#### **REFLECTION - WHAT ARE WE MEANT TO BE DOING?**

As I write, members of the Conservative Party are choosing between two candidates, one of whom will be the next Prime Minister of the United Kingdom. Each candidate has spent huge swathes of time and money presenting themselves to the party faithful (and to the rest of us?) in order to encourage people to vote for them.



Reflecting on this, I have been thinking about how we *all* have a role to play in the world in which we live, whatever stage of our life we are at. Many of us do not recognise what that role is or maybe wish we had a different one. When I was a lad, I rather fancied playing cricket for Yorkshire, but that was not to be. Indeed I was and am useless at cricket and I was not born in Yorkshire, so altogether I was on to a loser! But even in our later years there can be new roles to play, new challenges we are called to meet.

I have been interested to compare the Conservative party process with the situation described in the Old Testament where Jeremiah is appointed "a prophet to the nations". In chapter 1 of the book of Jeremiah we read that the Lord spoke to Jeremiah encouraging him to take the job. He reminds Jeremiah that even before his conception He knew him and had appointed him for the post. God knew Jeremiah, and He knows us – has known us from even before we were twinkles in our parents' eyes!

Jeremiah's response, however, was to say, "Alas, Lord God! Behold I do not know how to speak." Two things are very clear in this passage. The first is the divine certainty that Jeremiah had been chosen for the role. The second is the humility of the chosen one who recognises and is explicit about his failings. The Lord's response to Jeremiah's concerns about his abilities were that he should not be afraid and that He, God, would be there to enable him.

My hope is that both we – and the two candidates for prime minister! – should be aware of our own frailties and yet also be able to see the roles we are called to perform – and receive similar assurance that we can carry these roles through. However old, however young, we each have so much to offer.

There is one final encouragement to Jeremiah which is an encouragement for all of us: "Do not be afraid... for I am with you." The Lord promises to be with Jeremiah every step of the path he is to take. As we venture into a new role that we believe we have been given in the world, can we be assured that however lonely it may seem we are not on our own, and that the Lord God is our encourager and will be with us every step of the way?

I pray that we (and the new Prime Minister) will discern the roles that we are currently called to take on, that we can recognise and be open about our failings, but that we can also have confidence through knowing that the Lord is with us.

#### SEPTEMBER IS 'CATCH THE BUS MONTH'

Across England (and here in Rode), everyone is being urged to make a special effort to use the bus more in September and get into the habit of 'BUSSING IT'.

The one thing we can all do to improve our bus service in Rode (or in this period of lots of bus cuts just maintain our village bus services) is to BUS IT whenever we can.





As the Somerset County Council campaign says 'BUS IT: You Know It Makes Sense'.

Why does it make sense to BUS IT? Because it helps reduce our carbon footprint.. given the high cost of petrol, because it helps with our everworsening cost of living crisis ... because it means we can keep buses going through Rode which provide a lifeline for those too young to drive, or perhaps too old, or simply can't afford the costs of owning and running a car.

We have all battled for 7 years now to keep our buses going through our village ... and we constantly try and persuade particularly First Bus to improve its bus services to Bath via Rode. And we'll continue to put that case, but our argument is strengthened if more people could use the existing buses that go through Rode.

Every day (but never on Sunday!) we have an hourly bus daytime service to and from Frome and Trowbridge via the Faresaver X34 and early morning First D2 buses to Bath (plus one early evening buses) and afternoon buses back to Rode from Bath (plus a late night bus). Up-to-date Bus Timetables are available in the Village General Store and Café.

#### NHS SOMERSET INTRODUCES THINK PHARMACY

We have introduced a new, same-day, GP community pharmacy consultation service to help you receive quality care and support for minor health conditions, more quickly through accessing care via your community pharmacist.



It is estimated that 1000 GP appointments have already been freed up by the new Community Pharmacy Consultation Service.

If you live in Somerset and contact your GP to discuss a minor illness or injury, your GP receptionist may offer you a same-day consultation with your community pharmacist. Community pharmacists are highly qualified clinicians and can offer medical advice for minor injuries and illnesses.



During your consultation, your pharmacist will take your medical history, ask about your symptoms and any current medication you might be taking. Following the consultation, they will offer you advice and where appropriate, offer you an over-the-counter product. Some pharmacists are also able to offer anti-biotics.

The pharmacist will make a record of the outcome of your consultation on your patient record.

If having given you advice/treatment, your pharmacist thinks you may need further specialist help they will be able to refer you back to your GP or recommend another health service for support.

#### SEPTEMBER IS ABOUT MOVING

August marked the first 100 days in my role as a Somerset County Councillor. And what an amazing 100 days it has been!



I have learnt so much about the wonderful things happening in the Frome North community, the hard work going on at County Hall, and even more about myself.

It is very apt that on the 100<sup>th</sup> day, which was Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> August, I gathered with Frome Town, Mendip District and County Councillors, along with members of the public, at the D2 bus stop in the Frome Town centre in support



of the 'Save the Buses' campaign. Across the country bus services were being cut as the pandemic funding was to end in October. But so much work has been going on 'behind the scenes' to bring people and organisations together who can make the financial decisions, to come up with solutions and most importantly, to take action. Locals, passionate about our buses, such as Peter Travis in Rode, who is the Co-Chair of the Somerset Bus Partnership put the case forward for us in Frome North (and beyond).

A huge thank you to Peter, his team, colleagues, and volunteers (and all relevant organisations in Somerset and across the UK) for working tirelessly to get £130 million made available from the Department of Transport to keep services running across the UK. Sometimes our actions feel small, but as a collective, amazing things happen.

This grant is only for the next 6 months, which means we need to ensure that bus usage goes up and remains at the heart of our communities.

September is 'Catch the Bus' month, and it would be great if more of us could make use of the buses. Maybe enjoy a pub lunch in a neighbouring village, without having to ensure a 'designated driver'. Or attend a sports event or the theatre in Bath, a night 'on the town' or a family day out. It's cheaper, convenient, less stress, and of course the greener option. And it's a lot of fun!

I will be hosting a **surgery on the D2 bus in September**. I am so excited! Please watch social media and I will let you know when I will be on the bus meeting you to hear about your local concerns and celebrations.

On a personal level, September is about moving my body more. As an ex-PE teacher, I have felt my health and fitness slip, especially as I entered the menopause. Less than 40% of women in the UK exercise regularly. This of course impacts mental and physical health and puts pressure on our precious health services. If you know you need to exercise more, please join me at the Park Run at the Frome Old Showfield.

I am in no shape to run so will be walking the 5km circuit. It will be fun to do it as a group especially if you feel as 'out of shape' as I do. And let's talk about your local issues along the way too. #### **RODE CRICKET CLUB**

Only one cricket match to report on as we had something of a midseason break for most of August. The return match against The Star took place on 28th August on Bath CC's ground in Lansdown. The Star batted first and started strongly before wickets for James

#### **UKRAINIAN GUESTS - THE LATEST**

Another month has passed and we are all getting used to seeing Ukrainian cars around the area, and hearing Ukrainian spoken out and about. Our Ukrainian guests in the community have been experiencing the vagaries of a British Summer, causing one to query 'How does this happen, 34C one day, 24C the next?' I think they are used to more stable weather patterns back home!

**Our Personal Experience:** Since my last update, Caro and I have now welcomed our own three Ukrainians into the household, and a very rewarding and occasionally challenging experience it has turned out to be. Volodymyr and Olena are a younger couple and they have with them Liliia who is Volodymyr's mother. It has taken some time to even get used to how to spell their names! We have (in no particular order):

- been through the welcoming registration with Somerset
- set them up with a bank account each
- registered them with the NHS
- got them mobile phone SIMs
- registered them for Universal Credit at the Job Centre
- had them jabbed (their third, so first booster)
- got them their Biometric Residence Permits allowing them to stay 3 years

And I've probably forgotten some. Phew! And no doubt more bureaucracy will follow. In addition we have of course had to teach them the ways life works in England. Driving on the left was interesting, especially at roundabouts; which lane do I get into? This is not always obvious — there are general rules, but so often they are overridden by signs painted on the road. And getting used to our narrow country lanes has been a bit challenging for a driver used to 6 or 8 lane highways in Kyiv! And yesterday we had a lesson in how to do the recycling, when the bins go out, what goes in what, and so on. I get confused myself often enough, so it'll be no surprise if they miss a pick-up at some point, as we're leaving them largely to their own devices in September. They do have backup support though from our wonderfully supportive buddies, Jane and Martin, and Sue.

And then there's Richard the cat of course, an absolutely gorgeous ginger cross between a Scottish breed and a Chinchilla, with beautiful amber eyes. Used to living on the 24<sup>th</sup> floor of an apartment block in Kyiv, he is now loving the opportunity to explore the garden and meet the neighbours' cats.

Last night we took our guests down to the opening night of the reopened Mill, their first experience of an English pub. A nice sunny evening, sitting outside — not a bad introduction! In the middle of writing this article, I have just spent a few hours trying to get their UK mobile numbers transferred from '3' to their

new 6-months-free Vodafone SIM card, and that was not a lot of fun. Still, we've now managed to get two of the three numbers transferred. Why does everything seem so frustrating and difficult these days??

**Education:** As regards the whole Ukrainian community, the summer holidays have meant that English lessons have been scaled-back, classes only on Mondays and Fridays, funded by Somerset Council. The issue of childcare meant that it was going to be difficult for those with youngsters to be able to commit to their lessons, so the group decided to pause the lessons from Bath Academy during the summer period but restart in September when the schools go back. As a result of the wonderful response from the local community to the two Ukrainian evenings we held back in July as well as other individual donations received over the summer, we now have sufficient funds to allow Bath Academy to continue with lessons for another 6 weeks, so till the middle of October. Classes will be 3 hours long, two days a week, on Mondays and Tuesdays in Rode Memorial Hall. The Somerset funded classes will still be taking place in Norton St Phillip on Fridays as before.

There will be changes to the approach the Bath Academy teachers will be taking, however. As before, the students are divided into two groups, studying in parallel. The upper group (intermediate and advanced) will be hoping to take an exam at the end of their 6 weeks, the aim being to get them a certificate which will be useful in job interviews when applying for work. For those of you familiar with these things, the target is to if possible get the more advanced students up to level C1 of the European standard for grading language proficiency, defined as 'Effective operational proficiency or advanced'. The other less advanced group will concentrate on spoken/conversational English, which may possibly lead them to an appropriate exam at level A2 (basic and elementary). The students are certainly all very keen to progress their language skills, which have already in some cases come on a long way from when they first arrived some months ago.

Another Ukrainian Evening: The two Ukrainian evenings we held in July

were so successful the Ukrainians decided to hold another.

This time it was a summer barbecue on the Mead in Norton St Philip on Friday 26<sup>th</sup> August.







They were lucky in being blessed with fine weather, and lots of folk turned up to sample the beautifully made food on offer. There was a big vat of Kulish (a millet porridge) followed by skewers of meat which looked very appetising (even though I am vegetarian!) as well as Vareniki (a filled dumpling), and absolutely delicious apple bun-type desserts. The photos give you a taste of the atmosphere of a most enjoyable evening.

**Next?** As probably everyone is aware, hosts have signed up to a minimum of 6 months, and many of the earliest arrivals are getting towards that point. So discussions have been held in many households as to what happens next. There is no easy answer to this conundrum.

Their English has improved tremendously, and there are quite a few jobs available locally, which they will no doubt be applying for once their language training is finished. And some have already found employment in the area. But to earn enough to be able to afford their own place to live is really very challenging. There is already a shortage of affordable accommodation for local people, so where are the new arrivals to go? Most hosts are happy for their guests to stay on after the 6 months period is up, but they will have to move on at some stage. And of course for those with children now happily settled in local schools, it is important that they are able to stay local, in order to avoid unsettling already disturbed children. Not easy.

So if anyone knows of any rentable accommodation at a reasonable price, please, let me know. Or if anyone has previously thought about hosting Ukrainians and initially held back, but now would like to proceed, then again, do let me know.

My next report will not now be till the November edition, at which point we will be heading into a worrying winter, with the cost of living and energy prices going through the roof (as I write at least). Our guests are already thinking about how they are going to cope...

#### **LAVERTON NEWS**

**Laverton Fingerpost** - Many thanks to Bob Hill for keeping the Laverton fingerpost looking ship shape. I spotted Bob on his ladder repainting the post whilst I was driving through the village and couldn't resist taking a photo. Thank you Bob - It's looking great!



I had often wondered why the Laverton post had the spelling Buckland Denham - when the village is called Buckland Dinham. I asked Bob and he came back with a very interesting and comprehensive answer - see below:

There are two fingerposts where it is spelt Denham (prize for anyone finding the other one!). The probable (but boring) explanation is that while the 2nd finger of a large batch was being cast, the mistake was realised so the pattern was rectified to Dinham for all the others. An alternative more interesting version is that they are interchangeable because William the Conqueror gave the land to one of his faithful knights who came from Dinons in France. 'de Dinons' got shortened to DE(di)Nons or D(ed)INons. The Somerset Place Names book says: Bocheland 1086 (Domesday Book) "The land that is held by charter is Dunn's Home". Buckland is from the Old English *bocland*. Dinham is from a personal name *Dunn* and the Old English *ham* [meaning home , farm or small holding]. Dunn was one of the king's thanes at the time of the conquest. In passing, Laverton comes from Lavreton 1086 (Domesday Book) "The laurel tree enclosure" from the Old English *laur* and *ton*. This was the land of William de Ow whose tenant was named as Herbert.

**Need Something Repairing?** - Back by popular demand the Repair Cafe will be open for business in the Palairet Hall, NSP on Saturday 10 September from 10-12 noon and my husband Martin will be one of the team - so if you have any small electrical items currently not working - pop along!

Below is an interview Reverend Jo Williamson (who was heavily involved in setting up the café) had recently with Mal and Keith Bertenshaw about how they had found using the café, see below:

Q: When did you start coming to the café and how did you hear about it? Mal: 'I saw an advert in the Link and a poster in the Post Office and so I phoned Jo and asked about it and we started come in around October last year.'

Q: Why did you start coming to the café?

Mal: 'Well, I had been to the church for yoga - churches are different than they used to be - they have yoga and toddlers groups now - they are fun places! And also I felt that the café would be more of a private than a public place and so I felt that it would be a better place to go with Keith.'

Q: What happens at the café?

Mal: 'The first week we went we were full of trepidation, but we got a friendly "hello there" and Keith got a hand-shake - it was a really warm greeting. We get a cup of tea or coffee and loads of cakes and biscuits...easy chit-chat... it's like meeting old pals.'

Q: Keith, what do you think about the café?

Keith: 'It's brilliant! I like the sense of humour, and jokes - there's a connection that carries on week after week!'

Q: Mal, how has the café made a difference to you as a carer?

Mal: 'There are no expectations from the team - you can be yourself. And you are treated as an individual - I'm Mal, not just Keith's wife. I like it that couples can split up and sit on different tables and chat with others - the café team take an interest in you. I come home happy, we both do.'

Q: Would you recommend the café to other people in the same situation as yourself and if so, why?

Mal: 'Absolutely. How can I say this?...It gives you a lift knowing that there are people there who care and understand your predicament. The café team are very supportive.'

Q: What would like to say to people wondering about whether or not to come to the café?

Mal: 'Nothing ventured nothing gained! Don't let it being in a church put you off - it's a really happy atmosphere! It's one of the best things we ever did and it's

the only thing Keith's stuck to. It's made such an impression on him and it's the only thing he talks about between sessions - he looks forward to it every month.'

Mal feels so strongly about the difference the café has made to her and Keith's lives she wished me to add the following comment in addition to the interview to let others know and to thank the café team:

"What I would like to say is I would not be in this place now without you all, I am really so grateful to you all. I feel whole again even for an hour when I see my Keith laugh I can see my man, who is still in there. Keep going, I feel so privileged to have met you all, you are all very loving and special people. Much love" Mal.

Hopefully Mal's frank and heartfelt interview will encourage others who may have been reticent about going to the café, for whatever reason, to go along and give it a try for themselves.

#### SOMERSET NHS ENGAGEMENT RECENT NEWS

**Improving Young People's Health Knowledge** - "the eve appeal" are delighted to launch free, interactive, health-education lesson plans for young people aged 7-13, covering the topics anatomy, menstrual health, HPV and cancer. The lessons are free and available to download from knowyourbodylessons.org, and can be used by anyone, whether a teacher, youth worker, parent or young person - take a look, help empower the next generation.



The lessons were created with the help of experts in education and gynae health, with teachers and with feedback from pupils. They were created for 'spiral learning'- where children are retaught a subject several times, with more depth each time - so that as children move up the years their knowledge increases based on the foundations learnt beforehand.

Our research (Yougov, 2022) found that only 9% of people were taught about gynaecological health in their Relationships, Sex and Health Education (RSHE) lessons at school, and 8% said their parents were easy to talk to about gynae health. The Know Your Body programme was created to change that so the next generation have a greater awareness of gynaecological health and are empowered to look after it throughout their life, with the building blocks needed to know their body, notice any changes that might be the sign of something of wrong, and feel empowered to seek medical help.

All of the resources 'normalise' the topics and seek address the stigma that starts a young age around these issues. The area of gynaecological education was highlighted in the recent Women's Health Strategy. We hope these evidence-based and expert resources will begin addressing the current information gaps for children, teachers and parents.

**Trial NHS Menopause Services -** Women going through Menopause are being offered new services and better support as part of a year-long trial.



The Somerset NHS Menopause Service is made up of three elements. The main focus for the service is on the weekly Menopause Clinic which is already booked through to the autumn.

This work is complemented by two other services: better training for GPs and public advice and information webinars around the menopause. To find out more visit nhssomerset.nhs.uk/health/local-services/menopause-service/

NHS England – South West Skin Cancer Prevention Campaign - You're at higher risk of skin cancer if you have fair skin, moles or freckles, red or fair hair, or light-coloured eyes but excessive sun exposure can cause skin cancer in anyone. Sunburn increases the risk of skin cancer. A tan is not a sign of health and it won't protect you from the sun's harmful rays.

You can still get sunburn on cool days as you can't feel the ultraviolet (UV) rays. You can develop skin cancer at any age but those aged 50 or over are more likely to greater risk. Getting painful sunburn, just once every two years, can triple your risk of melanoma skin cancer!



A nice healthy glow? Not possible! Far from being a sign of health, a tan is actually a sign that your body is trying to repair damage from the sun.

**It's not too late for your Covid vaccination -** People in Somerset who have not yet had their COVID-19 vaccinations are being encouraged to come forward over the summer.



Vaccination clinics are open across the county offering appointments and walk in options for people to get their first, second and initial booster doses. Jabs will be available to everyone eligible from aged 5+.

Anyone who is 75 on or after the 1st July 2022 is now asked to wait until the Autumn to get their next booster, although people who are immunosuppressed are still able to come forwards. Pregnant women are also being encouraged to have their vaccinations and are advised to speak with their midwife for further advice.

Up to ten properties will be hosting visits, showcasing air and ground source heat pumps, solar panels, electric vehicles, hydro power, battery storage, and more.

If you are considering making changes to your own property, generating some of your own energy, or investing in an electric vehicle, this is a great opportunity to see the technology in-situ, speak to local people who have already taken such steps, and discover the pros and cons.

waste, save cash and give items a new life. As well as supporting charity shops and the growing repair cafe network, Reuse Week saw the Fixy reuse van visiting events across the county to collect dozens of donated smart tech items to be data-wiped and refurbished to pass on to local families in digital need.

The fun reuse contest attracted many entries e.g. a plastic box wildlife pond, strawberries grown in milk bottles, a lampshade flowerpot, child toys from wood offcuts, an oil drum growing potatoes see below. #### MDC'S CARBON MANAGEMENT PLAN ANNUAL REVIEW

The annual review of the Mendip Council's Carbon Management Plan shows positive progress has been made to tackle climate change but it also highlights the need for collective action by all, including government, to make a real difference.



MDC adopted its Carbon Management Plan in August 2021, listing a number of targets to enable it to achieve its climate and ecological commitments by 2030.

The latest annual report show positive progress has been made including increased recycling rates (over 52% of Somerset's household waste was recycled in 2019/20) and increased tree canopy cover in Mendip – an increase of an estimated 1.53% since 2019. Plus, Mendip have begun installing electric vehicle charging points in selected Council-owned car parks across the district's five major settlements.

Other initiatives launched by the District Council include a £50,000 Climate and Ecological Emergency Fund which has supported 16 local projects, as well as hosting sustainable land management webinars, in partnership with The Farm Carbon Toolkit, throughout July and August 2022.

However, the Plan highlights areas for improvement, including acknowledging the slow take-up of renewable energy. For example, the target for onshore wind generation is 77.3MW by 2030 whilst currently the district has 3.636MW installed.

The report shows that only 885 Mendip households have adopted retrofitting measures to improve the energy efficiency of their homes. More support is needed from government-funded grant schemes for the Council to reach its 2030 target of 15,400 retrofitted properties.

The Plan also recognises that without national government assistance, Mendip can only reduce its district emissions by a maximum of 37.5% against the 2017 baseline. National government assistance is required to achieve net zero.

#### **GARDEN NOTES SEPTEMBER 2022**

I'm pretty sure rising prices are a concern to everyone just now and this affects the choices we gardeners are making as well.

Here's a list of measures I'm planning to take this autumn in aid of balancing the domestic budget at TOC:

- Pay proper attention and nurture the plants I already have in the garden I chose them, I planted them and I really ought to look after them so they perform as well as possible. I'm hoping this extra care means I won't feel the need to impulse buy new plants to make up for disappointment in the borders. You may be familiar with that feeling which comes with looking at some plants, feeling just a bit meh and promptly passing the buck to them. It isn't their fault!
- Enjoy looking at lovely pictures of spring bulbs but either a) stick to a very strict list of bulbs to buy according to an actual plan I have worked out no wandering off piste into exotic new introductions or fashionably rare snowdrops or b) if I must have a wander off piste, that's only allowed in, say, early December when the bulb companies start to sell off discounted stock. It's a horticultural chicken run I'm thinking that I'll only blink at 40% discount offers but suspect it'll be more like 20%
- Even with the inevitable purchases under rule b) I'm still going to try and stick (more or less) to my chosen colour palette for this spring and bulk out what I've already ordered at full price, or just keep the really random coup de foudre purchases for small pots of new experimental bulb plantings that I can hide away in an obscure corner if they turn out to be revolting
- Not buy any more seeds until I'm sure my existing stocks just won't do. I know there are some gaps I'd like to plug and of course I'll always buy the annual favourites like Sweet Peas and Cosmos, but honestly how many packets of Antirrhinum 'Black Prince' do I think I need (3 at the last count,

apparently).

- Note: planting from seed always makes me feel so virtuous/smug/annoyingly smug/hopelessly depressed/furious according to germination and whether I forget the trays on the windowsills at the top of the loft but it is still hands down the best and cheapest way to grow plants.
- Here's a really important rule: no ordering of anything late at night and after a glass of wine.
- Which leads to the final rule: all rules are subject to change without any notice and to misquote St Augustine, God make me good, but just not yet.

# MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 9<sup>th</sup> AUGUST 2022 AT 7.30 pm

### **UNCONFIRMED**

### **Present:**

Cllr Mike Salmon – Chair (MS), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR) and Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB) **In attendance:** Cllr Barbi Lund, Cllr Dawn Denton, Hugh Williams – Clerk and 1 parishioner.

- 1. Public Participation: Concerns were expressed over the proposed new planning application for seven houses off Church Lane. It was thought the access was not suitable and that the area was not large enough for seven properties. It was reported that all the neighbours to the land were opposed to the development.
- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr P Travis and Cllr A Boyden (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> July were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.
- **5. Report from District Councillor:** Cllr Lund reported that the Tree Council was funding the planting of trees by schools and community groups; and additionally, there was funding for local schools to create nature areas.
- **6. Report from County Councillor:** Cllr Denton reported that the Local Community Network (LCN) boundary still had not been decided which was of concern. The Frome LCN had done a very good detailed audit of children and family services as part of a pilot LCN.

There was a major concern over bus services with the withdrawal of funding for the D2 service from Frome to Bath which served Rode. The user numbers were still down and use needed to be encouraged. It was thought First Bus had a several £100,000 short-fall. There was a likelihood the evening service would be axed.

### 7. Actions from previous meeting:

- Trees: Merfield/The Mead: Cllr Lund reported she had received a comprehensive reply from Bo Walsh and the risk/hazard from the trees was low even though they were considered dangerous. She agreed to see who should be contacting David James over the state of the trees as it was unclear who at Mendip would do this.
- **ii. Tree on The Mead near allotments:** The Clerk reported this should be seen to at end of week.

- iii. Clock: The Clerk reported that Peter Watkinson had made the necessary repairs to allow the clock to strike again. Initially the half hour and hour striking were wrong; but Peter Harris and Mike Price had sorted this out. Both had attended the repairs and Mike was being trained up to look after the clock. The Chair thanked the Clerk for persisting in getting Peter Watkinson to repair the clock.
- iv. Ultrafast broadband: There had been a presentation over 'Teams' to some Parish Councillors by Gigaclear who appeared to be the most advanced of the possible providers. The box for providing ultrafast broadband was due for delivery and installed on Lower Street/Rode Hill land at the end of August. A range of services would be available, these would have an initial 18month price but this would rise after this introductory period. Gigaclear was planning to make a presentation of their service in the Memorial Hall, probably in September.
- v. Grass round Christchurch: Currently this was cut by Mendip but done infrequently either left too long or done too often. The owner of Christchurch was keen to rewild this area to improve biodiversity. Mendip said that both the PC and Diocese would have to approve this before any change could be made. The meeting approved the rewilding of this area provided a path was left clear for those to attend graves. JM agreed to now take this to the diocese for approval.
- **8.** Climate Change Group: The main action arising from the last meeting was the agreement to run a 'Big Green Weekend' to be held on 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> September. This would take place in Rode, Norton St Philip and Beckington. A repair café would run in Norton on morning of 10<sup>th</sup> with 3 speakers (on climate issues) on 10<sup>th</sup> afternoon in the Committee Room at the Memorial Hall along with stands in the main hall. On Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> there would be a series of 'open houses' showing off various energy saving and other climate initiatives in the villages. JM asked for a contribution towards the publicity for the weekend and the PC agreed an initial donation of £100. The two other PCs would be asked for a similar contribution.

### 9. Highways:

- a) The Sportsman a further response had been received from Somerset which indicated that they were unable to fund any further work to prevent surface water on Clay Lane. Discussions reported that adoption of The Sportsman would not resolve all the issues and it was thought that the retained monies from the development could be used to resolve the drainage issues which were part of the S106 agreement for the development. AP agreed to obtain photos and the Clerk agreed to send these to Somerset clearly indicating the current problems.
- **b) Double yellow lines and 20mph in village:** MS reported Sara Davis had recently visited Rode and marked where the double yellow lines would go at the Rode Hill/High Street junction. The consultation for these ended on 18<sup>th</sup> August

and if no objections were received these should be in place within a short time. The 20mph limit in the village and the installation of village gates had been agreed by the police. The publication of the TRO still had to be done but Sara Davis was confident these would be in place before the end of the calendar year.

### 10. Planning:

### i) New applications:

**2022/1516/OUT:** Outline planning permission with some matters reserved for 7no dwelling houses with access details – land at rear of 41A Church Lane. Discussions on this noted that the objections made for the development on Barbara's Field over access, visual impact etc. would not apply to this proposal. The concerns from the neighbouring properties were noted. It was agreed to request an extension to the commenting time would be requested to allow for a fuller discussion at the September meeting.

### ii. Mendip decisions:

**2022/0801/HSE:** Replacement of existing conservatory – 3 Orneage Close. Approved.

**2022/1196/TPO:** Elm, removal of dead wood and remove/reduce overhanging lateral branches – 9 Langham Place. Approved.

**2022/1265/TCA:** Eucalyptus, reduce by 2m; acer reduce roadside by 0.5m - 5 Lower Street. Approved.

### iii. Other:

**2021/0071/OTS:** There had been no further news on the appeal. It was agreed that DLA Piper would be asked the following questions to help the PC prepare for the appeal:

- 1. Can we, as statutory consultee to the original decision-making process, be an official party to an appeal?
- 2. What forum (inquiry, hearing or written submissions) is in our best interests?
- 3. Why do we think the Appellant has requested an inquiry?
- 4. Can we have influence over the decision as to forum?
- 5. If we cannot be a party, what opportunity will we have to make submissions?
- 6. Any other advice as to how best to represent parishioners' interests in this process.

The appeal was likely to be through the inquiry process, which the developer had asked for, but Mendip would make the final decision. Cllr Lund agreed to ask Mendip for an update on the appeal.

11. Playing Field Constitution: AP is still to contact Steve Eyles to progress.

12. Church Farm: Some members of the Parish Council along with a resident from Church Farm had met Rob Benson of Autograph Homes and clarified a number of issues regarding the hard and soft landscaping. The path from the development would be improved on the land near the development in

accordance with the S106; however, the majority of the path had never been defined in any agreements and would remain as it is unless a new S106 can be agreed. It was hoped Mendip would require this (asked for by the PC and residents) as part of the planning revision requested by Autograph to change 2 properties from affordable to general sales. Autograph have agreed to put sand bags by the 'bridge' in the playing field and supply 1 tonne of fine stone to improve the path.

It was still unclear what the composition of the management company would be or when it would take over the maintenance of the path and communal areas on Church Farm.

- **13. Memorial Hall:** AE was now part of the Management Committee for the Hall and had attended the AGM, she reported that the Memorial Hall was keen to work with the Playing Field. It had also been agreed that the Hall would be free for villagers for the foreseeable future.
- **14. LCNs:** The Chair expressed his concerns that there were only 8 months until the new Somerset Council becomes the new Unitary Authority and the powers, responsibilities and geography of the LCNs still had not been decided. Cllr Denton said a consultation on these would start at the end of August and in November the recommendations for the size/area of the LCNs along with their powers and responsibilities would be made. There was a possibility of there being 40 LCNs which the meeting considered far too many.
- **15. Cold weather:** With energy prices continuing to rise a number of people would be in financial difficulties over the winter. The meeting gave initial thoughts to what could be done in Rode with one suggestion being to open up the Memorial Hall during the day and offer teas, coffees and maybe food to be somewhere people could meet and keep warm. This would be explored further at future meetings.
- **16. Buses:** The problems of reduced services had been raised under the County Councillor's report and people were encouraged to sign the petition to keep services. The Bus Users and Stakeholders Group was doing everything possible to get a service retained.
- **17. Allotments:** MS and JB had inspected the site at the end of The Mead, the main problems were the large tree at one end of the site and foul water drains near the other end. However, after discussion it was agreed this land could be offered to make new allotments probably two half plots. The Chair would discuss this further with the Rode Garden Committee.
- **18.** New Website: JM had had discussions with Zonkey who provided websites for a number of local groups and councils. It was agreed in principal that a new site would help with communication and should be open to other village groups and organisations in Rode. The question was raised who should have overall control was raised. It was agreed JM would go back to Zonkey and ask for a proposal to be put together for presentation at a future meeting.

### 19. Financial matters:

i) VAT rebate: The rebate of £2,264.65 had been paid into the PC account.

ii) Payments: The following payments were agreed:

### 20. Other business:

- i) A question had been raised over how long the Ukrainian flag would be flown for. After discussion it was agreed to keep it flying until Remembrance Day.
- ii) Should the street lights be turned off after midnight to save energy it was reported that this had been raised with Somerset some years ago and rejected by them. However, Cllr Denton agreed to raise this again with Somerset.
- iii) Fire on waste site on A361 this had been put out quickly by the fire brigade but it raised the question whether the PC should have a fire plan. This would be considered at a future meeting.


