Church Reflection, News & Events REFLECTION

"You are blessed when you can show people how to cooperate instead of compete or fight. That's when you discover who you really are, and your place in God's family." Matthew 5 v 9 (The Message)

Summer holidays can be a good time to catch up on reading. A friend lent me a book called "Searching for the Mother tree" by Suzanne Simard. It is Suzanne's personal account of growing up as a child in the forests of British Columbia, Canada, in a family who make their living by logging. As well as writing fondly and movingly of her family life, she also gives an account of at least four decades field research into varieties of mycorrhizae that exist beneath the surface of the soil. Our understanding of these vast fungal networks that communicate between trees and plant species sharing nutrients and protection is largely due to the exhaustive work of Suzanne and other scientists working across the world.

In the early days of her forestry apprenticeship, she became concerned that the fir seedlings she was asked to plant on large monoculture slopes were not thriving. As she experimented more she became aware that firs planted alongside other species such as birch fared better. She was vilified by the forestry community for suggesting such an idea. Birch and other woodland plants were considered weeds and blanket sprayed with glyphosate weed killer on a regular basis, killing the birch and destroying the mycorrhizae in the process. In her

work she discovered that the firs and birch communicate underground supplying each other with nutrients that they each need at different times of the year. She has since gained her doctorate and is professor of Forest Ecology at the University of British Columbia, with a global reputation. She also found that the old trees, the mother trees, provided the nutrients and liquid that the new seedlings need. Fascinating stuff.



One of her conclusions was that nature depends far more on mutual cooperation than competition. Although some competition is inevitable, the wholesale survival of the fittest that some eminent biologists have led us to believe might not always be the case, and that the plant world cooperates in a remarkable way. During Creation Time, that we are celebrating in our churches this month, we can grow yet more aware of the wonderful world we live in. There is so much we have yet to understand. We must resolve to steward and serve it, not dominate it, but learn from its wisdom.

Our Queen Elizabeth, who sadly has died made cooperation between people and nations one of her abiding thoughts. In her Commonwealth Day message on the 14th March this year she said: "In these testing times, it is my hope that you can draw strength and inspiration in what we share as we work together towards a healthy, sustainable and prosperous future for all." The Queen has been praised for her stalwart determination to keep her promises and to be a servant to her people. She was following the example of Jesus, her inspiration and her strength who said in Mark's gospel (10 v 43) " whoever wishes to be great among you must be your servant.... for the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve"

The forest, part of God's beloved creation has a wisdom and intelligence we might all learn from. I think our new King Charles 111 has been saying this for a long time and also been mocked for it. It now turns out that he was way ahead of his time. Let us learn all these lessons of cooperation instead of competition and find out who we really are and our place in God's family.

Church Reflection, News & Events NEWS FROM ST LAWRENCE

By the time you are reading this we may well have already celebrated this year's harvest with our Harvest Festival on 2^{nd} October and our Harvest Supper on 1^{st} October. In next month's edition we will give you an update on how these went.

Not surprisingly most of September has been dominated by the sad passing of our Queen. From a bellringing perspective plans had been put in place years ago as to the procedures for ringing bells on the Queen's death. You may therefore have heard the tenor being rung 96 times on 9th September (the day after the Queen's death). This was rung by Andy Pickett, and I, Sally, counted to check he rang the correct number of times! On 10th September we rang 6 bells to celebrate the proclamation of King Charles III. At this time the flag was also raised on the church for 24 hours in recognition of the new King. It was lowered again to half-mast one hour after the proclamations in Belfast, Cardiff and Edinburgh on 11th September. 19th September, the morning of the funeral, the bells were rung half muffled for half an hour, then Andy once again tolled the tenor.

I hope you were able to hear the bells at some point over the 10 days depending on the direction of the wind. I think all the bell ringers felt very honoured to be a part of these sad but historic events. We record ringing for events such as this in a book which we keep in the bell tower. We also had a book of condolences in the church which members of the congregation signed. This is now with Peter Travis whilst he waits to hear where these books will be stored for the future.

On 28th August, we were delighted to host the wedding of Hannah Organ and Jeremy Larcombe. Hannah is the granddaughter of the late David Joyce and his widow, Olive, who continues to live in Rode. A splendid occasion, we were delighted to play a part in it. We wish them every happiness for the future.

In this column we've previously mentioned the need to repair and replace the roof of St Lawrence. The church architect mentioned in his 2017 quinquennial report that the time for action was coming. That time has now arrived. This, together with the total estimated cost of £400,000, is the bad news. However, the good news (actually fantastic news!) is that our prayers have been answered and the Trustees of the Richard Oatley Foundation have indicated that they are prepared to provide funds of £300,000 towards this project. That leaves £100,000 to be found by our village and from whatever grants we can obtain. We must not miss this opportunity of a lifetime and an appeal will be launched as soon as possible. More details will be provided at that time.

RODE TO GET BACK ITS BATH BUS SERVICES



Rode Parish Council, Frome And Villages Bus User Group (FAVBUG), our MP, our County Councillors and Rode bus users have battled over the past seven years to get once again a proper bus service for Rode folk who need to go to Bath for work, school, college, shops, hospital or just for a night out.



After many years of campaigning, we have finally heard that in the soon-to -be-announced, new D2 timetable from October 9th First Bus will once again send most of its D2 Frome to Bath bus services via Rode.

A key reason for this success is that Rode Parish Council has always shown its strong backing for bus services, both for First Bus and for Faresaver Buses. The Parish Council has funded the production of a special Rode Village bus timetable that lists all our village bus services and door dropped a copy into every home in the village in order to encourage use of Rode's bus services.

Villages across Somerset are now being advised to follow Rode's example and print and deliver their own village bus timetables. If people know when buses are running, then they are far more likely to catch the bus and leave the car at home.

A new Rode bus timetable incorporating all the new First D2 and Faresaver X34 bus times is now being produced by Rode Parish Council in time for the new October 9th timetable.

It will be a case of USE IT OR LOSE IT. It's vital we all try and use the D2 and X34 as often as we can. Going by bus ensures there'll be a bus service for our fellow villagers who rely on buses (especially that's the young and old).



Worth noting too that in the midst of this cost of living crisis, going by bus is usually far cheaper than going by car to Bath. It's 'greener' too as it reduces your carbon footprint.

The message to the good folk of Rode, please do try and BUS IT whenever you can.

ENERGY REBATE SCAM

Action Fraud is warning the public about a sharp rise in reports relating to fake emails purporting to be from Ofgem, the independent energy regulator for Great Britain.

ALERT: Energy rebate scam emails

Action Fraud is warning the public about a sharp rise in reports relating to fake emails purporting to be from Ofgem, the independent energy regulator for Great Britain. The emails claim that the recipient is due a rebate payment as part of a government scheme and provides links for the recipient to follow in order to apply for the rebate. The links in the emails lead to malicious websites designed to steal personal and financial information.

Between Monday 22nd August 2022 and Monday 5th September 2022, a total of 1,567 phishing emails related to this scam have been reported via the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS). All the emails display the email subject header "Claim your bill rebate now". Offenders are using the Ofgem brand logo and colours to make the emails look as authentic as possible. However, the emails ask recipients to "apply for an energy bill rebate before September 2020", which is what prompted many recipients to realise the emails weren't genuine.

How you can protect yourself and others

- If you have any doubts about a message, contact the organisation directly. Don't use the numbers
 or address in the message use the details from their official website. Remember, your bank (or
 any other official source) will never ask you to supply personal information via email.
- If you have received an email which you're not quite sure about, forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk. Send us emails that feel suspicious, even if you're not certain they're a scam - we can check.



IT TAKES A VILLAGE

There is an expression in Africa: It takes a village to raise a child. The 'village' can be a physical village, or any community. And the 'child' can be any project, idea or even a business. On a deeper level, this expression is about connection. And as a Somerset County Councillor, my role is to facilitate this connection.



The passing of our Queen has also shown how we, as a nation, are connected with our past, helping us create a positive future. The outpouring of love and respect makes it clear that there is more that connects us, than divides us. I have reflected on how much I have learnt from Her Majesty – care, kindness, acceptance, duty, reliability, honesty, commitment, community, but most importantly, service. For me, this is about every aspect of my life, not just as a councillor. She will forever feature in our national psyche as a symbol of those traits that make us good human beings, and a great Britain.



1st October is the International Day of Older Persons. A day to consider how we connect with those in our 'village' who are older, who may need assistance, transport, a phone call, or a cup of tea and a chat.

I was sadly not able to have children of my own and will be growing old without that support. This has always been a great sorrow, and honestly, terrifying. This is one of the reasons why I selected to sit on the County Scrutiny Committee for Adult Social Care. In September we received dementia training which was eyeopening and concerning. We know, as a county, that there is so much more we need to do around dementia, but we are making progress and I will ensure that this continues.

I have also met with Age UK, Active and In-Touch, and Anne Hills who hosts a coffee morning in Frome for those 'Aging without Children'. I will be joining Anne when her monthly meetups are revived (post-pandemic) in October. There is so much out there to support us as we get older. Sometimes we just don't know what is available or how to access what we need.

A highlight over the last month has been 'Community Connector' training with Mendip Health Connectors. If anyone is facing a struggle, in any aspect of their lives, the Health Connectors are there to signpost and support.

Health and wellbeing are about the *whole*, so if anyone in our 'village' has money concerns, cost of living anxiety, needs medical guidance, is suffering with mental health, the Health Connectors are there.

They can be reached by phone, email, online, in groups or 1-2-1. They even have delicious, seasonal, and healthy recipes on their website.

Please do reach out to the Mendip Health Connectors for yourself, or if you need support to help someone in your 'village'. And if you would like to be a Community Connector, the training is only an hour, and you can wear your 'Community Connector' badge to help 'spread the word' locally about how to contact the Health and Green Connectors in the area (especially as we move inside and close our doors with the changing of seasons).

THE BIG GREEN WEEKEND!

The Rode Climate Emergency Group was formed just over a year ago, but before we embarked on anything too substantial, we decided to seek villagers' views on the climate crisis, and the key environmental priorities for Rode. Nearly 200 residents completed our survey back in April, which has helped us establish a number of priorities for 2022. One of our key actions was to hold an "environmental event", designed to both inform and inspire.

In collaboration with Norton St Philip and Beckington, the "Big Green Weekend" took place last month. Amongst the various events, nine local residents show-cased environmental technologies and solutions – hosting visits to their properties and answering questions on heat pumps, solar power, hydro power, composting, re-wilding, electric cars and e-bikes.

Many of the properties had up to 25 visitors on the Sunday afternoon, and Tellisford Mill hosted 4 separate tours, with nearly 40 visitors. In addition, Nigel Clarke hosted a well-attended tour of the Community Orchard in Rode.



The day before, the Palairet Hall in Norton St Philip was the venue for the Repair Café. And in the afternoon the Memorial Hall sprung to life, with a range of stalls and three fascinating talks in the Committee Room. The speakers were Mickey Green (Managing Director of Somerset Waste Partnership), Mike Dowell from JB Group Renewables, and Shane Collins, Somerset Councillor and climate activist. Each talk was very well attended and sparked lots of interaction and questions from the audience.

Meanwhile in the main hall a range of stalls provided the opportunity to find out more about issues such as the Somerset "Catch the Bus" campaign. The Frome Food Hub. heat pumps, energy efficiency, ways to manage your heating bills this winter, and recycling. In the car park the Frome Community Bike Project provided a free bicycle check-up. as well as the opportunity to use the smoothie bike! We also had a couple of e-bikes and an electric vehicle on show. Many thanks to



the exhibitors, speakers, and the hosts who kindly opened their properties on the Sunday afternoon....without their enthusiasm and commitment this event couldn't have taken place.

The Big Green Weekend was the first event of its kind in Rode, and I think definitely counts as a success. For example, several visitors have since expressed an interest in both community hydro power and solar power, and we hope to work in small groups to move these ideas forward. If anyone has a special interest in, or knowledge of, such projects, please contact me at the email address below.

The next Climate Emergency Group meeting is on October 19th in the Memorial Hall (7.30pm)...again, please contact me if you are interested in joining the group or would just like to attend the meeting. Amongst other things we'll reflect on the Big Green Weekend and take some initial soundings on whether to repeat the event next year.

MOST PEOPLE IN SOMERSET ARE RECYCLING, ARE YOU?

RECYCLE MORE COLLECTIONS, A REMINDER





- Plastic bottles please rinse, squash, put caps and tops back on. Discard pumps and trigger sprays, e.g. from soap bottles and cleaning sprays.
- Plastic pots, tubs and trays any colour.
- Tins and cans, steel or Aluminium, rinsed and squashed if possible no need to remove labels please place loose can lids inside squashed cans; all other metal items should be taken to any recycling site.
- Aluminium foil rinsed and scrunched, not if plastic or paper backed.
- Aerosols only recycle empty, and do not pierce or squash.

Green Box:

- Glass bottles and jars rinsed and unbroken no table or cook ware, put metal and plastic tops and lids back on.
- Cartons, such as Tetra Paks please rinse, squash, put any caps back on.

Black Box:

- Paper, newspapers, magazines, leaflets, directories, white envelopes (no need to remove windows) and other white paper.
- Cardboard that is brown corrugated, grey card, greetings cards and brown envelopes please flatten. Small bits of card can be put into larger boxes before flattening cut or tear up large pieces.
- Please remember, large boxes or large pieces should be taken to a recycling site and may not be collected at the kerbside.

Plastic bags (not black sacks):

- Small household batteries, in a small, tied bag.
- Small electrical items such as kettle, radio, laptop, iron, toaster, phone, charger, printer, router with plug, cable or batteries, that can fit into an untied carrier-size bag (plastic, compostable, freezer etc). Keep any wiring in the bag, put on top of recycle box.
- IMPORTANT <u>kerbside collection of textiles, clothes, shoes has</u> <u>changed</u>. Clothes and shoes must be good enough to be worn again. Textiles – bedding, curtains, throws – are NO LONGER TAKEN. Tie wearable clothes and shoes in a carrier bag – not a black sack – to keep them completely dry and put out on top of your recycling boxes.

Food waste bin

• All food waste, cooked or raw.

Sorry, we can't take these in your recycling... the following items are never taken in a kerbside recycling collection – do not put these out in your recycling.

- Compostable or biodegradable packaging these can't be recycled with SWP's food or garden waste collections
- Broken glass
- Glass that is not a bottle or jar, such as mirrors, drinking glasses, Pyrex, vases.
- Old or unused wallpaper
- Shiny, thermal paper, as used for many till receipts
- Plastic films and wrappers, for example crisp packets, pet food pouches, film lids, bread bags (Many supermarkets now collect soft plastics)
- Syringes, knives and other sharp objects
- Metal kitchenware, such as saucepans, baking trays, cutlery
- 5 litre large beer kegs
- Old metal tools
- Nappies and pet excrement
- Large quantities of cardboard or excessively large kerbside boxes please take to a recycling centre
- Single-use "paper" cups take these to a recycling centre
- Textiles which are not wearable clothes or shoes please take to charity shop or textile bank...

N.B. Very little to recycle? You can use one box if that is all you need.

All recycle sites switch to winter timetables from 1 October 2022 to Friday 31 March 2023.

When open weekdays, sites operate 9am-5pm October to March.

Saturday and Sunday hours remain 9am-4pm at all sites year-round.

BEING A MICRO-PROVIDER

The Community Council for Somerset (CCS) has launched a vital new service to help increase the capacity and variety of care and support services within Somerset.



The service helps new and existing sole traders, self-employed or small businesses to join Somerset's network of Micro-Providers.

A Micro-Provider offers paid-for support or care to help local people with everyday tasks, to stay well and get out and about.

There are currently almost 700 accredited Micro-Providers in Somerset who are making a positive difference to the lives of local people every day. Services provided can range from anything from gardening to cleaning, care provision to mobile hairdressing and even dog walking.

Two Enterprise Advisors have joined the Community Council for Somerset and are working across the county to support people in becoming a Micro-Provider. The Advisors offer free help, advice and specialist signposting to anyone with an idea to develop and set up a small service, or micro-enterprise, to support people in the community.

Cat Sweatman, CCS Enterprise Advisor said: "Becoming a Micro-Provider offers flexible working hours and interesting and varied work within your local area. It can be done alongside other employment and built up whilst starting up. The flexible hours can help fit work around the school run or perhaps you're retired and want a little extra income to help with the increasing cost of living."

Claire Searle, CCS Enterprise Advisor added: "We can support you through the process of becoming accredited through the 'Doing it Right' quality standard, led by Somerset County Council. We offer support through mentoring, one-to-one coaching and are only ever a phone call, email or What's App message away. We are really keen to hear from anyone who thinks they would like to become a Micro-Provider, so do get in touch."

Untold Tales

Another of Anthony Battersby's occasional articles about his over 30 years working on the operational development of child immunisation programmes in remote and difficult parts of the world...

CROSS BORDER: NAGORNO KARABAKH (NOW CALLED ARTSAKH REPUBLIC)

In May 1993 Rachel and I were preparing for our wedding at the beginning of July. I received a request from UNICEF: Please would I go to Armenia and review the immunisation programme there. At the time Armenia was at war with Azerbaijan over the mountainous region called Nagorno Karabakh. This area, like Armenia, is predominately Christian, and under the USSR had been autonomous. Before the collapse of the Soviet Union there was a move to transfer the autonomous region from Azerbaijan which is mostly Muslim to Armenia. It did not happen before the USSR ceased to exist.


When I arrived in Yerevan, the UNICEF local office asked me to go to Nagorno Karabakh, a Christian enclave inside Azerbaijan, where the British NGO Merlin was working. The war had been running



since 1988 and in that time the Karbakhis had been highly successful in expelling the Azeris from their mountain. Despite its size Nagorno Karabakh

provided the USSR with 13 generals and one admiral in WWII. They are good at fighting.

I left Yerevan heading southeast to the province of Syunik, at that time still called by its old name Zangezur. We passed Lake Sevan with its old churches - Armenia has many very old churches, some dating back to the fourth century. They are constructed entirely from Tufa, a honeycomb structured red rock. Because of its structure it is easy to cut and carve, but because the stone itself is very

hard the carving does not wear away. As a result these ancient churches, some of the oldest in Christendom, still have beautiful carved details.

Our journey was broken at a small village where we stayed overnight at a farm. The farmhouse was an unremarkable concrete structure but the welcome was warm and hospitable. I was asked how old my house was; "It was built about 1350" I replied. "Ah quite old" I was told, "but not as old as this one." "How old is this one?" I asked. "The oldest part is 4,000 years old," said my host, "follow me." Fascinated I followed; we passed through a door at the back of the modern building and entered a building with metre thick walls, small rooms and tiny windows, but that was not the end. Again we passed through a door and I found myself in a series of caves, in one of which lay a cow chewing the cud; others were used as storerooms and this was the part that was 4,000 years old. "How long has your family lived here?" I asked. "Well" I was told, "our forebears built the bit on the front of the caves somewhere in the 15th century, but it was too small and poky so we built this nice new airy house on the front of that about 40 years ago."




The next morning I was woken by a golden oriole singing in the walnut tree outside my window. It was hard to realise that I was in a war zone and that until very recently this whole area was the site of heavy fighting. Much of Armenia is a high mountain plateau and we were at an altitude of about 1,500m.

There are two ways into Nagorno Karabakh: the northern route, at that time more prone to bombing, and the southern across the Lachin Corridor. This is the narrow deep valley that separates the Nagorno Karabakh mountain from the main massif of Armenia. It is a long way down and then a very long way back up again on the other side.

The control of the Corridor was vital to the Karabakhis as holding it made their land contiguous with the rest of Armenia. It is equally important to the Azeris as it is the only link to Nakhichevan, a province of Azerbaijan wholly separated from the rest of the country by Armenia.

Once through the Corridor, having passed much war debris we reached Stepanakert, the capital of Nagorno Karabakh. While there the Minister of Health gave me lunch. Because of the instability in the area he had armed bodyguards who joined us for lunch. The one opposite me had the manner of a terrier: he looked as though he would like to kill something and was not particularly fussy about who or what it was. Every time he leant forward to take food I could see a large automatic under his arm. Suddenly the Minister

asked, "Have you ever been to Turkey?" "Yes" said I, noticing the terrier's eyes brighten and his position shift slightly. "Ah" said the minister "We do not like the Turks." I though it best to keep quiet about my antecedents and we passed to a safer subject, discussing vaccine and how to immunise children. The terrier looked disappointed.

Before leaving I asked if it would be possible to buy a Karabagh rug; they are very beautiful, geometrically patterned tribal rugs. I was told that unfortunately that would not be possible because the previous year all the rugs and carpets had been collected together and sold to buy weapons. I subsequently found some in Yerevan.



We returned to Yerevan the way we had come, stopping on the way at a point where naturally fizzy water comes gushing out of the ground. I was told it had medicinal qualities - it tasted disgusting so almost certainly did. On return to the city I bumped into a Merlin staff member. "Oh" she said, "you're just back from Stepanakert aren't you?" "Yes" I said. "Did you get bombed?" she asked; "No" I replied. "Oh bad luck" she said: funny priorities I thought.

Due to shortages of every kind in Yerevan my return flight had just enough fuel to reach an airport in Southern Russia where it could refuel cheaply. No meals were offered except to the cabin crew. It was not a good flight but I got home in time to get married.

SOME OF OUR LOCAL MOTHS

Leave the light on...

Accidentally leaving a light on overnight is an expensive business nowadays. But it does come with one consolation. Moths!

Whilst butterflies are the barometer of our environment, the same is true of moths. They are vulnerable to climate and habitat changes and perform the same important ecosystem roles as butterflies.

And there are loads more of them. The UK has 67 (or so) butterflies. But <u>over</u> <u>2,500</u> different species of moth.

We usually have 16 or 17 butterfly species in the lanes, gardens and fields of Laverton each summer.

Realistically we could have how many different moths? 200, 300, 400, 500? It would be a full time job to monitor them.

Here are a few you can see locally this Autumn as a start.....

The Herald:

These are beautiful moths with bright orange blotches on grey-brown wings They overwinter in outbuildings and sheds. You can see them in evenings feeding on over-ripe fruits such as blackberry and sloe.

Large Ranunculus:

This sounds like an angry uncle but actually it's named after the Latin name for the buttercup-like plants it likes to lay it's eggs on. They have beautiful but subtle colouring.

Silver Y:

It takes a bit of imagination but you'll see where this moth got the name. It is our most common migratory moth. It will be here until November when survivors of our summer migrate to southern Europe. It's caterpillars love nettles – and cabbages!

White Plume Moth:

This doesn't look like your standard Moth. Early naturalists gave it the Latin name Pterophoruspentadactyla alluding to its slightly prehistoric looks. They emerge twice a year and you can often see them in long grass during the Autumn.

Magpie: A day-flying moth so you can see them easily. There's an aberrant variation (it's in Laverton and has more white and less black on the wings). Most have disappeared by late September but you might just see one if the weather holds.

So leave a light on (the bathroom is their preferred room) and every day is a surprise.

There is always a new moth to find.

August, due to the drought like conditions. I noticed the conkers falling too. But now, as they fall, they are fully ripe and shiny, as a great conker should be. I read in a magazine that there will be Conker Competitions all over the country. A simple pleasure and far more exciting than a screen!



It's so important that the current generation of children are immersed in learning about nature and the countryside, the seasons and the weather. Of making dens and playing conkers, planting acorns and collecting 'fairy cups'. I fear that they will not have the memories and it's vitally important that they are encouraged to just play, away from screens and electronic games.

The birdsong has been quite epic of late, broods flown the nest and starting to mark territories select building sites and repairing nests to cosy up for winter. Who knows what weather will be offered us this Autumn and Winter but let us make the most of the last of the light evenings before we slip into Winter.



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MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 6th SEPTEMBER 2022 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR) and Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB)

In attendance: Cllr Barbi Lund, Cllr Adam Boyden, Hugh Williams – Clerk and 4 parishioners.

<u>1. Public Participation</u>: Good news was given to the Parish Council that new leaders and helpers had been found for the Scouts so the groups could keep going. However, there was still a shortage of Beaver leaders and these were being sought. There were now 62 young people in the Scout groups.

Concerns were expressed over the proposal to build 7 dwellinghouses on land between Clay Lane and Church Lane, these could block light and views and encroach on the privacy of the existing surrounding properties. Access to the site could result in further narrowing of Church Lane which was of concern. It was pointed out that only those directly adjacent to the proposed development had been notified by Mendip and it was thought a wider area should have been notified. The limited notice could restrict comments on the application.

There were still problems on the Bradford Road with the hedge by the empty (for sale) house forcing pedestrians into the road. It was agreed the Clerk would write to Mendip (cc Cllr Lund) as approaches to the selling agent had not managed to get the hedge cut.

<u>2. Apologies for absence</u>: Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)

3. Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 9th August were approved with the following amendment to minute 13 which should read: 'AE had attended the AGM representing the Parish Council and she reported that the Memorial Hall was keen to work with the Playing Field. It had also been agreed that the Hall would be free for Community village organisations until March 2023.'

4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Report from District Councillor: Cllr Lund had put an article into The Link on the annual review of Mendip's Carbon Management Plan and agreed to send this to the Clerk to upload onto the PC website.

6. Report from County Councillor: Cllr Boyden reported that the Local Community Network (LCN) consultation had just started and would run until 17th October. There were seven questions in the survey asking about the geography of each LCN and the priorities these groups should have. The Chair was surprised so little had been agreed by now and that once the survey was completed, results analysed and approval given there would be less than 5 months to get these up and running. It was known the LCNs would have all the local County Councillors on them along with representatives of the parish and town councils they represented. It was agreed to put this onto the October agenda and agree a PC response to the survey.

In response to a question Cllr Boyden said that planning application decisions would still be made under the Mendip planning panel with representatives from the local County Councillors until a Somerset wide plan was in place.

He said that he and Cllr Denton had met with Somerset Highway representatives who confirmed the 20mph speed limit in Rode along with village gates and speed restrictions on the A361 would be installed before the end of the financial year. Somerset was working on a design for the Bradford Road/Rode Hill junction which could include a flashing speed sign for traffic approaching from Bradford on Avon along with rumble strips this would be circulated when completed. The double yellow lines at the Rode Hill/High Street junction had had no objections and would be probably be painted in Spring. This was due to the queue of work to be done.

There was continued pressure to maintain bus services across Somerset. A drought had been declared across Somerset.

7. Actions from previous meeting:

- **i. Trees: Merfield/The Mead:** Cllr Lund said she would chase Bo Walsh as she had not heard from him who should write to the owners regarding the state of the trees.
- **ii. Ultrafast broadband:** Gigaclear is answering residents' questions on their ultrafast broadband coming to Rode in the Memorial Hall on 20th September, letters had been delivered to residents alerting them to this. It was, however, noted the box had not been installed at the end of Lower Street before the end of August as previously informed.
- **iii. Grass round Christchurch:** JM reported he would chase up the diocese as the PC had approved rewilding this area.
- **iv. Dog bin on Marsh Road and trees:** Grant Slade had agreed to move the bin further up Marsh Road and had apologised for having forgotten to move it. The Clerk said that the two branches that had come off one of the adjacent trees had been cleared away promptly by John Osborne and thanks were given to him.
- v. **Trees by Rode Bridge:** A parishioner had noted that some trees by the bridge were in an unsafe condition and had informed the County Arboriculturist and they have asked the PC to apply pressure. It was agreed

to check the location of the trees as these could be in Tellisford and therefore Tellisford PC should take action. [Clerk's Note: the trees are in Tellisford and they have been informed of the issue.]

8. Climate Change Group: The Big Green Weekend was taking place this weekend (10/11 September) with the repair café in Norton on Saturday morning then stalls and three lectures on Saturday afternoon in the Memorial Hall, Rode and on Sunday there were 9 open houses demonstrating various green initiatives. Thanks were given to JM for getting this weekend organised and it was hoped this would be a success.

The rewilding area by the Memorial Hall had not been that successful due to the yellow rattle not getting established. However, it was agreed to continue with the experiment and to consult with experts who could help with the rewilding.

<u>9. Highways:</u>

a) Church Lane closure: The Clerk agreed to inform Somerset/Mendip that the signed diversion down Marsh Road was incorrect and should be rerouted. A bus had tried to go down the road and had to reverse back up.

b) Other issues: Already covered under 6. Report from County Councillor. **10. Planning:**

i) New applications:

2022/1516/OUT: Outline planning permission with some matters reserved for 7no dwelling houses with access details – land at rear of 41A Church Lane. Concerns were expressed over this application as already expressed in the Parishioners participation it was also noted that the development was outside the Rode development boundary as agreed in the Neighbourhood Plan. The infilling of green spaces would harm the village and therefore it was unanimously agreed to reject the application.

2022/1612/TCA: Crown-lift pine to 4.5m by removing SE laterals – The Millers House. Approved.

2022/1753/TCA: Fell magnolia tree – 31 Lower Street. This was approved once it was explained that the roots were damaging the neighbouring drive and that felling was the only option.

ii. Mendip decisions:

2021/2297/FUL: Erection of four dwellings and creation of new access – The Bell Inn. The developer has issued an appeal to the Planning Inspectorate due to Mendip not making a decision on the application within the prescribed time limit. The PC noted the appeal.

iii. Other:

2021/0071/OTS: Information from Mendip indicated that this would probably be a one-day hearing and could be a combination of 'real life' attendance and virtual. The PC would be able to participate in the hearing. There was still no start date from the Planning Inspectorate. The Clerk agreed to send the agreed questions to DLA Piper.

Enforcement: Concerns were expressed over work at houses on The Mead and the buildings at The Coach House where work had been done without planning approval or was being done contrary to approval. It was agreed these should be brought to the attention of Mendip.

<u>11. Playing Field Constitution</u>: AP had contacted Steve Eyles and it had been agreed a meeting with the solicitor would to be held in the future.

12. Church Farm: Some surfacing of the development had now been done but the main roads were uncompleted. No further work had taken place on the path within the development area or resowing grass or planting of trees/shrubs. Mendip had not made a decision on the planning application regarding affordable housing.

<u>13. LCNs:</u> See 6. Report from County Councillor.

14. Buses: PT reported that the catch the bus month had started but due to the closure of Church Lane it was possible the catch the bus campaign for Rode would take place in October. There were problems with bus services across Somerset and locally there was a campaign underway to support the D2 especially the evening bus from Bath. Pressure and action would be maintained. **15. Allotments:** To be actioned.

16. New Website: JM had still to have further discussions with the provider and would report back at a later PC meeting.

17. Financial matters:
