As we look back and remember, we can also look forward with gratitude and excitement at all the opportunities to come together as a community in the next few months over Christmas and into the New Year.

As a parish we support three main charities - an international charity, a national charity, and a local charity. Over Christmas the collections from all our services are divided across these three charities.

Our international charity has recently changed, and it is now **Asha**, meaning 'hope' in Hindi, www. asha-india.org

Asha has been helping the slum dwellers of Delhi since 1988, when Dr Kiran Martin started treating cholera victims who were too poor or culturally constrained to seek help elsewhere. Now over 700,000 residents in 95 slum colonies have access to essential medical care and treatment with Asha, as well as a wide range of other support and benefits to help improve peoples' lives and bring them 'hope'.

On **Saturday 12 November 6.30pm** in St Philip and St James church Norton St Philip we are having a *Bring and Share curry supper* in aid of Asha. Their founder and a slum resident are coming to talk about life in the slums and what Asha is doing to help, see page 38 for more details. Please do come along...

Our national charity is **Safe Passage**. Every year thousands of unaccompanied child refugees arrive in Europe in search of safety. They find themselves stuck in squalid camps or sleeping rough on city streets unaware of their legal right to travel safely through Europe. Safe Passage is there to help child refugees access their rights. The headquarters of Safe Passage are in London. www.safepassage.org.uk

Our local charity is **Focus Frome**. Focus Frome works with GP surgeries, drugs and alcohol agencies, churches, housing associations, schools, universities, the police, social services, and other counselling agencies. They offer counselling to all and have funding available for those who are on a low income. www.focusbath.com

As we look forward to a time of remembering and being with others in our communities let's not forget those whose communities have been destroyed or who are simply lonely and isolated needing love and support at this time.

Let's remember them together and be pro-active in supporting them too.



RODE PLAYING FIELD PAVILION - WORRYING NEWS

Large cracks suddenly appeared last month in the walls of Rode's Pavilion.

Serious subsidence has subsequently taken place so severe that the main doors of the Pavilion couldn't be opened.



Not that this has stopped Ann and Pat from still serving teas and bacon sandwiches to the footballers each week!

But the Playing Field Committee is very concerned about the Pavilion and is arranging for an assessment to be made by a surveyor to advise on the best course of action to take... and with an estimate of cost.

The Pavilion, like the Playing Field itself, are major village assets.

There is a cost to the upkeep of such assets and the Playing Field does try to be as self-sufficient as is possible. However, given the problems with this subsidence, it is likely that an appeal will be needed to be launched seeking financial support from village residents. See page 48.

RODE CHAPEL APPEAL

We don't often write to this great journal, in fact hardly ever, except to advertise our Sunday Worship schedule and any forthcoming events.

The last series of articles were in fact reports on the development of the Village Quiet Garden and acknowledgement of the support given by so many volunteers.

The entire graveyard is now tidy, well groomed and planted and we're pleased to say has become a place of pilgrimage for many of our local community and visitors from outside. We are very grateful for those tireless volunteers who continue to give of their time and effort to keep it looking its best.

So why am I writing now?

The Chapel is once more in need of your support. It is a grade 2 listed building and needs repairs to its windows as a matter of some urgency. Our expert advice is that the problems are fixable if undertaken more or less immediately, but delay will only make the eventual repairs even more expensive.

There are 11 windows in all, two large ones behind the altar and 9 smaller ones...5 in the front wall of the chapel and two in each of the side walls.



The Fellowship have accepted an estimate for the whole job and need to raise some additional funds to meet it.

It is hoped that families or individuals might consider sponsoring individual windows, or making donations towards the total cost. There is already the promise of a one-off donation of £500, there are some limited financial resources already in hand and there is active research into grant aid. Around £15,000 is needed in total.

APPEAL FROM THE H.V. COMMUNITY GROUP FOR UKRAINE

Many people in our wonderful community have, in one way or another, helped our 80 or so Ukrainian war refugees arrive, be homed and get settled into life in rural Somerset over the last 7 months. These acts of humanity and friendship have been hugely appreciated by the Ukrainian families and we hope have been rewarding for everyone involved.

The great majority of hosts who took in a family are able to extend their hosting to beyond the first six months commitment, which is very generous of them and a reflection of the closeness of the bond that has developed. Other Ukrainian families have managed to take the step to independent living, which is wonderful, and of course the desired end result of the whole process. However, we have 3 small families for whom we need to find the next 6 months' accommodation in our community. For these folk their work income, coupled with the terrible shortage of affordable accommodation, plus landlords who won't take on tenants who have no previous UK rental history, means that we need to appeal to our community for anyone who could:

- 1. Step forward to become a new host for a family already in the community, for 6 months or longer
- 2. Consider letting out any property or annexe of their property to one of our community's families for 6 months or longer.

Two of the families need 2 bedrooms and the other family needs 1. Our experience suggests that any extra space, such as a room that can be used as their sitting room, makes a huge difference, allowing guests and hosts to be somewhat independent from each other.

Of course, as these are guests who are already registered here, there is very little of the complicated bureaucracy to battle with that potential new arrivals have to deal with, such as visa applications and so on. And once you are registered as a host, you will start to receive the monthly payment of £350 (apparently to be raised soon to £700 to help with fuel cost rises) to help with the expenses involved, until the date when they have been here for a year.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT NOVEMBER 2022

Norton St Philip Judicial Review of Mendip District Council Local Plan Part 2: I'm giving an update on this item because, although it's not strictly speaking Rode business, Rode was fully involved in the "additional hearings" for Mendip's Local Plan Part 2 (LPP2) and the outcome of the Judicial Review may well effect planning decisions in Rode in the future.

On Tuesday 18 and Wednesday 19 October I was in London with 4 other members of Norton St Philip PC to attend the JR into Mendip's LPP2 held in the Royal Courts of Justice. The trial took place in Court No 1 before the most senior planning judge in England, Mr Justice Holgate, and took two full days.

The case had certainly aroused a lot of interest - the court was full, with many Government Inspectors attending. The NSP PC barrister, Alex Greaves, with support from the PC's legal adviser, Tobias Paul from DLA Piper, presented the PC's case. This was followed by the arguments from barristers for Mendip District Council (the defendant), The Secretary of State (for the Planning Inspector) and the barrister for the developers, Lochailort and Redrow. NSP PC's barrister then had the opportunity to respond to the arguments from Mendip and interested parties (Lochailort & Redrow) before Mr Justice Holgate brought the proceedings to a close. He stated that he would try to produce his judgment as soon as possible. DLA Piper anticipate that there could hopefully be a judgment in about a month and, if not, before Christmas.

Mendip Tree Wardens: Mendip District Council piloted the Mendip Tree Wardens scheme earlier this year to help people take part in local, practical action to find out about, and support and care for wildlife and the environment in their area.

Being a Tree Warden is voluntary, and it is up to the individual or group to decide on what they want to do or get involved with. Existing volunteers are starting a community tree nursery, helping plant trees and hedges. Others are interested in taking part in Citizen Science Surveys, to record wildlife that lives in their area, such as ancient trees and woodlands, important hedges and the species that live in them. The Council can deliver the following training sessions, to help volunteers get started:

- Ancient Trees Survey using the Woodland Trust Survey forms.
- Hedgerow Surveys using the Peoples Trust for Endangered Species Survey forms.

There may be other Citizen Science Surveys to take part in too. The hope is that volunteers will survey their local areas and collect baseline information on the

wildlife within their parish. These surveys will contribute to local and national databases and help inform Mendip about the valuable local wildlife, which is frequently under-recorded.

Everyone is welcome, whether you are experienced or just beginning to learn about wildlife. So if you are interested in getting involved or want to find out more, please email climate@mendip.gov.uk

SOMERSET COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Finding creative solutions - Henry Ford famously said, "If you always do what you've always done, you'll always get what you've always got."



I wonder if we consider this enough in work, projects, communities and in life in general.

Maybe we need more creativity to find solutions to 'old' problems. Everywhere I look in my role as Somerset County Councillor, I see buds of creativity. Some ideas have resistance because we are 'creatures of habit' and continue to 'flog a dead horse', but some solutions are simple and can have a big impact. We just need to be brave and bold.

The 18th of October was World Menopause Day. Dr Helen Kingston at the Frome Medical Practice realised that a 10-minute GP appointment is not enough to discuss menopause symptoms and for questions about HRT. The Practice has, creatively, set up Menopause information sessions. I attended the first one, which was a huge success as women were given a safe space to get all the information they need to make informed decisions about their bodies.

I am always amazed at the creativity of children. In the past month, in my role as Enterprise Adviser for Selwood School, I met with staff to discuss how I can support children to understand the value of what they are learning in the classroom and to apply concepts in their everyday lives. In October they made items to sell to friends to understand business. And in November the children will be making recycled gifts for Christmas. Creativity at its best!

I was invited to Critchill School as part of a work preparation programme for children with a range of disabilities. This creatively asks people from different careers to be interviewed, by the children, about their jobs. The students consider the jobs and craft their interview questions with a deeper understanding and assessment. It was such a wonderful experience which I will be supporting again in November.

A friend of mine does a fundraising project every year. As she volunteered for the Princes' Trust in the past, she decided to fundraise for this remarkable charity. She invited those in the community she loves spending time with, and who she may not see often enough, to a delicious breakfast. We chatted, laughed, ate, and celebrated the power and strength of community. It was the perfectly creative way to spend a morning and make a difference.

Norton St Philip Parish Council has agreed to fund the re-connection of a previously purchased AutoSpeedWatch. The unit will be fitted to record persistently speeding vehicles in an easterly direction, above 40 mph. Details of how Avon and Somerset Police will handle the data are yet to be confirmed. But there is a big drive in November across the region to clamp down on speeding, so if you don't keep an eye on that dial enough, be warned!

I am 5 weeks into a 10-week philosophy course with the London School of Philosophy and Economic Science. Our 'homework' is to constantly ask, "What would a wise man / woman do?". This could mean simply not responding to a social media post, listening in a meeting without feeling I have to say something, or simply taking a step back. This has given me the opportunity to come up with solutions (without overwhelm or heightened emotion) and create something new. I hope to find more wisdom in the way I tackle life and my job, by continuing to ask the question. Fingers crossed.

I adore this time of the year as the nights draw in and the colours of the trees become richer. I find myself being more creative as I bake more, write more and I start thinking about gifts I can make for the festive season. Have a happy creative November! OUR UKRAINIAN GUESTS - NOVEMBER UPDATE

Vladimir Putin launched his invasion of Ukraine on the 24th February. That is already, as I write this, nearly 8 months ago. He may have hoped for a quick overrun of the whole country, as he achieved in Crimea in 2014, but it hasn't worked out like that. And so, for the Ukrainian guests that we have welcomed into our community, the months pass. Having hoped initially for a quick resolution of hostilities and a speedy return to Ukraine and some semblance of their old life there, it now looks increasingly difficult to imagine that happening any time soon.

The majority of our guests arrived in the initial desperate flurry, so between March and May, which means that the earlier arrivals have already come to the end of their initial 6 months, and soon they will pretty well all have got to that point. Many have now found work in and around the area, the children are all happily installed in their schools, and those who can afford it are now looking to find independent accommodation.

Their English lessons have been invaluable in getting them to this point, and the teaching provided by Bath Academy has been excellent in so many ways. The teachers have formed a real bond with the students over the last few months, and they will all be sad to come to the end of their lessons. But we have arrived at the stage where the more advanced students are spending a lot of time job hunting if they don't have a job already. So it was felt that we needed to bring the Bath Academy teaching sessions to a conclusion. We will however be continuing with the lessons funded by Somerset Council, these being primarily aimed at the less advanced students.

At this point I must offer a really heartfelt thank you to all the helpers who have driven to Bath to pick up the teachers and bring them to Rode, and then return them at the end of the classes. Without their help these classes would not have been feasible, and so we and the Ukrainians are indebted to them for their dedicated effort over many months!

There are still issues for our guests to overcome, but on the whole these are more the issues that everyone in the community has to deal with. The one that comes to mind and has been discussed in the hosts' WhatsApp group recently is the difficulty (or rather impossibility) of getting registered with an NHS dentist. But as I say, this is not a problem specifically for the Ukrainians.

And then there are several unresolved issues around driving / cars / licenses / insurance and so on. But slowly these are being resolved one way or another.

Meanwhile the Ukrainians are gradually and successfully being integrated into the community, so they have become less of a self-contained 'refugee' group and more just ordinary folk going about their business. And from the point of view of a Rode resident, the restoration of the D2 bus service to Rode means the Ukrainians (and we!) can travel to Bath so much more easily, a real bonus.

My Personal Note:

Our three guests will have been here for 3 months by the time you read this, and they have become very well settled in. We left them on their own in the house in September as we were abroad, but they were well supported by our buddies Jane and Martin, and Sue, so we had no real concerns. And with the Internet and instant communication these days, it doesn't seem you are really ever out of contact, even when in a lodge in the Amazon jungle!

Volodymyr continues to find leads for his company back in Ukraine, which provides personal self-contained self-rescue safety equipment to outfits involved in underground work, tunnelling and so on. The kit comes into use when people are trapped in a confined space, and will provide a supply of oxygen for anything up to 3 hours, which can of course be life-saving. Olena is developing various software projects, and when she showed me her code the other day, it brought back nostalgic memories of when I used to write software for a living! Meanwhile, Volodymyr's mother Lilia is currently back in Kyiv, clarifying her work situation. Apparently if she doesn't turn up in person she can be dismissed, which seems a bit harsh in the current situation.

Despite their inevitable concerns, still they manage to remain cheerful and upbeat, a real pleasure to have living with us, not just a duty.

We share meals together from time to time and sit chewing the international cud round the table for hours at a time, often discussing the finer points of English grammar. For example the other day we were talking about the use of 'either...or' and its negative counterpart 'neither... nor'. I then realised that though we may say 'I am not going' with the response 'Neither am I', if we say 'I am going' we do not respond with 'Either am I', we say 'So am I'. This they found somewhat confusing (me too when I thought about it!). But we also talk of their hopes and aspirations for the future, all the more sad and difficult given the state of limbo they find themselves in at the moment, with no prospect of an early resolution.

Who know what the months ahead have in store for us all?

MDC RODE DRAINAGE PROJECT - LATEST NEWSLETTER

Since our last newsletter to you in March 2022, the project team has been working hard through the tender process to appoint a contractor to undertake the long awaited infrastructure improvements to the village.



Through this process it became clear that additional funding needed to be secured to deliver the extent of works that we felt were crucial to the long term flood resilience of the village. The rising fuel prices and costs of materials are partly to blame, but we also did not know at the time of the initial funding award for Rode what the CCTV surveys would find.

We are pleased to inform you that the **Somerset Rivers Authority** (SRA) Board approved the additional funding in September (circa £200,000) to deliver the full scope of works.

We can confirm that works for the **Rode Drainage Project** are now due to commence on **7 November 2022**.

The programme for the works is expected to be **6 weeks**, with completion anticipated by **16 December 2022**.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the whole community for your continued support on this project. We appreciate that it has taken us a long time to get to this stage, so thank you for your patience.

THERE'S BURIED TREASURE IN THESE PARTS!

I was so pleased to get this story from Shirley Sargent about Will's exciting find in Laverton. Will and a family friend often spend time with their metal detectors on the land around the farm.

They were excited to recently discover a small silver lion, which on closer inspection turned out to be part of a spoon. The item is now in the safe hands of the British History Museum and the Coroner has opened an inquest as the item has been classed as treasure. Below is an excerpt from their findings so far.



Find: silver spoon terminal. Description: An incomplete Post-Medieval silver spoon terminal. It is a lion couchant, facing. It is a detailed depiction with body, legs and head realistically depicted and with engraving to show fur. The head, however, appears to have been modelled on the face of a person, with hair, in 17th century long style (rather than a mane) heavy eyebrows and moustache but no beard. Possibly allegorical alluding to Charles II. The lion is moulded in such a way as to lie flat on its stomach and folded legs, with the very top of the shaft/stem of the oval section spoon handle evident within a rectangular plinth at the tail of the animal. There is a maker's mark stamped on the lion's back, possibly reading H.C. The spoon handle was lost to an early break. Date: c. AD 1650-1700 Discussion: no direct parallel in metalwork has been found.

Well done Will - keep up with the detecting!

The Antiquities Liaison Officer has said it is unlikely the item will ever be returned to Laverton but will be exhibited in a museum somewhere.

Historians tend to work at a fairly slow pace - when an item is 400 years old – what's another few months!

Watch this space for a further update on the Laverton Lion!

WHY CAN'T I SEE MY GP?

A good question and I have every sympathy for anyone asking it at the moment, as the NHS struggles in almost every area with a mismatch between demand and resources.

Our team are working as hard as they safely and sustainably can and yet appointments are often still in short supply: our practice team provided almost 85,000 appointments last year, with the majority of those being face-to-face.



Looking ahead in hope, some good news to impart:

Firstly, direct booking of face-to-face appointments with GPs is back! From the beginning of October, we have been offering pre-bookable routine appointments with a choice of face to face or telephone, subject to availability. We receive feedback that both appointment types are very valued and so are offering a mixture. Requests for acute on-the-day care with our GPs and Advanced Nurse Practitioners will continue to be 'phone first', as this allows us to prioritise the most acutely unwell and make sure that those presenting with an urgent medical need are seen at the most appropriate time and place, by the most appropriate person.

Secondly, I am pleased to announce that Roxine has joined our team as our second ANP. ANPs have additional training to provide on-the-day care for acute medical problems and exacerbations as a GP would, allowing us to release GPs from this to routine and complex care, so that we can get back to offering continuity of care and management of long-term problems in pre-booked routine appointments. Our ANP team are key to us being able to provide more routine face-to-face GP appointments in future.

So, if you think you need on-the-day acute medical care, you may well speak to or see an ANP and not a GP. Our four first contact physiotherapists are also able to assess, diagnose and treat patients presenting with musculoskeletal problems at first presentation with shorter wait times than GPs.

We are now on Facebook! Check us out for news and useful information.

Finally, I would encourage you to get your COVID and influenza immunisations, if eligible: we may well be facing a very tough winter ahead.

A CHARITY WORKING IN EAST AFRICA MOVES TO RODE

CHASE Africa has recently moved to an office at Barrow Farm in Rode.

I have been lucky enough to have visited Kenya many times over the last 45 years. My father-in-law was in the safari world and we had some wonderful trips into wild places. It was thrilling to see Africa's extraordinary range of wildlife, many related to species we in the 'developed' world had hunted to extinction many years ago.



But each trip was tinged with a sense of sadness as a rapidly increasing number of people were living in poverty, and what had been wild land, was now cleared for settlement and agriculture.

My wife's family lived close to a shrinking forest and determined to try and make a difference I founded a charity called the Rift Valley Tree Trust in 2000.

We began to plant trees in schools, woodlots on small farms, and along watercourses. It was through the course of this work that I had some fascinating conversations with women about the challenges they faced. What became very clear was that most of them these women would like to have had fewer children and to have been able to look after them better, but that this wasn't an option as there was no access to family planning.

It became very obvious that there was a link between poverty, the disappearing forest and the lack of family planning. The Rift Valley Tree Trust changed its name to Community Health and Sustainable Environments (CHASE) Africa in 2012.

Since then we have supported organisations in East Africa to start projects which provide access to sexual and reproductive health information and services, such as family planning.

We continue to plant trees to protect the environment and build resilience to climate change.

We focus on reaching marginalised, rural communities who have an unmet need for family planning, poor access to health services generally and whose lives and livelihoods are heavily depending on natural resources, so there are strong connections between environmental and human health.

In recent years, CHASE Africa has established an effective approach of working with conservation organisations, to support them to engage in community health projects, including addressing issues around lack of access to family planning

I think most people can agree that Planet Earth cannot cope with an everincreasing human population. How many people the world can support, where we all have a reasonable standard of living, and where we can start to repair the damage we have done to the natural world, depends on many things. What we all consume is a primary issue.

Africa's population is predicted to double by 2050. Umpteen millions of people already live in dire poverty and a rapidly increasing population will only increase the pressure on what is, in many places, an increasingly depleted environment. Coupled with the fact that Africa is facing the added burden of climate change, giving women the chance to choose how many children they would like to have can only point to a brighter future for those that live there.

CHASE Africa is participating in the Big Give Christmas Challenge fundraising week from the 29^{th} of November until the 6^{th} of December. Any donations in this week will be doubled as part of the campaign. There will be a live link on our website to this campaign www.chaseafrica.org.uk

It costs us just £5 to give a couple family planning for a year. This gives the opportunity for a family to break out of poverty and to give their children a much better start in life We would be very grateful for any support.

NOVEMBER GARDEN NOTES

I managed to sneak in a day trip to RHS Wisley recently on the most glorious autumnal day. I drove along the A303 and the M3, in and out of rolling mists, but by the time I parked up the sun was out and the sky was one huge uninterrupted expanse of intense azure. Glorious.

There was a lot to enjoy at Wisley, but the autumnal trees were outstanding. It reminded me of RHS Chelsea Flower Show autumn of 2021, when the Queen's Green Canopy garden project was launched: 'Plant a Tree for the Jubilee' - every county in the UK was invited to create a network of trees, tree-lined avenues, copses and woodlands in honour of Her Majesty's 70 years of service to the nation. Following the death of HM Queen Elizabeth II the project has been extended until the end of March 2023, so there's still plenty of time to chose and plant your own tree. I've got a few recommendations below for slightly unusual small to medium-sized trees that really show off their autumn foliage but if you don't think you have the space, I've also included a couple of suggestions for shrubs and perennials that also give a fiery autumnal glow in the garden. Surely there's something there to pique your curiosity and inspire you to get planting?

Trees:

- Amelanchier whether lamarckii, 'Robin Hill', 'Ballerina' or any of the other varieties, all have delightful colour in the autumn
- Parrotia persica Persian ironwood with flaking bark and colourful leaves
- Cercydiphyllum japonicum the tree that smells of burnt sugar in autumn
- Nyssa sylvatica a native curiously not so well-known, it's lovely
- Acer griseum chosen for its peeling bark, especially in low autumn sunlight
- Malus (crab apples) & Prunus (cherry trees) most have great autumn colours
- Liquidambar styraciflua a bigger tree but boy is it worth the space it takes!

Shrubs:

- Euonymus Alataus lots of different spindle varieties to choose from, it's called the burning bush for a reason!
- \bullet Euonymus europaeus 'Red Sentinel' any type of Euonymus, with fascinating berries and foliage
- Cotinus one of my all time favourites. Depending on the variety, it'll have plum/purple foliage through the year but it's outstanding in the autumn
- Viburnum plicatum 'Mariesii' wide branching & tiered, strong autumn colour
- Vaccinium corymbosum aka the blueberry bush really good autumn colour as well as the delicious berries
- Callicarpa bodinieri var giraldii 'Profusion' the beauty berry, slightly weird purple berries. I find them a bit too psychedelic in colour, you might like them?

A Parishioners Challenging Experience

SWIMMING THE NORTH COAST OF LESVOS

Back in November 2018 I spent a month volunteering with a small humanitarian charity called Lighthouse Relief on the north coast of Lesvos, Greece. Lesvos had been at the forefront of the refugee crisis in 2015 and 2016 when thousands of refugees were arriving every day. Although numbers were much reduced by 2018, there was still much to be done. And, after returning from my stint as a volunteer, in 2019 I started to work formally with the charity and have done ever since.

The Idea: Whilst on a short visit to Lesvos in the summer of 2019 I had the idea of doing a swim to raise money for Lighthouse. Not that I'm a swimmer! At the time I couldn't even swim front crawl and was pretty nervous about the sea.

But I knew, if I was going to ask people to sponsor me, I needed to do something that would really stretch me. My initial plan was to do the swim in the summer of 2020. However, Covid intervened, and then, in early 2021, I started suffering with tendinopathy in my right shoulder, which basically meant I couldn't swim. A long period of rehabilitation followed, but I eventually set a date - 1st October 2022. The swim itself was to be 6km, the distance from the Turkish shore to the "safety" of the Greek border, halfway between Turkey and Lesvos. It would have been impossible to replicate that exact journey, but 6km was also the distance from the lighthouse at Korakas (which inspired the name of the charity) to the fishing village of Skala Sikamineas where the charity had been based, and that's the route I followed.

Preparation: There were three things I needed to do to prepare myself for the swim — 1. Overcome my fear of sea swimming and get used to swimming a reasonable distance in the open sea; 2. Sort out my shoulder; 3. Get fit! To address the first issue, I went on a few holidays with a small company called Swimquest. These trips were invaluable, specially the most recent one where I was able to gradually get accustomed to swimming 2km-3km in the open sea, in a safe environment. To manage my shoulder, I had a great physio and tried to follow his exercise regime as closely as possible. It needed a lot of patience, but I stuck with it. And with fitness, I soon realised there were no shortcuts, especially as I'm now the grand old age of 60! I had a simple routine involving two or three visits to the pool every week. I gradually ramped up the distances, so that in the final month I was doing 2km or 2.5km every time I went to the pool. Ideally I would have swum a bit further, but I'm rather slow, and to be honest doing 100+ lengths in the pool can be a bit tedious!

The Swim: The swim almost didn't go ahead as planned. On the eve of the big day, one of the guys who had helped organise everything rang me to tell me there was a problem. It turned out that we needed to get permission from the Hellenic Coast Guard to do the swim. My immediate thought was that classic Greek bureaucracy was going to cause the whole thing to be abandoned. However, after further consultation, and a trip to see a very jovial coast guard in the nearest town, I signed a rather forbidding document which, as far as I could tell, basically gave the coast guard the right not to rescue me if I got in trouble! After that, they were very happy to wish me luck and allow the swim to proceed.

On the day, the sea was colder than anticipated. Luckily I'd taken a wetsuit with me, but as I hadn't done any training in a wetsuit it took me at least half an hour to get used to it, which didn't help my initial anxiety levels!

Plus, I had multiple other anxieties: jellyfish, cramp, my shoulder, the weather, my general fitness levels.... But most of all, I was very much out of my comfort zone and attempting



something that was significantly more challenging than I'd ever done before. Also, because I was raising money for charity, I had to be very public about the swim, and I was absolutely dreading the prospect of potentially telling my sponsors that I had failed.

I anticipated that the first few kilometres would be mentally the toughest, and this proved to be the case. It took me ages to get my breathing right, and the novelty of swimming in a wetsuit made it worse. I had two techniques to combat the demons. Firstly, I just focused on my stroke and tried to banish every other thought from my head. And, when I found the doubts and fears filtering in, I thought about an amazing family member who is fighting leukaemia and reminded myself how brave she is. That was very inspiring. And, with a bit of help from a following wind, I managed to complete the swim in just under 2 hours. I was extremely relieved!

Hopefully my swim will have helped raise awareness that the refugee crisis in Greece isn't over, and also provided some much needed funds for Lighthouse's vital work. It was also a great lesson for me personally, as it helped to prove that I could overcome my fears and do something pretty challenging. 





Volunteer to be an Independent Visitor or Advocate for children in Somerset.

These are fascinating and inspiring opportunities, which can bring real benefits to vulnerable children and young people (travel and reasonable expenses are reimbursed).

You can help children and young people understand their rights and ensure that their views, wishes and feelings are heard.

What is an Independent Visitor?

Independent Visitors are volunteers who befriend and spend time with a child or young person who is in the care of the Local Authority. By law all local authorities have to provide an Independent Visitor service.

In Somerset our intention is to encourage the relationship between the Independent Visitor and young person to continue beyond care. This way the care leavers continue to benefit from support, while making the transition to young adulthood. Independent Visitors are highly valued by the young people as they may be the only person involved in their lives who is not paid to be there.

What is an Advocate?

An Advocate is an independent person who can offer one-to-one support to children and young people to have their voice heard when meetings are taking place concerning their wellbeing.

It's the role of the Advocate to speak up for the young person, make them aware of their rights, listen to them and represent their views, wishes and feelings. Why not join our bank of advocates? You chose when you're available.

Your volunteering can be arranged to suit your availability. Your life experience will be highly valued and you will be trained and supported in developing key skills.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 4th OCTOBER 2022 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR) and Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB)

In attendance: Cllr Dawn Denton, Hugh Williams – Clerk and 2 parishioners.

1. Public Participation: There were still problems on the Bradford Road with the hedge by the empty (for sale) house forcing pedestrians into the road, the Clerk had approached County Roads regarding this and a work number had been assigned but nothing had happened. He agreed to chase up. [Clerk's Note: This should be done within 7 days.]

There was comment that Mendip should remain consistent in its objection to the development on Barbara's Field. The Chair said that Mendip were still against this development.

The PC was asked about the flying of the Ukrainian flag and it was agreed this would only be flown on the country's significant days (with 14th October being the next one – Defenders of Ukraine Day).

- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr J McAuliffe, Cllr A Pickett, Cllr B Lund (District Councillor) and Cllr A Boyden (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 6^{th} September were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.
- **5. Report from District Councillor:** Cllr Lund's report had been circulated to the PC. There was support for the Mendip motion on river quality although it was uncertain what action could be taken. The Energy Saver website was a good place for people to look for energy tips (https://somersetenergysaver.co.uk/).
- <u>6. Report from County Councillor:</u> Cllr Denton reported that Somerset County Council was struggling financially with overspend in some areas. The Local Community Networks (LCNs) were still the subject of a survey and it was possible this could be extended to 1st November. People across Somerset were encouraged to have a flu jab and also a Covid booster jab.

7. Actions from previous meeting:

- i. Trees: Merfield/The Mead: Cllr Lund had chased Bo Walsh as to who should write to the owners regarding the state of the trees, but had not had a reply. [Clerk's Note: We have now heard Mendip will write to David James on this issue.]
- ii. Ultrafast broadband: Gigaclear had held an information evening and were still optimistic as to when Rode would have full fibre available. However, Voneus had gone quiet and it was unlikely fibre (via Gigaclear) would be in the village until late 2023. The base for the Gigaclear box had been put in on Lower Street so some progress was being made albeit later than promised.
- iii. Bradford Road Hedge: See under 1. Public Participation.
- iv. Dog bin on Marsh Road and trees: Grant Slade had moved the bin further up Marsh Road.
- v. Slip road onto A36: Videos were now available of vehicles stopping on the slip road and it was agreed that National Highways should be approached again to see what can be done to stop people parking on the slip road. Cllr Denton agreed to speak to Sara Davis at Somerset Highways to see if she had any contacts or the best way to take this forward with National Highways.
- **vi. Fire Plan:** Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue had informed the PC that they do have fire plans for rural areas. However, it was agreed that Frome Fire Service should be approached to come to Rode to see if any actions should be taken to reduce fire risks.
- **8.** Climate Change Group: The Big Green Weekend had taken place this on 10/11 September and this had been well attended and the PC thanked Jim McAuliffe for arranging this. It was agreed that another one should be held but there was a need to try and encourage younger people to attend, especially as they would be the most effected by climate change.
- **9. Highways: A361 by the church:** The wall had been hit again and damaged, there was concern that the insurance premiums could rise significantly as the wall had now been hit three times in recent years. Cllr Denton agreed to approach Sara Davis to see if there were any traffic calming measures that could be carried out to try and reduce accidents on these bends. Although a 30mph zone traffic often exceeded this limit. It was agreed traffic flow figures would also be given to Sara Davis.

10. Planning:

i) New applications:

2022/1846/TCA: Fell birch tree -1 Hughes Court. The meeting had no objections to this but was concerned that a tree was being felled in a conservation area and this comment would be made to Mendip.

2022/1877/TCA: Reduce height of apple tree by 2.5m and spread by 2m; reduce height of magnolia by 3m and spread by 1m - 17 High Street. No objections.

ii. Mendip decisions:

None.

iii. Other:

2021/0071/OTS: DLA Piper had been sent the PC questions and their responses had been received and circulated. There was some discussion over how the challenge to Mendip's refusal would be conducted and it was agreed that Mendip should be approached to enquire by what route it would like the appeal to be heard.

- **11. Playing Field Constitution:** This still had to progress. However, it was brought to the PC's attention that there were structural problems with the pavilion with cracking, probably caused by the dry summer. A builder was to inspect the building and it was agreed that as the building was used by the public a structural engineer's inspection should be carried out. JB would give AE details of a company who could do this.
- **12. Church Farm:** It was reported that Mendip is inclined to refuse the application to allow two affordable houses to be sold on the open market. This decision would be contrary to the Rode PC and residents' position which would favour this change in ownership as part of a condition to substantially improve the path from Church Farm to the village. It is likely that the final decision will go to the Mendip Planning Board. Autograph Homes had been chased up over gravel etc. for improving the 'bridge area'.
- 13. Local Community Networks:

 The Chair reported he had attended a meeting where recommendations were given on how to respond to the survey. It had been pointed out that the questions regarding the roles that the LCNs should have should have a 'very important' answer given to many of these otherwise there would be no point in having LCNs. The meeting worked through the questions on the survey and agreed 'very important' to most of the roles. Discussion favoured a smaller number of LCNs across Somerset, this would give the LCN greater power through weight of numbers represented by the LCN but would unfortunately reduce the power of any individual parish council within the LCN. The Clerk agreed to complete and submit the survey.

14. Buses: PT reported that very unexpectedly First Bus had agreed to reintroduce a greatly improved service running through Rode. This would include buses on a Sunday for the first time in years as well as an improved evening service and regular daytime service to Bath for the first time in seven years. Unfortunately, this improved service would only initially run for six months as a trial and therefore it was essential people used the buses as much as possible. The meeting thanked PT for his work in improving bus services and unanimously agreed to fund the printing of new timetables for distribution to all households in Rode.

15. Allotments: To be actioned.

16. Drainage work: It was noted that work to improve and repair the drains and culverts etc. in Rode was scheduled to start on 7th November.
