

REFLECTION - BLESSING THE LAND

By the time you read this, Rogation Sunday will have passed. We celebrate it every year in church and usually go for a walk in the afternoon, taking in one or two churches and farms on the way.

This year it was Norton St Philip to Hemington via Hardington. In years past it has been Rode to Tellisford and sometimes Farleigh Hungerford, enjoying our beautiful countryside.

The name Rogation comes from the Latin "rogare" meaning to ask, when God's blessing was asked for the crops which had been planted a few weeks earlier. This goes right back to pre-Christian times. There was a custom of "beating the bounds". It started when people walked the boundaries of land in times before maps. They would pause at certain landmarks; trees walls, and hedges and beat them with sticks. The sticks were often made of willow and as the bark was removed it was called "stripping the willow". Is this where that challenging but exciting country dance of the same name comes from?

The church developed this to mark parish boundaries, with banners and prayers and food and drink. The names "Gospel Oak" or "Amen Corner" may well derive from this. We certainly carried on the tradition of good food and drink in Hemington church this year!

The land needs our concern and our prayers - and action. Sharman Flindall wrote a report in last month' s magazine about a fascinating talk by Sally Morgan, a biologist and gardener, at Rode Gardening Club. She spoke about adapting to Climate Change in our growing patterns.

Human activity is causing rising temperatures, and it's not just by burning fossil fuels, but also by changes of land use, deforestation, and unhealthy farming methods in agro industry.

The land is becoming increasingly a desert and it is estimated the world has only 60 harvests left, a terrifying thought for our grandchildren. Land is no longer capturing carbon as it was designed to do because mankind increasingly pours chemicals on it which destroys the wonderful structure and turns it to dust.

This is not hopeless if things change very soon. I am not a farmer, but I have been told that that good grazing techniques, return to organic manure, and rotation of crops can make a big difference. I am a gardener, however, and appreciate what Sally had to say. Have another read of Sharman' article and see what a difference we can make in our gardens.

MAY SOMERSET UNITARY ELECTIONS RESULT

On 1 April 2023, the five existing councils in Somerset will be replaced by a single Somerset Unitary Council and as both our Somerset Councillor, Linda Oliver (Cons) and our Mendip Councillor, Barbi Lund (Green) did not stand for re-election change is afoot. Our two new elected Councillors are Adam Boyden (Lib Dem) and Dawn Denton (Cons).

Adam Boyden introduces himself below and we look forward to Dawn Denton being able to do so next month.

I would like to take this opportunity to formally thank Linda and Barbi for all their work on behalf of our community and for their involvement with The Link.

THANK YOU AND HELLO FROM ADAM BOYDEN

Every election is determined by the people who show up", and on 5th May, 43.7% of the electorate voted, and I had the honour of being elected as one of your Somerset County Councillors for Frome North. Thanks to everyone for your help!



Due to the immense support across Somerset, I am now part of the brand new Liberal Democrat administration running the County Council. Our first 'full council' meeting was yesterday when nearly all 110 county councillors met in a large room near Bridgwater. Bill Revans was elected Leader of the county council, and he used his maiden speech to outline a few priorities.

This will be a listening council, with a positive relationship with all Somerset residents. We will disperse power, including by developing the emerging Local Community Networks, to give local residents a genuine role in shaping how the new council will operate.

A big challenge will be to 'get Unitary done', as this has a strict deadline of next April when the new unitary Somerset Council must be formed, taking over all county and district services.

How we develop the current 'pilot' Frome Area LCN (covering the Rode area) which has been looking into the local coordination of services for children and

young people, into an effective local committee of the unitary council and an active and engaging partnership with local people and organisations to raise issues and achieve meaningful action on local issues, will be really important.

I know many in Rode are concerned about environmental issues, and Somerset is in the front line of the fight against climate change. The new Lib Dem council will increase momentum towards making Somerset more resilient to the effects of climate change and becoming an exemplar council on climate and environment policy, led by councillor Sarah Dyke in the council's Executive.

This is also why we have established a new Scrutiny Committee for Environment and Climate Change policy, of which I will be Vice-Chair, to ensure that we are doing all we can to tackle the global threat locally. We need to promote active travel, better bus services and digital connectivity to keep Rode connected and reduce the need for car journeys.

I also remain a Mendip District Councillor for nearby Frome College Ward and supported the Lib Dem motion at that Full Council on Monday which declared a 'cost of living emergency', due to the explosion in the cost of living and its impact on working people, pensioners and those on benefits. This called for a windfall tax on energy giants, and for a summit of local organisations to find ways to help people in need, and it is truly a shame that this is needed in the 21st century.

Locally I am also picking up on issues of current concern, including road safety, and will be meeting with parish councillors to help progress local priorities.

I will also be working with your Mendip District Councillor Barbi Lund (until next April) of course, and with Dawn Denton who was also elected in Frome North.

I really want to hear from anyone with a concern or ideas. H.V. COMMUNITY GROUP - UKRAINIAN CRISIS UPDATE

Well, it is now some 3 months since the Russians invaded Ukraine and a lot has happened since then. The HV Community Group was formed to respond to the crisis at a local level by finding people willing either to host fleeing Ukrainians or to help to make them feel more at home when



they have arrived. We have also been ascertaining the possibilities available to arriving Ukrainians in terms of education, transport, jobs etc.

It is a constantly evolving picture, but at the time of writing, we have some 30+ guests recently arrived in our community, spread across the several villages of HV, and they are generally beginning to settle in well. There are another 40 or so in the pipeline at various stages of the process; visas are applied for in the majority of cases, and we are now waiting for them to be granted before we move on to figuring out transport arrangements. Each hosting household is supported by one or more 'buddies' who can take over if the hosts are not available at any point, and this reduces the stress on the hosts considerably.

Emotional Reactions - It is hard to put into words what our guests must have been through. They were people just like us, living their day to day lives, with all the hopes and fears we all know and share. And then suddenly the world goes crazy. Imagine if one day, you had to suddenly leave your village, be it Rode or Norton or wherever, and head off with perhaps only one suitcase, to an unknown future in a foreign country, leaving all your treasured belongings behind, losing everything that represented your progress in life. Gone. And imagine further if you had to leave one family member behind to fight. It is an almost unimaginable prospect for us, but that's what it was like for our guests after February 24th.

So we need to support them emotionally and mentally as well as physically. The children who have arrived so far are resilient, although some still report occasional nightmares. But a recurrent theme from all the guests is how amazing they find the welcome they are receiving, and the large number of Ukrainian flags they see flying everywhere (including of course on Rode green). And a number of them have mentioned how much they love English architecture! Who would have guessed? It should also be said that most of the guests think of their move to the UK as temporary and are keen to get back to start rebuilding their country whenever it is possible. However, that seems a distant prospect at the moment.

Education - For most of the Ukrainians here, education for the children seems to be the first priority. Schools have been sorted out for most of them, and it must be said that the various schools involved have been more than helpful.

From first schools through to the colleges a practical approach (such as signs in Ukrainian for example) has been taken to integrating the children, making them feel welcome and managing their different requirements.

We are going to be starting English Tuition classes for the adults. (they should be well under way by the time you read this) involving daily 2-hour group classes in venues in Rode every day except Wednesday when they will be in Norton St Philip. There will also be one-to-one conversation sessions with experienced TEFL teachers in the villages. There are of course also online courses. We feel that getting their standard of English to a fairly good level is crucial if they are to find jobs in the community, and thereby become more independent and move on. But for the moment Google Translate has really come into its own!! And it has to be remembered that not only are they having to learn a new language, but also a new way of writing, using our Roman system of letters rather than Cyrillic. So they even have to learn how to write their own name! The first stage on arrival (once they are settled and ready) is to get them to undertake a language assessment questionnaire to see what level their English is, so as to offer them a place in a suitable level class. Having said all that, some of the guests are arriving with already very good English, and it is hoped that they will be happy to help with supporting and translating for the others.

We had hoped to use the facilities at some of the local institutions of further education to provide formal English teaching classes, but of course these are now all finished until September, and we need to provide lessons pretty well immediately. Somerset County Council has agreed to support classes two days a week and we have agreed to buy in professional services from Bath Academy to provide the education as required the other 3 days a week. This is not cheap (although we are being given preferential rates), and to that end our online donations page is now looking to raise even more than the current achievement of more than £2500, and the large majority of any sum raised will be used for this education program. Bureaucracy - Prior to their guests arriving, hosts need to fill in the required visas on their behalf. This is just as complicated and frustrating as has been described in the media. When I did the ones for my 3 guests, it took 4 solid hours, and that was with the assistance of an expert who had done it several times already. But at least we have some experience of the process now. Needless to say, the hoops are seemingly endless that have to be jumped through to register for the various services that our guests need once they have arrived, such as Health Service, National Insurance , Universal Credit and so on. Through trial and error, the hosts and their buddies have learnt that things need to be done in exactly the right order to progress the registrations. So, for

example, they have to have a bank account before applying for Universal Credit. Getting a bank account with the high street banks takes some 4 weeks or longer. However the online Monzo Bank seems to be relatively quick in getting one set up. It is a constant learning process.

Employment - The guests are all expressing a desire to find employment as soon as possible. I am currently building up a list of job opportunities in the locality, and once the guests are established and have a suitable level of English, they can start to look for work. In general they are willing to turn their hands to anything initially, although they may have been working in highly skilled positions back in Ukraine. There are a number of lawyers, accountants and so on, and they hope they will eventually find work in their particular profession. If you know of any job vacancies please drop me a line and I will add them to the list I'm building. I'd be particularly interested in any professional vacancies.

Transport - One problem still to be resolved involves obtaining car insurance for those that can drive. Hopefully we can find a company willing to insure Ukrainian drivers at a premium which is at least worth considering. One of our coordinators has been investigating this and has found out that to put one Ukrainian (who is not a youngster!) on the host's UK insurance only one company (Saga) was willing to offer the possibility, and the cost would be £2000! Something will need to be done about this, but it is difficult to see just what at the moment.

More Information - So a good start; no doubt there will be difficulties to come, both bureaucratic and emotional. But be assured that all the hard work put in by hosts and helpers is very much appreciated.


DAVID HORNSEY

The Field Beans are currently in flower and will be harvested in September.

But first, haymaking towards the end of June. My favourite time of year.

The hay is cut, turned 2 or 3 times, rowed up and baled. We need about 7 days at 21 degrees! So difficult to predict when to go! All down to experience and weather watching.



THOUGHTS FROM MUDDY FINGERNAILS

I'm taking a short break from bucolic May-time Somerset and find myself in the middle of Snowdonia. The scenery is so different, with breathtaking mountains, picturesque streams and cascades around every corner. The hillsides are violethazed with the massed bluebells, the verges are pungent with the wild garlic.

Everything seems a month behind Somerset, so I'm enjoying spring all over again. And just as I'm drinking in all the natural beauty around me, my Instagram feed is full of the noisy, frantic preparations for RHS Chelsea next week. Could there be a greater contrast between these apparently effortless natural surroundings and those which are being painstakingly created by teams of designers, landscapers and horticulturalists in a temporary home just behind the Kings Road?

I do love seeing all the work that goes on behind the scenes at RHS Chelsea, the crazy details and the extraordinary lengths the garden designers and nurseries go to in their attempts to create a "natural" garden scene, to mimic nature. There is such skill and creativity and sheer bloody hard work on show there. But then I walk out into the hills behind my tiny rental cottage and what is on show here seems unsurpassable - the whole is so pleasing, so simple yet also varied and full of tiny perfect details.

Of course even the natural landscapes her reflect human intervention - the hills are criss-crossed with ancient drystone walls, the roads and streams meander beside each other, ancient routes carved out over centuries, bisected by quaint bridges and flanked by groves of birch trees while the sheep graze the land all around. I don't think I'm alone in feeling that as hard as we gardeners may try, we'll always fall short of what nature herself creates. But am I down-hearted? Of course not!



Plas Brondanw, the home of Clough Williams- Ellis of Port Meirion fame, is predominantly green with sloping lawns, mature trees, evergreen hedges, and very little colour on show - apart from the extraordinary soft verdigris colour of all the painted ironwork and window frames of the old house. The garden doesn't compete with but celebrates the landscape beyond: all the greens within

the garden (avenues of beech and yew, glades of Japanese cherry trees, double borders simply planted with deciduous ferns), sit so comfortably with the colour palette of mountains and valleys beyond, the garden structure framing the outstanding views of Mount Snowdon.

I'm swooning now at the thought of it and I'm determined to take on board a couple of key lessons from it - firstly that gardens work best when they draw fully from the wider landscape and secondly that the greatest impact usually comes from the simplest planting. Snowdonia is magical!

Enough purple prose. I'm off to buy some dwarf- runner bean plants I've spotted on a bench at the end of the road in this wonderful mountain village lots of plants grown in cut- off plastic milk bottles, with an honesty box for payment.

But of course there's no place like home...

Muddy Fingernails

NATURE NOTE

When I came here nearly 30 years ago the garden in front of my house was a field, Row Court had no garden either and there was little gardening round about except for Graham & Daphne White's new garden at Row Barn.

For all these years three clumps of strong bright gold daffodils with bold green stripes on the backs of their flowers have defied the sheep to eat them in the field. This year I took their photograph and sent it to a daffodil fanatic in Scotland and this is what she told me:



'It is called "Van Sion", dates from before 1620 and its first appearance in England was chronicled by Parkinson in Paradisus as being by a Fleming, Vincent Sion. Parkinson wrote a beautiful botanical book "Paradisi in Sole ParadisusTerrestris" in 1629 and dedicated it to Anne of Denmark, Queen of England, wife for Charles I.

Row Farmhouse was built in 1641, so maybe an early owner was an advanced gardener and they have been here ever since! I shall always wonder how they got here.

SHARED GARDENS

As I mentioned in previous Link articles, I have had interest from a couple of garden owners in the Parish to share their gardens, which is absolutely fantastic - I've met them and seen their gardens and have had meetings with the keen growers and garden owners.



The shared garden in Tellisford is now well under way with the grower getting stuck into tackling some greenhouse and beds clearing work to get prepped for growing. I can't wait to see how the space develops! We are still setting up the shared garden in Rode but hoping that one will be underway soon.

For our shared garden, we feel even further behind in the growing season (I think some years are like this! We've been so much busier this year than the last two, so have had less free time for growing). We've only done a small amount of seed sowing in the greenhouse - sweet peas, tomatoes, herbs and some other cut flowers. We've now directly planted most of the dahlia tubers overwintered in storage into the ground where tulip and daffodil bulbs were growing, a great job to tick off. The rest will most likely go into big pots. Steven's sowed his colourful fiesta corn, and he's doing three sisters planting – corn/beans/squash growing together. We'll be directly sowing our runner beans and sowing cucumbers and



courgettes in the greenhouse end of May - hoping it's not too late! I'm so pleased to see various plants have come back or reseeded from last year - mostly abutilon (Indian mallow)/foxgloves/alliums/nigella/squirrel tail & bunny tail grass/calendula/angelica/stocks/nasturtiums. Makes me very happy - and means I don't need to re-sow these this year!

Do you have a patch of garden that you don't use any more or is too much work? Would you be interested to share your garden with others? Or would you like to have more space to grow vegetables, fruits and flowers? If so, I would love to hear from you if you are interested in getting involved in the Garden Share scheme across the parish. RODE LADIES GROUP MEETING WEDNESDAY 27TH APRIL

The meeting was opened by Pat Banwell. She announced that the Rodent Readers Book Club had two vacancies, contact Pam George for details. Pat then introduced the speaker on "The Cleveland Pools, Bath" - Sally Helvey.

Sally is a Bath tour guide as well as an ambassador for Cleveland Pools. She swam at the pools before they closed in 1984. The Pools are the oldest outdoor pools in the UK and possibly Europe at 200 years old. They are in Bathwick and were originally fed from the River Avon. As well as the main pool, there was the Ladies perpetual shower bath and the children's pool on the upper level. They were built on the Bathwick Estate, owned by the 1st Duke of Cleveland, as part of a development that included Sydney Gardens but was never completed and were the smallest of 11 pools in Bath at the time. They were designed by a local architect, John Pinch, and financed by private subscription. Originally, they were for men only and a separate pool for ladies was created later.

In Victorian times a Captain Evans was employed to run the baths and teach children to swim. He was eccentric, 'a master of incredible feats' and was accompanied by a Mandrill Baboon. All sorts of swimming matches and galas were put on, often with gold and silver medals as prizes. Sally passed round a medal that had been donated to the Pools which was worth £800 today. In 1915, mixed swimming was allowed.

In 1984 the pools closed due to competition from the new leisure centre opening in the city. In 1988 a trout farm was opened on the site and in in 2004 the site was put on the market for £450,000. It's listed building status was changed in 2006 to a Grade 2 Site of Significance. A Trust was formed to save the site and restore the pools for use all the year round. They have received grants from various bodies including the Heritage Lottery Fund but are still short of £400k to cover the £6m overall cost. The pools will be heated to 28-32C using a river sourced heat pump. They hope to host other activities such as water polo, canoeing and paddleboarding. There will be a shop and café and access will be by river as well as by footpath.

Sue Shannon thanked Sally for a very interesting talk. The raffle was won by Hazel Roberts' daughter.





BREAKING DOWN THE BARRIERS OF LONELINESS

Frome based charity **Active and In Touch (A&IT)** will focus on the impact of loneliness when it launches its "Above and Beyond Fundraising Appeal" during National Loneliness Week (13th-17th June). A&IT supports over 300 people in Frome and neighbouring villages who live alone at home. Demand for in touch Frome their services increased significantly during the COVID-19 pandemic...



According to the Campaign to End Loneliness -


- The number of over-50s experiencing loneliness is set to reach two million by 2025/6. A 49% increase in 10 years.
- Half a million older people go at least five or six days a week without seeing or speaking to anyone at all.
- Two out of five older people (about 3.9 million) say the television is their main company.

Social isolation and loneliness are real issues to many. Lack of family contact, no friends, limited opportunity to go shopping, being house bound or unable to get active in the community have a real impact on physical and mental health. A&IT is changing this by supporting people and creating space and opportunities for them to make friends and connections and develop a sense of belonging through a matched 1:1 befriending service. A&IT work closely with a range of health and wellbeing services including Frome Medical Centre/social care charities/Health Connectors/Village Agents/Frome Town Council.

A&IT's team of wonderful volunteers offer a lifeline to people who may be struggling alone at home. Knowing there is someone out there they can meet for cup of coffee and chat, help with shopping or providing some company can make all the difference. In addition to the befriending service, the charity runs 2 weekly social groups and A&IT Community Drivers, providing a lifeline for people living in Frome and neighbouring villages who could not otherwise access vital services such as attending medical appointments, going shopping, visiting family and friends or attending social events. They rely on a network of local volunteer drivers give up their time to provide lifts within Frome and neighbouring villages, including visits to the Royal United Hospital in Bath.

The charity is calling on the residents of Frome and surrounding villages to get behind the appeal by giving a donation, running an event, or involving their church, school. community group or business. It is also looking for volunteers to join the befriending service or signing up as a community driver. MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 3rd MAY 2022 AT 7.30 pm

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM) and Cllr Elaine Butler (EB)

In attendance: Cllr Barbi Lund, Hugh Williams - Clerk

1. Public Participation: None

2. Apologies for absence: Cllr Linda Oliver (County Councillor).

3. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 5th April were approved.

4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Report from County Councillor: Cllr Oliver had given an update on Somerset buses but this would be covered by PT (see minute 14)

6. Actions from previous meeting:

i. **Trees:** Merfield/The Mead: The Clerk had sent a registered letter (including the tree report from J Osborne) to the owner requesting he had the trees assessed and respond to the PC. However, nothing had been heard. Discussion was held over what other action could be taken but apart from notifying Somerset and Mendip of the PC's continuing concerns it was felt little more could be done.

Parish trees: The report had been received and circulated, generally all trees were in good condition. It was agreed that the Norway Maple near the allotments should be inspected by a tree surgeon regarding removal of dead wood.

It was reported that there were two dead trees, one on Rode Hill and another by the Rode Hill and Bradford Road crossroads that need to be reported to County Roads as these could endanger the highway.

ii. Clock: The Clerk reported that he had been in contact with Peter Watkinson regarding repairing the striking mechanism and he would hopefully be over in the near future.

The sad news that David Hornsey had died meant that there was now no one in the village to regularly look after the clock. It was agreed the PC

would look for a replacement to wind, check the time keeping and make other maintenance checks on the clock.

iii. Footpath from Church Farm to Playing field: The path was still of considerable concern. Exchange of emails with Autograph had made little progress. There had been no feedback from Mendip on this issue. It was reported the previous S106 officer at Mendip had been very helpful. Discussion was held over the best way forward not only on the path but other S106 requirements that appeared not to being implemented by Autograph. It was agreed that the Parish Council would seek a meeting with Autograph on the S106 issues and maybe include Mendip, Andy Fussell and all other partners in the S106 agreement.

On the issue of S106s it was agreed Mendip Planning should be approached regarding future S106s to discuss potential requirements.

Quotes for the extra fencing by the path in the playing field were still awaited.

The clearance through the small wood was still to be done and the Playing Field Committee was arranging this.

- **iv. Spring Clean:** This had taken place on 10th April and teams had cleared a considerable amount of litter from around the village. Thanks were given to AE and PR for doing the teas in the pavilion.
 - Future Hoedowns and litter clearances were discussed and it was tentatively agreed a village Hoedown would be arranged for the end of June. EB agreed to circulate an email thanking those who had joined the spring clean and encourage future clean-ups; also including those who had participated in previous Hoedowns.
- v. Waste site on A361: This had been largely cleared and Mendip had requested that anyone seeing vehicles either clearing (or dumping at) the site to report any details to them. The threat of enforcement action by Mendip appeared to have had an effect.
- 7. Climate Emergency Group: JM reported that a joint meeting with Beckington and Norton St Philip had been held. This had been useful in exchanging ideas and information. He said that the key issue from the Rode village survey had been to improve bus services. There was some new government funding coming on the installation of communal Electric Vehicle (EV) charging points and Rode could apply as there was a lot of on-street parking and a large number of properties unsuited to having EVs, possible locations would need to be determined.

It was reported that the grass in the church yard at Christchurch was being cut too often and Cllr Lund agreed to let JM know who to contact at Mendip to allow the rewilding of this.

8. Highways:

a) Bradford Road/Rode Hill junction: A meeting at the crossroads with Sara Davis had taken place and possible improvements were to be put forward by Sara Davis to Somerset. Although there had been a number of accidents this was not considered a high priority junction by Somerset. The meeting also agreed new SID locations and amendment of others.

It was agreed to contact Sara Davis with regard to the double yellow lines that had been agreed near the junction of the High Street and Rode Hill, to ensure they were included in the implementation of the 20mph village speed limit and village gates work.

- **b) Memorandum of Understanding:** This still had to be completed and the precise SID locations (using what3words) had to be inserted into the document, once completed it was agreed the Chair would sign it and be submitted to Somerset for counter signature.
- **c) The Sportsman:** An email had been sent to the address given by Cllr Oliver but no response had been received yet.

9. Planning:

i) New applications:

2022/0218/VCR: Variation of condition 2 of permission 2019/0620/REM application for approval of reserved matters following outline approval 2015/1431/OTS to replace existing dwelling with 5 new dwellings and associated garages – 6 Frome Road. No objections

2022/0579/HSE: Erection of single storey extension – 41 Marsh Road. No objections

ii. Mendip decisions:

2022/0557/TPO: To crown lift holm oak and cut down cypress - 16 High Street. Approved

iii. Other:

2021/0071/OTS: There had been no progress with the appeal, this still had not been assigned to the Planning Inspectorate to start the appeal. It was noted that since the planning application had been made Mendip had now adopted a net zero policy for all developments in the area. This could be raised as an additional objection point in the appeal for the development.

Nether Storey: The Parish Council had been approached to see if it was willing to join a forum of parish council across Somerset that were concerned over developers not delivering the affordable houses they promised. It was agreed Rode would join the forum with the Chair being the main contact.

10. Playing Field Constitution: No further progress had been made.

11. Queen's Jubilee Celebrations: The plans for the day were progressing well, a Jubilee mug was circulated and these are to be given, free, to all under 12 children in the village. A plea for first aid cover for the day was made.

13. Elections: It was agreed that the residents on Church Farm could be approached to fill the vacancy, by co-option, on the Parish Council.

14. Buses: PT reported that Somerset had been given £11.9m funding by the Department for Transport (DfT) but before releasing the money the DfT has to approve the plan Somerset has for using this money. He said that £8m would be used to install bus lanes in Taunton, with the justification that this would be an easily demonstratable use of the money and should allow for future funding money for further bus improvements.

The new Rode bus timetable would be printed shortly and distributed to households

15. Annual meeting: It was noted this meeting would take place on Monday 9th May at 7.30pm in Rode Chapel, reports would be sought from the playing field and memorial hall committees.

16. Financial matters:

- i) Allotment charge: It was agreed to increase the annual charge to £55.00 and the Clerk would invoice Mrs Bird.
- **ii) Payments:** The following payments were agreed:

Four residents were nominated to serve on the Planning Sub-Committee - Anthony Battersby, Nicholas Diggle, Clare Parfitt and Rowena Smith – and they were unanimously elected. Paul Brimble had resigned from this committee as he is moving away from the village. Clare Parfitt has agreed to fill the role of Honorary Footpaths Officer.

Paul Lawrence, formerly with Voneus, gave a detailed update on recent developments in plans for providing high speed broadband.

Under the current government contract for extending fast connectivity to 1 gigabit per household, the potential suppliers compete with each other to claim vouchers for connecting households, unlike the previous scheme for which we as householders claimed £500 and all claimants passed the grant on to the chosen provider (Voneus). Now there is competition between Voneus and Gigaclear to provide a fibre service off BT telephone poles: they have maps and are calculating their options.

There are differences between the two companies in their proposed coverage of villages; Gigaclear is planning to cover Norton St Philip, Beckington, Rode and Tellisford by the end of this year, whereas Voneus is planning to cover all the villages in their first scheme plus Beckington, Rode and NSP. The team of village champions that was formed to get Voneus' current service has reconvened, to be ready to respond as soon as Voneus contacts them about high speed fibre, expected to be in mid-June. A new company, Fibreway, is providing service via fixed wireless — as Voneus is now — and its network pings from Shepton Mallet to Writhlington to Tucker's Grave to Fortescue Fields in NSP to Southwinds in Woolverton. Paul said that even with a household of three teenagers it was unlikely that the target provision of 1 gigabit would all be used.

Sven Rees, a recently arrived resident in Southwinds, drew attention to the danger of the A36.

This road is the responsibility of Highways England which has consistently declined to adopt this Parish Meeting's suggestions for speed-reducing measures. In the past TPM has asked for a "gate" which could have a sign thanking motorists for driving carefully, but Highways said the verges were too narrow for such a gate to be installed.

The SID (Speed Indicator Device) is currently obscured by branches, and the plans to start a Community Speedwatch were put on hold by the Covid pandemic.

The meeting agreed to various actions, including reactivating and training the Community Speedwatch team in co-ordination with the experienced group at Farleigh Hungerford, removing foliage obstructing the SID, and asking the developer of Southwinds about the bus stop mentioned in their plans.
