Spring is a beautiful time of year and as we move out (hopefully) of the long, cold, wet spell that we have been experiencing lately....Spring will be on us very quickly. Spring echoes the church calendar.

Having celebrated Easter and the resurrection of Jesus we have renewed hope, renewed vision and renewed understanding of a better way to live and be - celebrating that we can be forgiven, and that there is life beyond death.

Children are often helpful in showing us how to see the beauty around us, when we so often focus on the negatives and the problems. The innocent joy of hearing a child laugh as they jump on a trampoline or run across the fields. Like lambs they are still carefree and simply glad to be alive.

NEWS FROM ST LAWRENCE

You may have heard the bells ringing on the morning of Saturday 13th April — this was a visiting band of ringers from around Somerset who rang a peal — non-stop ringing which on this occasion took 2 hours 40 minutes to complete. As I am normally one of the ringers it was nice for a change to not be ringing but to hear the bells being rung by experienced ringers. I seem to remember it was a lovely day and I sat outside in the garden with a cup of tea listening to the bells.

Many of us gathered in Norton church on Maundy Thursday for a Passover supper. The tables had been beautifully laid and the food was delicious and traditional to the Passover feast. Although it was a solemn occasion there was an opportunity to catch up with people as we ate and also to discuss the various traditions we were enacting such as the washing of each others hands and the significance of the food items.

You may have seen about 20 of us walking round Rode on Good Friday behind the large wooden cross, this was our walk of witness and we were blessed with good weather for the majority of the walk. We were then welcomed by the chapel congregation for a short service and reflection.

The church looked beautiful for Easter Sunday, with the wonderful arrangements created by our team of flower arrangers and we are very grateful for all their hard work.









We are in the process of revamping our fourth Sunday informal service. It will be at the new time of 9am (just like Breakfast Church on the second Sunday of the month) and I will outline more about it in next month's Link. However, suffice to say we will begin with coffee and the service will commence at 9.15am, aiming to finish by 10am. 
RODE RIVERSIDE WALK

The passes are issued on request by a volunteer on behalf of the Parish Council and we are now

Parish Nature

EARLY SPRING IN ALL SAINTS TELLISFORD CHURCHYARD

Over several dry and wind-free days in January, we pollarded the seven lime trees, offered the branches as supports to village gardeners growing (for example) climbing beans, sweet peas or dahlias, then transformed the remainder into chippings, which were all used in various Tellisford gardens.

Some piles of rotting wood remain as sanctuaries for creatures that appreciate that kind of setting.

Just before Palm Sunday, Jean Richardson from Hemington (who is a great deal more knowledgeable about botany than me) visited our churchyard on a damp, chilly and windy morning to record what could be seen on Saturday 23rd March.

In alphabetical order, here is the list of plants that she found which were not already on her spreadsheet:-

Lesser Celandine, Chive?, Dog's Mercury, Field Wood Rush, Honesty, Honeysuckle, Ivy-leaved Speedwell, Rue-leaved Saxifrage, Snowdrop.



Field Wood Rush is a member of the *Luzula* (Wood-Rushes) family. Its stems are rarely over 15cm (6") tall, usually much less, so when Jean took this photo of it she must have been horizontal, at ground level. Her photo makes one able to appreciate the modest beauty of this small plant, which we probably trample on without noticing it in the grass.

I was also intrigued to learn about Rue-leaved Saxifrage, a tiny plant growing on the north-facing roof over the organ.

Having followed Jean's guidance on where to find it in the churchyard, I have now discovered it at home, growing 2 to 3 inches high between limestone slabs.

Running up to the Easter holidays at Norton St Philip, the Pre-school have been busy. The children and staff have enjoyed many Easter activities together

including making Easter cards for family and friends and getting out our chefs' hats to make chocolate Easter nests using cereal and melted chocolate. The Pre-school committee also organised an Easter egg trail in the village to raise funds for the Pre-school and to give everyone the excuse to eat lots of cake and chocolate!



Alongside our Easter activities we have explored printing, cutting the shapes out of potato and using paint to print the shapes onto paper. CLIMATE EMERGENCY UPDATE

No Mow May is here again!

It's that time of year when the lawnmowers emerge from sheds and garages around the country. However, that early cut is definitely NOT rewarding for wildlife - in particular bees and other pollinators which are critical to food production (around a third of all the crops we eat rely on invertebrates for pollination). These creatures rely almost entirely on wildflowers to survive. However, in the UK we have lost over 97% of species-rich flower meadows since the 1930s. So, ignoring your mower over the month of May will provide a muchneeded boost for wildlife throughout the summer.....whilst private gardens cannot substitute ancient wild meadows, we can do a huge amount on a small scale to reverse critical habitat loss.

And the good news is we can do this with little or no effort, saving energy (and money) in the process....because one of the best ways to encourage wildflowers in the garden is simply to forget the lawnmower and just let your grass grow! Leave a patch of lawn to its own devices during spring and summer, and the chances are that at least some wildflowers will appear in your new minimeadow. Not only will it attract wildlife into your garden, but it will look lovely too – a powerful reminder that we should value what's left and support all efforts to restore wildflower meadows.

Yet more sewage in the River Frome

The issue (many would say "scandal") of untreated sewage being regularly pumped into our rivers and seas has become increasingly high profile in the last few years. Despite the media attention there seems little chance of much near-term improvement. Locally, Wessex Water have been upgrading the treatment works in Rode, but the latest data shows that, yet again, the figures for Rode are the worst on record. In total, the facility overflowed **102 times** last year, for a total of **1,429 hours**. This compares to 82 times and **1,**248 hours in 2022. These most recent results are significantly worse than for each of the previous three years (data is available from 2019 onwards). The Rivers Trust publishes the data on sewage overflows for nearly all "Combined Sewer Overflows" (CSOs) and water treatment works in England & Wales, and the data is available on their website: https://theriverstrust.org/sewage-map

The river can look idyllic, but unfortunately there still appears to be a serious risk of nasty objects floating around...in addition to any agricultural run-off or other forms of pollution.

RODE AND DISTRICT GARDEN CLUB

Herbs at Rode and District Gardening Club

Carrie Pakenham arrived early for the club's last meeting in the Village Hall before the Autumn because she had brought a large variety of plants to share with us in her talk about herbs. The many members and guests present browsed the club's sales table to pick up plants grown by members for the house or garden, and sales were brisk before the talk.

Averil Morrow reminded everyone to take a copy of directions to the gardens the club will visit this Spring and Summer, and to sign up early for the September trip to RHS Wisley before the trip is opened to others in the villages.

A second board was seeking helpers on June 9^{th} 11am -4pm for the Rode Open Gardens. Gardeners in Rode were encouraged to open their gardens and/or to help run the stall selling visit maps and the plants on the day. People could sign up for two-hour slots.

Helen welcomed Carrie who comes from Rudge and has grown and sold herbs for many years. She passed around a bouquet with a wide range of flowers and foliage, which most members were surprised to learn were all herbs. Most people are familiar with culinary herbs, but herbs also provided the earliest medicines, dyes and fragrances. Herbs have a very long history of use. Some were used in pre-Christian religious ceremonies and have survived through to today like bringing holly and mistletoe into our homes at Christmas.

She talked of the use of birch bark to ease pain from strains, and the collection of sphagnum moss during the First World War as it has antiseptic qualities and can hold large amounts of fluid, so was used on wounds. World War Two saw widespread collection of berries and rose hips to produce syrups to provide vitamins for children. Modern day Chinese scientists are researching tree peonies for their possible medicinal uses.

Herbs are still used in this country to today to heal and treat medical conditions, but we were warned to consult an herbalist rather than use plants in our gardens. We were, however, encouraged to grow comfrey to make a tonic for our garden and save money. The green parts of the plant can be cut and added to water to soak for a few weeks. The liquid produced added to water will nourish growing plants. She also encouraged us to make jellies to preserve the flavours of fruits, herbs etc. as it is easier to make than jams.

Amongst the culinary herbs were several varieties of rosemary which can easily be grown from cuttings as Carrie demonstrated. There was so much useful information and a wide choice of reasonably priced plants to buy. Many people took home more plants to find a place to plant in their garden, or a jar of jelly to enjoy.

This month is our first garden visit. It is an afternoon trip to Forest Lodge at Pen Selwood, Wincanton, meeting at 2:30pm on Monday 13^{th} May. This is a 3-acre mature garden with a lake, bulbs and flowering trees. Guests are welcome but please let the club know you are intending to be there. Entry price to the garden is around £10.

Parish History

NOOKS AND CORNERS: WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Although a distance of almost three miles separates the war memorials of Norton St Philip (left) and Rode (right), these monuments are in fact

connected by a number of curious historic coincidences and the matter of roughly 9,000 miles - the distance between England and West Australia. For each stone cross bears the name of an emigrant (one from Somerset and one from Wiltshire), each of whom left the West Country, settled in Australia and, following the outbreak of war in 1914, enlisted in the Australian military forces, both joining, unknown to each other, the same infantry unit and each losing their



lives on the same day in 1918. The lives and deaths of Percy Wadman and Ernest Kemp are intimately linked, yet they may never have met.

The story of Norton-based Percy Wadman (recorded on the NSP memorial) is well known to me, (it's told in the 'Brief Lives' booklet) but the name of Ernest Kemp, recorded on the Rode memorial, was a recent discovery and, having learned that Ernest had served in the same West Australian infantry battalion as Percy, I was intrigued by the possibility that the two might have had some experiences in common. A little digging revealed that the two men had close ties with Bradford-on-Avon before both emigrated, each settling in different parts of Western Australia.

Ernest William Kemp (born in Rode in about 1898), together with his family, (father Edward, mother Hannah and younger sister Rosina) left their then home in Bradford-on-Avon for Australia in September 1911, arriving in Fremantle in November of that year. NSP based Percy Wadman (born in Bradford in 1890) arrived at Fremantle almost exactly a year later. Almost 8 years older than Ernest, Percy became a farmer, and Ernest, when old enough, gained employment as a 'driver'.

During the War Percy and Ernest enlisted in the Australian Military Forces, and as fate would have it, both ended up in the 51st Infantry Battalion. Percy signed on in June 1916 and Ernest in January 1917. Both gave their place of birth as Bradford on Avon - Ernest giving his new 'home' address as *Coode Street, Bayswater W.A.*

They both, in turn, made the long dangerous voyage by troopship to England en route for Flanders and, prior to active service in France, both men were retained in England for final training on Salisbury Plain: Percy in late 1916 and Ernest in the spring of 1917. The Wiltshire landscape would surely have been familiar to them, and like many visiting Australian soldiers they would have got to know Codford and its pubs, (especially 'The George'), very well before being despatched to the drudgery and dangers of the Western Front.

Parish History

Both were in the line with their battalion in late April 1918, during the momentous German 'Spring Offensive', when the city of Amiens, a vital Allied communications centre, was subject to repeated enemy attacks. Following the German occupation of the nearby large village of Villers-Bretonneux on 24 April, Amiens looked destined to fall, and the British Fourth Army Commander, so alarmed by the situation, ordered that Villers-Bretonneux be immediately retaken. It was in a hastily organised but ultimately successful nighttime counter attack (in which the English-born Australian senior officer, Major-General J J Talbot Hobbs played a crucial planning role) and in which Australian forces (including the 51st Infantry Battalion), predominated, that the village was recaptured and the German drive to Amiens finally halted.

But the savage fighting that night claimed many lives, including both Ernest and Percy. In the confusion of the immediate post-battle reports both men were recorded as 'missing in action'. It was not until the end of June 1918 that Ernest was officially confirmed as 'killed in action,' and not until October 1918 that Percy's relatives knew for certain that he had also died that fateful night.

Percy's body was eventually found and formally interred in what is now Adelaide Cemetery, to the west of the village; his name was also recorded on the NSP war memorial, which was unveiled in 1920. Poor Ernest was lost for ever – his body was never found. But his name lives on. It was first recorded on the war memorial in his



home village of Rode, which was also dedicated in 1920 and five years later his service was acknowledged on his adopted home town's war memorial – in Bayswater WA (now a low-rise suburb of Perth).

This elegant memorial was unveiled on Anzac Day (25 April) 1925, by the victor of the Villers-Bretonneux action, General Talbot Hobbs, a commander both Percy and Ernest may well have seen during their active service. A sympathetic and thoughtful leader - he had begun life as an architect and later developed a particular interest in war memorials - Talbot Hobbs genuinely earned the trust of his men. Ernest's name was also subsequently recorded on the National Australian War Memorial for the Missing in France, at Villers-Bretonneux, which was inaugurated in 1938.

Unfortunately, General Talbot Hobbs, who played a prominent role in the establishment of the Memorial, died at sea on his way to attend its unveiling. It remains a place of pilgrimage for Australian families, a permanent reminder of



the importance of the action which took place there, forever honouring the men whose sacrifice ensured victory. A memorial for which so much was owed to Talbot Hobbs and on which Ernest's name forms a small but integral part.

Parish Council Meeting Minutes

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON MONDAY 15th APRIL 2024 AT 7.30 pm

ON MONDAT 15" AFKIL 2024 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon (MS) – Chair, Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB), Cllr Moira Punt (MP) and Cllr Peter Travis (PT). **In attendance:** Hugh Williams – Clerk, Cllr Dawn Denton (County Councillor).

- Parishioners Participation: No Parishioners were present.
 Congratulations were given to Peter Travis on his Frome Civic Award.
- **2.** Apologies for absence: Cllr J McAuliffe, Cllr P Restorick and Cllr A Boyden (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 11th March were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. County Councillor's report:

Cllr Denton reported that she had recently heard that CALM Engineering were due to meet with Somerset to progress the outstanding drainage work. She said she would chase this up.

She also agreed to investigate Conservation Areas for Rode.

6. Actions from previous meeting:

- i Hoedowns: It was agreed to set up a Hoedown for May.
- ii. Bench on Lower Street: The current bench is in a poor condition and the meeting agreed to purchase a replacement and install it. A limit of £500 was agreed. JB agreed to progress.
- **iii. Paths at playing field:** The new path was due to start later this month now the ground was drier and should be completed in early May.
- **iv.** The Mill: A response from Phil Wake agreeing an 'online' call had been received. AP agreed to speak to Grant Slade who had comprehensive records of the licence hearing and then go back to Phil Wake to seek clarification on the issue.
- **v. Paths from Barrow Farm:** The meeting agreed to go ahead with Steven Whitehead for 7 cuts over the growing season.
- **vi. Drainage:** Cllr McAuliffe had been in contact with Somerset but had been given no update on work on Crooked Lane and Straight Lane. (See also minute 5 for CALM Engineering). It was noted that Somerset Rivers Authority was hosting a meeting, to discuss flooding issues in the area, in Frome Town Hall on Tuesday 23rd April and JB hoped to attend.

<u>7. Climate Change Group:</u> There was still a shortage of volunteers to help with the Repair Café in June and this would probably be delayed until September. A new Chair was still being sought for the Group.

8. Highways issues:

- i) Autospeedwatch: It had been reported that a large number of vehicles had been recorded exceeding the speed limit going up Bradford Road. It was agreed that this data should be forwarded to the police who would hopefully send letters to repeat offenders. (John Flindall would be asked to submit data). The Clerk reported that the Speed Watch Team had resources to monitor another Autospeedwatch device and this could be located on Rode Hill. However, it was agreed to not purchase another device until it was seen that some action was being taken by law enforcement on the current data collection.
- **ii) Street Lights Turn off:** The Clerk reported that he had received a quote for the work and this had been circulated. It was agreed to progress this with Somerset.

9. Planning:

i) New applications:

2024/0365/TCA: Walnut tree, reduce crown by 1-2m – Mayfield Mill, 4A High Street. No objections.

2024/0492/TCA: Sycamore, pull back house side by 2-3m and crown lift to 5m; sycamore, crown lift to 5m; horse chestnuts, fell – The Millers House, 1 Rode Hill. No objections.

ii) Somerset decisions:

2024/0244/TCA: Sorbus, reduce by 0.5-1m all round; grafted maple, reduce crown by 1-1.5m; apple and pear, thin crowns by 10% and reduce by 1-1.5m; birch remove all dead wood and reduce crown by 1-2m - The Stables, Langham Place. Approved

iii) Other: It was agreed to forward the Friends of the Earth link regarding placing of solar and wind farms in the UK to Nikki White at Somerset Planning for consideration when reviewing the solar farm application (2023/2183/FUL).

10. Neighbourhood Plan: The premeeting had discussed the current Rode Neighbourhood Plan and it was agreed that Context Planning would be approached on a number of issues. The PC agreed that it would try and avoid any substantive changes that required a referendum.

The main points to take to Context were:

- a) Conservation area to be increased to include Merfield, rectory on Bradford Road etc. But should this be done separately or as part of the Neighbourhood Plan?
- b) To increase the Recreation area (playing field) to include the new S106 land and also can this be redesignated as F2 land instead of green space.
- c) To strengthen Policies 5, 8, 11, 12 and 13 within the existing Plan.

- d) How to get the footpaths from Church Farm to Church Lane and the Recreation area officially designated as footpaths.
- e) To strengthen environmental statements within the Plan.

It was agreed not to expand the scope of the Plan to include The Mill or extend it to include any neighbouring parishes. Some issues regarding land ownership would be clarified. AP agreed to discuss these points with Context.

- 11. Buses: The new timetables had been delivered by Councillors to all properties in Rode. There was still a threat to the buses, especially the weekend services. There was concern First buses to Bath at times were full and this might not be getting recorded. It was agreed to use the village Facebook to record this. PT asked for further funding to promote bus use. The PC agreed to allocate up to £200.
- 12. New Village Hall: It was reported that the meeting held on 1st April had been positive, although some concerns were expressed over lack of terms of reference and that the concept design being prepared could restrict any future architect design. A budget had been agreed to get an initial planning application prepared. It was noted that the current Memorial Hall cannot be sold without consent by the village. The next meeting was due to be held on 23rd April but due to availability of participants could be delayed. However, there is urgency due to the current state of the Scout Hut and Pavilion to progress the plans.

13. Financial matters:

- i) Allotment charge: It was agreed to charge £60 for this year.
- **ii)** Annual Governance and Accountability Return Section 1: The meeting agreed that Rode Parish Council complied with all the accounting statements in Section 1 of the AGAR form.
- **iii) Payments:** The following payments were agreed:

- 14. Any other business: The Chair asked if anyone was willing to take on Chairmanship at the Annual Meeting for the coming year. He said he could continue for one more year but would need to hand over some duties to other members of the Parish Council.
- **15. Date of next meeting:** The next meeting would be held in the Committee Room at the Memorial Hall on: **Monday 13th May at 7.30pm.** This meeting will follow the Annual Parish Meeting starting at **7.00pm.**

The meeting closed at 9.15 pm.






