiful stone wall with the bare stems of a climbing rose against it, or maybe a table or bench painted hot pink or warming orange may be all that's needed to lift the mood.

But if you're not in the market for big changes and don't have such a generous budget, there are still so many ways to get bursts of joy from the winter garden. I'd start with finding a spot right next to the back door/front door/path to the shed where you can plant a winter-flowering shrub which you see, but much more importantly, you smell each day. The fragrance of the shrubs is so exquisite and somehow unexpected, which adds to the pleasure they give.

If you're browsing along the garden centre aisles or the websites, look out for Daphne odora 'Aureomarginata' or Daphne bholua 'Jacqueline Posthill' - decide where you want to put it and once, planted, don't try to move it as it may sulk terminally. The other more recent variety which pumps out the scent almost all year round, with pretty little shell-pink flowers is Daphne x transitsantica 'Eternal Fragrance'.





I love Christmas Box - Sarcococca - and there are great mounds of it expertly clipped by the GP surgery in Beckington which I greatly admire. Sarcococca confusa can grow to 2m but can be kept in check (although why would you want to?) whereas Sarcococca hookeriana 'Winter Gem' comes from a smaller parent plant and is dainty and easy to place in a spot already crowded with plants. There's also S. Hookeriana var. digyna 'Purple Stem' for a bit of one upmanship.

Others in the running include Lonicera fragrantissima and Lonicera x purpusii 'Winter Beauty" - honestly I don't know the difference between them. I do know that I am maddened that the one I have inherited here is placed at the far end of the garden - precisely the least likely place I'll be found in January. Its scent is delicious. For the rest of the year it's a bit of a straggler, but I forgive this minor fault.





Also try Mahonia if you can put up with the spiny leaves and rather bare stems if left to grow too big.

And Chimonanthus praecox and all those lovely Viburnum minus or bodnantense - 'Dawn' and 'Charles Lamont' - which do that beautiful thing of flowering on bare stems - so very elegant. Bring the stems inside to bring their perfume to all comers of the house.

If all else fails, buy a tray of delft blue violas or pansies and bung them in any old pot by the front door. And wait for spring, which will be here sooner than you think...

SHARED GARDENS SCHEME

In November, in the garden I share with its owner (and for which I am so very grateful), I sowed some of the sweet pea seeds I saved from our flower patch. This is the first time I have done any autumn sowing and I am quite excited to be able to compare with spring sown plants. These earlier sown ones should be stronger plants and flower earlier, and therefore having both the autumn and spring sown plants should extend the picking season of one of my favourite flowers.

My husband Steve and I have been clearing last year's growth in our shared garden flower and veg beds, saving any additional seed, tidying the greenhouses and slowly preparing our growing patch ahead of this year's growing season.

We've been reviewing what we grew last year and thinking what we would like to grow more of, less of and anything new for the year ahead. We've bought some more seeds - I'm particularly excited about growing more squashes, a hot pink sweet pea called "Pandemonium" and seeds of "British Basil" which can be grown outside in the UK, and we also bought some additional dahlia tubers - I couldn't resist!

Do you have a patch of garden that you don't use any more or is too much work?

Would you be interested to share your garden?

I know of many in our community who would be thrilled to have the opportunity to have access to a shared garden as I and others are lucky enough to.

There are so many benefits in the scheme for both the garden share owners and the garden share users (as I know personally).



I would love to hear from you if you are interested in getting involved in the Garden Share scheme across the parish and to explain how it works (rest assured, it is nothing like a community garden).



FUSSELS - FROST FROM SUNRISE TO SUNSET



Recently, upon waking, we find we have been danced on by Jack Frost. His fingers on the inside of our windows and the shimmering early light falling on the rooftops and fields. Some crops, particularly, the rape is quite at home with a good hard frost, quietly sleeping until February.

We have also experienced stunning sun rises of late. The glint of the sun casting sparkle and shadow as it rises always make me feel excited. You can't beat a clear sky and the bite of early morning. Sometimes it hasn't thawed all day and then we are treated to another blast of colour as the sun sets. The birdsong is very moving at this time of year, still singing at the top of their voices, reminding us they are still out and about. But so much is missed by so many while plugged into their phones!



Fine Foods: Our Factory Shop was very busy right up until Christmas but recently, life has been on catch up here. No Farmer's Markets in January or events but lots of preparation as Spring approaches. The first Farmer's Market we will be attending is Axbridge on 4/2. The Frome Cheese & Grain Farmer's Market starts again on 11/2. Do support our Somerset Farmer's Markets, the traders will be delighted to see you and you will find a wide range of produce available. You can't get fresher!

Tours: We are looking forward to some Speaking Engagements and the commencement of our popular Tours. Do keep an eye out for our Blooming Tour dates, soon to be announced. Perhaps we will be offering a twist on our Tours. Watch this space!

Parish Farming

Farm: Andy and Shaun have been getting on top of the winter jobs. Angus has been out hedging and also ditching and last week was moving a fence. With the amount of rain we had over the late Autumn and early Winter it is important to ensure there is somewhere for water to run off without causing too much water pouring onto the lanes. This is also a time to check and repair all the farm kit, ready for the next season of work. These pieces of kit work hard and it is essential that they are all running well and in good order ready for the off.

Some crops have already been fertilised and in a short while they will start to come out of their winter sleep. Crop walking is still important, Shaun and Andy are always keeping a close eye. With over 800 acres to walk, it keeps them busy. As I write this, there is little rain forecast, which will mean that when February arrives, all crops will get a good kick start, without their 'roots' waterlogged!

The Rape seems to have done well, with little damage from the flea beetle so far, but (and it's a big BUT) we will not know for sure until it fully wakes up and restarts is growth cycle. The flea beetle also is dormant over winter but can be inside the plants, waiting for the off! Here's hoping that this year will bring us a much better yield. The Wheat and Barley are sitting well just now in their neat rows, but this will soon change as the ground starts to warm up and they start to get away. See if you can identify which is which as you walk around the lanes.




Spring is just around the corner and by the end of February we should notice the light stretching out a little bit more every day. Take care.

A HELPING HAND

Hi there! My name is Steve, I am the husband of Julia and we live in Rode (you may know Julia from her past Link articles, the Rode Grows and Shares events and her gardening work).

We have been living in Rode for just over three years now and really can't imagine being anywhere else now! Before we came to Rode I worked at Guy's Hospital in intensive care and also in the renal unit, after all that I wanted to try my hand at community nursing and so I started work as a district nurse in Bath.



Julia and I share a love of nature and we love to grow things together. We have a postage stamp sized garden at the back of our house on the High Street, and have been lucky to grow both vegetables, fruits and flowers in other people's gardens locally – in Rode and now in Woolverton. We have developed this shared growing space, which we call The Plot with additional raised beds and three greenhouses. We are very grateful to Val who owns the land on which we are growing.

We grow mostly for ourselves and Val, then our family and friends. We managed to grow and sell surplus vegetables, flowers and edible flowers last year. I planted root chicory as an experiment in the veg patch for the first time last year and have been making my own coffee substitute with it. It is quite a labour intensive process, but definitely worth the effort! I also make country wines and cider using locally sourced fruit. I have made small batches for our own consumption for the last few years but one day I hope to expand this and make it a sideline business. If there is anyone reading this who wants to plant an orchard please by all means get in touch!

A few months ago the time came for me to make some lifestyle changes; I have recently left the nursing profession and am starting out as a handyman, gardener and general oddjobber. In addition to providing the usual sort of handyman and gardening services, I am also available to help out with moving and handling work (if you've got an attic or garage to sort out for example) and I am also available to run errands.

CURRIED CAULIFLOWER AND CORIANDER SOUP IN 3 SIMPLE STEPS

Preparation time 20 minutes - Cooking time 30 minutes Ingredients:

1 tbsp. garlic oil 1 large onion chopped 2 (or more) fresh garlic cloves 1tblsp grated fresh ginger 1 red seeded chilli, chopped 2 tsp black mustard seeds 2 tsp garam masala 1 tsp ground turmeric 2 tsp ground cumin 2 tsp ground coriander 1.5kg cauliflower, trimmed and coarsely chopped 1.5L chicken or vegetable stock 250ml coconut cream 60ml plain voghurt 1 tbsp. coarsely chopped fresh coriander leaves



Method:

- 1. Heat oil in large saucepan; cook onion, garlic, ginger and chilli stirring until onion softens. Stir in seeds, garam masala and ground spices; cook, stirring until fragrant. Add cauliflower and stock; bring to boil. Simmer uncovered for 15 minutes until cauliflower is tender.
- 2. Blend or process the soup mixture.
- 3. Just before serving soup, stir in coconut cream, yoghurt and coriander leaves. Season to taste!

Cook's Note: Warming with many layers of flavour (for a thicker version of this delicious soup I sometimes also add at least 1 parsnip and 2 medium potatoes).

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE CHAPEL ON WEDNESDAY 7th DECEMBER 2021 AT 7.30 pm

CONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Andy Pickett (AP) – in the Chair, Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Steve Eyles (SE), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Elaine Butler (EB),

In attendance: Cllr Barbi Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk, and Ian Hasell (Chair of Norton St Philip PC)

1. Public Participation:

Ian Hasell reported on the recent public meeting held in Norton St Philip on the previous day (6th December). The purpose of the meeting had been to consider what action, if any, Norton St Philip Parish Council (NSP PC) might take in the event that Mendip District Council were to adopt the Local Plan Part 2 (LPP2) as modified following the LPP2 Inspector's report.

HE reported that the public meeting had supported NSP PC considering a legal challenge subject to Legal Counsel's opinion confirming that NSP PC had a viable case for any such challenge and the appropriate level of funding to support a Judicial Review being identified.

NSP PC was in discussion with Beckington PC as to whether they would consider supporting a legal challenge. The meeting discussed whether Rode PC might also provide support and it was agreed to put this issue on its January meeting agenda. The meeting requested that Ian Hasell to keep it informed and updated on this issue.

<u>2. Apologies for absence</u>: Cllr Mike Salmon and Cllr L Oliver. Caroline Murray (Calm Engineering) was also unable to make the meeting so her update would be held over to the January meeting.

3. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 10th November were approved.

4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Report from County Councillor: Cllr Oliver's report was noted, specifically that Covid rates remained high in the area and also that there was now a specific Somerset website on climate emergency, which could be of interest.

<u>6. Report form District Councillor:</u> Cllr Lund had nothing specific to report.

7. Actions from the previous meeting:

i) **Trees:** The Clerk informed the meeting that he had chased up the cutting of the dead trees along Clay Lane and these should be done soon.

He had sent a second email regarding the trees along The Mead to the owners of Merfield House attaching the tree report from John Osborne; also copied to County Roads. County Roads had forwarded the report to the County Arboriculturist for him to inspect the trees. It was agreed that Mendip should also be informed and that a further email sent enquiring whether insurance was in place on these trees should they come down.

A further concern had been expressed over a tree near the allotments on PC land, and it was noted that the Parish Council did not have a register of the trees it was responsible and SE agreed to contact Peter Harris to see if he knew of one. All PC trees should then be inspected by a tree surgeon and conditions noted.

- ii) **Fingerpost Straight Lane:** The Clerk reported that the fingerpost had been removed and that the new finger and repainting were in hand. The post should be returned within a couple of weeks.
- iii) Notice board by Memorial Hall: It was reported that the Memorial Hall might own the freestanding notice board but were reluctant to take ownership. It was agreed the Clerk should source and get a price for a new board and evaluate the state of the legs. This would be reviewed at the next meeting.
- iv) Clock above Cross Keys: A report from David Hornsey indicated that getting the striking mechanism working again would require access from the roof. This would require scaffolding and be expensive; however, the meeting agreed it should be repaired and further enquiries would be made.
- v) **Building in grounds of Coach House:** It appeared that although planning permission had been given this probably lapsed before construction began and its use and size might not accord with permissions given; Cllr Lund agreed to follow this up with Mendip Enforcement.
- vi) **Footpath from Church Farm estate:** The path from the estate to the playing field had now started. However, plans from Autograph indicated that only the path to the playing field was to be constructed and not the arm off it to Church Lane. AP and EB agreed to check emails they had on this and Autograph would be approached over the paths. Supply of the sleepers would be chased up and cut-through location checked.
- vii) **Voneus broadband:** The Voneus service of fibre broadband should be ready for service by June/July 2022. Rode was still a priority village but there was currently a shortage of engineers. BT could also be installing fibre in the village through a separate scheme.

8. Highways:

i) Speed Watch: The purchase of an extra SID for use in the village as a reminder to motorists was still planned. Fixing points had been agreed in the

past with a new one on Rode Hill to be installed. However, a new Memorandum of Understanding had to be completed and a meeting with the Speed Watch team should be arranged. AP and EB would arrange to get this Memorandum completed.

ii) The Sportsman: The drainage issues were being investigated by Somerset and Calm. An update was expected at the next meeting.

iii) A36 Slip road: Highways England had acknowledged the Clerk's email and it had been passed to the engineering division.

<u>9. Planning matters:</u>

i) <u>New applications:</u>

2021/2621/HSE: Erection of single storey ground floor extension with roof terrace – Monkley House, Monkley Lane. No objections.

2021/2641/TCA: Reduce birch by 2-3m finished height at 9m, reduce apple by 2m - 7 Langham Place. No objections.

2021/2297/FUL: Erection of four dwellings and creation of new access – The Bell Inn, 13 Frome Road. Discussions on this application raised concerns over the piecemeal development of the land around The Bell Inn and the fact that the Bell – a listed building – would not benefit from the development. There were concerns that other small development plans could be submitted all of which could avoid any S106 or other planning requirements (e.g. affordable homes) due to their size. Some other concerns had been raised over the access along Church Lane. The development was also outside the village boundary. It was agreed that the PC should reject the application and seek to find out the intentions of Wellington Pub Gorup who owned the whole site.

Rode Village Facebook would be updated to alert the village of this development.

ii) Mendip decisions:

2021/2329/TCA: Reduce by 1 to 1.5 all round two yew trees – Rode Chapel. Approved.

2021/2368/TCA: Reduce magnolia by 1m, reduce plum by 1.5m and reshape apple tree – 5 Lower Street. Approved.

iii) <u>**2020/1686/OTS appeal:**</u> No update available – still to be considered by Planning Inspectorate.

10. Playing field: The Memorandum of Understanding between the PC and the Playing Field revision was still to be progressed, SE was to speak to a solicitor.

<u>11. Conservation Area:</u> Deferred to the next meeting.

<u>12. Bus services:</u> PT reported that Somerset had put in a bid for £165 million to improve bus services across the whole county, however the Government had received from across the country bids well in excess of the funds available. The

Government response was now awaited. He added that some minor changes in local bus times were expected in January but no cuts to services. Bus use was running at only 70% of pre-Covid levels.

13. Financial matters:

i) It was agreed the PC would fund a gift voucher for E Talman who had played the trumpet at the Remembrance Day commemoration on the village green again this year. She had travelled down from London and thanks were expressed to her for doing so.

b) As this was his last meeting, thanks were given to Steve Eyles for his many years on the Parish Council, his calm and persuasive approach would be missed.



MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 11th JANUARY 2022 AT 7.30 pm

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM) **In attendance:** Cllr Barbi Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk, Caroline Murray (Calm Engineering) and 2 Parishioners

1. Public Participation:

A comment was made that Rode PC should support Norton St Philip in any challenge to the Mendip Local Plan Part 2.

The SID had been in place on Straight Lane near The Mead and it was questioned whether it was working correctly. It was thought it was and it was agreed the data from it would be asked for to be presented at the next meeting. The frequency of its calibration would also be checked. Again, a request was made for the 20mph limit to be extended to the far side of Crooked Lane.

Queries were raised over the path from Church Farm especially regarding its route through the woods and playing field. A question was raised as to who was to pay for the fencing and its cost. It was agreed this would be investigated.

A question was raised regarding the rubbish on the plot alongside the A361, this was ever increasing. It was pointed out this was on private land but Mendip were aware of it and the PC agreed to raise this again with Mendip to see if any action could be taken.

The Rode Cricket Club was probably starting again this year and therefore more frequent cutting of the playing field might be required during the playing season.

<u>2. Apologies for absence</u>: Cllr E Butler and Cllr L Oliver.

3. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 7th December were approved.

4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Drainage issues: Caroline Murray reported on the work that Calm Engineering had carried out last year. Currently a schedule of works had been put together and it was out for tender. It was expected that once a tender had been agreed the work, principally on Lower Street and some possibly outside the school, would start but this might not be before June. Some upstream work has already been done to help attenuate water run-off from fields and to reduce silt entering the drainage system. A letter to all residents is planned to update them on the work. The Chair expressed concerns over the hole in the Lower Street pavement and the problems it was causing asking if the work on it could be brought forward. This might be possible under 'emergency work' and Rode

PC agreed to highlight this, by email, to Caroline Murray who could then progress.

Concern was raised regarding the water run-off from Barbara's Field onto Clay Lane and whether this was impacting the adoption of The Sportsman by Somerset. It was agreed that a larger settlement pond at the end of the current ditch would help reduce silt entering the highway drainage system. Caroline Murray reported that a site meeting was planned to take place later this month on this issue and it was agreed AP would attend to represent Rode PC. (Further information on Calm's work can be found at: https://mendip-flood-riskmanagement-programme-

mendip.hub.arcgis.com/apps/c8022cbfc5304de78989370f03284d3a/explore) **6. Report from County Councillor:** In Cllr Oliver's report to Rode PC it was noted that there was a call for the return of health care equipment that had been loaned out. There was also a new direct way, either by phone or computer, to report any highway issues which could be used by all. (https://www.somerset.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/report-a-problem-on-

the-road/). However, concern was expressed that this might not result in any faster action.

7. Report from District Councillor: Cllr had nothing to report.

8. Mendip Local Plan Part 2: Cllr Lund reported that Mendip had approved the Plan at its December meeting. DLA Piper had then submitted a pre-action letter on behalf of Norton St Philip (NSP) stating that NSP would be considering a judicial review (JR). It had been hoped that Mendip might take the approach of not defending the JR but Mendip had replied to DLA Piper on 11th January stating it would defend the JR challenge. NSP PC was due to meet on 12th January to decide whether to proceed with the JR following further discussions with their solicitors. A question was raised whether District Councillors could pass a motion at a Full Council meeting requesting the Council reverse its position.

It was agreed that Rode PC could not make a decision until NSP PC had made its decision and the PC had seen all the relevant documents on the issue.

There was still uncertainty on whether Mendip had a 5-year housing supply and information on this would be circulated to the PC.

<u>9. Actions from previous meeting:</u>

i. Trees: It was agreed that the Clerk should investigate when the Somerset Arboriculturist was coming to inspect the trees along the side of The Mead bordering on Merfield.

It was agreed that a tree surgeon should check the state of all the trees on parish land and report on their condition.

- **ii.** Notic board: It was agreed the Clerk should order a new notice board to be installed outside the Memorial Hall by the bus stop.
- **iii. Clock:** The Clerk had obtained a quote to scaffold up to the roof to enable a roofer to inspect the roof and bell. It was agreed Grant Slade would be

approached regarding contacts for a roofer and scaffolder to quote for the job.

- iv. Footpath from Church Farm to Playing field: This had started and the spur to Church Lane was to be also done as part of the job. Work was due to restart next week. It was noted the sleepers had not been delivered although they had been promised.
- v. Link digitalisation: JM reported that Gill Leonard was investigating this through her contacts. He said a rough quote of £25/copy had been quoted to him. Further information was being sought.
- vi. Grit bin: The meeting agreed to purchase a grit bin (approx. £55) for the new development on Lower Street, and would look at sourcing salt/grit. AP agreed to liaise with the requester regarding where to locate the bin. Somerset would be contacted about the new bin and refilling it.

10. Highways:

i) Speed Indicator Devices: A meeting still had to be arranged to progress the completion of a new Memorandum with Somerset.

ii) Speed limits: Somerset had informed Rode PC that the new 20mph speed limit in the village would not be installed in this financial year (to end of March).

<u>11. Planning:</u>

i) New applications:

2021/2323/FUL: Change the use of building from offices to microbrewery – Barrow Farm. No objections.

2021/2867/TCA: Reduce height of plane, reduce lateral branches of yew, reduce height and lateral branches of maple, three cherries, hazel and two ash trees – Langham House, Rode Hill. No objections.

Licence application: Alcohol licence for Fussels Fine Foods – Church Farm. No objections.

ii. Mendip decisions:

2021/2412/TCA: Fell two willows and re-pollard third willow – 33 Lower Street. Approved.

2021/2494/TCA: Fell apple tree, crown lift beech, reduce height of beech hedge, reduce beech and crown lift alder – rear of 16 Lower Street. Approved.

iii. Other:

2020/1686/OTS: Appeal against Mendip's rejection of building 29 dwellings on site of Merfield/The Mead. A date for the Planning inspectorate to consider the appeal had been arranged but it was unknown what the date was.

12. Playing Field: The revision of the Declaration of Trust was in hand but would take a couple more months.

13. Buses: PT reported that although some cuts were planned in services at the end of January none of these should affect Rode. He said that buses were having a bad time due to Covid and the request to work from home. There was considerable concern over services from April onwards when Government

funding due to Covid ended. The Government nationwide increased bus funding had not been agreed and would probably not be in place until well after April.

14. Elections: It had been agreed that Councillor elections would take place in May and full information would be available in March. It was agreed that current Councillors would give brief information about themselves for inclusion in the April Link and on the village Facebook site.

15. Financial matters:

i) Grass cutting: It was agreed to continue with Eagle to cut the Parish grassed areas and the Playing Field. It was also agreed that a quote would be obtained for a 'floating eight extra cuts' of the Playing Field which could be called on as required during the summer.

ii) Donations: The PC agreed the level of its annual donations (see below) and agreed to review them again next year.

iii) Precept: It was agreed to increase the Precept for Rode for 2022/2023 to £20,000. This reflected a small increase as expenses this year had exceeded the annual Precept.

iv) Payments: The following payments were agreed:



Book Review

THE SALT PATH BY RAYNOR WINN

I came across this book whilst checking the Phone Box defibrillator - what a mess in there with wet, out of date 1985 manuals! Please only leave good reads, like this one - the cover caught my eye so I brought it home. Thank you to whoever left it for others to read. I've so enjoyed it and it's given me a chance to re-think what's important in life.



A couple decide to walk the Southwest Coastal Path starting at Minehead hoping to get to Lands End - although that is a very long way off. Some walkers tackle this path with a definite destination to reach each day but the journey of Ray and Moth is a very different one, they just walk as far as they feel able each day, not rushing and enjoying many things that will have been lost on others. They meet some characters along the way and are treated like tramps on a few occasions. But they were also shown kindness by some and I think that seems to have outweighed the disappointments and hurt they

received. Carrying all their own kit and camping when and where they could find a suitable spot, they had little money and experienced much.

Here is an extract: 'I walk in the garden on a starry night and see the Plough hanging over the mountains in the north. It was never over the mountains now. It stayed in the north but my perspective had changed; I'd lost my bearings. The country towered above me, a blank empty space containing nothing for us. Only one thing was real, more real to me now than the past that we'd lost or the future we didn't have: if I put one foot in front of another, the path would move me forward and a strip of dirt, often no more than a foot wide, had become home. It wasn't just the chill in the air, the lowering of the sun's horizon, the heaviness of the dew or the lack of urgency in the birds' calls, but something in me was I was no longer striving, fighting to change the changing season too. unchangeable, not clenching in anxiety at the life we'd been unable to hold on to, or angry at an authoritarian system too bureaucratic to see the truth. A new season had crept into me, a softer season of acceptance. Burnt in by the sun. driven in by the storms. I could feel the sky, the earth, the water and revel in being part of the elements without a chasm of pain opening at the thought of the loss of our place within it all. I was a part of the whole.'

This is an extraordinary journey by two brave human beings, beating all the odds and uncertainty of what the future held for them. I can't recommend this book enough, so well written with much emotion but also joy!


