REFLECTION

The biggest news in the UK these last few weeks has been 'Mr Bates vs the Post Office'. Everybody is talking about it, and everyone seemed to be feeling the same thing saying, 'it makes me so angry.' Why do we all feel angry about this? Because it is a huge miscarriage of justice and British people put a high value on justice — we want things to be fair — we don't like it when powerful people or organisations lie and take advantage of those who are not able to defend themselves. The Post Office appears to have been more concerned about their reputation than speaking the truth, and this cover-up went on for years. The story of the hundreds of sub-postmasters whose lives have been destroyed and changed for ever by the unjust allegations and convictions has led to a public outcry - and rightly so.

This got me thinking about what God thinks about injustice. We say that God is love, but if love is on one side of the coin, I would like to suggest that that the other side of the coin is justice. Without justice love is empty and weak.

In Old Testament times God sent prophets to his people, not look in a crystal ball and tell them what the future holds, but to hold up a mirror to them and show them what they are doing wrong. The prophet Isaiah said:

"For I, the Lord, love justice; I hate robbery and wrong doing." (Isaiah 67 v 8) and he told God's people:

"Learn to do right; seek justice. Defend the oppressed. Take up the cause of the fatherless; plead the case of the widow." (Isaiah 1:17)

Isaiah goes on to foretell the coming of Jesus who would bring justice and peace: "Here is my servant...he will bring justice to the nations.... A bruised reed he will not break, and a smouldering wick he will not snuff out. In faithfulness he will bring forth justice."

Although God's people have sometimes been the oppressor rather than the defender of the vulnerable, there are many more who have been in the forefront of fighting injustice – obvious examples from history that spring to mind include William Wilberforce who was at the forefront of the campaign to abolish slavery; George Müller who from 1836, during the time of Dickens and Oliver Twist, cared for thousands of destitute orphans in Bristol; Gladys Aylwood who was described as 'a small woman with a big God', who campaigned for the end of the cruel foot-binding practice of women in China, and Martin Luther King who led the civil rights movement in the USA in the 60's.

So, I wonder what justice issue gets you steamed up? Is it the climate emergency or people trafficking or unfair pay rates for essential workers or....

There are so many injustices that sometimes it is hard to know what to do about them and we might feel that we are just 'skint little people' - powerless to change things - and so we do nothing. Alan Bates was pretty ordinary, but he didn't give up, he continued to hold up that mirror to injustice — and look what has happened! So, let's learn from him and do our bit to defend those that are voiceless and oppressed.

One way we can offer support is through finances.

In our parish we support 3 different charities and one of these charities is Asha India that offers young people opportunities to gain an education regardless of their background, caste or religious beliefs. Our Rector Caroline will be visiting this project in February, during her sabbatical, as they celebrate 25 years of transforming lives in the slums of Delhi.

And you are a part of this amazing work as all of the donations that were given during our Christmas Services went to our charities and I am delighted to let you know that the total collected was £2330 - so thank you for helping release people from poverty by transforming their futures.

May God continue to use us to challenge injustice and make a difference, one life at a time. Amen!

There were very few comments on why people were against the turn off, which was slightly disappointing as it would have been good to know why.


One point that we had not made clear in the questionnaire was the estimated cost, and to clarify this; it would be a one-off cost for Somerset to come round and fix new timers to any of the lights that are to go off at midnight and, if necessary, come back on at 5.30am. There should be no ongoing costs.

Therefore, the Parish Council plan to contact Somerset Council after its next meeting in February to progress the turning off of all the Rode street lights after midnight except for those on Bradford Road, Church Lane, High Street and Rode Hill.







Parish Environment CLIMATE EMERGENCY UPDATE

Proposed Solar Farm: The proposal for a large solar farm in Rode was debated at length at the December Parish Council meeting. After nearly an hour and a half of discussion, the Parish Council unanimously decided to **object** to the application. The PC is acutely aware of the need for more sustainable energy sources, but in this case the <u>scale</u> of the proposed development, and its impact on the setting of the village were over-riding factors. Other reasons were also important, reflecting the views of local residents (as set out in the various responses to the planning application – 43 submissions, of which 42 objected, with one neutral). The PC's submission to Somerset Council is available on the Rode Village website: www.rodevillage.com/parish-council/planning/major-planning-applications/solar-farm/

In addition to the objection from Rode PC, a number of other consultees have objected, including the Somerset Council Conservation Officer and Somerset Council Ecology Services. Historic England's submission stated "We consider that the proposals could result in both physical harm and harm to the historic rural landscape as a result of the marked change from a rural landscape which forms part of the setting of both the church and the long barrow both of which are considered significant heritage assets." The Somerset Council Landscape Officer had "an objection to its size and resultant visual impact from certain locations." [He recommended a number of changes, including a reduction in scale of the proposed development]. The Environment Agency had no objection on the proviso that a detailed water containment plan was provided (and approved) for the location of the battery storage facility. Finally, although not a formal consultee, CPRE Somerset strongly objected to the proposal. timetable for Somerset Council to determine the application is not yet known, albeit a decision should normally be reached within 13 weeks of the application being submitted (ie, by 12th February).

Climate Change Means More Flooding: Climate change is increasing the risk of both flooding and drought in the UK. As the atmosphere warms, it can hold more water, which is then released during rainfall events. According to the Met Office, for the decade 2010 to 2019, UK summers were 13 per cent wetter, and winters 12 per cent wetter, than in the period 1961 to 1990. Seven of the wettest years on record (ie, since 1862) in the UK have occurred since 1998. The five wettest winters have all been from 1990 onwards.

So, it seems pretty certain that Climate Change is already impacting Rode, with various flood events in the village over the past 20 years or so. Fortunately quite a bit of work has been undertaken to try to mitigate the impact of higher rainfull – the holding ponds to the east of the village were upgraded in the early 2000s, and more recently renovations were carried out to the drainage system at locations around the village.

Parish Environment

Notwithstanding these improvements, some problems still remain – notably on Crooked Lane and Straight Lane, and behind the Old Brewery site. Water runoff from the fields, combined with blocked drains, can result in large volumes of water running down the High Street. Likewise, waterlogged fields on the land behind the Old Brewery can cause excess water to accumulate there – all of which occurred most recently on 4th January.

Rode Parish Council and County Councillor Dawn Denton have been working on some solutions in conjunction with Somerset Council and others. The key actions are as follows:

- An inspection of Crooked Lane was arranged (ref. 620939) in November, and an order as placed with the Somerset Council operations team to cleanse the existing drainage system. This was added to the works programme which started on 8th January, and this work has been completed;
- Some minor improvements on Crooked Lane will take place (to include siding back of highway verges to better channel surface water and undertaking some minor re-profiling of the existing surface);
- An upgrade to a length of drainage towards bottom of Crooked Lane (which
 has collapsed) has been included in the structural maintenance programme
 for the new financial year although there are many sites across the county
 that need to be prioritised and this work may not be completed for some time;
- A site meeting took place on 16th January with a representative of Somerset Council Highways. As a result drains along Straight Lane (from the junction with Parkgate Lane/Crooked Lane) will be jetted and cleansed in due course;
- Rode Parish Council will liaise with Clive Harrington with a view to arranging a regular (annual) sweep of key roads/lanes in the village to remove surface debris/leaves etc (likely to occur November, after major autumnal leaf-fall).
- Rode Parish Council is liaising with the landowner, such that minor works can take place in the fields behind the Old Brewery to minimise the risks to those properties.

RODE & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

Despite the challenging weather January saw many members rejoin and several new members interested in joining.

The programme of garden visits from May to September is proving popular. This year we will visit gardens in Wells, Wincanton and Newton St Loe plus a day visit to RHS Wisley in September.

Talks during the colder darker days are on varied topics and started in January with a very interesting demonstration on pruning from Neil Ross.

He brought several stems to illustrate how to do it and began by asking if members had any plants that they were particularly concerned about pruning, which he covered. His key points were that you need sharp clean tools; secateurs preferably should be by-pass, a strong pair of loppers but he was increasingly interested in ones that are not so heavy or extendable as they can be frustrating to use. He felt a good quality small saw was most useful, plus shears to shape bushes like box.

When pruning as well as removing dead, dying or diseased branches it is also necessary to take out dainty weak stems as they will not provide strong future growth. Taking out a proportion of old branches ensures the bushes don't get too dense and keeps the plant in a good shape, so it looks right where it is.

Some plants like dog woods can be cut right down to the ground in March to ensure new growth, which will keep the bright colour of reds, yellow and bright green that gardeners prize. The cuttings can be used to support growing plants that tend to flop or crops like peas, which require staking. The cut stems can also be woven into frames to support. While most dog woods can cope with removal of all growth many plants cannot, so just the remove a proportion. It will keep the plant thriving and over several years bring it more under control. Bushes should have branches of different ages.

He encouraged gardeners to take out branches from the base on most shrubs rather than trimming just the top. This thinning out is good for renewal of the shrub. Strong growing plants like apples benefit from this, as it allows better air flow, prevents lots of non-fruiting stems and keeps fruiting at the required height. A good rule of thumb is to prune deciduous plants in winter when dormant, and evergreens in the spring or summer after flowering. Rosemary, hebes and clematis montana can all be tidied up after flowering to keep them looking compact and encourage flowering.

Some shrubs and trees do not like being pruned but if it is necessary, apply the rules above taking out just one or two branches where needed.

Roses can be pruned at any time in the winter and Neil suggested that the whippy growth of climbers and ramblers can be tied loosely to their support in the summer to keep tidy and then tied down into place in the winter, so they are growing horizontally to encourage more flowers.

Neil's talk inspired members and they were more confident in tackling their pruning jobs.

This month's meeting is on 12th February when Derek Dexter will talk on growing fuchsias. Doors open at 7:15pm for refreshments. Talks start at 7:30 pm.

Parish History

JONATHAN NOAD AND HIS LEGACY TO RODE

This article has been inspired by another letter in the possession of Dave Collins of Australia, whose ancestors came from Rode. Below is the only remaining part of the letter that has survived for over 250 years, including being transported to Australia by sailing ship.

"To Miss Sally Whitaker

Dear Miss,

I am going to desire a Favour of you which I hope You'll not deny me, that is to give me your Company five minutes this Night abt. Seven O'Clock on the Top of the Hill, where if you'll be so good I'll do myself the pleasure to meet you. I have something of Consequence to say to you, and have a particular Reason for not coming to yr. Brother's, which. if you'll favour me with a meeting at the place appointed, I will tell you.

Pray don't be anyways apprehensive that I intend anything dishonourable, for by all that's sacred, I do not. I only want to speak a few words."

The signature is missing, but the facts that a Jonathan Noad married Sally in 1762; their daughter, Sarah, married James Collins; and that the letter survived in the Collins' family, strongly suggests that he was the author. Presumably he wished to find out how she felt before saying anything in front of her family.

Jonathan's date of birth and parentage are unclear, but he is thought to have been born c1740.

He was brought up by Thomas Noad, a cloth maker and his wife Joanna, living and working at Rockabella.

Jonathan's surname seems to have gradually changed from Miller to Noad. and he was described in Thomas's will of 1760 as: "..... Jonathan Miller otherwise Noad (who has liv'd with me from his infancy and for whom I have a sincere regard) ..."

Thomas appears to have trained Jonathan in his cloth manufacturing business. Then, lacking any sons of his own, on his death Thomas left the house, business, and the bulk of the rest of his estate to him.

Jonathan and Sally were married at St. Lawrence in 1762 and continued to live and work at Rockabella.

Jonathan had an agent, Mr Elderton, at Blackwell Hall in London, the centre for the wool and cloth trade in England in the 18th century. Elderton bought bags of wool and sent them to Rode where Jonathan had them made into broad cloth, which he sent back to Elderton to sell. The following is a note from Elderton to Jonathan at that time.

"30/6/63 Yours received – is now before me – must inform you it has given me great uneasiness after all the care that I always have taken of your Business (you would recommend to me to pay some regard to your interest) which expression I think very ingenuous nay ungrateful – there is no man in this world ever strived to oblige one person more than I have always done to you, or has any man's Business him done better or taken more care of – where one blue cloth has been sold for 16/6 there has been twenty sold for 16/- in Blackwell Hall within these last six months and not a cloth of yours has been sold under full price except one which you very well know was very bad." "Let me tell you once more I have always studied your interest as much as my own – the last twenty bags of wool I sent you are at this time worth full Forty Pounds more than charged to you at. I knew they was good bargain, therefore wrote to you to have them. I have been wrote to ten times for this wool, but if I would give 3/per pound there is not another bag in London - the very day I sent them you I was offered $2/7^{1/2}$ for them – now they are worth 2/8 – but I think there is no pleasing. Three blos received – your Bill shall be paid."

 $3\ \mathrm{months}$ and several notes later their relationship appears to have improved.

"6/10/63 (3 bl received) I shall be extremely glad to see you in Town. My house you know is your house, am glad to hear Mrs Noad is well Your order of Tulips shall be completed, will call on the person about the colt Am much obliged to you for your kindness & hope by this time you have seen the gentleman you mentioned & pray don't leave one stone unturned until you can get me a couple of good medley makers and in doing of this you will do me the greatest piece of kindness you possibly can. Pray do all that lays in your power and desire Mr. Ledyard to speak to his brother at Semington. I shall say no more but leave it to your good conduct.

NB Keep your Cloths to a good substance.

PS I ordered you to dye 20 pieces? of light blues but I would not have" "don't dye any middling blues yet. Let me have your Bolts - if possible you can forward 1462 pray do."

Sally's father, Thomas Whitaker was a very successful dyer with businesses at Rode Bridge, and Shawford. When he died in 1781, he left Jonathan the house and business at Shawford plus £800.

With this and the inheritance from his adoptive father, Jonathan went on to become a wealthy man, and he used some of his money from the cloth trade to provide his children with some of the finest houses in Rode - a legacy we are still able to enjoy today.

They are:

- Ivy House, (22 High St.), suitably upgraded for daughter Sarah who had married James Collins.
- Southfield House (16 High St.), converted from 3 terraced cottages for Thomas and his family.
- Shawford House, renovated for Humphrey and his family.
- Merfield House, (Straight Lane) newly built for Jonathan Jnr. and wife.

Jonathan Snr. died aged 74, having lived most of his life at Rockabella.

To complete the story of the letter, James and Sarah Collins had two daughters and a son, Thomas.

The latter became Captain of a merchant ship and in 1827 his wife travelled with him to Australia. She seems to have continued sailing with him as she gave birth to a child at sea off Trinidad in 1829. They then made a home for a while in Sydney, Australia, but returned to Rode in 1838 so that their eldest son could attend school in England. Later they sailed again to Australia to live out their days in Queensland.

Jonathan Noad Snr was the grandfather of Commander Arthur Mayne Noad RN. of Southfield House, Rode – details of his life, the stained glass window in his memory in St. Lawrence Church and two of his letters were featured in The Link in 2023.





GOOD NEWS FOR EVERYONE (GNFE) (FORMERLY GIDEONS)

Thank you so much for ongoing support and prayers for GNFE. Whilst some of the traditional routes for outreach have been curtailed in recent years, others are emerging! These include large scale events such as recent distributions to Scouts and Guides at Exeter Cathedral and sports organisations such as Bristol City and Rugby Bears. Over the past year there has been much blessing at recent summer festivals/agricultural shows! The following provides a brief snapshot:

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON MONDAY 11th DECEMBER 2023 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon (MS) – Chair, Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR) and Cllr Moira Punt (MP).

In attendance: Hugh Williams – Clerk, Cllr Adam Boyden (County Councillor) and 5 parishioners.

- **1. Parishioners Participation:** The principal concerns of all Parishioners present were the proposed solar farm and in particular its size and the use of Monkley Lane as an access road. It was agreed that this planning application would be moved up the agenda.
- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr A Pickett and Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 13th November were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Planning:

2023/**2183**/**FUL:** Construction and operation of a solar photovoltaic farm with battery storage and associated infrastructure, including inverters, security cameras, fencing, access tracks and landscaping.

The Chair outlined the comments that had been received by Somerset, apart from 27 comments from Rode residents (26 opposed, 1 neutral) there had been comments from a number of statutory consultees. There were no major concerns from: Environment (no noise concerns), Somerset Archaeology (apart from one possible barrow), and Highways (apart from need for improved access/egress from the site off A361. Local Lead Flood Authority required improved drainage and plans for heavy rainfall events, the Somerset Landscape Officer did not object but required black panels and improved screening of the 'farm' along with the removal of much of the triangular area near Rode on the road to Wingfield. There were objections from Somerset Conservation over impact on listed buildings and supports Somerset CPRE objection which said the 'farm' was too large and too close to the village and would impact on it, along with other solar farms in the area this was too many; there was insufficient information and in particular lack of safety regarding the batteries.

The principal local concerns were the use of Monkley Lane for construction and, also for future access to both the site and the batteries and inverters, the scale of the proposed solar farm and concern over the lack of detail provide. Discussion

over the Parish Council (PC) declaring a climate emergency and possible counter action of not supporting a solar farm. Additionally, concerns were expressed over the lack of benefits to the village itself. However, with the Climate Emergency Group also having concerns over the proposal it was agreed that the PC would submit an objection with comments. These comments would centre on, scale of solar farm and the impact on the character of Rode, use of Monkley Lane, lack of detail on a number of issues and in particular on the safety of the batteries.

Information was given to the meeting that Somerset was working on a renewable energy plan for the county but this would not be ready until sometime in 2024. It was reported that the amount of financial remuneration being offered to the PC was very low when compared to other solar farms and the PC would require further negotiations with Low Carbon on this.

6. County Councillors Report: The LCN had recently met and had discussed road safety, this had given a chance to raise the two fatal accidents on the A361 and the delay in implementing a 30mph limit on this stretch of road. This had been taken on board and the TRO for the 30mph limit on the A361 and 20mph limit in the village should now be issued by 21 December.

The replacement sites for consultation on where to build the 505 houses arising from the shortfall to meet the Local Plan Part 2 should be issued soon. It was though none of the sites would be in Rode, Beckington or Norton St Philip.

A public consultation on the Somerset budget for next year was now open: https://somersetcouncil.citizenspace.com/comms/budget-consultation-2024-2025/ This is open to all to gauge people's priorities and everyone was encouraged to look at this.

7. Actions from previous meeting:

- **i** Grass cutting: The Clerk reported that Tony Jones had accepted the cutting of the village grass for 2024, however a contract was to be drafted by Cllr A Pickett and sent to him for agreement.
- **ii. Paths at playing field:** Following the meeting of the Playing Field Committee it had been agreed to cut through the fence and put in a path to join up with the concrete path from the skate board area. A sign asking people to keep dogs on short leads would be put in place. It was agreed to progress with this and instal a scalping path.
- **8.** Climate Change Group: The Group had recently met and submitted comment on the proposed solar farm development.

9. Highways issues:

- i. Street Lights Turn off: A new questionnaire outline possible extent of the turn off at midnight had been prepared and members of the PC agreed to circulate this to all Parishioners.
- **ii. SIDs:** JB reported on the new automatic SIDs which could be put in place and made continuous recordings during daylight hours. These new devices would help avoid confrontations between the Speedwatch team and motorists

and the data provision could be used by the police to approach persistent speeders. It was agreed to make the purchase of one automatic SID for use on Bradford Road and Rode Hill. Avon and Somerset Police have still not taken the initiative to sponsor these.

10. Planning:

i) New applications:

2023/2187/FUL: See above under 5).

ii) Somerset decisions:

2023/2036/TCA: Fell apple tree and reduce another by 1m to leave a height and lateral branch length of 3m - 13 High Street. Approved

11. Website: The new website was now live and thanks were expressed to JM for his work on it. More of the village history still had to be transferred over. Zonkey would be approached to give access to other people. JB requested access to update the Hoedown section, he reported the last Hoedown had collected a lot of litter and it was questioned what could be done to try and stop people just throwing litter from vehicles. This would be considered early next year.

12. Any other business:

- i) **Trees behind school:** It was noted that leaves etc. from these were possibly blocking the culvert behind the school. Some had been pollarded and the culvert would be inspected.
- **ii) Christmas tree:** The PC expressed its gratitude to the Osbornes for supplying the tree on the green. (Clerk to thank on behalf of the PC).
- **iii) Somerset Bus Partnership:** PT reported that the Bus Partnership was asking Parish Councils for support; the official request would follow. The meeting agreed to donate £100 to the Partnership.

13. Financial matters:

- **i. Annual donations:** These would be reviewed and payments made in January.
- **ii. Payments:** The following payments were agreed:

- 1. Parishioners Participation: None
- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr P Restorick and Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 11th December were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Actions from previous meeting:

i Grass cutting: AP reported that he had sent a contract to Tony Jones outlining the frequency of cutting and length of grass required. The contract included termination conditions and requested extra cuts of playing field prior to village 'fete' and the village green prior to the Remembrance Service. He was waiting for acceptance and said that Tony Jones had expressed interest in attending the February meeting.

The Clerk agreed to inform Eagle Grounds Maintenance that they would not be required for 2024.

- **ii. Paths at playing field:** The Chair reported he and Grant Slade had measured up the new path length and he was now awaiting a quote for the scalping path and new gate. It was hoped the path could be completed after the February meeting.
- **iii.** The Mill: The replies from Somerset had still not resolved the issues over the new licence and AP agreed to pose detailed questions again to Phil Wake to try and clarify the situation. It was agreed to copy in the County Councillors.
- **iv. Paths from Barrow Farm:** The meeting considered the quote and agreed to request a revision as it was thought too much time had been quoted for the actual work. The Clerk agreed to try and get a revised quote.
- **6. County Councillors Report:** It was reported that the Planning Committee was to review the allocated sites to build the 'missing' 505 houses on 14th February and would then issue the list of proposed sites for consultation.

Cllr Boyden reported that the TRO for the 20mph speed limit in the village along with changes on the A361 had finally been issued. However, this, if approved,

would not be implemented until the new financial year (after April). There was no news on the solar farm.

The Police were asking for a 10% increase in their precept but even with this increase services would have to be reduced. The Somerset Council consultation on people's priorities was still open to 22 January. However, the financial situation for the Council looked bad and whether sufficient savings could be made to avoid the Council going into a Section 114 agreement was uncertain. A final decision would be made at the 20th February meeting.

7. Drainage: An inspection of the drains had been carried out on Crooked Lane following the flooding after the recent heavy rains. A collapsed drain had been identified and concern was expressed that the drainage work carried out recently across the village should have included Crooked Lane but appeared not to have done so. Further work by Somerset is expected.

The run off from fields down Straight Lane and Crooked Lane had nearly caused houses to flood and it was agreed to approach Clive Harrington to see if leaf clearance could be carried out in November to help alleviate the problem.

8. Climate Change Group: The Group was due to meet soon to agree objectives for 2024. JM reported there were 97 people on the Group's circulation list.

9. Highways issues:

- i. Street Lights Turn off: The Clerk reported that the responses received indicated a 2:1 majority in favour of turning off street lights at midnight. 99 responses were received (65 in favour, 33 against and 1 abstention). The meeting agreed to go ahead with the turn off after publishing the results in The Link and on the noticeboard.
- **ii. SIDs:** Details of the automatic SID had been sent to the Clerk and he agreed to order it along with a solar boost pack and warning sign.
- **iii. TRO for 20mph limit:** This had now been issued for the village centre, and if agreed work would take place after April. The TRO included reduced speed limits on the A361. It was reported no signs about the TRO had been put up and this would be investigated.
- **iv. Finger post:** The finger post on Straight Lane had been damaged again with a finger being broken off. It was agreed to try and move the whole post back from the junction and mend it.

10. Planning:

i) New applications:

2023/2446/HSE: Rear storey extension, replace house/garage roofs, removal of parapet, demolish room on south east elevation, replace/add new windows/doors and amend existing access – Hill View House, Bradford Road. No objections.

ii) Somerset decisions:

 $\underline{\textbf{2023/2135/TCA:}}$ To fell cherry tree and reduce height of cypress by 50% - 25 Lower Street. Approved

- **11. Website:** JM reported he was still transferring the large amount of village history from the old site to the new one. The PC expressed its thanks to him and especially Peter Harris who had compiled all this history.
- **12. Neighbourhood Plan:** There had been a pre-meeting of Parish Councillors reviewing the current Neighbourhood Plan. Since the Plan was drawn up a large number of houses had been built in Rode and it was agreed to get accurate numbers for these. The 2021 census would be checked to see if more up to date information on Rode was available. It was noted that 2029 was now only 5 years away and that the PC would need to conduct an in-depth review of the Plan in 2-3 years.

AP agreed to approach Liz Beth or Context Planning regarding reviews of Neighbourhood Plans.

The meeting agreed to confirm information for review at the February meeting.

13. Financial matters:

- **i. Memorial Hall:** A request from the Memorial Hall to pay for the floor sanding was agreed as the Memorial Hall was through agreement linked to the parish Council. Reimbursement would be sought.
- **ii. Payments:** The following payments were agreed:




