#### REFLECTION

'We have a glut, help yourself' was the sign on the box of veggies in the porch in Norton St Philip church – so I did!

Outside a house on Church Lane in Rode there was a tray with a few cucumbers and another sign saying: 'Free cucumbers – Please Take'.

Then as I sat down to write this piece there was a knock on the door and someone arrived with a box full of home-grown vegetables for me!

We live in a place of abundance and being on the receiving end of generosity has been so lovely!



But I wonder if you have ever been in a house of someone who hoards? I have been a hoarder - I hoarded packages of cheese sauce when I lived in China. Cheese was not available in Chinese supermarkets so I would bring packets of dried cheese sauce back in my suitcases whenever I visited UK. When I packed up to leave China there was a cheese-sauce mountain in my kitchen cupboards - most of the packets were years past their sell-by-date and had to be thrown away!

Hoarding happens because of fear and greed. At the start of the pandemic people rushed to the supermarkets to stock up on toilet rolls! But there have been other types of hoarding too.

The BMJ reports that the US had already thrown out more than 180,000 expired vaccine doses by the end of March while the BBC reported on the 9<sup>th of</sup> September that 40,000 vaccine doses were wasted in Wales with the amount of wastage probably even higher in other parts of the UK.

At a press conference on 21 July WHO's director general, Tedros Ghebreyesus, said, "Over 3.5 billion vaccines have been distributed globally, but more than 75% of those have gone to just 10 countries. Vaccine inequity is not only a moral failure, it is also epidemiologically and economically self-defeating."

The issue is complicated, it involves logistics, legalities and licences, but essentially hoarding means that others go without - it comes down to greed and injustice.

In Luke 12 Jesus told a story about a man who hoarded: "The farm of a certain rich man produced a terrific crop. He talked to himself: 'What can I do? My barn isn't big enough for this harvest.' Then he said, 'Here's what I'll do: I'll tear down my barns and build bigger ones. Then I'll gather in all my grain and goods, and I'll say to myself, Self, you've done well! You've got it made and can now retire. Take it easy and have the time of your life!' <sup>20</sup> "Just then God showed up and said, 'Fool! Tonight you die. And your barnful of goods—who gets it?' <sup>21</sup> "That's what happens when you fill your barn with Self and not with God."

In November the UK will host the COP26 UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow. This is a key time for our planet. Will we choose to stop consuming, hoarding and destroying the earth's resources or will we decide we want to share them with our poorer neighbours and protect them for our descendants?

Here in Hardington Vale Parish, during our October Sunday Services we will be focussing on this amazing world God has given us to enjoy and we will be thinking about how we can be part of the solution rather than the problem (these talks will be available online too).



We will also have an interactive display -The Time is Now -which will help us think and pray about this global issue (16 - 30 October in St Philip and St James NSP, and 1-13 November at The Chapel in Rode).

These will be suitable for all, so do pop in and take a moment to think and perhaps pray.

Our community is incredibly generous – if we don't want our homegrown beans and tomatoes to go to waste, I know we will want to be involved in making a difference to climate change through prayer and action!

## **NEWS FROM ST LAWRENCE**

We would like to thank everyone who contributed to the success of the bottle stall on August Bank Holiday. First of all, thanks go to the RPF Committee who organised the Village Day, without which nothing else would have been possible. Then there are the people who contributed the bottles. The generous response to



our request for bottles was well beyond our expectations, to a point where we thought we would have a substantial number left over. However, the people who turned up on the day and bought tickets were equally generous. Consequently, no bottles of any significance were left and just over £500 was made. Finally, our thanks go to those who helped on the day to make it such a success.

We reported in the August Link that the Reverend Alex Holmes would be leaving during August to take up a new parish at Westbury-Sub-Mendip with Easton. There was a Licensing Service held at Westbury-sub-Mendip in the middle of September and so she is now the official incumbent in that parish. We wish her well in her new post and hope she may cross the Mendips occasionally to come and visit us in Rode. Reverend Jo Robinson has now moved into the vicarage on Church Lane in Rode and we know she has already met lots of Rode people on her dog walks around the village.

We have recently received a donation of £130 under a scheme (Trust130) run by Ecclesiastical Insurance Company. Briefly, this has arisen as a result of someone taking out a house insurance policy with that company and nominating our church as the beneficiary under the scheme. This is not a recommendation to take out a policy with that particular company, but, if your research leads you to them anyway, it would be helpful if St Lawrence could be mentioned in relation to the scheme. Details are on the Ecclesiastical website.

In October we will be resuming our pre-Covid Service patterns so as well as the Holy Communion Services held on the first and third Sundays of the month at 10.30am I am delighted to say that Breakfast Church will be returning on the 10<sup>th of</sup> October (second Sunday) at 9am and the Informal Service on the fourth Sunday (in October this will be the 24<sup>th</sup>). Breakfast Church had been running for four and half years before Covid struck and it was a very popular service involving wonderful music from Steve, Becky and Mirjam, breakfast, activities for children and a talk with discussion. There's no need to book, just turn up at 9am and you'll be made very welcome. Hope to see many of you on the 10<sup>th of</sup> October.

**Somerset Waste Partnership:** Recycle sites switch to winter hours on 1 October - Every one of Somerset's 16 recycle sites will go over to their winter timetables from Friday 1 October, with weekday opening hours of 9am to 5pm while weekends remain 9am to 4pm. "With impressive recycling



rates of up to 72%, Somerset's recycle sites network is open every day of the year except Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day to take dozens of materials." For more information on each recycle site, including opening schedules. details of charged materials, and van and trailer permits, click on recycling centres at somersetwaste.gov.uk. To keep up to date with recycle site changes, sign up for the SWP e-newsletter at somersetwaste.gov.uk and follow @Somersetwaste on Facebook or Twitter. Collections Service update as of 22<sup>nd</sup> September - It is expected that there will be full crew deployment for all recycling, rubbish and garden rounds, though misses can happen for other reasons. The ongoing national driver shortage means services are fragile. Recruitment, retention and close monitoring of the Covid situation continues." Residents are encouraged to report any missed collections after 7pm on due day each time using My Waste Services at www.somersetwaste.gov.uk

**Somerset Coronavirus Support Helpline:** A single phone number continues to be available for anyone is Somerset who needs coronavirus related support 0300 790 6275, is open seven days a week from 8am to 6pm.

**Somerset steps up to support Afghan refugees:** People across Somerset have been stepping forward to help support Afghan refugees as the crisis being played out in the international spotlight deepens. Somerset County Council is committed to help a scheme to house Afghans who supported British military and to resettle interpreters and translators.

Local residents have done our county proud offering spare rooms, lodgings and entire houses to help out. The Council anticipates the Government will fund a number of places for refugees through its resettlement programmes. These programmes have strict rules on the types and locations of suitable accommodation. "It has been an amazing response and I want to acknowledge all those who have offered their time, help and even lodgings or spare rooms," said Cllr David Fothergill, Leader of Somerset County Council. "Sadly, we are unable to place refugees in temporary accommodation. We have had a number of very generous people offer self-contained flats and houses and that is the type of accommodation that we need."

Most resettled Afghans will be housed in town centres where they can access

specific foods, medicines and transport to link with other communities. Anyone who would like to help in anyway please contact us at resettlement@somerset.gov.uk and we can put you in touch with partners and voluntary groups doing great work in this crisis. ## Queen's Green Canopy tree-planting initiative for Platinum Jubilee:

Somerset residents, communities, and organisations are being asked to join a national initiative to plant trees in celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Next year will mark 70 years since HM The Queen came to the throne – the longest reign in our history. There are various plans for celebrations to mark her Platinum Jubilee, including a 4 day Bank Holiday from Thursday 2 June through to Sunday 5 June. As part of the celebrations, HRH The Prince of Wales has devised a project called The Queen's Green Canopy, which is designed to leave a legacy in memory of his mother's reign for many generations to come.

The idea is for people – both individuals and organisations – to plant as many trees as possible around the country during the tree-planting seasons that run from October 2021 through to March 2022, and again from October 2022 to the end of next year. This initiative will not only celebrate the Queen's long reign but also have a positive impact on the environment and help to counter the damaging effects of climate change. And it should provide a useful educational opportunity for young people – and perhaps not so young people, too. To learn more about the project, visit: www.queensgreencanopy.org. This provides advice about how best to select and plant trees. **Carbon Reduction:** Over half of street lighting is Somerset is now ecofriendly and playing an important role helping the county work towards 2030 carbon neutral target. SCC's Highway Lighting Team has started to reduce its carbon footprint in the past 5 years thanks to the installation of LED lanterns in 56% of street lighting stock. The LED replacements have seen a reduction in carbon produced per year, down from 9,522 tonnes in 2015/16 to 3,278 tonnes in 2020/21: a reduction of 6,244 tonnes of Co2 and resulting in 31.75% of energy saving equal to £950,000 per year.

## **NEWS UPDATE FROM BECKINGTON FAMILY PRACTICE**

We have now started booking appointments for annual flu vaccinations for eligible patients. If you are over 50 years old or/and have a chronic condition, please telephone us on 01373 830006 between 2pm and 5pm to book your appointment.



Covid Booster vaccinations will be offered in collaboration with our primary care network practices at Shape Mendip in Shepton Mallet. Eligible patients will be contacted by Shape Mendip to book an appointment – these cannot be booked by telephoning the practice.

Those of you old enough to remember the BBC Test Card may recall the phrase 'normal service will be resumed shortly'. Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic means that for us and the NHS as a whole, this is still some way off and a difficult winter lies ahead.

We are conducting more than 100 extra appointments a week to try and meet the unprecedented levels of demand but, in common with hospital services, ambulance services and GP surgeries across the country delays are inevitable. We are working as hard as we can to do as much as we can but there are still limits to what we can safely and sustainably do, despite good levels of staffing.

A national shortage of blood bottle supplies has not helped but this is now easing. On a positive note, our new Advanced Nurse Practitioner Jane Holmes joins the team at the beginning of October and will work alongside the GPs to offer on the day appointments for acute medical problems, which will increase our capacity to help those needing to be spoken to or seen on the day and free up GPs to offer more pre-bookable appointments, enabling our patients to book ahead to see their usual GP more easily. She will also help cover our sessions at Frome Community Hospital.

Dr Tippin now joins Dr Wooding and I as GP Trainers and Dr Matthew Cowan will join us as a second trainee in October.

GP appointments continue to be 'phone first' in order to limit waiting room overcrowding, protect our most vulnerable patients and prioritise requests on the basis of medical need, but we are seeing increasing numbers face to face following this. We thank you for your continuing patience.

# **Parish Ecology**

## **RODE CLIMATE EMERGENCY GROUP**

As you probably know, Rode Parish Council declared a "Climate Emergency" earlier this year.

That was the easy bit!

We now need to focus on what concrete actions we as a community can take to reduce our carbon footprint. Most of us will already be taking a whole range of steps to limit our impact on the planet. But I think we all acknowledge we need to do a lot more.



The Climate Emergency Group has been set up to help us as individuals, and groups (e.g. the Parish Council) to do more.

There are currently nine members of the group (although we'd welcome others!). We held our first meeting in mid-September and started to form some ideas.

Broadly, our objectives will be to initiate, inform, educate, encourage, and (where specific projects are identified) potentially get involved in helping to manage those projects. But the group itself is small, and we don't have the resources, or the expertise, to deliver solutions ourselves...hence the emphasis on initiating and encouraging!

So – what are we looking at? Here's a list of some of the things we'll be considering over the next few months:

- Collaborate and share ideas with similar groups in Norton St Philip and Beckington
- Holding a series of talks on climate-related issues likely to be of interest in Rode (probably initially via Zoom over this autumn/winter, but hopefully in-person next spring/summer)
- Ask the Parish Council to undertake an audit of its property and activities
  to assess the level of climate impact, and identify actions which the PC
  could take to reduce its own carbon footprint
- Signpost residents to ways in which we can calculate our own carbon footprint, and/or better understand the changes we can make which will impact climate change most effectively

# **Parish Ecology**

- Tree-planting and re-wilding. Discuss with the Playing Field Committee ways in which the Playing Field (including the \$106 land) can be used to reduce the carbon footprint of the village. Look at other re-wilding opportunities (including in individuals' own gardens). Support the PC in its plan to follow the "No Mow May" philosophy on small areas of PC owned land
- Investigate the potential to install at least one electric vehicle charging point in the village
- Investigate the potential for additional allotments in the village (there is currently a waiting list of 13, and we only have a dozen plots at the moment)
- Ensure we can identify potential grants that may be available for "green" initiatives
- Look at ways to get Rode young people, including the Scouts and the school (and other village groups) involved in local Climate actions (and help with actions they may already be taking, where possible)
- Transport is key every effort to be made to support/encourage use of public transport
- Investigate the issues surrounding solar panel installation within a Conservation Area

That's quite an agenda to start with, and we're a small group – so, if you think you have some expertise, experience, or energy to get involved in any of the above, please let us know.

In particular, if you have ideas for a speaker or a subject for one of our Climate talks, please get in touch.

And if you have other ideas about what we, as a village, should be doing to combat the Climate Emergency, contact us.


# **Parish Farming**

## **AUTUMN IS IN THE AIR, HARVESTING THE MAIZE**

The morning dew is very apparent now, along with distinctly shorter days; quite dark by 8pm.

Lots of cutting back in the gardens as we ready them for whatever Autumn brings.

Personally, I don't think we are finished with the warmth and we may yet get a flurry of sunshine as this edition arrives in your letterbox. I stand corrected... there are still some Housemartins about; the third brood having fledged and can be seen practising their flying, feeding and gaining strength for the long journey they will soon be embarking upon!

The trees are just on the turn and soon we will be enjoying all the colours of Autumn. I noticed that some farmers have managed to get a third cut for silage or hay, which will be a bonus when winter arrives. There is plenty of foraging to be had; plump blackberries and sloes go well with a bottle of gin! My cousin has just picked the last of her raspberries and is awash with tomatoes all ripening at once.

**Fine Foods:** Our Factory Shop is getting busier and open now on Saturday mornings between 10-1pm. As we start to think about the 'gifting season' look out for our hampers and gift boxes, having been a huge success last year. We can process the order and send on to recipient of your choice, making gifting easier all round. We are also hoping to add a gift-wrapping service too.

Talks and Tours continue to be popular. Our Demonstration Kitchen can also be hired for events or just a bigger space for preparation. Next Tour Thursday 20/10/21 10.30-1 p.m.

Farmer's Markets: The Frome Independent returned on Sunday 5 September and was well attended. Everyone was so pleased to be able to celebrate all that is Frome once again. Axbridge 2/10 Nailsea 16/10

Shows/Events: October takes us to the Wells Food Festival on Sunday 10th, a great family day out situated in the lovely city of Wells. Stalls are placed around the Moat, in the adjacent field and through into the Market Place. Well worth a visit; the Cathedral too.

# **Parish Farming**

**Farm:** Finally, our harvest is in and now is the time to be looking to ready the ground for our winter barley and wheat crop. Farming is never straightforward and we are now faced with a delay in the processing of seed and awaiting delivery! Orders are always placed in good time but with Britain leaving the EU, many difficulties have presented themselves. They are not insurmountable but cause a lot of head scratching, discussion and additional worry. The Fertiliser we use is a liquid fertiliser and so the problems with the shortage of gas, will not affect us. It is at this time of year that we start to tidy our hedges and can get into the fields without crops. The turnaround is very tight so Angus is already out trimming away. There is always plenty of groundwork to be covered and it is much better if this can be done without too much rain. Our choice of minimal tillage means that we can create a good seedbed without turning the soil. Once the seed has arrived, Shaun will be out planting the wheat and barley, but with a shorter window!

The Maize: 35 acres will be harvested in 3rd or 4th week of October. Andy has yet to finally decide whether it will be combined or foraged. The plan was to combine it this year but that depends on the end user (all for cattle feed) but in different forms. Combining is just one option! Watch this space! It's standing very tall this year.





The Rape is doing very well and has given a good covering with not too much evidence of the Flea Beetle. The Rape's waxy leaves ensure it overwinters well. It has some more growing to do before it settles down to hibernate until February. Andy will also be growing Stubble Turnips for Tom Wheeler for sheep grazing in the Spring. There will also be grass in our rotation and Brown's Ground has already been put down to grass which I'm sure is welcome.

Andy now has some great kit which inevitably makes what he and Shaun do, a little easier. Kit coming at the right time either as a replacement or more up to date, saves time in 'man' hours and diesel! Even though we are not finished the planting this year, there will be discussion as to what is to be planted where, in blocks, next year. A farmer is always working ahead, not only with planning the layout of his crops but also who is the buyer. Being on top of the Grain Markets and buying and selling ahead is crucial to the success of all the hard work. No good growing if you can't sell! Take care.

## **COVID CORVID CAUSING CHAPEL CHAOS!**

In Laverton's quiet dip 'Bill nd his boys', vindictive crows, have settled.

Let's leave 'Covid' awfulness for a brief while; we're experiencing some 'Corvid' disruption here.

He (maybe she, I'm not sure how to sex these birds) arrives punctually each morning at around 5am, sometimes alone, but often mobbed up in the large oak opposite the Chapel.

First, he faces off the eight magpies West Side Story-style.

The magpies have already seen off all the gentle garden birds; my feeder has not been touched for a month. But now 'Bill nd his Boys' have arrived. A display of loud, gratuitous violence is called for, a message even a magpie will understand.

It starts on our neighbour's bathroom window: weaponised by a honed chisel of a beak, he attacks the linseed oil in the putty leaving a scar of nearly two feet long. Not enough? He thrills at the sound of his beak on the glass. The jackhammer racket inside both homes causes 'Tippi Hedren like' fear. High on linseed now, he gives each ancient window a go, gouging their wooden lintels.

A bird tapping on your window?

Doesn't this all seem a bit...well... precious?

I laughed when my neighbour first mentioned it.

"Putty? Are you sure it was a rook, not 'a putty cat'!" ... and four days later, Bill's down to our own cottages, he gouges the wood of yet more listed frames: inches deep here, inches! Major surgery!

Not so funny now, eh?

It's 5:00 am, I leap from bed. Less than lithe, I rush down to confront him, nearly falling down wooden stairs and tripping over Rufus, the prone, somnambulant dog. I tear open the curtains with all the drama of a West End farce. "Aha!" I confront him. Time slows to "Matrix" slow-mo. I stare deep into those jet black eyes for less than a second. The deep black of Darth Vadar's eyes. "You creature of doubtful birth!" I scream.

He flits casually back to the cedar branch across the road and waits, staring malevolently, three loud caws aimed at me. Always three...he can count! I will learn to dread that sound.

5.20 am. I return to bed, Clint Eastwood-smug. "You won't see him again, Sue!"

...BANG! BANG! You get the picture; you understand the pattern.

Now imagine three weeks of it so far...5- 7am every morning, religiously.

But... and here's the thing: how well do I know my crows? Every local farmer will tell you corvids are rampant this year. Rooks on barn roofs in their hundreds, magpies everywhere, perhaps they know mankind is on the back foot? 'Us today, you...'

I have had corvids tap gently on windows once or twice before, but 'Bill 'nd his boys' hate us. It's personal, and I loathe him; it's a strong word, but roused from sleep at 5am, I loathe pretty much everything!

Every friend or Lavertonian has a thoughtful theory on crow behaviour:

Hormones? His morning reflection? A taste for linseed putty? Defence of young? His territory? Childhood trauma revenged? A harbinger of one's doom (certainly feels like it at 5am)? Offending an old lady selling lavender? Loather of the brutalist Methodist architecture that defies the Gothic beauty of the pure church?

Likewise, everyone has a good solution:

Drawn curtains or open curtains; whitewash your windows; feed him; the Council; a mirror; swap Rufus for a decent cat; chilli peppers rubbed on lintels; silhouettes of hawks; owl automatons; fishing line on paperclips; flashing lights; netting; boarding up; an exorcism; pay the ransom; get advice from Wile E. Coyote and Acme; earplugs and wood filler; pest control... and (very commonly for such a gentle, polite community!) the more permanent option.

All agree it's seasonal and will pass. It did in Hitchcock's The Birds.

Then again, I once had to endure kidney stones.

We have another of the of seven "Those Were The Days" articles originally published in the Link in 1976 which Peter Harris has kindly transcribed for our current readers.


### **THOSE WERE THE DAYS... Tellisford**

Several histories of Tellisford have been written since its existence was first recognised in the Domesday Book, but we are concentrating on "living memory" in this series.

For memorable personalities the name Baker seems virtually synonymous with Tellisford: for nearly 130 years, three generations of the Baker family - father, son and grandson - were "rectors, lords of the manor, and benefactors of the village", most of which they owned. The grandson, the Rev. R. W. Baker, died in 1945.

Another character well-remembered was Jo Greenhill: when he was head cowman at Manor Farm, he would greet any of his dairymen who arrived late for work at 5 a.m. with "And where have you been all day then?! Long after he died, they felt he was still there sat on the milking stool waiting for the cows each morning.

Nobody remembers there being a shop in Tellisford, though "Granny Dixon" used to sell sweets in the front room of her cottage (where Mr. Humphreys now lives). The village school was also in Mrs. Dixon's cottage at one time, and later moved to Church Farm, where the three R's were taught in the sitting room at a cost of one penny per child per week.



### **Parish History**

Up to the turn of the century the Tucking Mill provided work for the villagers of Tellisford and the neighbourhood: the womenfolk weaving clothing in their cottages and taking it to the mill where the menfolk worked on the tucking process (finishing off the loose threads and fluffing it up with teazles, an abundance of which can still be found in the surrounding woods).

It was a very happy, resourceful community, and residents still remember the Harvest Suppers held every year in the garage of the Rectory. For the sing-song that followed the mea1, the piano was carted up the road from Church Farm on an old set of wheels, ready to be played upon by Mr. Frank Woolley in an assorted repertoire, which regularly included Mrs. Washington's magnificent rendering of "The Village Pump" accompanied by Mr. N. Brunt.

On these occasions there was no cost to anyone ("money didn't come into it") but everyone contributed something towards the food and drink in the way of rabbit pies, apple tarts, etc. etc.

Nor was there any charge for anything at the equally popular annual Gymkhana: a function which began as "An Afternoon of Mounted Games" in Tellisford, and whose sponsors then united with their counterparts in Rode and called themselves the Saddleflaps.

Mercifully only mock war hit Tellisford when, during 1914-1918, the guns and horses of the Royal Horse Artillery battery are said to have forded the River Frome and charged up the hill beside the Pack Steps into the village – as part of an assault course.

# MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON MONDAY 6<sup>th</sup> SEPTEMBER 2021 AT 7.30 pm

### **UNCONFIRMED**

Cllr Mike Salmon - Chair (MS), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Steve Eyles (SE), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Elaine Butler (EB)

In attendance: Hugh Williams – Clerk, and 3 members of the public

### 1. Public Participation:

Thanks were expressed to the Parish Council (PC) for opposing the development on Barbara's Field which had led to Mendip rejecting the application.

Concern was expressed over the Bradford Road and Rode Hill junction with cars travelling too fast on all the approach roads to this junction, a major accident could happen any time. The Chair said that some additional markings had been added and the police were aware of speeding on these roads.

A question was raised as to how the 20mph speed, when introduced to the village, would be enforced. It was reported that Somerset had now applied for the 20mph zone to the police and their endorsement was awaited before signs could be put up. Apart from the use of SID enforcement it would be up to the police to enforce.

It was asked if the Inspector's Report on the Hearings on the Local Plan Part 2 had been published yet, in response it was reported that an off the record comment that there were no surprises in the report had been given, which would indicate RD1 was not included as a development area.

The Declaration of Trust for the Playing Field S106 land was considered to be poor and a request for it to be improved made.

### 2. Apologies for absence: Cllr B Lund and Cllr L Oliver

**3.** Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 11<sup>th</sup> August were approved. It was pointed out that the minute 7i) the following text should be included: 'The PC should check with DLA Piper whether there would be any benefit to the objection to the planning application if the PC requested a public enquiry. Also, could the PC actually make such a request.'

**4.Declarations of interest:** JM expressed an interest in planning application 2021/1816/LBC.

**5.Report from County Councillor:** The report from Cllr Oliver had shown that covid19 cases across Somerset were still very high but fortunately the take up of the vaccine in Somerset had been one of the highest in the country. Rural grants for up to  $\pounds$ 5,000 were available to help recovery following the covid virus, these were on the Somerset website. Somerset was supporting Afghan refugees and anyone wanting to help should contact resettlement@somerset.gov.uk

### 6. Actions from the previous meeting:

- i) Hoedown: The August Hoedown had been well attended with various projects undertaken and special thanks went to the residents of The Mead who had done an evening clean up. Next year the number of Hoedowns might be reduced to just 3 in April, June and September.
- ii) The Bell: Contact had been made with the managing agents who have confirmed that they are still seeking a tenant. Questions were raised over this as it was reported a business proposal to take it over had been submitted but the applicant had been told they were unacceptable. It was probable once in a very poor state a planning application would be submitted. The PC were in a difficult position to put pressure on the owner/agents. The managing agents however, have confirmed that a tree surgeon had been approached about the dead trees and they were awaiting the owner's approval.
- iii) **The Mead:** A report of the condition of the trees on The Mead was still outstanding.
- iv) Marsh Road: An onsite meeting with Somerset County Council had taken place and it had been pointed out that Highways had right of access over all the land between the wall/fences of properties on either side of the road. However, it was difficult to make any changes to appearance now as so many changes had been made over the years. However, it was agreed the gully needed repair and that a proper gully installed across the pavement to take water from Brown's Ground into the roadside gully. Calm Engineering would be approached to see if its funding could be used to make these improvements.
- v) **Dog bin foot of Marsh Road:** A further request to move this bin had been received. It was agreed the bin could be moved about ten feet up Marsh Road, still under the trees. Grant Slade would be approached to do this.
- vi) **Fingerpost Straight Lane:** The Clerk reported that he had received quotes for a new finger for this fingerpost. It was agreed that as removing

the broken end could be difficult a full repair involving installation of a new finger, blasting and repainting the fingerpost should be done. The Clerk was asked to check if the PC insurance would cover this or future repairs, if necessary.

- vii) **No mow May:** An initial approach to Julia Robb had been made, this was to be discussed further.
- viii) **Village day:** Thanks were given to AE and PR for organising a successful day. Thanks were also given to all those who attended.
- **7. Climate Emergency:** Following the well-attended (over 40 people) Extinction Rebellion presentation JM reported that a number of people had come forward to join the Climate Emergency Steering Group and an initial meeting was planned for w/c 13 September.

### 8. Highways:

i) Speedwatch were considering purchasing an additional SID (speed indicator device) which would provide a visual speed reminder but not collect data. This could be moved to key locations. However, it was agreed that until the Memorandum with Somerset was seen this should be put on hold as Rode might be limited to a single SID. The cost was estimated at around £2,000 for an SID. ii) The Clerk reported there was no update on The Sportsman being adopted.

iii) The meeting discussed concerns over traffic speed along both Bradford Road and Rode Hill and the junction of these two roads. A major accident could happen any day and although some increased signage and markings had been put in by SCC it was essential something more was done. The Chair agreed to initially speak to Cllr Oliver and possibly pursue this with Sara Davis. It was agreed to keep this item on the agenda.

### 9. Planning matters

i) <u>Appeal of:</u> **2020/1686/OTS:** To build 29 dwellings and associated roads and access to site on The Mead/Merfield.

The extension to the deadline for comments to 14<sup>th</sup> September had given the PC time to get a Heritage Expert to come and view the site and prepare a report, this report was expected any day now. JM was thanked for preparing an initial response to submit to The Planning Inspectorate and this would include parts of the Heritage Expert's report, it was agreed that his report would also be submitted as a separate document. It was noted that Ashford Homes appeal was focusing on the tilted balance in favour of development if there was no 5 year housing supply but did not fully consider the requirement to meet all three sustainability tests.

The meeting agreed that up to £1,000 could be spent on getting DLA Piper to check the more technical parts of the PC comment document to The Planning Inspectorate.

- **ii.** <u>New applications:</u> **2021/1816/LBC**: Replace existing stormsure profiled windows and panelling with new conservation timber framed windows and panelling, 17B High Street. No objections, leave to Planning Officer.
- **iii.** Mendip decisions: 2021/0071/OTS: Application for outline planning permission (all matters reserved except for access) for the erection of up to 49 dwellings, formation of vehicular access, open space, landscaping and associated works. Refused.

**2021/0087/VCR:** Application to vary condition 13 (obscure glazing) of approval 2021/1212/VCR, 6 Stable Close. Approved with conditions.

**10.Broadband:** SE informed the meeting that Voneus was planning to start the introduction of fibre broadband, capable of giving each property ultrafast broadband, late this year. It should take around four months to complete installation of fibre to each property and it would be up to residents to decide whether they would link up to this. This had recently been done in Buckland Dinham with 60% take up.

11. Church Farm access to village/footpaths and playing field: The path from the site to the playing field had not started although emails had been sent to Autograph and Enforcement at Mendip. The latest reason given was waiting for the crop to be harvested and hedge cut. The harvest was now in. It was agreed the Clerk would send another email to Autograph and copy in Enforcement at Mendip and Andy Fussell.

The Declaration of Trust covering the playing field was difficult to follow and needed improvement with there now being two documents covering the playing field it was thought that a new Trust could be drawn up and a charity had a template which could be used to minimise costs. It was important that the PC had clarity on the Playing Field trustees and their actions, as ultimately the PC had responsibility for the land.

- **12. Parish Elections:** There had been a request by the Somerset Association of Local Councils to parishes to bring the elections forward from May 2023 to May 2022 to tie in with the Unitary Authority elections and reduce costs. The meeting agreed with this.
- **13. Unitary Authority/Frome:** The Chair reported that Frome's spreadsheet to ascertain the issues and responsibilities within Frome and all the

surrounding parishes councils had been returned. This was part of Frome trying to set up a larger group which could act locally once the new Unitary Authority was set up. A further virtual meeting was planned for October.

**14.** Conservation Area/Neighbourhood Plan: AP reported he had arranged a meeting with a consultant to discuss this further. It was possible a good case for a Conservation area covering the whole village could be made which would give better protection over further development.

15. Bus services: PT reported that a new timetable had been published which had added an extra daytime bus to Bath and also one back. Further meetings were planned to get improved bus services across the whole of Somerset. Consultants had been brought in by Somerset to progress the case which had to be submitted to Government by the end of October. He said there was now some agreement by Somerset that improved services should run in the evenings and at weekends.

### **16. Financial matters:** The following payments were agreed:

<u>17. Any other business:</u> Concern was expressed that building works were being undertaken at 1 The Mead without any planning permission. The Clerk was asked to write to the owners. The tree on the walk through in The Mead required pruning and a quote would be obtained.




