If you don't own a car – or you want to leave it at home and travel more sustainably, Think Travel can help you with your transport options. Whether it's getting to the doctors, shops, travelling to work, college, or school, or just into town to meet friends or family, the new travel planner shows you what's available. It covers public transport, community transport, the Slinky demand responsive transport service and car sharing.

To start your search, all you need to do is enter your journey start point and destination in the planner and Think Travel will find the available options for you. As well as information on train and bus services, there's also a dedicated car sharing notice board you can sign up to, where offers or requests for car sharing journeys can be posted. MENDIP DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Since the elections for Somerset Council in May several people have asked me whether I'm enjoying no longer being a Councillor – which led me to realise that the current arrangement is rather confusing.

So, for the sake of clarity: the four District Councils remain in place and sit alongside the new Somerset Council until 31 March 2023 and I remain ward councillor for Rode and Norton St Philip until that date. I continue to be the first port of call for planning applications, any issues relating to Somerset Waste Partnership and other general local issues.

While I was obviously disappointed that neither of the Green Party candidates were elected for Frome North I want to congratulate Adam Boyden and Dawn Denton for their electoral success, and I look forward to working with them over the next nine months. I am sure that both Adam and Dawn are fully aware of the enormity of the climate emergency and that it will inform their work over their period of office.

Many of you will have seen the recent articles, based on the research from the University of East Anglia, about the approximately 200,000 English properties at risk of being lost to sea level rise by the 2050s. North Somerset and Sedgemoor are two of the areas most at risk. The study comes after similar warnings from the head of the Environment Agency, Sir James Bevan, that many homes would be impossible or uneconomic to save, and whole communities would have to move inland, which he called "the hardest of all inconvenient truths".

I have to say I no longer know what to do with information like this. However, we have known and the government has known for many years that this scenario, amongst so many others, has been unfolding. In spite of this, the UK and many other governments seem distressingly reluctant to put in place the global action that is needed to enable us to escape the worst effects of the climate crisis.

One of my key learnings from my time as a district councillor is how constrained local authorities are by national policy and legislation. However, Green Party District Councillors will continue to do their utmost to ensure that Mendip fulfil as many of their environmental obligations as possible in the remaining time before the changeover to the unitary authority.

H.V. COMMUNITY GROUP FOR UKRAINIAN REFUGEES LATEST

So another month has passed since my last update with respect to the Ukrainian guests who have come to live in our community, having fled the devastation and destruction in their own land.



We now have a total of 60+ guests in the community. You may well have seen them around or spotted Ukrainian cars on the road with the UA international badge on the number plate.

We are awaiting another 20 or so to complete the full quota of guests that we can match to available hosts. So really the matching phase is now over and we move on to sorting out the needs of the new arrivals. Most of the early arrived guests are now well settled and enjoying the peace and tranquillity of our lovely Somerset villages.

There is without doubt still some anxiety under the surface, but on the whole they are much more relaxed now than when they first arrived, the children in particular. The schools have been tremendous in their help and support, and it is truly wonderful to see the Ukrainian kids playing (even cricket!) so easily with their new-found English friends.

Education:

The Community Group has been extremely busy since the last update, primarily focussed on setting up a series of English classes for the guests. This is to enable them to improve their command of the language so that they are in a position to look for work and thereby start the process of becoming independent. This has meant sourcing venues and resources to allow the teachers to work. We started classes at the end of May, just before the Jubilee weekend.

After some inevitable teething issues, we have now established a pattern of running classes 5 days a week, 3 days in Norton St Philip and the other 2 in Rode. This roughly reflects the distribution of students in the villages. In Rode we are using the Hall and the Chapel - we did initially use St Lawrence Church, but the students (and teachers) found getting across the A361 to the church quite terrifying, which is understandable! In Norton, we use the Church, the Palairet Hall, and the cricket pavilion. The system now seems to have bedded in and be working well.

We are very grateful to both Bath Academy and Somerset Council for their support in providing the teachers; and of course to the various venues for

allowing us to use their facilities to such an extent. And not to mention the various helpers from the community group who have taken on the task of ferrying the teachers to and from their classes. It looks as if the classes are to continue until the end of July or start of August, depending to a certain extent on the funding we can raise.

Donations:

We have over the past month intensified our efforts to raise money to pay for the classes we've been providing. We have been delighted by the GoFundMe donations received, which so far amount to nearly £5000. But more is always needed. This is a link to the page if you would like to donate:

I must at this point say a particular thank you to Rode Parish Council for their extremely generous donation of £1000, which will help tremendously. Also hugely generous is a donation of 50% of the profit from the Jubilee Fete in Norton St Philip; this was quite unsolicited, and so we really would like to thank Norton Preschool, Norton Cricket Club, and the organisers of the Fete for this gift, which will be put towards the education expenses. Additionally, local supermarkets have been approached for sponsorship, and one in particular is looking hopeful.

In addition to the financial donations we have received, we've also been inundated with offers of equipment, clothing and so on. That has been gratefully accepted and is now being stored in a NSP barn for the Ukrainians to visit as and when they wish, so they can select anything they need. There are all sorts of things there, from clothes to wellies to scooters to furniture: quite a collection. Anything unclaimed at the end of the hosting period will be donated to other charities supporting refugees from all over the world.

Employment:

I now have a fairly long list of job vacancies that our guests may soon start to explore. Our first arrivals have now been here an unbelievable two months.

The first month was taken up with form filling and jumping through the necessary bureaucratic hoops, sorting out the children's schooling getting settled into their new homes and so on, and then it became a matter of getting stuck into the language classes. So as of now that is their top priority, but as they grow in confidence with their English, hopefully applying for jobs will become more of a feature of their lives here.

There certainly seems to be no shortage of employment opportunities for the Ukrainians to explore when they feel able to do so, although these jobs may be more manual than they were doing back in Ukraine.

Ukrainian Evenings –A Date For Your Diary:

We are currently planning two Ukrainian fundraising evenings - the first in Rode on July 15 – see page 42 for more details (the second on July 16th in NSP).

The purpose is for locals to come along and celebrate our guests, their culture and their history, and allow us to find out more about our newly arrived visitors and their worlds.

Plans are at an early stage at the moment, but the evening will certainly include a Ukrainian meal cooked by the Ukrainians and one of the group telling us about Ukraine, from a Ukrainian perspective. The rest of the evening's program is yet to be decided, but I'll post information on Facebook and put posters around the villages as and when confirmed.

So come along and experience a little piece of Ukraine in Somerset - find out more about this country which, at the start of the year, very few of us would even have been able to point to on the map! All funds raised will be used to support the ongoing language classes.

RODE CLIMATE EMERGENCY GROUP – UPDATE

Our most recent meeting was a collaboration, with attendees from both Norton St Phillip and Beckington.

Whilst we will continue to have our own group, specifically focusing on Rode, we all agree that it makes sense to collaborate on climate emergency issues with our neighbouring villages.



We've been thinking hard about priorities for 2022, taking account of the responses to the survey earlier this year. So we've initially identified five key projects:

- "Green Open Doors": Just like an Open Gardens event but designed to showcase environmentally-friendly technologies and solutions. Currently this is tentatively planned for **Saturday 10th September** – more news soon!
- 2. Electric Vehicle Charging Points: A project to secure funding and deliver a number of public EV charging points in Rode.
- 3. Repair Café: collaborating with NSP and Beckington (NSP already have a Repair Café up and running the next one is at the Palairet Hall in NSP on **Saturday 9th July**.
- 4. Safe cycling/walking routes: Working with Beckington and NSP parish councils to develop safe cycling and walking routes to Frome and beyond.
- 5. "Pocket Parks": Investigating the potential to acquire small pockets of land (e.g.: corners of fields which may be difficult to farm) with a view to turning these into wild areas to enhance local bio-diversity.

To make a success of these projects we need your help! You can get involved as follows:

- Do you have (or know of) an environmentally-friendly project to show-case? (e.g.: Air/ground source heat pump; solar panels; wildlife-friendly garden, retrofit project, etc, etc).
- Do you own an electric vehicle and have insights/experience to contribute to the EV charging point project?
- Do you know of any small pockets of land which could be acquired by the community for re-wilding?
- Are you a keen cyclist/walker with a desire to see more safe cycling/walking routes in the area?
- Do you have any repair skills (or do you know of anyone who does), and are willing to help out for a few hours at one of the Repair Café events?



Parish Gardening

GARDEN NOTES BY MUDDY FINGERNAILS

Priorities for the ornamental gardener (I've totally missed the boat with courgettes this year, much to my annoyance):

• Dead head, dead head - roses and perennials, to promote further flushes of flowers.

• Prune out the flowering stems of shrubs like Philadelphus/mock orange which bloom early in the spring/summer- taking out these stems allows room for the new stems that will flower next year. Just make sure to take out the old stems down at the base.

• Dis-bud dahlias - take off those two side buds that generally appear either side of the main stem, so you get a bushier plant with more flowers later.





• Take cuttings of favourite plants. You've nothing to lose, so it doesn't matter if like me you find the results are sometimes a bit patchy...

Just remember the key advice to take the cutting material from side and non-flowering shoots or stems.

Make a clean cut through or just above a leaf bud at the base of the stem, remove the majority of the leaves on the stem to minimize transpiration.



Place the cutting in a pot with a mix of compost and sand, or maybe experiment with just vermiculite/perlite. As long as it allows good drainage to prevent the cutting stem from rotting away and at the same time ensures the cuttings have a moist environment (clear plastic bag over the whole pot).

This is seriously one of the most satisfying gardening jobs.

The thrill of seeing a cutting "taking" is not to be underestimated!

FUSSELS - MIDSUMMER, SWALLOWS AND HARVEST

I can't believe it is already time to pen July's blog!

We've enjoyed some lovely long, warm summer days during June and not much rain. The rain that did fall was refreshing for our gardens as well as our crops. We have also seen rainbows, hail, thunder, heavy (stair rod) rain, dark skies and stunning sunsets; sometimes all in one day! The hooligan crows are still causing havoc and have enjoyed pulling up our maize! They work in gangs along a row!

Fine Foods: 18 June was Bridport Food Festival which is a lovely Festival. I usually cover this one but I have recently been moved into the Weighbridge Office on the Farm. You won't now find me covering markets or any events now or in the shop but one of the others will help you.

Harvest Tours: Keep an eye out - new Evening Tour dates, starting at 6.30pm.

Farm: Shaun's still busy. He's managed some early baling of hay but loads more to do! The Maize continues to look good; it's growing apace now. The Rape is doing well, turning now from green to brown with nice plump pods and very thick and entwined. The mixture of rain and sunshine has been perfect. Now we wait for it to finish ripening. Still looking good to harvest late July. Our Barley looks fantastic with hopefully a good yield. Harvest will be mid-July before the Rape, as Rape often follows Barley in our rotation. It has changed colour in the last 10 days and is on the way to being fully ripe. Our Wheat is growing taller everyday but it will still need to be watered, so some occasional rain would be good. Shame it can't be ordered!!. The Field Beans flowers



have gone over and the bean pods will begin to form. But first, haymaking towards the end of June. My favourite time of year. The hay is cut, turned 2 or 3 times, 'rowed up' and baled. We need about 7 days at 21 degrees! Currently tricky to predict when to go when there is the risk of showers towards the end of this week! All down to experience and weather watching. It's looking like haymaking will run into Harvest again this year. You just never know! Take care.

Untold Tales

Continuing Anthony Battersby's occasional articles about his over 30 years working on the operational development of child immunisation programmes in remote and difficult parts of the world...

CROSS BORDER: TRANSNISTRIA (PRIDNESTROVIAN MOLDAVIAN REPUBLIC)

Moldova is a small country squeezed between Romania and Ukraine, originally known as Bessarabia (see footnote). It is one of those parts of the world where borders have endlessly changed as more powerful neighbours waxed and waned. In the last hundred years it has been part of Austro-Hungarian the Empire, Romania, and USSR.

I was asked to go there following a polio outbreak. Like so many of the constituent parts of the USSR it became a battle ground when the Soviet Union collapsed. Those living on the eastern side of the Dniester River are predominately of Russian or Ukrainian origin, those on the west are Moldavian and Romanian.



By the time I arrived the fighting had died down and the land east of the Dniester River had broken away calling itself officially the Pridnestrovian Moldavian Republic, but more commonly Transnistria.

The polio outbreak had been in a town called Slobodzia in the south and the authorities in Chisinau, the capital of Moldova, wanted me to investigate the vaccine storage facilities in Transnistria, which they considered to be an integral part of Moldova.

Politics at the time, 1993, were extremely fluid, Moldova itself had only come into existence as an independent country three years earlier.

I travelled with the head of the Moldovan Epidemiological Department and my interpreter Elena.

Untold Tales

We crossed the Dniester River at Bendery where the heaviest fighting had recently taken place and duly arrived at the self-styled Ministry of Health in Tiraspol, in reality the Regional Sanitary and Epidemiological Station (RSES). We were received by the "Minister of Health", otherwise known as the Head of the RSES.

My first inkling that something odd was going on was when my interpreter said to me "Why are you translating to that man?"

I realised my interpreter was translating everything that was being said and that there was a problem. There then ensued the most extraordinary conversation.

The "Minister of Health" turned to my colleague and asked, "Who are you?" he replied "Vasiley you know perfectly well who I am we were at medical school together in Chisenau." "Ah, so you have come from Moldova, where is your visa?"

We had no visa, as far as my colleague was concerned we were in Moldova. "In that case I must ask you to leave The Pridnestrovian Moldavian Republic at once you may not carry out any investigation without a visa."

We left the minister's office, all the public health officers who were with us were acutely embarrassed and said, "At once means after lunch." We then had a delightful lunch and discussed the polio outbreak.

On leaving I was presented with a set of Transnistrian currency notes. These were Russian rubles with a Transnistrian postage stamp stuck on them to denote their value.

This is the only time I have been formally told to leave a country.

The polio outbreak was one of the last to occur in Europe and worldwide polio has still not been eradicated

Footnote: Ever since the days of the USSR Russia has had troops in Transnistria, originally called the 14th Army it numbered 15,000 soldiers. Russia subsequently reduced this to 1,500 and renamed Operational Group of Russian Forces in Moldova. Its primary duty is to guard 22,000 tons of military ordnance located in Transnistria. This tiny sliver of land may yet again become a battlefield should Russia decide to mobilize these troops, or Ukraine tries to take the ordnance.

MINUTES OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD IN RODE CHAPEL, HIGH STREET ON MONDAY 9TH MAY 2022 AT 7.30 PM

Present: 7 Parish Councillors, Clerk and 1 Parishioner.

1. Election of Chairman for 2022/23

Mike Salmon was elected unopposed as Chairman for the year.

2. Election of Vice Chairman for 2022/23

Andy Pickett was elected unopposed as Vice Chairman for the year.

3. Review of Code of Conduct

A new Code of Conduct had been prepared by the Somerset Association of Local Councils (SALC) and this had been circulated to Councillors. There were no objections to the new Code and it was agreed the Clerk would tidy this up and it would be re-circulated with the aim of adopting it as the Rode Parish Council Code of Conduct at the June meeting of the Council.

4. Minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting

The minutes were approved.

5. County Councillor's Report

The position of County Councillor had ceased following the elections held on 5th May. This post is now replaced by two Councillors who will represent the new area of Frome North into which Rode falls; these will be part of the new Unitary Authority for Somerset (to be known as Somerset Council). No report given.

6. District Councillor's Report

A report for the last year was submitted (attached as Appendix 1). The position of District Councillor for Mendip remains until the end of March 2023 after which the two Councillors for Frome North will take over responsibility for the area.

7. Memorial Hall Report

The Memorial Hall was still free to local organisations and would remain so until the end of 2022 to help these organisations. No AGM had yet been held this year.

Questions were raised as to whether there was a declaration of trust between the Parish Council (PC) and the Memorial Hall and whether

there should be PC representation on the Memorial Hall Committee. This would be investigated.

8. Playing Field Report

Not available at meeting but supplied after - see Appendix 3

9. Chairman's Report

The Chairman said that he had hoped this would be a quieter year but with planning proposals and appeals, road accidents and speed limits, village Hoedowns, buses, S106 and Church Farm and numerous issues it had yet again been a busy year for the PC. He thanked the other members of the PC for all the work they had done during the year. (Report attached as Appendix 2). The Councillors thanked Mike for his work over the last year.

10. Financial Statement

The Clerk reported that the Parish Council had spent around £8,500 more than it had received this year but this was mainly made up by a donation of £5,000 toward the Jubilee Celebrations to be held in June this year and £3,000 to have the streets professionally swept (this being donated to the Playing Field and Scouts). Otherwise, expenditure closely matched income with the largest expenditures being on grass cutting, costs associated with Merfield planning appeal and clerk's salary. Reserves still remained healthy (see Appendix 4).

The PC outgoings had exceeded £25,000 this year and therefore the annual return (AGAR) would require an external audit.

It was agreed that the Clerk would prepare a budget for 2022/23.

11. Parish Discussion Forum

Thanks were given to the PC for their success in fighting the appeal to build on Merfield land adjacent to The Mead. Thanks, were also given to Cllr Lund and all those who wrote to support the rejection of building on this land.

A request was made to try and get the 20mph speed limit extended up Straight Lane to the far side of Crooked Lane and, if not, could Somerset put in writing why this was not possible.

The Parish Council was encouraged to continue to fight the planning application to build on Barbara's Field. The PC would need to find out what it could do to fight the appeal to build there as the appeal process was not fully understood.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 14th June 2022 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Ann Edney (AE) and Cllr Pat Restorick (PR)

In attendance: Cllr Barbi Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk and 2 parishioners.

1. Public Participation: Concerns were expressed over the state of the path from the Church Farm development to the village playing field. It was apparent that there was a specification (under the S106) for the path within the development; however, as soon as this became a 'rural path' there was no written specification and a poor quality path now was in place. Concern was also expressed that the path over the bridge and around the side of the children's play area was not suitable for buggies, pushchairs or mobility scooters.

Discussions revealed that Mendip (following site meeting at end of May with the Enforcement Officer) could currently not force Autograph to improve the path as it was outside the current S106 agreement.

There was concern expressed that the Church Farm Rode Management Company that had been set up to look after this path and other onsite issues could pass over responsibility to the residents to maintain an inadequate path. Currently the Management Company consisted only of Simon Taylor of Autograph Homes.

As part of the new planning application (2022/0932/VCR) there would be a requirement to reduce the number of affordable houses on Church Farm by two and discussion was held over whether if Rode Parish Council (Rode PC) approved this it could set a precedent for future planning applications. However, this was thought unlikely as affordable and housing for the aged appeared to get mixed up, often being double counted; and Mendip had a policy of 30% affordable housing on any new larger development. Parishioners said they would not object to this planning application but would support the PC if as part of the approval a request was made to improve the 'rural path' to the same specification as was in place within the development.

<u>2. Apologies for absence</u>: Cllr P Travis, Cllr J McAuliffe, Cllr E Butler, Cllr Denton and Cllr Boyden.

3. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 3rd May were approved.

4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Planning:

i) New applications:

2022/0801/HSE: Replacement of existing conservatory – 3 Orneage Close. No objections

2022/0932/VCR: Variation of conditions 9 Estate Roads), 13 (Housing Land Access), 15 (Pedestrian Access), 17 (Housing Land Drainage), 20 (Tree and Hedge Protection), 24 (noise Mitigation), 25 Construction Environmental Management Plan), 29 (Housing Land Parking), 34 (Housing Land Refuse and Recycling), 35 (Ecological Mitigation), 38 (Housing Land Materials) and 49 Housing Land Sample Panel) of permission 2011/3124 – Church Farm. This was approved with three Councillors in favour and one abstaining. It was agreed that the PC would in its comments strongly request that Autograph Homes improved the path from Church Farm to the S106 land to the same standard as applied to the path within the Church Farm development.

ii. Mendip decisions:

2022/0579/HSE: Erection of single storey extension – 41 Marsh Road. Approved

2022/0482/HSE: 2 storey rear and side extension – 11 The Mead. Approved **iii. Other:**

2021/0071/OTS: There had been no progress with the appeal, this still had not been assigned to the Planning Inspectorate to start the appeal.

<u>6. Report from District Councillor:</u> Cllr Lund had nothing specific to report having been on holiday but had made various approaches to Mendip – see various items.

7. Actions from previous meeting:

- **i.Trees: Merfield/The Mead:** Cllr Lund reported she had raised the issue with Bo Walsh at Mendip and he had agreed to inspect the structural integrity of the trees and report back. This had still to be done and Cllr Lund agreed to chase it up.
- **ii.Clock:** The Clerk reported that he had been in contact with Peter Watkinson again and he was due to come to measure angles for a bracket this week and would contact the Clerk when he came to do the actual repairs.

8. Highways:

a) Memorandum of Understanding: This had now been completed with all the SID locations inserted into the document. The Chair signed it off and this would now be sent to Somerset for their agreement and counter signature.

b) 20mph speed limits: The Chair said he had spoken with Sara Davis at Somerset and there was no date for the implementation apart from 'this year'. However, the double yellow lines on Rode Hill near the High Street had been agreed and added to the TRO.

c) The Sportsman: No response had been received yet. However, AP reported that he had been informed that the drains had been inspected prior to adoption. It was not clear if the field overflow had been included and the Clerk was requested to contact Caroline Murray at Calm to see if an improved settlement

pond had been agreed to reduce overflow from the fields.

<u>9. Playing Field Constitution</u>: It was reported that the Constitution had now been approved by the Playing Field Committee and had been sent to the Charities Commission for approval.

10. Church Farm: It was agreed that the Parish Council would accept the offer from Autograph for a meeting in late June and the Clerk would approach Autograph for a date. 




