REFLECTION

July is traditionally the month for schools to break up for their Summer Holidays and off we all head to exotic locations or at least to camp somewhere and find the beach....

But we are all still slightly holding our breath to see how things pan out and what we can and can't do come the end of the month.

Looking back, I wonder what the whole lock down experience has possibly taught us? For some I am sure it has been a very hard, dispiriting time. But for others I wonder if, like me, it has been an opportunity to recalibrate and actually count our blessings.

I have just been fortunate enough to have a week away and during the week I read a book called 'The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry. How to stay emotionally healthy and spiritually alive in the chaos of the modern world by John Mark Comer. You might think we have all achieved this during Lockdown, but this book seriously challenges the frantic pace that we still lead our lives, largely ruled by our mobile phones and all the wonderful time-saving devices that we have now become slaves to.

Comer suggests that we all have "hurry sickness" and he states that hurry is a 'form of violence to the soul'! One of the biggest areas in our lives that falls victim to hurry is our relationships. Hurry kills relationships. Love takes time; hurry doesn't have it. Hurry kills all that we hold dear; spirituality, health, marriage, family, thoughtful work, creativity, generosity...name your value. Hurry is a sociopathic predator loose in our society.

So what is the solution? Well, I would suggest that you buy the book and take it on holiday with you to read! But in the meantime, in a nutshell, it is quite simply to slow down and simplify our lives around what really matters. John Mark Comer recommends silence and solitude, Sabbath, simplicity and slowing. And reorganising life around these very simple goals:

- Slow down
- Breathe
- Come back to the moment.
- Receive the good as gift
- Accept the hard as a pathway to peace
- Abide

Jesus says 'come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest for your souls.' Matthew 11: v28 - 29

NEWS FROM SAFE PASSAGE UK, HV'S NATIONAL CHARITY

A year ago, Hardington Vale's Parochial Church Council (PCC) voted to support Safe Passage UK, a charity helping child refugees access legal routes to safety. In this magazine for August 2020, I outlined the charity's work, with a link to their website and video www.safepassafe.org.uk/how-we-work. Here is an update on Safe Passage UK's efforts through legal support, helping children in country, political advocacy, grassroots campaigning, and supporting children after their arrival.

Last year, Safe Passage UK launched a challenge of the Government's unlawful family reunion policy for child refugees from Europe. Due to Covid delays, it took months to confirm a date for a court hearing, but in early March 2021 they received confirmation that the hearing would be held on 25^{th-26th} May.

Also in March, Safe Passage UK wrote to the Home Secretary, asking her to offer child refugees quick and easy ways to reunite with family in the UK by making ambitious reforms to family reunification rules, and to establish a new scheme for relocating child refugees in Europe and offering them sanctuary in the UK, including those without family links here. The charity urged the Home Secretary to focus on delivering safe routes for all those who need them.

At the hearing in May, Safe Passage UK challenged the Home Office's policy for considering refugee family reunion cases from Europe. This route was closed to new applications in December 2020, but many children still had applications under consideration. Hundreds more had their applications rejected last year under this unfair policy. As a consequence, children who could have been safe with their families in the UK spent a freezing winter stranded in Europe during a global pandemic.

The day after the hearing ended, the charity emailed: "We spent the last two days presenting our case to the judge and listening to the Home Office present their own evidence. We won't know the final verdict for a while yet, but we feel sure we did the best we could to argue for the hundreds of children unjustly refused by the Home Office and we are cautiously confident in the strength of our case. Winning this case will offer hundreds of children another chance to reach their families in the UK."

So we await the outcome of the court hearing. Meanwhile this charity continues supporting children in country and after their arrival in UK and welcomes any help that we can give.

BIGGER AND BETTER

Earlier this month the Committee reached out to people in the village who had expressed an interest in helping deliver the community orchard/woodland and wildlife development of the playing field extension.

This gave a few people an idea of what we hope to achieve for Rode and to start the ball rolling on getting three small groups formed to head the development. Initially we're looking to form three teams of no more than four or five people to do the following:

- Firstly the design team. We have an initial, baseline design but it needs some development to make it something special for our community.
- Secondly the fund-raising team. We have two people interested but we'd really welcome some additional help getting our fund-raising plans off the ground. We've got a few ideas in addition to seeking National Lottery support but we're sure that there are people in the village who have the skills to help us.
- Third and finally the communications team. Just one person so far but again, we're sure that there are others in the village who have good communication skills. We need people to help us keep the community of Rode informed of progress, as well as providing communications support to the other two teams.

So ... you know what's coming ... any volunteers to join one of the project's three teams? If there are please get in touch. My details are below.

Rode in Bloom and Open Gardens – Sunday 8 August, 11am – 4pm.

Rode Grows and Shares, Rode and District Gardening Club and Rode Allotment Society have come together to organise a garden competition and open gardens across Rode, Woolverton and Tellisford. We want to showcase, encourage and recognise how important gardens are, in whatever form and size, and celebrate them and everyone involved in making and tending to them. In the parish, there is a huge passion for plants and gardens and it would be so good to share this passion and knowledge further.

On the day, there will be a manned hub on the Rode village green including a map of the gardens involved and a plant and gardenalia stall. The stall will be raising funds for the development of a community orchard and wildlife area on the section 106 land, overseen by the Rode Playing Field and Pavilion. Any donations for the stall would be very welcome.

The competition categories are: planter/ hanging basket, small garden, large garden, veg garden/ allotment, wildlife garden, and children's planter. The competition will be judged by Janet and Mark Berlin, who live in Wingfield and are passionate gardeners and experienced judges — including Bath in Bloom. JULY VILLAGE AGENT NEWS

As Village Agents, we enjoy being able to respond to people's situation quickly and efficiently – we pride ourselves on being problem solving solution finders!



This can be from a seemingly simple task of finding someone a gardener to help reclaim an unruly garden that was causing a mental and physical distress, to being able to provide someone escaping domestic abuse the basics they need to start up a new home and keep them safe. To do this we rely heavily on our Crisis Fund – an unrestricted pot of funds we manage that we can use to purchase things for people in need. People in crisis.

The Crisis Fund has proved to be an enormously valuable and valued extra "tool in the bag" for Village Agents to help people facing personal and family crises. We haven't ever actively fundraised for the Crisis Fund before, as the donations we had kept us ticking over, but our team has tripled in size in 3 years in response to unprecedented demand for our services, and as a result we are meeting more and more people in need.

The past year has been our most challenging yet, and this time of crisis and hardship for many in our communities the need is greater than ever, and we **desperately need donations** towards the fund which has been almost depleted.

So this month, it is a plea for the #LoveSomerset Crisis Fund. We are extremely grateful for the huge £1200 donation we have received from Whatley Hansons and this money will be ringfenced for communities in Whatley and the surrounding areas.

We help when others can't, won't, or don't. Some examples of what these grants have been used for recently are:

- To buy two mattress protectors for a carer who was supporting their loved one with night time incontinence.
- To support a family with funeral costs after their teenage son died.
- To buy children's clothes for a family who had recently lost Dad to cancer.

- To buy half a tank of oil for a lady with a chronic health condition who was struggling to heat her home.
- To buy a washing machine for a carer who is struggling to keep up with washing demands.
- To buy food and drink for a client who had been struggling to get shopping during the lockdown.

Other ways you could help towards the crisis fund are:

RODE HOEDOWN UPDATE

Hi Everyone. This update is always yesterday's news as the deadline date for The Link is before that month's Hoedown has happened, as the Hoedown is always on the last Sunday of the month, so writing this now in June for the July Link about the May Hoedown!!



Anyway, just to keep you in the loop how it's all going... Many thanks to all who volunteered on or towards the May Hoedown which you made a great success by doing much needed work in the village.

Visibility is hugely improved at the Junctions Bradford Road/Rode Hill and Crooked Lane/Straight Lane, which were cleared and strimmed. Such an important safety aspect for all!

The now beautifully sorted 'Book-Swap' Phone Box has made the Defibrillator a lot more accessible which is hugely important and potentially life-saving should it be needed. Let's please encourage all to keep it this way.

For this purpose, there is a note on page 14 from Kate and Richard with a few tips on Book-Swap Phone Box /Sharing with Defibrillator Etiquette!!

Weeding/sweeping on the roads and pavements, whilst very time consuming, is also very worthwhile with the results very visible throughout the village, and the un-weeded bits sticking out even more now!

Barrow Farm paths, from the Allotments down and then the first bit across to Rockabella, had the encroaching brambles, nettles and foliage snipped back, making walking there easier...

In the subsequent 3 weeks all had grown so much again that it was necessary to have another remedial cut back. It will soon get a good strim which should hold the offending brambles and nettles more effectively at bay for longer, and we are looking at it being strimmed more frequently.

And a lovely bit of strimming happened on Rode Hill, with the area around the bench all clear now.

The litter pickers managed to fill their bags decluttering our verges, hedgerows, ditches and lanes.

This is, always, much needed work if we are to stay on top of the increasing amount of through traffic drivers who prefer to chuck their rubbish out of the window rather than take it home with them.

A shout of thanks to Richard at DD Aggregates for giving us the very full dumpy bag collection of what came out of a further couple of the Marsh Road gullies, which is an amazingly huge amount!

And also a big thank you to Anne Edney's grandson who has done an amazing job of clearing gullies on Marsh Rode, which were solid like concrete so a massive job!

We were blessed again with a beautiful warm sunny Sunday and had a lovely gathering afterwards on the Green sharing the tasty refreshments provided by The Mill – thank you John!

Our next Hoedown is on Sunday July 25th @2pm (see page 46).

If you'd like to take part on the day please let either Mike or me know so we can ensure we cater for the numbers with refreshments.

And if you're working around your home area or chosen locations at random times, which we know quite a few of you are, that's great, thank you!

Rode - Project Newsletter

Following on from our successful CCTV survey work in March this year, the team have been busy conducting additional topographic survey work upstream of the village, (adjacent to the church, through Seymour Court Farm and up towards Rudge Lane). This has enabled us to capture both the enclosed system within the village and the open watercourse that feeds this system. This data will be used to replicate the whole drainage system within a computer generated model and to test the capacity of the system using simulated rainfall events.

We have been reviewing and discussing with landowners the opportunities in the open areas of the watercourse. These include slowing down the flow of water, storing water for longer and minimising the amount of sediment being carried downstream into the village drainage system.

All survey work was completed in early June, including a habitat survey of the ponds and watercourse upstream. We are now starting to build the computer model to enable us to test the capacity of the system and determine which opportunities are going to provide the most benefit to the village in the longer term.

To aid us with this part of the project, we are looking to gather photographic evidence of water levels within the system over a period of time. This helps us to identify what water levels coincide with what recorded rainfall events so that we can ensure that our model is calibrated to real events.

We are therefore asking residents to hunt out some photos from the last 10 to 20 years. We would ideally like these to show one of the following:

- The level of the water in the watercourse (at any time of the year)
- Road/ Land flooding, including an indication of the duration of this flooding (if known)

All photos should be dated with a location clearly indicated and these should be sent to calmengineering@outlook.com.

SOMERSET COUNTY COUNCILLOR UPDATE 20.06.21

Face-to face meetings to resume: From the 21st June the majority of SCC council meetings will require members of committees to attend in person so they can take part in voting. For the last 14 months all meetings have been held through MS Teams.



It's worked very well, and it enabled more councillors and members of the public to join the meetings, without the need to travel. It is a shame that the option for online meetings is not able to continue for those who would like to observe and participate in meetings but are not involved in a vote.

Highways: My councillor workload is predominantly linked to highways. I work very closely with all members of the various teams within the Highways department. I work on highways related matters every single day and includes all types of queries. Speeding is the number one issue that is raised. Speeding issues are actually a police matter. Many towns and villages have speed watch groups who work closely with the police. The work they do is invaluable in slowing down traffic and collecting data to share with the police. This data then helps in getting speed enforcement support from the police. Having undertaken speed watch sessions, it is quite often local people who are speeding. I would urge you all to stick to the speed limits at all times. The 20 mph limits that are beginning to be more prevalent are there for good reason and the police are undertaking enforcement in these areas. I have regular meetings with the SCC Traffic Engineer for the Mendip area. In the last 14 months these meetings have been done through MS teams. We spend hours going through issues raised across my County Division. These relate to requests from residents and or Parish Councils for such things as changes to speed limits, yellow lining to address numerous issues, refresh of existing road markings, new and replacement signage and parking issues to name a few areas. Another highways department deals with potholes, overgrown vegetation impacting the highway network, blocked road drains, queries on road works and much more.

Planning applications, particularly for multiple dwellings will result in Highways Development control being consulted as a statutory consultee. Planning is a District matter, but I make sure that the team are aware of any local concerns regarding Highways issues that are relevant to a particular planning application.

Public Rights of Way also falls under highways and this is another area where there is a lot of activity I am involved in and matters to resolve. Residents do contact the various departments direct. I can give you the email addresses if you need them. Other areas of work I am involved in include matters relating to education, passenger transport, social care, libraries and waste disposal.

The Frome North Division: My county division covers; Rudge, Berkley, Farleigh Hungerford, Hassage, NSP, Rode, Beckington, Tellisford, Lullington, Laverton, Part of Standerwick, Oldford and an area of Frome that includes Frome College and surrounding area, the hospital, showground, Stonebridge Drive and surrounding area.

One Somerset: The official government consultation is closed and the announcement on the future of local government in Somerset is expected from the Government in late June/ early July If you want to learn more about what will happen next or learn more about the consultative groups that are being set up to help shape the future of public services in Somerset. visit: www.onesomerset.org.uk/whats-next/

Extra investment into Public Health: Somerset County Council is allocating an additional £10m to embed public health across all areas of council services. The major investment will include £2m to support Somerset communities – helping address anxiety and those with mild mental health issues. £2m expanding Somerset's expert health protection programme including controlling outbreaks, managing testing, providing localised contact tracing, and supporting businesses and communities. Some funding will be invested in research and work to improve local understanding of Covid and the changing needs of the Somerset. A further £500,000 will be made available for town and parish councils to help them reconnect with their communities by safely reopening facilities like halls, rooms and other sites with good prevention control measures in place.

Summer activities for Years 11: Somerset students heading from Year 11 into Year 12 will have access to a wide range of free exciting educational opportunities this summer. There is a mixture of virtual and face-to-face events and activities to choose from taking place across the county including Kilver Court, Charterhouse, and other key venues across Somerset. These will include team-building exercises and physical activities such as climbing and low-ropes, as well as wellbeing and 'ready to study' sessions. Rights of Way: During the COVID-19 pandemic there has been a big rise in the number of people using the county's 9,000 public rights of way across the network which totals 3,843 miles (6,186 km). This has meant a huge upsurge in the number of reports being received; at times double that from previous years. Through the Rights of Way team and nearly 400 volunteers the network's 'easy to use' grading has risen to 85.7%, the highest since records began in 2003 when the percentage was just 39.2%. New School for Special Educational Needs and Disabilities: Construction has finished on Polden Bower School, a brand new £23m Somerset County Council-funded state-of-the-art school in Bridgwater which is clearly visible from the M5. The project is part of a wider SCC's programme to boost provision for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities (SEND) in the county and caters for 160 students aged 4-16 with complex needs. Primary aged children are due to start on site in June, with older children following in July so that they get the accustomed to their new environment before the start of the new school year in September 2021.

Winter Gritting Summary: In the 2020/21 winter season SCC's fleet of 23 gritters were needed on 66 occasions when freezing temperatures were forecast, treating around 900 miles of road each time to help prevent ice forming. This included additional gritting to ensure safe passage to vaccination and testing sites. The team covered 70,200 miles, a significant increase from previous years when they covered 44,000 miles in 2019/20 and 32,800 miles in 2018/19. The lowest road temperature was recorded at -6.1 degrees in the Mendip Hills on 10th February 2020.

Lateral Flow tests: Rapid lateral flow tests are available to everyone for free and the advice is that they should be carried out twice a week (every 3 to 4 days). It is estimated that 1 in 3 people have Covid-19 but do not have symptoms-rapid testing helps to identify those so they can self- isolate and 'stop the spread'. Find out how to get a lateral flow test: somerset.gov.uk/coronavirus/covid-19-lateral-flow-test/

Vaccination Programme: Somerset is performing very strongly in the vaccination rollout. The programme has been extended again with everyone over the age of 18 able to be vaccinated. There are now walk in sessions at the local vaccination centres. please keep your eyes on the local media sites for details. Tests for the over 18-year-olds can now be booked at the nearest centre at the moment is the Bath & West Showground. The test can be booked from the www.nhs.uk website. Over 25's without internet access can phone 119 to book an appointment.

In the last week 75291 people were tested in Somerset. Of those tests 117 were positive. Slightly up on the previous week. The latest data for Somerset as of 18th June shows the infection rate for Somerset is now 20.8/100,000. The figure for Mendip was 4.3 per 100,000 last week and the County figure was 10.1. This week the figures have increased for Mendip to 14.7/100,000. All Districts have infection rates between 10 and 30 per 100,000 but they numbers are rising.

BECKINGTON FAMILY PRACTICE

We would like to thank all of our patients for your patience and your expressions of support during the pandemic so far. Although it is not currently possible to directly book a face-to-face appointment with a GP, we have continued to provide face-to-face, telephone and online support and our nursing team have been working hard to provide essential care and investigations. We are also performing large numbers of blood tests on behalf of the local hospitals.

Thank you for being patient. We're very busy, with many people contacting the surgery for medical advice and treatment. We are doing all we can to answer your queries as quickly as we can – this may take longer than usual. Now that lockdown is lifting, our GP practices are experiencing very high numbers of patients trying to contact them. In response we have been providing almost 20% more consultations than two years ago but this is proving very challenging. Please be patient and understanding if it takes a while for us to answer the phone or for you to be seen for an appointment.

Don't forget your highly qualified, local community pharmacist can provide health advice and over the counter products or help with a wider range of minor illnesses and injuries like backache, bites, coughs and colds, sunburn, hay fever and diarrhoea. For urgent care, or after our GP surgery has closed, call or click NHS 111 to be directed to the local healthcare you need.

With new variants circulating, only half of the adult population fully vaccinated, some very vulnerable patients and with scientific advice to minimise numbers indoors (including waiting rooms) and limit face to face contact time we cannot safely return to 'service as normal' yet.

While face-to-face appointments continue to be offered to those based on clinical need, many issues can be resolved during a phone consultation without patients having to travel to a surgery.

The practice team will direct you to the most appropriate healthcare team for your needs. We can also conduct video consultations and receive images by text or email, if the GP requests this.

We are certainly not 'phone only', as some have feared, but we are likely to be 'phone first' for the time being.

RIVER WATER QUALITY UPDATE

With the advent of more summery weather the prospect of a dip in the River Frome can seem enticing.

We all know that Tellisford Weir is a very popular spot, and there are other better-known locations just a few miles down river (eg: Farleigh & District Swimming Club, and Warleigh Weir). Unfortunately the quality of the water in the River Frome is not great, and anyone going for a swim or even a paddle should be aware of the risks.

However, the good news is that various projects are underway to improve the water quality - not just for us humans, but for aquatic life, too.

As most villagers will know, Wessex Water is undertaking substantial improvements to the Water Recycling Centre at Langham Farm. An update from Wessex Water is set out below.

In addition, work is underway to investigate the potential to achieve bathing water standards at Warleigh Weir, and full details can be found on the Wessex Water website: wessexwater.co.uk/warleigh-weir. Incidentally, as part of that project, WW are monitoring the water quality at Tellisford on a weekly basis.

Update from Wessex Water

Work to upgrade Rode Water Recycling Centre (WRC) is progressing well and remains on track for completion by the end of this year. The site is being upgraded to fit new phosphorus removal and flow capacity Phosphates equipment. cause eutrophication (excessive plant growth) in watercourses and reduce oxygen upsetting the delicate balance of life and primarily affecting invertebrates and fish.



The improvements at Rode WRC will ensure continued compliance with Environment Agency standards for treated effluent discharge to the River Frome.

Parish Ecology

Langham Place and Rode Hill: <u>A</u>ll planned work will remain within Wessex Water's existing site boundaries, except for a new drinking water service which is required for operational safety at the WRC. This new service will be laid from the Bristol Water main on Rode Hill towards the WRC via Langham Place, with work scheduled for the first three weeks of September 2021.

Wessex Water has submitted a Somerset Council road closure application for Langham Place, beginning w/c 6 September for two weeks.

The work will affect the section of road between Rode Hill and the cattle grid adjacent to Langham House, with pedestrian access maintained. Bristol Water will be submitting a further highways notice for temporary traffic lights on Rode Hill for w/c 27 September, allowing them to make the final connection of the new service pipe.

Understanding our rivers: Wessex Water will have invested £57 million in new nutrient removal treatment in Somerset by 2024, and projects such as Rode WRC have been designed to ensure the company minimises its ecological impact and follows environmental requirements – both during and after the work.

Phosphates also come from agriculture and urban run-off, not just sewage treatment, so Wessex Water is spearheading collaboration with farmers and others who can affect water quality.

BART WaterBlitz: In addition to the projects above, Bristol Avon Rivers Trust (BART) continues its work to improve the quality of the Bristol Avon and its tributaries (including the Somerset Frome).

This month it is holding its annual Water Blitz, which is a Citizen Science project to help better understand the quality of water in our local rivers and streams. You may have spotted an article in the May edition of The Link on this subject-well, now it's happening!

Parish History


THOSE WERE THE DAYS... WOOLVERTON

Obviously the greatest change in Woolverton since the turn of the century is the vast increase in through traffic, but the village has always been an important crossroads and used to have two toll-houses, the second standing a short way along the road to Rode to match the one at Shawford which is still recognisable as such.

Some residents can remember the days when the Bristol/Salisbury Post Coaches changed horses at the Red Lion, and the remains of the stables still can be seen across the road - with the letterbox on one wall.

The row of cottages on the third of those corners, now sadly in various stages of dilapidation, were then tied cottages belonging to the three main farms in the village.

On the site where the council houses now stand, there was a huge sheep pound, to which sheep (and sometimes cattle) were brought from farms as far away as Devon and Cornwall and all over the West Country, to be collected ready for the famous Westbury Sheep Fair.



Parish History

Woolverton House has had a varied history; for many years it was the Rectory, and the older part of the house may be that referred to as follows in Arthur Mee's Record of Somerset:

"And to this small place there came sometime between Trafalgar and Waterloo a rector who was to stay for 62 years until he died at 92. He was rector of this and the neighbouring village of Rode, and he must often have used the ancient trackway from Woolverton to Rode, where there is still a narrow packhorse bridge with three old arches and massive cutwaters."

However, succeeding rectors moved to Rode, and for a short time the house was run as a guest house, re-named The Grange, until it became privately owned as now.

Also now a private house, just across the road, is what used to be the Schoolhouse, which had a resident school-teacher, and until quite recently still held the old school bell in its chimney.

Tragedy put Woolverton into the local headlines during the last War when in 1940, after an airborne dogfight, a Spitfire and a Heinkle 111 both crash-landed together into a field in the village.

Mr. Banks was one of the first on the scene and gave first aid until an ambulance arrived from the Army Medical Unit then based at Beckington.

The German pilot survived to become a prisoner-of-war, but sadly the R.A.F. pilot died: he was Flight Sergeant Holland Ripley and the memorial stone to his memory, 1aid by his family, is still to be seen in the field.

Many of you, who walk the footpaths and lanes will have seen that the Maize planted a few weeks ago, has germinated and is coming along nicely. Hopefully, this will continue. The recent rain will have given all our crops such a boost.



The Barley will be harvested about third week of July.

I love watching the Barley change colour as it ripens, the heads moving gently in the breeze.

Once the Barley is ready it will be non-stop on the Farm until at least the end of October.

The Rape has performed better this year. Drilling at the very beginning of August seemed to give it a good start.

Perhaps the Cabbage Stem Flea Beetle was not around much or even hungry at that time; who knows? We have planted 120 acres and Andy and Shaun are hopeful of at least getting a reasonable yield.

Jamie of Waggle & Hum has now collected his hives, the Bees having done their work across the crop. They really gorge themselves on the rape pollen, returning to the hives totally covered in it!

The Rape harvest will follow the Barley with the fields being prepared for the Rape to be drilled again in early August. Always a quick turnaround.

Our Wheat will be ready to harvest in August and we are hopeful it will yield well. More about that next issue.

As I write this, we have already seen the longest day and Midsummer's Day is fast approaching.

How can half a year pass so quickly?

Parish Gardening

GARDENING IN JULY

Spring has been challenging in many ways and the weather quite extreme from prolonged frosty nights in April slowing plants and their growth down by 2/3 weeks, to a mostly wet May, then to a mostly hot June, what will July and the summer bring? Hopefully, a good mix of warm weather with rain overnight, that would be ideal - well we can hope!



Watering – with the warmer temperatures likely, we will need to keep an eye on pots especially and avoid them drying out, but if we get a significant hot spell, we may need to water established flower beds too. It is better to water a good amount less often, than a small amount of water frequently – as this will encourage deep roots making the plant more resilient against dry conditions.

Weeding – try to keep annual and perennial weeds at bay as soon as you can to stop them from spreading onto your chosen plants. Perennial weeds like bindweed and ground elder are an ongoing problem, as they root from the smallest of white roots. But keeping on top of it, removing as much of the root as you can will help keep it in check.

Staking – plants will be likely be putting on growth rapidly now, and certain plants may need some help standing up. You can use individual canes and string/wire – either bamboo, hazel, or any other strong branches you can find, or you could buy wire plant supports. It is best to get these in place as soon as you can, as it is difficult to stake plants when they have a lot of growth, and it's hard to make the form look natural.

Hedge cutting – hedges will be growing well now and can be cut but do check for nesting birds as they can be active until August. If you want your hedge to flower and fruit, such as pyracantha, hawthorn, blackthorn, then avoid cutting until after you or the birds have harvested in autumn or later.

Lawn – keep cutting your lawn regularly if you want to keep the grass as full as possible - raise the blades if we get a prolonged dry spell. I've heard lots of you did the No Mow May, which is fantastic and such a great thing to do for wildlife and an opportunity to see wildflowers you may not have known were there.

Thinning fruit trees – 'June drop' is when trees will naturally shed fruits, but if you have a huge amount of immature fruits, you can then remove by hand any excess or damaged fruits from branches to concentrate the trees energy in a smaller number of fruits – i.e. apples, pears and plums, and to ease the pressure on the branches.

Parish History

Planting – if planting at this time of the year (spring and autumn are preferable for most plants) then best to do this on a mild day and ensuring you give plants a good soak to settle them in. And water during hot spells, until they develop a larger root system.

Sowing seed – throughout the summer you can keep sowing quick growing crops such as lettuce, rocket, radish and beetroot in between other plants to maximise growing space. Biennials such as sweet williams, honesty and wallflowers can be sown now and planted out in autumn for flowering next year. To extend your veg crops into winter and early spring, you can sow late summer/winter veg crops such as leeks, carrots, dwarf peas and sprouting broccoli.

Saving seed –if you don't deadhead flowers and they have been pollinated, then they will go to seed - which is the plants way to ensure survival. If you would like to collect seed for growing more plants, then choose a dry day and have a paper bag to store your seed – and make sure you label them, easy to forget what they are months later when you come to sow them. Don't collect seeds from hybrid plants as unfortunately they won't come back true to type and will revert to being one of the parent plants. Hybrid plants have been bred by specialists.

Cuttings – Now is a great time to take cuttings of plants you wish to have more of, either for yourself or to give away. Cuttings can be taken from a range of herbaceous plants, climbers and shrubs and at this time of the year are either softwood or semi ripe cuttings. Softwood cuttings are more tender shoots and semi ripe cuttings are more developed and have a woody base from which they'll root. There's lots of information online that you can read up on for the specifics.

Wildlife – keep feeders clean and topped up and access to water too for all your wildlife visitors. Our bird feeder continues to bring such pleasure, and it always amazes me how birds find it even in a teeny garden.

I hope that you also take time to relax and enjoy your hard work, listen to the birds and the bees and watch the butterflies.







MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON MONDAY 7TH JUNE 2021 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon - Chair (MS), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Elaine Butler (EB)

In attendance: Cllr B Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk, and 2 members of the public

1. Public Participation:

Concern was expressed over parking on Rode Hill near the junction with the High Street as this was causing problems when pulling out of the High Street especially at present with the tall grass partially obscuring the view. Putting double yellow lines on Rode Hill near the junction would alleviate the problem. There was some concern that the Highways report on traffic generated by the proposed development on Barbara's Field would not cause any traffic issues.

Putting tables on the island by The Mill pub was contrary to the S106 agreement which had allowed development of the patio area and this along with the use of lighting which was not low level should be pointed out to Tellisford Parish Council who were responsible for The Mill.

A request for the SID to be put in place on Straight Lane was made as this had already been agreed at a previous meeting.

- 2. Apologies for absence: Cllr Steve Eyles and Cllr L Oliver
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 4th May were approved. It was agreed the Clerk would issue an Action List to councillors along with the minutes.
- 4.Declarations of interest: None.
- **5. Report from County Councillor:** The Chair gave highlights of Cllr Oliver's report to the meeting; these were that the Covid rate in Somerset remained low with an R of 0.8 to 1.1. The vaccination rate in Somerset was one of the highest in the country. A decision the make-up of the Unitary Authority for Somerset should be made in July. It was noted that the voting across the county had been two thirds in favour of 2 Unitary Authorities (East and West), although only 25% had voted.
- <u>6. Report from District Councillor:</u> Cllr Lund reported that a number of key staff had or were about to leave Mendip District Council (MDC), these included the enforcement staff and the key Planning Officer (James O'Dell) but his line manager Simon Trafford would take over his duties while new full-time staff were sought. Currently agency staff were filling enforcement posts.

7. Actions from the previous meeting:

- i) **Hoedown:** The village Hoedown carried out on 30th May had again had a good turnout and a lot of weeds were cleared as well as tiding up the books in the village phone box. A report on the activities was going in The Link and on Facebook. The next Hoedown was planned for 27th June.
- Lengthsman: Ben Vowles had done a day's work in May clearing gullies on Marsh Road but had now handed in his notice.

 There was discussion over whether garden waste bins could be obtained from Mendip with agreement for their collection by SWP to help dispose of rubbish from the Hoedowns. The footpath on Church Lane was of concern and it was unclear whether Mendip were responsible for clearing it as to do it during a Hoedown was considered too big a job. Cllr Barbi Lund agreed to investigate this with MDC.
- iii) **The Bell:** Contact had been made with the manager but no progress made. It was thought the roof lead had been removed and currently no one was interested in taking it on. Further contact by EB would be tried.
- iv) **Jubilee Clock:** This had been inspected and it had been agreed that Peter Watkinson would carry out a full service (agreed at £185) and evaluate any further work that might be required. It was agreed the Clerk would check with David Hornsey when this work would be done.
- v) **Bus back better:** PT reported that he had had a number of meetings, with Frome Town Council, First Bus and was due to meet with Wells. It was possible that First Bus was going to increase the D2 service through Rode. Wiltshire were considering later running X34 buses and discussions would be held to see if this would extend to Frome. He added that the survey of Rode residents on buses should not be done yet but at a later date.
- vi) **Trees:** The trees along Clay Lane had been evaluated and the dead elms at the Eastern end were not dangerous, however those at the Western end should be felled by a tree surgeon as they were at risk of falling onto the Lane. A letter would be sent to Andy Fussell.
 - There was a leaning tree on The Mead which was of concern and it could fall onto the road and pavement. A letter should be written to David James and copied to the MDC Enforcement Department to ensure action was taken.
 - The tree by the allotments was not considered to be an issue.
- vii) **Brown's Ground:** A paper had been prepared outlining possible options for use of the land which could be used by the PC should the land be offered to the village.

- **Riverwalk sign:** The sign by Scutts Bridge had been vandalised and torn down. A replacement was required and it was agreed to get one and try to get a more robust option to avoid repeat damage.
- **8.** Climate Emergency: JM reported that he had only 3 (now 2) people interested in joining the Steering Group which was not sufficient for a meeting. He was proposing to leaflet the village and it was agreed that the leaflet calling for volunteers should include a few ideas of initiatives the Group could do. The PC agreed to fund leaflets up to £200.

9. Highways:

- a) A meeting with Sara Davis had been arranged for 21st June and along with Cllr Linda Oliver, MS, JM and EB would take part. The group would look at the proposed sighting of the 30mph speed signs and village gateways on the A361; possible 20mph restrictions on Marsh Road, High Street (including beyond Crooked Lane) and Church Lane; any signage on Lower Street; and roundels or repeater speed signs on Rode Hill. Also, the possibility of putting SID signs on brow of Rode Hill. The meeting agreed to push for the 20mph speed restriction on as large an area of the village as possible.
- b) Some pavement photographs had been taken, others were still to be done.
- c) The Clerk had emailed Somerset Development Engineering regarding the adoption of The Sportsman but had not received a response, he agreed to chase this up.
- d) The meeting agreed the Highways report on traffic from the proposed Barbara's Field development was of concern. Discussion was held over the best way to challenge this as the report had only concentrated on traffic turning left from the site onto the A361 and not seriously considered traffic going through the village or appreciated the narrowness of Church Lane in both directions. It was agreed that a draft response should be prepared based on data and then this be checked by a transport consultant (funding for this was agreed) prior to submission to Highways and Mendip. AP agreed to prepare the response. An offer of a Zoom call with the Highways (Ben Sunderland) had been agreed by Cllr Oliver and it was agreed to accept this and include members of the PC and interested residents.

10. Planning matters

a. New applications:

2021/1001/HSE: Erection of garden pod – 3 Stable Close. No objections, leave to planning officer.

2021/1212/VCR: Application to vary condition 1 (plans list) of planning permission 2018/2015/VCR to allow for material alterations of approved plans and alter some materials of approved boundary materials – 3 Frome Road. No objections, leave to planning officer.

b. Mendip decisions:

2021/0807/TCA: Works to trees in conservation area: 3 beech, 1 ash, 7 lime, 6 horse chestnut and 1 yew – Langham House. Approved.

2021/0858/FUL: Erection of detached dwelling including associated alterations to 9 The Mead and provision of 2 car parking spaces - 9 The Mead. Approved with conditions.

- **11. Calm Engineering and drainage:** JM reported that all the survey work had been completed and that modelling was being carried out. Discussions were to be held with landowners and the proposals should be published soon.
- 12. Church Farm access to village/footpaths and playing field: AP agreed to follow up the progress of the path from the site to the playing field. It was reported that the Playing Field Trustees were to meet tomorrow and were expected to approve the proposed plans for the S106 land. A new Declaration of Trust to include the S106 land would then be drawn up for agreement.
- **13. Parish Council website:** A virtual meeting had been held with George Berry but to date nothing had been done. This would be progressed.
- **14. Unitary Authority:** The Chair had attended a virtual meeting hosted by Frome Town Council with all the surrounding 10 parishes attending. This had been held to see if this group could be successfully formed to represent around 50,000 people which could be one of the 'devolved bodies' that had been proposed to be formed under either Unitary Authority for Somerset. A spreadsheet of issues was to be circulated and a further meeting held probably not until mid/late July.
- 15. Conservation Area/Neighbourhood Plan: Currently there were two Conservation Areas one covering the centre of Rode and the area along the A361 near The Bell. It was proposed that the whole village should be covered as a number of listed buildings fell outside the Conservation Areas and if the whole village was covered it would add strength to protection of the village against development. With future planning likely to split areas into: Growth, Regeneration and Protection it was important to get Rode into a Protection area. There was agreement this should be pursued with AP taking a lead and hopefully with help from Peter Harris and others. The Neighbourhood Plan would be a good starting point but it raised the concern that each year this became slightly less useful. A revision of it could be considered but any new Neighbourhood Plan would have to offer land for housing development and there was no enthusiasm for this. Cllr Lund warned that Norton's Neighbourhood Plan was still under legal challenge and it was 2 years since it had been finished but was still not in force. It was agreed further discussion would be held at the next PC meeting.

16. Financial matters:

- i) The meeting agreed to meet the shortfall (£215) for Life Education to bring its health and well-being programme to Rode School.
- ii) The Clerk had submitted the VAT reclaim to HMRC and awaited repayment.
- iii) The Certificate of Exemption for the AGAR had been submitted and the notice posted.

iv) The following payments were agreed:

17. Any other business:

- i) Doctors Surgery: It was very difficult to get a face-to-face appointment and even getting a telephone appointment was not easy. It was agreed a letter of concern should be sent to the Beckington practice as the situation had still not improved now most lockdown restrictions had been relaxed.
- **ii)** Village get together: AE asked the Parish Council if it could make a contribution to the village day to be held on the playing field on 30th August. This event was to bring the village together after Covid19. Marquees and bouncy castle and entertainers were being sought and there was a funding shortfall. The PC agreed to donate £500 towards this.
- **iii) Dog waste bin Rode Hill:** A request had been made to move this slightly down the hill as the smell was affecting residents. It was agreed this could be done and Grant Slade would relocate it.
