REFLECTION

Somewhat surprisingly, it's now not far off a year since I first moved to Rode. It has been a strange time to join a new community, what with a ban on meeting people for a lot of the time and all, but it has, nevertheless, been an interesting few months. I do hope that you are able to enjoy the gradual easing of restrictions as we come out of Lockdown and have more opportunities to meet with friends and family again.



As we are gradually recovering some of the freedoms that a lot of us took for granted pre-Covid, I've also been reflecting on the way in which it has opened up new opportunities for me too - and that has largely been thanks to the technology we are blessed with. One of my passions is social justice, in fact I'm so passionate about it I moved from full-time ministry to part-time ministry so that I could spend time doing a PhD which looks at ways of enabling the church to be more active in the social justice arena. Long before I ever thought about being a vicar-type person, I've seen part of my personal vocation as being to speak up for those who can't speak up for themselves - which it turned out is a phrase that comes from the bible, but it was years before I discovered that at theological college! It comes from Proverbs 31 and says:

Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute. Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy.

Over the years I've become increasingly committed to working in the areas of social and environmental justice - areas which are intertwined. Environmental justice is inherently linked to social justice as it is generally the poorer populations of this world who are most directly impacted by climate change. For me, living with a focus on justice means trying to make ethical decisions in how I live my daily life but also joining with others in challenging injustice in all sorts of ways - and working *together* is crucial in this area if bigger changes are to be achieved. The pandemic has actually made that easier in some ways. I've been involved in social and environmental justice meetings that I wouldn't otherwise have been able to get to. So I have learned a lot more and met many others all working towards the same outcome of a more just society.

Just one of those ways has been through doing more training and going to more meetings with Citizens UK. CUK are a community organising group that is a people powered alliance dedicated to challenging injustice and building stronger communities. These alliances are made up of faith communities, charities, schools, health trusts, and other organisations all working together. And they actually go a step further than just speaking up for others - they

empower others to have a voice in making decisions that affect them and in finding solutions for the real issues and injustices that they face. It was CUK who introduced the idea of a real living wage and also them who initially challenged the injustice of child refugees living alone in desperate circumstances and being separated from their relatives here in the UK. They created a coalition to deal with this issue that ultimately led to the setting up of the charity Safe Passage - which is a charity that is supported by this parish. I love it when things come together!

Much of my life is centered on working towards social justice and enabling others to do that too so that the world might gradually be transformed. Ultimately, I think, my passion for social justice comes from a belief that this world and all the people in it are so precious that we have to care for each other and our planet in every way we can. If you are passionate about any area of social or environmental justice too, it would be great to hear from you and maybe chat about it over a cup of coffee.



H.V. CAMPAIGN TO HELP VACCINATE WORLD'S POOREST



Revd Scott Patterson, a vicar in Curry Rivel and his wife Rowan have launched 'Twin My Vaccine', a campaign to help raise funds for communities across the world who are struggling to vaccinate their population against Covid 19 and whose infrastructure in places may not even include basic refrigeration.

We think this is a brilliant idea, so we have set up a JustGiving page to direct funds to UNICEF's COVAX programme.

Curry Rivel set a target of £1000 but by 1st March they have already passed £57,000. Let's see what we can do.

Rowan and Scott said: "We're delighted that our parents and friends are beginning to be vaccinated against Covid-19 and it's great that in the UK this is freely available on the NHS. But many of us could have afforded to buy the vaccine if we'd needed to and there are countries which cannot afford to vaccinate their people at all. UNICEF's coronavirus/COVAX campaign will deliver vaccines to some of the poorest countries in the world."

Two doses of vaccine (depending on which kind you have) might be worth between £4 and £30, plus the time and expertise needed to administer it. People are so delighted that they or their family and friends have received it that the idea to help others seems to have resonated. Many have donated through the JustGiving page and have shared the idea with friends, work colleagues and their extended family.



NEW OPPORTUNITY FOR SOMERSET BUSES

The UK Government has just launched a new national bus strategy for England entitled Bus Back Better. The Government's believes 'buses are the easiest, cheapest and quickest way to improve transport".

This national Bus Strategy is backed by £3 billion of new funding and forms a key plank in the Government's twin agenda of "Levelling Up" and "ensuring the economy meets Net Zero carbon emissions". This is the biggest change in buses in the last 30 years! As Co-Chair of Somerset Bus Partnership and a Chair of Frome and Villages Bus User Group I feel this new national bus strategy and its extra funding gives us in Somerset the chance to deliver major improvements in the County's bus services. Somerset now needs to seize this unique opportunity.



The newly formed Somerset Bus Partnership is supported both by Councillors and by bus user groups across Somerset and it will seek to work with local town and parish councils and with Somerset County Council to input into a Bus Enhancement Partnership for Somerset that incorporates both what current bus users need and take steps to facilitate more Somerset residents to switch from using private cars to travel by bus.

At 10 journeys per resident, Somerset currently has the fourth lowest bus passenger journeys per population in England. It is the lowest in the South West. Bus passenger journeys in Somerset have decreased by more than some 40% over the past decade. Said Peter Travis, "The new Bus Strategy provides the funding to reverse this decline in passenger numbers in Somerset and see Somerset playing its part in the Government's levelling up and green agendas by launching a Bus Enhancement Initiative for Somerset. Somerset needs to commit to this initiative by June 2021."

R.P.F. BIGGER AND BETTER

In my March article I outlined the Trustees' approach to adoption of the land granted to the parish as part of the Section 106 provisions attached to the Church farm development.



As mentioned, we intended to produce a plan for the land's development as a community orchard and wildlife area. The plan has been published to Rode Parish Council, as landowner, and to a few people who have expressed an interest in supporting the Trustees. The plan itself should be available for everyone to view via Rode Village Facebook if you want to have a look at how we're intending to go ahead with the project (if you are not Facebook user and would like information, please contact me).

Just one thing to note, the design shown at the beginning of the plan is just a concept: a starting point for the development, consequently it may look different once the project is completed. Why is this? Well, how things are laid out will depend on what we find once we start work so the plan has been kept relatively simple allowing us to adapt the design in the light of reality. Anyway, more on this in future articles.

A Great Green Space - With the lovely weather that we've recently enjoyed it's been great to see the playing field being well used. There have been picnics; people hanging out for a chat in the sun; families enjoying impromptu football and cricket and a few just soaking up the sun. Just one small thing. All users of the playing field need to be assured that the grounds are safe so, a brief reminder to use the rubbish bins provided or take your litter home with you for recycling please. Also, a quick reminder that dogs are not allowed on the playing field as we really do need to keep the playing surfaces clean and clear of dog fouling.

It Costs Money! Some may not be aware that the playing field is run by a managing charity, so we have to raise money for upkeep of the grounds and equipment. We do pretty well, thanks in no small part to our lottery, Rode Parish Council support and generous donations. However, the income is not keeping pace with the growth in dilapidation sadly.

The Trustees check the playing field pretty regularly to ensure it's safe, but pressure is increasing as equipment, ground works and buildings age. Just recently the reason for buckling of the tarmac adjacent to the scout hut has been identified as water getting under the surface. Again, it's quite safe but indicates a significant amount of work will need doing to repair it.

The Trustees are undertaking a review of all the facilities to ascertain the extent of dilapidation and estimate the cost of work needed to improve the facilities.

Enjoy the Sunshine - Bit by bit we're coming out of Lockdown. There's plenty of fresh air and open space to enjoy in the sunshine at the playing field. It's free for non-commercial use! From the 17th May we can start meeting in small groups indoors – groups of 6 or two households. All being well, from the 21^{st of} June, the government hopes to be in a position to remove all legal limits on social contact. Things are getting better.

RODE DRAINAGE SURVEY - BRIEF UPDATE

Calm Engineering, on behalf of Mendip District Council and the Somerset Rivers Authority, would like to extend our thanks to the residents of Rode for your co-operation and support during the recent survey work in the village. The survey team remarked on how smoothly the survey progressed and how they had never worked within a community that was so engaged and helpful. We were able to access all the areas we needed to complete this part of the survey.

We were able to clean the drainage network of sediment (using the giant vacuum on the back of a tanker) and, where possible, to flush out any limescale build-up within the culverted watercourses. This has already improved the capacity of the drainage network.

We identified several manhole covers that needed replacing and liaised with Wessex Water to undertake this work whilst the road closures were in place. There were a total of 5 manhole covers replaced: 4 on the High Street and 1 at the bottom of Church Lane.

We await the full results from the survey, which we will hope to provide in an update next month. Please note that there will be some additional surveys undertaken on the watercourse and attenuation ponds upstream of the village during May (scheduled to start w/c 10th). There should be no disruption to the village during these works.

BRISTOL AVON RIVERS TRUST CITIZEN SCIENCE EVENT

There has been a lot in the news recently about the condition of our rivers. We're very lucky to have the beautiful Somerset Frome on our doorstep....it's not only a haven for wildlife, but also a recreational resource for anglers, kayakers and swimmers.



The quality of the water is vital for the wildlife, and for other (human) users! The good news is that we can all play a part in understanding and improving the quality of our local river....

Bristol Avon Rivers Trust (BART) will be running their annual Citizen Science Water Quality Monitoring event this summer and are seeking river enthusiasts to take part. Throughout July BART aim to collect as many samples from the rivers, streams and lakes of the Bristol Avon catchment to help gain a snapshot of water quality.

BART will supply free water testing kits to volunteers which can be used to measure nutrient levels in a water sample taken from a chosen waterbody; In high concentrations nutrients can impact the local wildlife which depends on a healthy river.

The presence of nutrients may indicate a pollution event nearby or ongoing issues from land management, sewage outfalls or urban pressures. The results will help BART target their conservation work.


George Clark, BART Project Manager, said:

"Rivers and streams are the arteries of our planet but they face serious challenges. Within the Bristol Avon Catchment, including the Somerset Frome and its tributaries, we often see nutrient pollution entering watercourses and degrading these important ecosystems and impacting the species that inhabit them. Therefore it is increasingly important to carry out monitoring and work together for rivers."



"The citizen science event is a great opportunity to get back outside after months of Lockdown and connect with your favourite local river or newly discovered stream. Volunteers can take an active role in scientific monitoring, helping us understand the water quality issues in our communities and to help protect these precious environments."

Individuals or groups can get involved in the event and BART would like to encourage schools and community groups to take part too. To register your interest in the event please get in touch with George via email (george@bristolavonriverstrust.org) and he will share the sign up page with you when it goes live in June.



We will have a distribution point in Rode for the test kits – more info on that in the June edition!

NEW SCHOOL BUS SERVICE FOR RODE

The first afternoon D2s from Bath schools came through Rode on April 19th.

For many months, despite the best efforts of bus campaigners, there has been no afternoon D2s School Bus to bring Rode pupils back from Bath schools, even though there has long been a morning D2s school bus that takes them to Bath.



Finally, late last month, First accepted our argument that Rode needed an afternoon school bus to bring back to Rode those school children they took to Bath schools in the mornings.

The D2s school buses were introduced following the Covid pandemic. They are exclusively for school students because as long as they sit in school/class bubbles and wear face masks, there isn't the same requirement to be socially distanced as there is on the normal D2 and so a lot more school children can be transported on each bus.

By the way, if in the morning, you might have been surprised to see the convoy of yellow and brown D2 buses going along Rode's High Street and thought, 'You wait ages for a bus and then three come at once', that'll be the D2s and plus two D2 buses. Because of limited passenger numbers allowed on each D2 bus, to carry all those who need to get to Bath in the rush hour, First have to put on two buses. The same happens in the evening rush hour too.

Like many organisations, Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service has a range of statutory responsibilities we need to undertake in order to manage the risk to our communities.

At the same time, we have broadened our offer to partners wherever we can as we recognise that there are some complex issues, such as reducing the impact of mental health, that require leaders to work together to solve some difficult societal problems.

As such, we are undertaking our regular strategic review of the risks that we might face in the future and what the future landscape might look like in terms of infrastructure as well as societal trends.

This will be reflected in a Community Risk Management Plan (CRMP), formerly known as an Integrated Risk Management Plan (IRMP), which will run from April 2022 until 2027.

Before developing the draft CRMP, we are gathering views from people and partners across Devon and Somerset. These views will give us an understanding of what you and residents feel are local risks that we need to consider as well as perceptions of the fire and rescue service and its role within our counties.

RODE GROWS AND SHARES UPCOMING EVENTS

autumn last year I planted up a galvanised tub full of spring flowering bulbs, in the last few months it's been giving me so much pleasure, others have told me they've really enjoyed it too, which makes me so happy. It didn't cost a lot, perhaps \pounds_{30} and has definitely been worth the money and effort. I'd love to see more planting across Rode and am so excited to be co-organising 'Rode in Bloom' - more info and details in due course!



Giant Sunflower Competition – I'm so pleased with the interest in the competition - now fully subscribed with all competition seeds distributed - 43 individual entries plus 5 classes from Rode and Norton Federation School. All those entered should have received my initial email end of February with full competition info and growing tips. I just want to flag up that if you haven't yet sowed your seed, I recommend you now sow the seed directly and by the end of May. SOMERSET COUNTY COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Future Parish, Town and City Council Meetings: The government announced on 25th March that the Coronavirus regulations allowing for remote Parish, town and City Council meetings would not be extended beyond 6th May 2021. This effectively means that all Council meetings scheduled for 7th May or later will have to be held in public, face-to-face. No provision is available for remote attendance including mixed hybrid (part attendance) meetings. A legal challenge has been launched by Hertfordshire County Council but this will not be heard until later in April and planning should now be made to either pull forward meetings before 7th May, postpone meetings or determine Covid secure meeting facilities for the Council and Members of the public. The Government have launched a consultation on allowing remote or hybrid meetings on a permanent basis via their website: gov.uk/government/consultations/local-authority-remote-meetings-call-for-evidence/local-authority-remote-meetings-call-for-evidence.

Road Map Out of Lockdown: Enjoy the great outdoors responsibly now that restrictions are easing, it's important to keep following the rules while still enjoying the new freedoms – and sunny weather. Please keep travel to a minimum, avoid unnecessary journeys and try to combine trips if that's possible. If you need to travel, walk or cycle where possible, and plan ahead to avoid busy times and routes if you use public transport. This will allow you to practise social distancing while you travel. If you need to use public transport, you should follow the safer travel guidance for passengers, visit www.gov.uk. There is also advice on accessing green spaces safely,

Lateral Flow Tests - For people who do not have symptoms, around 1 in 3 people with coronavirus do not have symptoms. Lateral flow testing is a fast and simple way to test people who do not have symptoms but who may still be spreading the virus. Rapid testing is now being offered to everyone, with people encouraged to take regular tests (twice a week) to help prevent outbreaks and reclaim a more normal way of life. You can find out how to book a regular lateral flow test if you do not have symptoms here.

Somerset Coronavirus Support Helpline: A single phone number continues to be available for anyone in Somerset who needs Coronavirus-related support. 0300 790 6275, is open seven days a week from 8am to 6pm.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT FOR MAY

Countryside Planning Matters:

As you can imagine a wide variety of planning issues have come up in my relatively short tenure as ward councillor. Given the season I thought it might be useful to highlight a couple about our relationship with the countryside on our doorstep.



Removal of Hedges:

It is against the law to remove most countryside hedges without first seeking permission. According to the1997 Hedgerows Regulations it is an offence to remove or destroy certain hedgerows without permission from the local planning authority. "Important hedges" are any hedgerow more than 30 years old that are valuable because of the mix of species they contain, or because they have historic significance.

Hedges are also protected if they grow in, or next, to land used for farming, forestry or horses with a continuous length of 20m or more; or with a continuous length of less than 20m but meets another hedge at each end.

Removing a hedgerow can lead to potentially unlimited fines if the breach is deemed serious enough to be heard in the Crown Court.

In addition, the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 prohibits damage to the nest of any wild bird, while that nest is in use or being built, which effectively makes the removal or trimming of a hedgerow an offence in the nesting season, 1 March to 31 August.

Planning Permission to Use a Paddock or Field as Part of a Garden: You need planning permission if you live next to a parcel of agricultural land, paddock land or a field and would like to use it as part of your garden or for other domestic purposes. This is because it constitutes a material change of use, as set out in section 55 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

Enough of dry (even if very important) legislation - I hope you are all enjoying our glorious outdoors and have a happy and productive May.

POLICE ALERTS

30/03/2021 9788 Somerset: Buying & Selling on Social Media / Online Platforms:

We are seeing an increase in burglaries from garages and sheds where the offenders are clearly seeking out motorcycles, specifically dirt bikes such as KTM & Yamaha.



It appears that a number of these bikes have been listed for sale on social media platforms, where a potential buyer arranges to view the vehicle but then doesn't turn up. Not surprisingly, a day or so later the Garage / Shed is broken into and an attempt is made to steal the bike, or it is stolen.

If you are considering selling your vehicle - or any expensive item - follow the guidance provided on the website. Do not automatically assume it is safe to pass over your address details and or photos of your vehicle outside of your garage, especially if it shows your street name and garage number. If you do so and the purchaser doesn't turn up, be aware and pay close attention to the item you are selling and the security of the location it is stored.

Sadly, this may not just affect you. If your garage is broken into, your neighbour is likely to be targeted and may also sustain damage to their garage.

Remember, whenever you place an advert, you are also advertising what you have to steal. Read the guidance provided by the website carefully, and ask yourself if you really need to provide your address or do you meet somewhere public nearby? Always meet any prospective buyers in a well-lit, public area.

01/04/21 9788 Somerset – Caravan Security: As the restrictions around Covid-19 are being eased and many people are looking at "Staycations" rather than holidays aboard, caravans are becoming increasingly popular. Unfortunately, criminals have also noticed this, so please take steps to increase the security of your vans.

Secured By Design is the official police security initiative which provides a recognised standard for all security products, and a recent addition to this listing is Caravan iD.

This scheme provides an individual identification number for your caravan and motorhome that can be checked to see if it has been stolen. For more information, visit their website at https://caravanid.com/

I have started, along with Caroline and Jo, visiting Norton St. Philip and Rode First schools for assemblies and it has been wonderful to receive such a joyous welcome from the children and staff on both sites.



Tots and Toys: I am now able to offer (started 21st April) outdoor babes and toddlers as a pre-cursor to 'Tots and Toys' re opening in St. Philip and St. James Church in NSP.

We cannot use the church at the moment as there is a lot of work being undertaken to remove pews and put in a new floor and heating. So, each Wednesday from 9.30-11.00am I will host an 'outdoor meet and greet' for parents and carers with babes and toddlers.



This will take place on The Mead at NSP in the enclosed play park at the top end of The Mead. "THE BIG ASK" – IMPROVING CHILDHOOD



AUDREY HARRIES 19.10.1925 - 12.03.2021

Audrey Harries, nee Stride, was born on 19 October 1925 at Trudoxhill, the youngest of 9 children: 3 boys and 6 girls. She was 14 when WWII broke out and decided to help the war effort by volunteering to become a Red Cross nurse. She trained in Weston Super Mare and served in Plymouth, Chatham and finally in East Grinstead, where she helped nurse burned airmen at the Queen Victoria Hospital. She worked with Sir Archibald McIndoe, a pioneer plastic surgeon.



Later, Audrey joined the navy, scoring 98% in the Naval Entrance Exam. She met her husband-to-be David at Chatham Dockyard aboard HMS Scott at 7.30pm on Feb 20th, 1948, where the ship was undergoing a refit. Engaged in September 1948 they married at Nunney Church in June 1949.

When David retired from the navy, his new business interests led them to Bearsden, near Glasgow, where their only child, also called David, was born in 1955. The family lived in Scotland for the next 15 years, before moving south to Rode in 1970. David's employment was transferred to Bath and Bristol, and Rode was chosen as their home, as Audrey was keen to be living closer to her now elderly mother.

In Scotland, Audrey had founded the Bearsden branch of the Scottish Society for Mentally Handicapped Children and Adults, following the move South she continued to fight tirelessly to champion the cause of children and adults with learning disabilities. She spent years giving speeches to raise awareness about this issue together with founding the Frome branch of Mencap in 1971 and energetically fundraising for it. Subsequently Audrey became a Trustee of the national charity Royal MENCAP in 1987...in which role she served for 13 years until retiring in 2000 at the age of 75.

In another age she might have had a very high-flying professional career, but as it was, she devoted her considerable energies to the support of her husband's career, to her son David and her causes: Citizens' Advice, Mencap, adults and children with learning disabilities and latterly the Macular Society. She led a wonderfully altruistic life of service to others. After Audrey's own diagnosis of Macular Degeneration, she attended the Bath branch of the Macular Society in Green Park for 14 years, before setting up another branch locally, in Frome.

She was a fiercely independent person and a natural leader who led by example. She knew what she thought and what she wanted and was energetic and

determined in the pursuit of her agenda. She was feisty and loved a good argument...she could be deliberately provocative and at times it was wise to bite one's tongue...she loved to have the last word and she was very difficult to say "no" to. But she had an admirable lack of capacity for self-pity - despite her rapidly deteriorating eyesight she continued to attack life with gusto and got on with as much as she could manage.

Following her beloved husband's death in 2018 (they had been married 69 years) Audrey found herself living alone and therefore increasingly lonely....one of the curses of a long life. Her Red Cross and Navy Nursing years qualified her as a blind veteran, which led to her being invited for a week's break at the Blind Veteran's centre in Brighton. There she met Godfrey, a former soldier and doctor, another blind veteran of similar age. They became fast friends and were to spend much of their remaining time together.

To celebrate her 95th birthday she planted 95 daffodils in her garden, many of which were showing when she returned from hospital on Tuesday 2nd March. In those last days not once did she grumble or complain...as ever, she set a formidable example. I don't think she was ever really aware of the high esteem in which she was held by those who knew her. She was bowled over by the generosity of the team who cooked for her each day in the week following David's death. And she was kind, loving, thoughtful and wise, always interested in other people of all ages, and they in her. One friend remarked "She was one of the nicest people I ever knew...a wonderful person" and another "A very, very nice lady...she always looked so smart...I'm so glad to have known her" And another friend and colleague of over 30 years standing: "Just say what a wonderful friend she was...she was so supportive and a real fighter for what she believed to be right".

Even at 95, she was still campaigning...smartly dressed, looking no more than two thirds of her actual age, she spoke movingly on television just scant weeks before her death, in support of saving Furlong Close from closure, a campaign which at the end was closest to her heart.

GARDENING IN MAY

We had an unusually dry April with many glorious blue sky and sunshine days but also many frosty nights to keep us on our toes protecting tender plants and seedlings. I've been really enjoying the magnolias and cherry blossom around the village, clematis Montana too, on a warm day I often smell its beautiful fragrance before I see it. As I write wisteria buds are breaking and it won't be long till the beauties are in full bloom, looking and smelling incredible.



Gardening tasks for the month:

- Watering as needed in dry weather. Better to water first thing in the morning or in the cool of the evening, than in the heat of the day avoids leaf scorch/reduces evaporation. Keep an eye on pots as can dry out very quickly.
- Cutting the grass regularly cutting is good for healthy growth, encouraging the grass to thicken up. However, avoid cutting the grass too short in prolonged dry periods, being a little longer offers good protection.
- Weeding due to dry weather weeds have not been quite as prolific, which is brilliant. Best to remove or hoe annual weeds before they flower and set seed remove all the roots of perennial weeds to prevent them regrowing.
- Tying in and staking plants are putting on a lot of growth now and some need support climbing/rambling roses, clematis (self-clinging, but often needs help), peonies and dahlias to name a few. Best to get support in early.
- Pruning early spring flowering shrubs such as forsythia and winter jasmine if you haven't as yet, to keep their size in check.
- Planting spring is a great time to plant into the garden (as well as in autumn), you can see any gaps that need filling and more plants are available. After the risk of frost has passed, summer bedding plants can be planted out which will give you so much colour and interest for months.
- Seed sowing a lot of annual veg and flower seeds can be directly sown from May if you haven't had a chance to sow them indoors before now. ls.
- Hardening off seedlings before planting out recommended to do this place in a cold frame or bring them outside in the day for a week or so in a sheltered spot - it will thicken their leaves and make stronger plants.
- Feeding now we're in the main growing season good to regularly feed certain plants, especially those struggling after a wet/windy winter, also recommend an ericaceous feed for acid loving plants (acers/ hydrangeas/camellias etc) to keep them happy and avoid yellowing leaves.
- Pest control I am much more in favour of natural methods of pest control over chemical control either using simple manual methods or biological

control solutions. For aphids, a mixture of water and washing up liquid can be sprayed over an infestation or use a tissue gently to remove them from buds and stems, or in a greenhouse setting you can order ladybird larvae which prey on aphids. For issues with vine weevil (notches taken from the leaf edge) I recommend using a biological control in the form of a microscopic nematode that specifically targets vine weevil applied every six weeks during March till October.

For all my sowing/potting on/top dressing, I use peat free compost for environmental reasons. Peat is highly nutrient dense, but it is not a sustainable resource coming from lowland raised bogs which are a rare habitat. There are many alternatives to peat giving great growing results, including coir and wood based composts. I recommend always looking closely at the compost you buy – it will state if it is peat free or peat based and how much peat is present. My favourite compost is Melcourt Sylva Grow, and they are RHS recommended too.

Birds are raising their broods now so definitely appreciate any food put out for them and water to drink and bathe. I noticed a blue tit tugging at a jute string support in our garden and flying off with a beak full, presumably for nest building. I added more jute string and he came back within a minute for more. A pleasure to see the birds, notice behaviours and know that you're helping.

Shared gardens - Over the last couple of months we've been busy setting up our extended growing space - now have 3 secondhand glass greenhouses and 2 new raised beds made with reclaimed scaffolding boards. We've been seed sowing and potting on -trying to keep everything alive and happy through the frosty nights/hot days we've been having! A few tomato casualties at the start of the frosty nights, lesson learnt to be more cautious. We've had to do a lot of



watering – now watering seedlings from the bottom, getting the compost thoroughly damp has made a big difference, would definitely recommend it.

Do you have a patch of garden you don't use any more or is too much work? Interested to share your garden with others? Or would you like to have more space to grow vegetables/fruits/flowers? I would love to hear from you if you're interested in getting involved in the Garden Share scheme across the parish.

Parish Farming FUSSELS - EARTH DAY - SPRING PLOUGHING

On Thursday 22 April Fussels' were celebrating "Earth Day" and what better day to be turning the soil early on a beautiful sunny morning with clear blue skies.

The field, showing in the photograph, is named Ten Acres, as it is just that!



A small field surrounded by established hedges and a public footpath on two sides, one being a 'covered hedge'. It sits just on the edge of the village. Andy as a third-generation farmer is very passionate about the land, particularly the soil. If the soil isn't right, then the yield will be poor. Agronomy is so important.

Last Autumn this field was put down to stubble turnips for local Sheep Farmers, Tom and Charlotte Wheeler, for their store lambs to feast and fatten. Stubble Turnips are a great break crop for farmers and an early food source for the stock lambs. When the sheep have finished feasting, the ground is then prepared with a measured amount of farmyard manure (which is ploughed in) ready for the next crop, Forage Maize, which Andy grows for animal feed. This will be drilled in late April, early May for harvest in September/October, all weather dependent! This year it will be cut by our Combine Harvester. The difference is that we will drill less seed (37,000 seeds per acre) as opposed to (44,000 seeds per acre) if it was going to be cut by the Forager. The rows will be more defined and won't fall over!


There is a skill to ploughing which only comes with experience and knowledge of the undulation and lie of the land. In the photograph you can see our experienced Farm Manager, Shaun, ploughing a straight furrow. Much is done by eye.

When ploughing, it is important not to place the plough into the soil too deep as we don't want to disturb dormant seed that will flourish when brought to the surface and into the light! The furrow depth is approximately 10cm deep and is set by eye (and the small wheels on the plough). At the time of writing, due to the lack of rain, the soil is compacted, cracked and dry and so it was slow going, but with some new blades on the plough and the power of our Fendt 720 Tractor, the job was completed.

Parish Farming

The ploughed field will first be rolled with our Roller, which will break up the soil and consolidate the moisture followed by the Power Harrow over the rolled ground to break it up a bit more, ready for the precision Maize Drill, which is a specialist piece of kit. Germination takes approximately 14 days. And then we wait...

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MINUTES OF THE VIRTUAL (via ZOOM) MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON TUESDAY 6th APRIL 2021 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Peter Travis – Chair (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Elaine Butler (EB), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Mike Salmon (MS)

In attendance: Cllr B Lund, Hugh Williams – Clerk, and 3 members of the public

<u>1. Public Participation</u>:

Comment was made that there were a number of trees along Clay Lane that appeared to be dead and that could fall onto the road creating a public hazard. Additionally, water was still running off Barbara's Field onto Clay Lane and it was hoped the adoption of The Sportsman would resolve this.

A question was raised as to whether there had been any update on the Hearings regarding the Local Plan Part 2. The Chair said no report was expected for at least a month, however it was thought Ashford Homes would be challenging the Inspector's removal of The Mead from possible development sites.

A Parishioner said that should development of Brown's Ground go ahead, advice should be sought from a landscape engineer, and one lived in the village who was willing to give advice.

2. Apologies for absence: Cllr Steve Eyles and Cllr L Oliver

3. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 2nd March were approved.

4.Declarations of interest: None.

5. Report from County Councillor: A report had been submitted which noted that Somerset had very impressive vaccination rates. There were concerns over the resumption of face-to-face council meetings after 7 May. Somerset was also looking for nominations for the Somerset Medal and was looking for people who had done particularly well with regard to Covid19; nominations closed on 23rd April.

<u>6. Report from District Councillor:</u> Cllr Lund reported that Mendip like Somerset was against the forced re-introduction of face-to-face council

meetings and supported the challenge to the Government ruling. Business grants continued to be available. Consultation continued on the new Unitary Authority until mid-April.

In response to a question over the two major planning consultations she said she had no news of either going to the Planning Board but thought it was unlikely either would progress before the LPP2 Hearing Inspector's report.

7. Actions from the previous meeting:

- i) Hoedown: An article had been put in The Link and also on the village Facebook site. To date there had been expression of interest in taking part from 6 people, with others indicating participation later in the year. MS agreed to repost a call for volunteers before the Hoedown day – 25th April.
- ii) **Lengthsman:** Due to injury the Lengthsman had not started work yet but should start in this month. AP reported that it was the landowner's responsibility for keeping footpaths clear, therefore this should not be part of the work required to be done by the Lengthsman.
- iii) **Barrow Farm paths:** It was agreed to check if these paths were public footpaths or not as their status was uncertain. Additionally, concerns were raised over whether the PC owned the grass bank on Lower Street next to the Temperance Garden.
- iv) **Marsh Road:** The site visit was to take place once Covid19 restrictions were eased. The status of the grass edges would also be raised at this meeting with SCC to confirm who was responsible for what.
- v) The Bell: No update.
- vi) **Broadband:** It was reported that ultrafast broadband was to be installed in Rode by Voneus and that the work should start in October. Ultrafast would be available to all households.
- vii) **Aerial photographs:** The order for the photograph as a gesture of thanks for the cleaning work done by Clive Harrington had been raised.

<u>8. Climate Emergency:</u> JM reported that he had got 5 people interested in joining the working party but he was still looking for younger participants.

9. Highways:

- a) It was agreed the working group would look at the A361 speed and volume data with Patrick Moss later this week.
- b) County Roads had been informed about the concerns over HGVs using Lower Street and the request for speed repeater warnings on Rode Hill; acknowledgement had been received but a further response was awaited. Thanks were given to Cllr Oliver for submitting photographs of worn road markings to SCC.

c) Cllr Oliver had also got SCC to circulate the proposed speed restriction areas on the A361 past the Church Farm development and the PC agreed to accept the proposal although further extension of the 30mph limit beyond the Parkgate Lane junction would be even better. The PC also agreed that the 'village gates' sign should be similar to the Long Stanton design that had been circulated.

10. Planning matters

a. New applications:

2021/0415/HSE: Erection of second storey extension above existing single storey side extension and erection of two storey side extension -3 Walnut Close. No objections.

2021/0418/HSE: Demolition of single storey extension to rear elevation and demolition of existing garage. Construction of two storey side extension. No objections.

2021/0534/TCA: 4 pleached hornbeams, reduce height by 1-1.5 metres – 17 High Street. No objections.

2021/0569/TCA: Reduce height of ash by 2 metres and its spread by 1.5 metres – 1 Halfpenny Row. No objections.

b. <u>Mendip decisions</u>:

2020/2328/FUL: Forestry building with seasonal retail element and forestry office – Hillside Farm, Marsh Road. Approved with conditions

2021/0025/HSE: Erection of solar panels on garage roof – 18 St Lawrence Lane. Approved with conditions

2021/0139/HSE: Extension of single garage to form double garage – 1 St Lawrence Lane. Approved with conditions

2021/0141/HSE: Erection of double garage rather than single garage and car port – 9 St Lawrence Lane. Approved with conditions.

2021/0178/HSE: Insertion of garage door to existing car port and erection of a garden room for home office – 16 St Lawrence Lane. Approved **2021/0293/TCA:** Goat willow – re-pollard at previous pruning points – Cheap Street. TPO not required.

c. <u>Other planning matters</u>:

2021/0071/OTS: Application for outline planning permission for the erection of up to 49 dwellings etc. Noted the submission of rejection by PC.

The Clerk reported that Mendip had changed their policy of informing Parish Councils of planning decisions. The PC agreed this should be challenged and the Clerk agreed to write to Mendip on the issue.

<u>11. Calm Engineering and drainage:</u> JM reported that the survey of the village had been completed with minimal disruption and thanks went to all residents for their co-operation. The results of the survey should be available in a couple of weeks. An update would be sent to all residents and an article would be put in The Link. Two issues had been identified, these were: partially collapsed drain outside the school and fragile structure in danger of collapse in Lower Street opposite the new houses.

A plan of action would be drawn up to minimise flooding and carrying out mitigation works.

It was reported that Bristol and Avon River Trust were on part of Earthwatch Europe looking for groups to take river water samples and it was hoped the village school could do this. Samples taken in September had indicated high levels of phosphate pollution in the Frome at Rode.

12. Church Farm access to village/footpaths and playing field: The hoggin path had still not been started and it was agreed representatives of the PC would initially email Autograph Homes with a view to meet them to progress this.

<u>13.</u> Parish Council website: An outline proposal had been circulated by the Chair and the meeting agreed this should form the basis of a new website. A simple site with links to information was favoured. The Chair and Clerk agreed to progress this.

<u>14. Cycling and Walking:</u> The Frome area for the LCWIP (Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan) was funded but to include other villages parishes would need to fund it themselves, and the figure for Rode would be £2,400. It was agreed this would not be currently pursued and this would be an item for the Climate Emergency Group to consider in the future.

15. Police Beat Manager: The monthly report was noted.

<u>16. Village assets</u>. Thanks were given to Keith Sharman for photographing the village assets. The Clerk would complete the listing and circulate this. It was agreed that finger posts and milestones should be included in the asset register.

<u>17. Back to bus:</u> A Government Strategy Paper had been published which was very supportive of improving bus transport across the country. Boris Johnson was very keen on buses and they were seen as a way of reducing transport costs and positively impacting on the climate emergency. This could

result in a significant change in Somerset's approach to bus services. It was agreed the PC would fund (approx. £150) for a village survey of bus use and requirements to help push the local case for increased bus services.

18. Financial matters:

i) The Clerk reported that he had still not heard back from the NatWest, but hoped the new signatories (EB and MS) had been approved.

ii) The accounts status to the end of March was noted and the Clerk informed the meeting he would be completing the AGAR forms for approval at the May meeting.

Trees – The Mead and Clay Lane: A report that there were trees leaning unsafely on The Mead had been received along with concerns expressed earlier in this meeting about trees along Clay Lane. It was agreed these were the responsibility of the landowners, however before the PC contacted them an expert would be asked to look at them to assess their state.



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
