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#### **REFLECTION**

It feels like we have been on a roller coaster of emotions the past two years — anxiety about Covid, relief when the vaccine came out, sadness at our separation from loved ones and then, for many, joy when we finally hugged them again. And now, these past few months, we have felt horror and disbelief as we have watched the war in Ukraine unfolding.



I'm writing this reflection a few days after attending a meeting we had in the chapel in Rode (there was a similar meeting in NSP a few days before). A committee of people are coordinating a response from Hardington Vale parish to the Ukrainian refugee crisis, and as they shared about how we can get involved some of the weight of heaviness I had felt about the situation in Ukraine lifted, I sensed some anticipation and hope as we talked about how we could welcome, host and support guests from Ukraine and I felt hugely privileged to be part of this loving and caring community.

It is exciting seeing how things are coming together and how different people have different resources and gifts but everyone has something to offer - some have spare bedrooms, others offer skills in finances or form filling or computers, others have talents in teaching or experience in safeguarding, some have contacts in schools and social services and others can even use their gift of shopping!

There is a long list of opportunities and in fact whatever your resource, talent, gift or skill, I am sure it could be used in some way and although individually it seems like a huge task, together we can do something really significant. And this isn't just for the next few weeks, it is going to be for many months, so there will be plenty of opportunities to be involved.

Over the last couple of years, as a church community, we have been talking and praying about how we can give and receive hospitality. Then for the whole of last year we were meditating on a passage of scripture (Acts 6:1-7) about caring for widows and have been discussing how we can each use our gifts and skills for the benefit of others. So now, as it is mostly women and children arriving in our community, it seems like all this is coming together in an incredibly special and poignant way.

It reminds me of my favourite part of the Easter story when the two disciples are on the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus. It was Easter Sunday, and the disciples are upset and confused by the death of Jesus and the disappearance of

his body and, as they walk, they are joined by a third person who asks what they are discussing. Their response sounds almost impatient; 'are you the only person visiting Jerusalem who doesn't know what has been going on?'

Of course, Jesus is the one person who actually *does* know what has been going on and, using the Old Testament, he explains why the Messiah had to suffer and it all starts to make sense to the disciples. So, they welcome him, in fact they urge him, to stay the night with them in Emmaus and as they eat together, and as he breaks and shares the bread, they realise it's Jesus! Jesus said, 'when you welcome the stranger you welcome me' (Matt chapter 24). I love that hospitality was the key to recognising Jesus.

Things are moving incredibly quickly at the moment and by the time you read this reflection there may be quite a significant group of Ukrainians living in our parish and, as time goes on, I am sure that we, and indeed our guests, will have lots of different and unexpected experiences and emotions. Sometimes we will perhaps feel frustrated as we struggle to communicate or confused as we encounter cultural differences, and we may feel empathy for our guests as they struggle with being far from their home and loved ones. It won't always be easy or simple, but as we work together it will be extremely rewarding and we will experience joy as we don't just give welcome and hospitality but as we receive it too.

## **NEWS FROM ST LAWRENCE AND AN INVITATION**

Church History Afternoon – on Saturday  $11^{\rm th}$  June you are invited to come to St Lawrence and learn something of its long and interesting history over a cup of tea or a glass of wine.



Come along and discover more about:

- · The oldest parts of the church, which precede the Reformation
- The relics from an earlier Norman church
- The magnificent East window
- Who St Lawrence was and what happened to him
- The reredos behind the high altar
- The memorials to past residents
- The organ
- · Captain Noad's window
- The Rectors of Rode
- Why there were two churches in Rode, well within living memory
- The Stations of the Cross paintings
- The bells and their restoration earlier this century
- The improvements to the vestry to provide kitchen and toilet facilities, also earlier this century

You will have an opportunity to go up the tower to see the bells and where they are rung. For safety reasons, access onto the tower roof will not be possible.

The church is normally kept locked for security reasons; the West door was even ram-raided a few years ago. Please take this opportunity to come and explore Rode's church. Our village historian, Peter Harris, and others will be available to answer your questions and explain things.

It is an important Grade 1 listed building and the residents of the village from time to time are the custodians who must try to maintain it and pass it on to the next generation in good condition.

Feel free to drop in at any time between 2.00 p.m. and 5.00 p.m. There will be no charge, but donations for the upkeep of the church and its churchyard are always welcome.

## SOMERSET UNITARY ELECTIONS THURSDAY MAY 5TH

On 1 April 2023, the five existing councils in Somerset will be replaced by a single Somerset Unitary Council. This means that all the services delivered by Somerset County Council and the four district councils – Mendip, Sedgemoor, Somerset West and Taunton, and South Somerset – will be delivered by the new Somerset Council. You will have two votes and can choose from seven candidates – see above. The Councillors elected on 5 May 2022 will transfer to this new Council and will run it until the next election in May 2027. Polling Stations are open from 7am to 10pm on May 5 2022.

You must vote at your assigned Polling Station. We have a Polling Station in Rode at Rode and District Memorial Hall. You need to be registered in order to vote - you don't need your poll card to vote.

### **RODE PARISH COUNCIL ELECTION UPDATE**

Seven nominations for Councillors for the Parish Council were submitted by the deadline. This means there will be no election of Councillors in Rode as there are eight vacancies, which are filled by these seven nominations.



There is still a Councillor vacancy which we hope to fill by cooption in the next few months.

### **RODE DEFIBRILLATOR - RE-STARTER FOR 10!**

This is our Defibrillator!

This is to give you the latest on the defibrillator. Currently it is beeping and showing a red cross in the corner of the box where there is usually a green 'ready' light.

Just to reassure you I confirm that the defib is still operational and I have sent away to The Community Heartbeat Trust and paid for a new battery which should last until 2026.



In 2013 when the 'Starter for 10' Appeal was launched, we raised enough money, not only to fund the purchase of this essential piece of equipment, case etc., but also enough to cover the cost of several pairs of replacement pads including 2 battery replacements and a rescue ready kit, up until now!

## WOW!

Alas, the account now stands at close to zero! So, in order for the monitoring and availability of a defibrillator to remain operational in the village (it's in the Phone Box for those of you who don't know its location), I will be starting to fundraise again.

I estimate that we need to raise around £400 just to keep things ticking over. Broken down, that is 40 people giving £10 or £80 people giving £5 (just a suggestion).

Any other amount or loose change will also be much appreciated.

I am aware of how much food, energy and fuel have escalated recently but if anyone does feel they would like to contribute, please pop any donation in an envelope marked 'Defib' and post it through my door at:



## **RODE COMMUNITY ORCHARD & WILDLIFE GARDEN**

## **Progress Since December**

The first Plantathon in December successfully planted a mixed hedge along the 170 metre boundary fence – some 650 plants in all. The event was very well attended some 50 plus people of all ages from the village community.

Plantathon 2 took place in March when a smaller band of community volunteers planted 100 trees donated by The Woodland Trust. These were planted in small copses one of entirely silver birch and three others of mixed trees comprising downy birth, rowan and wild cherry. The Trust also provided a significant number of dogwoods and these were planted at the north eastern end of the site. The community was asked if they had trees they could donate which resulted in the planting of a copse of locally grown oaks, walnut trees, a sycamore and a horse chestnut.

The footpath has been installed by the developer. Excess hedging plants are being planted along the boundary. The project is also in receipt of some reasonably mature 4' high rowan trees that were saved from being dumped in a skip. Some of these have been planted at intervals along the boundary hedge.

John Osborne has done a trial raking of the site. A site visit is now required to determine if this is sufficient to allow the wildflower seeds to be planted (Task 14).

#### **REMEMBER - NO MOW MAY**

Full details were given on this by Jim McAuliffe last month. A brief reminder - to help protect wildlife, the charity Plant life started the "No Mow May" campaign several years ago – and whilst private gardens cannot substitute ancient wild meadows, we can do a huge amount on a small scale to reverse critical habitat loss.





One of the best ways to encourage wildflowers in the garden is simply to forget the lawnmower and just let your grass grow. Try to resist cutting until at least the middle of July – or even into early September if you can. This gives the wildflowers a chance to complete their cycle of growing, flowering and setting seed.

#### A CALL OUT FOR MENDIP TREE WARDENS

Currently they are looking for one or two groups of people in different parishes who are interested in joining a pilot, before we open it up to the whole district. Everyone is welcome whether you are experienced or just starting.

The Mendip Tree wardens enable groups to contact each other to share knowledge and skills as well as enabling training and support for groups.



### **RODE CLIMATE CHANGE SURVEY - RESULTS**

First of all, a VERY BIG "Thank You" to everyone who completed the Climate Change survey which took place in March. The survey was undertaken primarily to help the Climate Emergency Group understand what Rode residents think about Climate Change and help inform decisions regarding the priorities for us as a village, and as a Group.

The survey itself contained eleven questions. Respondents were also invited to indicate their age and gender, and the survey responses could then be analysed to understand any key differences in responses by age-group or gender.



Copies were hand-delivered to all adults on the Electoral Register for Rode (just under 700 individuals). Additional copies were available in the Post Office for those not on the Electoral Register. 198 responses were received (approx. 22% of the electorate), with nearly a third of respondents (70) also adding some brief narrative comments.

The vast majority of respondents feel that the climate <u>is</u> changing, that humans are primarily responsible, and that drastic changes are required to avoid the worst effects of climate change. Over 80% of respondents believe they could be doing more (or a lot more), and although a majority think they know what they should be doing, 40% of respondents feel they need more (or a lot more) information.

Almost every respondent said they were already recycling as much as they can (although almost a third said they planned to recycle more in 2022). Almost 60% of respondents are already home-composting, encouraging wildlife and buying locally-grown food where possible. Nearly half of respondents are planning to reduce meat consumption this year, and over 40% are planning to buy more locally-grown food. Although the numbers are much lower, over 10% are planning to buy an electric/hybrid car, and nearly 20% looking to improve their home insulation in 2022.

It is clear that there is an appetite in the village to make some significant investments in household carbon-reduction. However, a lack of information, and cost, are significant issues. When it comes to transport, a large majority of residents are keen to see improved bus services, nearly half want improved safe

cycling/walking routes, and over a third believe we should instal community EV charging points.

In terms of the natural environment, there is general support for some of the key farm management initiatives outlined in the SCC Climate Emergency Strategy. In addition, nearly three-quarters of respondents are concerned about the use of pesticides, and over half concerned about the quality of the water in the River Frome.

For the final question, respondents were invited to select their top two priorities from a list of seven. The clear "winner", gaining almost twice as many votes as the next most popular, is the improvement of public transport and provision of safe walking/cycling routes. There was also strong support for increased recycling and maximising the use of low carbon energy sources.

For the most part there were no material differences between age-brackets or genders - although Women generally felt they could be doing more, compared to Men, and acknowledged a need to know more. Women were also more likely to want to prioritise improved bus services, whilst Men were more likely to prioritise low carbon energy.

In relation to Age, there were some distinctions which seem to chime with national and international data - in particular, younger residents (under 65s) are more likely to think that human activity is *mainly* responsible for climate change, and under 65s are more likely to think they could be doing more to avoid the worst impact of climate change. In terms of behaviour change, the biggest generational difference related to meat-eating....61% of under-65s are planning to reduce their meat consumption this year, compared to 37% of over-65s. And in relation to our priorities, improving safe walking & cycling routes had the same percentage difference between the generations (61% of under-65s seeing this as an important way to reduce emissions from road transport). [Over 65s are twice as likely to accept the need to use our cars but seek to prioritise other ways to reduce our carbon footprint.]

The Climate Emergency Group is now reviewing the results of the survey and starting work on an Action Plan to help reduce Rode's carbon footprint. We'll be feeding back on this at regular intervals and would very much welcome support to help deliver on that plan. ## THE RIVER FROME, AND WATER QUALITY

Much has been said and written recently – in the press and elsewhere – about the quality of sea and river water in and around the UK.

Last autumn the Environment Bill was passed into law, and with it either (depending on your perspective) carte blanche for water companies to continue to pump raw sewage into rivers and seas – or increased requirements on those water companies to improve the quality of those same rivers and seas. Most environmental groups took the former view, whilst the government and the water companies themselves generally took the latter.

In fact, everyone has the opportunity to express their views, as the government recently launched a consultation on some of the proposed targets in the new legislation. Responding to the consultation is relatively quick and easy, and if you feel strongly about this issue it is definitely worth making your feelings known (search for "Consultation on the Government's Storm Overflow Discharge Reduction Plan"). The deadline for comments is 12<sup>th</sup> May.



The Rivers Trust has recently updated its excellent Sewage Map to include the 2021 data. This shows, for the vast majority of combined sewage overflows (CSOs) throughout the UK, how many times these CSOs allowed excess water/sewage into rivers and seas. Locally, the CSO (water recycling centre) near Langham Farm overflowed 47 times, for a total of 446 hours last year, a *slight* improvement on 2020. The situation should be materially improved later this year when the upgrade works are complete (see below).

Meanwhile, Wessex Water is working on a project to use both regular sampling and Artificial Intelligence to predict water samples at multiple points on the River Frome (including Tellisford Weir).

Currently the AI algorithm is approximately 90% accurate in predicting the water quality at Tellisford. One objective of the project is to provide near real-time data on water quality in a way that can be used by the public. This should give swimmers and other water-users the confidence they need when assessing whether the water quality is safe.

Incidentally, if you still have the latest Wessex Water magazine (which was delivered to all WW customers recently) there's a short article on storm overflows. Their website also includes some good explanations of how CSOs work.

## Rode Water Recycling Centre Improvements - Wessex Water Update

Phase one of Wessex Water's upgrade of Rode Water Recycling Centre has been completed ahead of the Environment Agency Regulation date of 30 June.

The second phase of the £2.6 million scheme starts in May, work that will increase biological sewage treatment capacity and allow for population growth and future development in the area.



All work is taking place within the existing site boundary and also involves remedial improvements to the access track. Pedestrian access will be managed and maintained throughout.

Wessex Water will be installing a standby generator to provide resilience should mains power be disrupted, with all work expected to be finished during September 2022.

Residents may notice an increase in construction traffic in the area and some noise during working hours (normally Monday to Friday, 7.30am to 6pm), with every effort made to keep this to a minimum. Customers' water and sewerage services won't be affected.

## RODE AND NORTON ST. PHILIP FIRST SCHOOL FEDERATION

March and April have been extremely busy months in our Federation and it has been wonderful to be able to take part in some of our usual whole-school events again, welcoming parents back into schools.

**Steam Week** - In March, the children spent a week experimenting with Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. Parent and engineer Jill Clay kicked us off on Monday using her engineering and science background to lead workshops on bridge building, at Rode. Using just paper straws and masking tape the children created bridges. Over at Norton, children built towers of toilet rolls to see how many could be pulled along without the tower toppling. They investigated how to build towers that were stable and strong, looking at real towers for inspiration. Our own Mr. Searle visited all the classes to help them to plant seedlings, beans and cress heads. Years 2,3 and 4 investigated what wolves, pigs and cows eat and whether they are omnivores or herbivores. Year 3 made space rocket blow toys using straws. morning for their first school trip; a troll hunt! They set off from Rode school and found not three, but in fact, four goats. They crossed three bridges, discussed currents, islands, weirs, whirlpools and waterfalls. Near the Mill,





they bravely approached the arch of the bridge and, would you believe it, there was the troll! As he was a friendly troll they took him back to Norton on the minibus. A great walk full of science, nature and geography.

**Wild Jubilee Garden Big Spring Dig -** Huge thanks to our valiant band of helpers that pitched in on Saturday April 1st to work on the Wild Jubilee Nature Garden at our Rode site. There were some great workers; digging, raking,

chopping and pruning. We even had some dry-stone walling! Little Wilfred Ellis (not yet two years old) proved to be a dab hand with the spade and wheelbarrow. A super example of our Federation teamwork at its best. Thank you to all involved, especially Mr. Searle who organised resources and tools. Tasks included clearing and opening pathways, moving wood chip and beginning to dig out the pond area.



**Sponsored Swim at Frome Lions -** Our team of valiant swimmers entered the annual Frome Lions sponsored swim and had great success. The children really rose to the occasion and lapped up the cheering and clapping from the viewing gallery! We'd like to say a big well done and thank you to Alice W, Leo

#### RODE AND DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

Last month members of the Gardening Club heard from Sally Morgan, a biologist, writer, and keen gardener on the impact of climate change for gardeners and growers of crops.



Despite May 2021 being the coldest here since 1659, temperatures are rising and today the UK is warmer by an average 0.8 °C compared 1961-1990. Human activity, particularly the burning of fossil fuels coupled with deforestation, changes in land use and farming are the prime causes.

We have seen across the world the loss of polar ice leading to higher sea levels, droughts, intense downpours and flooding, plus vast forest fires. We all are aware of these, but other signs such as mosquitoes being active in the daytime in Spain not just in the evening.

As growers we cannot carry on as usual, but we need to adapt our growing spaces to meet these challenges. Apples which were harvested here in October are now all in before the end of September. This means cider makers cannot leave them till winter to process (as in the twentieth century) as they are rotting before then, adding extra pressures at a busy time.

One positive result is that here in southern England the growing season is extended by 21 days. Trees budding 14 days earlier and small plants flowering 32 days earlier. However winters have tended to be wetter and less cold and summers hotter and drier. Many trees, especially fruit trees dislike being waterlogged. They do need a period of chilling to break bud dormancy. This time when temperatures are below 7°C, known as the chill factor, is between 400 – 1000 hours for most fruit trees, but plums and damsons need more than 1100 hours, so growers are now having to look for different rootstocks more tolerant of higher temperatures. Commercially these may reduce problems but for gardeners' trees on dwarfing rootstocks will be more vulnerable.

Rain when it arrives may be more intense. One in a hundred-year events could become one in ten. Too much water needs to be dealt with. We can slow it by planting green roofs, creating permeable surfaces especially in our front gardens. Building swales, channels to direct water run-off, especially in new developments, follow the contours, plant with grasses and wildflowers to slow run off, soak up water, provide homes for wildlife and look attractive.

Gardeners need to collect water for use in the drier hotter summer months. Water butts are easiest to install and perhaps tanks to collect water for dipping watering cans should be considered.

Gardeners can address drought issues by deciding not to dig beds but mulch them. This keeps the moisture where it is needed and actually helps when rain falls as soil can absorb it better. Mulch can be any organic material, which improves both the structure and the microbes in soil, supporting better plant growth. Cut material can be placed straight onto the beds. Where rainfall is already low, such as the southeast, gravel can provide a good mulch surface to grow through.

The choice of plants may have to be adapted, living lawns with a wider range of plants supporting wildlife especially insect variety will enhance the opportunities for wildlife generally, reduce the need for using weedkillers and pesticides. Mediterranean or prairie planting in drier areas could be an option.

Our choice of trees to grow may also be affected as their life span is so much longer. Will beech, oak, lime, or horse chestnut cope with this new climate we have created? What trees would be better choices? The Forestry Commission is already looking what types of trees it should plant today to harvest in fifty or one hundred years.

There will be positives, but we need to be flexible if we are to create productive gardens that contain flowers, vegetables, give pleasure, so they are attractive places for us and our native creatures.

This will be the last meeting in the Village Hall for a few months as members visit local notable gardens over the summer. There are some seats available on the coach if you would like to join us on our day trip to the RHS Garden at Wisley on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> June. £20 (includes entry to Wisley). #### **RODE LADIES GROUP**

The Eagle has Landed. Rode Ladies Group met on Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> March. he meeting was opened by Chairlady, Pat Banwell who commented on the dwindling number of attendees which was partly due to the meetings having to be held in the afternoon. She also said that we still needed a Secretary whose duties would include drawing up agendas, taking minutes of meetings and organising the AGM. Pat then introduced the speaker, Bob Rogers.

Bob was originally a full-time civil servant, but at the age of 45 he changed to working part-time and started working 4 days a week at the Hawk Conservancy Trust near Andover. He learned a huge amount from Reg Smith the original owner Reg Smith was the son of a butcher who had a small farm and was passionate about nature conservancy and had an enormous amount of knowledge. He gave talks on radio and TV and cared for all sorts of injured and abandoned animals. Following his appearance on Blue Peter, 150 cars turned up at his farm the following Saturday and 240 on the Sunday. In 1966 Reg set up Weyhill Zoo Park on his farm, which featured European wildlife. The family took in an orphan brown bear cub which lived in the house with them until he reached 7ft. Reg created a bear pit for him but they had to take out a picture window to get him out of the house as he wouldn't fit through the door.

At the end of the 70s Reg decided to specialise in keeping birds of prey, aviaries were constructed amongst the trees and the Hawk Conservancy Trust was founded. Since then, it has gone from strength to strength and is a very popular attraction as well as conserving and breeding birds, carrying out research and providing education.

The Trust now has extensive premises and grounds and a café. There are 3 different daily displays of birds of prey and they also run 'Experience Days'. Reg talked about some of the birds that might be on display. Barn owls numbered 90,000 before the war but there are now only about 4,000. They are fussy eaters and hunt at dawn and dusk. They use their hearing, which is very acute, to find their prey. Kestrels, also known as 'wind hovers' are now on the amber list of endangered species due to changes in farming practices and are now often seen over motorway verges. Peregrine Falcons are the fastest creatures in the world. They fly upwards and then dive down onto the bird they have targeted – they can reach 200mph in 3 seconds.

Liz Dinnis thanked Bob for a very interesting and well-illustrated talk and Terri Lewis won the raffle.

The longer days and recent sunshine have made the memory of winter fade, although the breeze has been cool and temperatures are still dropping overnight. Perhaps we might still see a frost! The photograph of the bluebells was taken by Helena in Picket Woods. I must find a date soon for a walk from Shearwater to Heaven's Gate, where there are bluebells galore. They put on such a display and I sometimes stand in awe and pause, as they wave their delicate bells in the breeze, as if they are saying you can look but don't pick us!

**Tours:** Blooming Tours Thursdays 5<sup>th</sup> and 19th May, both at 6.30pm. There are still some places available on both dates - do think about joining us. They're a pleasant way to spend an evening - a glass of bubbly and light supper included!

**Shows/Events**: Shows coming up are Bridport Food Festival on 18<sup>th</sup> June. A great foodie event and definitely worth a visit. This is one of my favourites!

**Farm:** Again, we have grown an early flowering strain of Oilseed Rape; a great food source for the bees.

Waggle & Hum's hives are in place close to the OSR, which is a game changer with pollination. Our fields are buzzing!

Andy buys seed forward on the Grain Markets and now with OSR topping £830 per tonne (as I write) it seems to be going up daily.



A huge problem for us at Fine Foods when the price of the raw material escalates. Fertilizer has also hit £1,000 per tonne; the highest price ever; it comes from Russia! Need I say more? These are huge problems for all farmer nationwide.

Shed Field, The Brickyard and Barbara's Field were spread with FYM in early April; then ploughed, harrowed and made ready for the maize to be drilled during the first week of May. Look out for the precision maize drill on the back of the tractor in the coming days. It doesn't take long, so don't miss it! It's always exciting to get a new crop into the tilled soil and then wait (approximately 14 days) when the first shoots poke through the warm earth. Readying the fields for the forage maize requires experience, precision and care, which Shaun has in abundance. Farming requires much future planning. Working the rotation in conjunction with the Rural Payments Agency's lengthy document (the farm being mapped via satellite) is complex and takes a lot of Andy's time. And then there's the Contract Farming that we do as well! It's a game of survival...

#### **GARDEN NOTES FOR MAY**

I've been thinking about what brilliant pearls of wisdom I might share with you but worryingly I find my mind is flitting butterfly-like between lots of different and completely unrelated subjects.

This is not news to those who know me well, but I know you'll be kind and choose to regard this instead as a gardener's potpourri - which by the way may be one of those things due a revival (if it ever went away in this corner of Somerset...?) As you see, the urge to digress is strong. I must be firm. Here goes.

Colour palettes and spring bulbs: I've decided to get ahead for next year and note up the colour combinations I like NOW, instead of waiting for these thoughts to return to my scattered mind in autumn. I'm not convinced I'll go as far as putting in an early order now but it's been great to see combinations that have not previously charmed me now doing just that.

How about a tropical fruit cocktail: orange, cream and lemon with some purple accents including Viola cornuta varieties, white Myosotis (forget-me-nots), soft yellow Hyacinthus orientalis 'City of Haarlem' and red purple 'Woodstock', orange Erysimum allionii (wallflowers) and white Hesperis matronalis. It looks gorgeous and fresh and fun and we can all do with more of that in our lives, so they're all going on my wish list. (The photos by Cassian Schmidt on Instagram will convince you, if that's needed?)

Dahlias: mine have now all been potted up following their winter break and are showing encouraging signs of having coped with my benign neglect (again) but all the labels have got muddled up. Who cares? It'll be fun to see what emerges (if the slugs allow).

The fresh new foliage of the autumn raspberries has started to emerge and I'm so excited at the prospect of this late crop which kept on fruiting well into November last year - I'm so pleased I planted it. Sometimes I get it right.

Compost Heap: I need to be brave and find time to turn it next weekend. I decided it was on the "too difficult" list and put it off for so long last year, but of course it isn't too difficult at all. I

t has apparently attracted the attentions of a rat, so no more kitchen scraps at all, I'm just using cut up plant material. And I've decided to feel accountable to you so that next time I write, I have to report, without fail, that the heap has been turned. I just have to find a path to the compost heap through the growing

towers of stacked plastic plant pots that I've acquired over the years, all merrily slung into the space in front of the compost heap.

I re-use these pots as much as possible but even I have my limits, so the towers must be reduced somehow. They should be accepted at the Frome recycling centre on Manor Furlong but you can also offer them to others who might want them via local Freecycle groups online, and I hear that Dobbies Garden Centres will also accept plastic pots of any size/colour as long as they've been given a quick wash beforehand. So that's another job for next weekend.

Seeds: I bought a good dozen packets of exciting new seeds months ago and they're still (ahem) in their packets. Accountable to my readers (see above), I shall report on their being sown by next month. This may also prove to be a partial answer to the pot towers (also see above).

Finally my plant of the moment: Muehlenbeckia complexa which has wiry dark stems and small dark green disc-shaped leaves. It doesn't sound great, but it will climb and twine or sprawl and spread through other plants and it knits together lots of lovely shade loving plants so its great versatility makes it a planting designer favourite.

So many pearls of wisdom here, just so many....







With regard to the potential development of Barbara's Field she added that National Highways had already noted concerns over the A36, particularly the two roundabouts round Beckington and any development would need to provide S106 funds to improve these.

This was Cllr Oliver's last meeting and thanks were given to her for all the help, assistance and guidance she had given the Parish Council over the years.

## **6.** Actions from previous meeting:

i. Trees: Merfield/The Mead These trees are on private land and Somerset County Council arboriculturist had revisited the site but said as these were on private land little could be done. The owner should be

approached and ensured he had public liability insurance for them. A registered letter would be sent, with the report from a local tree expert, requesting action. A tree expert contact number had been given.

**Parish trees:** Clerk said the report from the independent tree expert, had been chased up and would be chased again.

- ii. Clock: The Clerk had received an offer from Peter Watkinson, who had made repairs in August, to come and see if he could get the striking working again from inside the Cross Keys. He hoped to come sometime in April and it was agreed to put on hold any repairs via the roof. Additionally, it was agreed that a new maintenance person should be sought for the clock due to David Hornsey's ill health.
- iii. Footpath from Church Farm to Playing field: The path was still of considerable concern. A bridge had been put in over the ditch but this was currently surfaced in large stones which were already falling into the ditch. There had been some work done on the path but its condition was still unacceptable, one key point was that the drainage required improving. Cllr Oliver suggested the S106 Planning Officer at Mendip should be contacted. Mendip Planning Enforcement had been made aware of the concerns over the path but the specific S106 Officer could well be of help. The Clerk would make contact.

It was reported that the undergrowth in the small wood was to be cleared by the playing field and the meeting agreed that initially the path through this small wood would be left without surfacing. Discussions over further fencing along the path within the S106 land were held and it was agreed quotes from Richard Arney would be obtained for general fencing and 'dog-proof' fencing.

- iv. **Mead development:** This had been reported and Mendip Planning Enforcement had registered it.
- v. **Spring Clean:** Plans were in place for this to take place on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> April. It was advertised on the Village Facebook and teas would be available in the Pavilion.
- 7. Climate Emergency Group: JM reported that 198 questionnaires had been returned and these indicated a high level of awareness and concern over climate change within Rode. The return rate had been far better than expected and the results would be publicised to the village. The Group would now consider possible actions.

#### 8. Highways:

**a) Bradford Road/Rode Hill junction:** A meeting at the crossroads with Sara Davis had been arranged to take place on 12<sup>th</sup> April.

**b) Memorandum of Understanding:** This still had to be completed and it was suggested the meeting to finalise the Memorandum took place after the crossroads meeting.

#### 9. Planning:

#### i) New applications:

**2022/0557/TPO:** To crown lift holm oak and cut down cypress – 16 High Street. No objection.

**2022/0482/HSE:** Two storey rear and side extension with front elevational changes and associated works – 11 The Mead. No objection.

#### ii. Mendip decisions:

**2021/2641/TCA:** Reduce height of apple and birch tree – 7 Langham Place. Approved

#### iii. Other:

**2021/0071/OTS:** There had been no progress with the appeal and the Clerk was waiting to hear from Mendip. An offer had been made by Simon Steel-Perkins to meet to discuss possible S106 requirements. There was concern that it would be necessary to ensure this meeting was without prejudice and in confidence; and that he understood the PC was still against the development. Again, the S106 Officer at Mendip should be consulted prior to the meeting for guidance. However, there was agreement that a meeting should be held.

- **10. Playing Field Constitution:** AP reported that a new draft had been drawn up which appeared to be satisfactory. It was up to the Playing Field to progress and to ensure the Charity Commission cleared the new agreement.
- **11. Queen's Jubilee Celebrations:** The plans for the day were progressing well, a further meeting of the organising committee was planned for the following day. The committee were very grateful to the PC for its generous contribution. It was noted that currently neighbouring villages had not planned any events for this weekend.
- **12. Death of a Senior National Figure:** The meeting agreed a separate Rode book of condolence would be used and that, providing it was agreed, be placed in Rode Chapel when required.
- **13. Elections:** It was reported that seven nominations for Councillors for the Parish Council had been submitted today being the deadline. This would mean there would be no election in Rode but there was still a vacancy for co-option. The Unitary Authority elections would take place in 5<sup>th</sup> May with two vacancies for the Frome North area.

<u>14. Buses:</u> PT reported that Somerset had been given £11.9m funding (compared to the £160m requested), although this would be of help it would not enable the plans to be implemented fully. Concern remained with bus occupancy still at only 75%. He asked for PC funding (about £150) to produce a new bus timetable for Rode residents and this was agreed. The Bus Back Better group had prepared a manifesto to send to electoral candidates and asked for PC endorsement. As this had only just been circulated and all had not seen it this would be put on the May agenda.

**15. Annual meeting:** It was agreed to hold this meeting on Monday 9<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30pm in Rode Chapel.

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
