#### Reflection

# "Come forth into the light of things, Let Nature be your teacher" William Wordsworth

As I write, we are coming to the end of UK Mental Health Awareness week. It has been said that there is a mental health epidemic in our nation at the moment and not only amongst the young. The received wisdom from many doctors now is that to go out into nature, be it gardens and parks, or more importantly woods and fields, anywhere that nature and biodiversity is allowed to flourish.

But the important thing is to pay attention. "Attention" says Mary Oliver" is the beginning of devotion". This means not clutching our smartphones, listening to music, podcasts and audio books, or even discussing politics or sport with our friends. There is time for all of this, but to really benefit from the restorative effects of nature we must be willing to pay attention.

At Mottisfont Abbey there is a well spring, which channels up through a circle of stone about 8 foot in diameter, the surface of which is utterly still. The marvel is that 900 litres of water per minute are pouring up and out from this pool into the stream a little further down the hill. Well springs are ancient and never appear to run out. But many visitors walk right past this marvel, unaware of it, in search of more obvious attractions.

This is the time of Pentecost when Christians celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit to the first disciples in Jerusalem. Jesus is quoted as saying in John 7 vv 37 "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink... out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water" Howard Green, a botanist, writes of a walk in Mottisfont. "We pause in stillness at this place, not thinking or trying too hard, but observing the flow, and letting it release something of our own inner source, the living waters that can overflow us, to bring refreshment to the world around us."

Ninety per cent of people, when asked where they feel closest to God, will say "out of doors". The earth can teach us (Job 12vv7,8) and heal us if we pay attention. There are times for "power walks". They are good for our cardio vascular system. But so is a "saunter" which derives from the French "a la saint terre", to the holy ground.

There are plans afoot to take church outdoors on occasion. Several people have asked about Forest Church. It can simply be Outdoor church, or as in another Somerset village, Church up a Hill. However, we do have some handy woods nearby. So watch this space......maybe in July. And it's great for families!

"May what I do flow from me like a River, No forcing and no holding back, The way it is with children" (Rilke).

## **Churchyard Policy**

Following a recent query and misunderstanding here are the Hardington Vale churchyard rules that were agreed by the PCC of Hardington Vale in 2014 and since then have been and still are, displayed on all the notice boards across the benefice. It has been recently updated to include the parish of Buckland Dinham which is also coming into Hardington Vale.

May I draw people's particular attention to the general management of graves so there is no further confusion about what is and is not allowed. Thank you for your understanding on this.

#### The Parish of Hardington Vale

Buckland Dinham, Farleigh Hungerford, Hemington, Laverton, Norton St Philip, Rode, Tellisford

In order to preserve the dignity of the churchyards, to conserve the number of grave spaces and to ease the task of maintaining the churchyards these Management Regulations have been adopted by the Parochial Church Council of this Parish.

These Regulations are supplemental to the Churchyard Regulations of the Diocese of Bath and Wells which govern the size and form of headstones, memorials etc. and other sundry matters.

#### **Burial Policy**

Burials of those living in the parish at the time of their death will normally take place in the churchyard of village church i.e. at St Michael and All Angels Buckland Dinham, St Leonards, Farleigh Hungerford for residents of Farleigh Hungerford, St Mary the Virgin, Hemington for residents of Hemington and Faulkland, St Mary's Laverton for residents of Laverton, St Philip & St James for residents of Norton St Philip, St Lawrence for residents of Rode and All Saints for residents of Tellisford & Woolverton. The boundaries of these villages are to be defined as those of the former ecclesiastical parishes.

Those residents of the parish who moved out of the parish solely for the purposes of care e.g. to Nursing Home accommodation shall also be eligible for interment in the churchyards. Those with strong personal reasons (e.g. former churchwardens, incumbents etc) may exceptionally also be buried in the churchyards with the permission of the current churchwardens and incumbent.

#### Interment of Cremated Remains

At Norton St Philip cremated remains shall be interred in the Garden of Remembrance, these remains shall be placed in the ground without a casket or box unless such a container is biodegradable. No plaque or maker shall be fixed in this area. Where there is no Garden of Remembrance cremated remains shall be interred in another suitable designated area of the churchyard.

Cremated remains may also be interred in existing family graves. It is vital that all parties closely connected to those already buried or interred in any grave give consent to any new interment.

#### General Management of Graves

- The surface of the churchyards shall be kept as far as possible level and free of grave mounds.
  The Parochial Church Council may level any mound at its discretion at any time more than 12 months after the latest internment in the grave.
- Bulbs may be planted in the soil of a grave but unless these are kept tidy the Parochial Church Council may treat the grave as part of the turf and mow over it.
- Wreaths or cut flowers may be laid direct on any grave or in any vase authorised by the Incumbent or by these regulations; but the Parochial Church Council may remove them when they appear to be withered.
- The Parochial Church Council may in its discretion at any time remove and dispose of any artificial flowers, plastic decorations or other unauthorized items placed in the churchyards.
- Any power exercisable by the Parochial Church Council under these regulations may be delegated by that Council to a person or persons deputed to care for the day to day upkeep and maintenance of the churchyards.

## The Annual Parochial Church Meeting 25<sup>th</sup> April 2024 Highlights (minutes available but not published)

The APCM was held at St Lawrence Church on 25<sup>th</sup> April and was attended by 35 people, with 6 apologies.

Four churchwardens (Parish Wardens) were elected:-Geoff Banwell, Mary Morrison, Fergus Stewart and Chris Cloke.

The Deputy Wardens are Muriel Duckett (NSP), Sally Pickett (Rode). The Chapel Wardens are Guy Hungerford (Farleigh Hungerford), Bob Hill (Laverton), Rachel Feilden (Tellisford) and Jenny Waller (Buckland Dinham).

The church Tower Captains were recorded as Jenny Middleton (NSP Acting Captain), Sally Pickett (Rode) and Sandy Wheeler (Farleigh Hungerford). Buckland Dinham were waiting to hear who their Tower Captain would be. Coordination of tower captains was being organised by Andy Pickett.

The meeting received the accounts for the year ended 31 Dec 2023, the net result being a surplus for the year of £21,511. This is a pleasing outcome which is due to a variety of factors including the generosity of our congregation. Tony Nash has been replaced by Tony Day as the Independent Financial Examiner.

The Annual Reports (as published in H.V. News 2024) were received and it was noted that the benefice was in good heart and encouraged by the progress made.

The Rector, current Area Dean, reported on the three meetings held and the new Frome Deanery leaflet. The visits of Bishop Michael and Bishop Ruth had been very uplifting. Buckland Dinham had merged with Hardington Vale in a mutually warm and joyous way.

The meeting noted that the Deanery Synod representatives still in post for three years are: Barbara Day, vacant, Andrew Morrison, Mark Baines, Jenny Waller.

The meeting received the Electoral Roll Report. There are currently 172 on the roll (up from 164 last year).

The meeting made five appointments to the Parochial Church Council:- David Lockley, Paul Richardson, Susie Filkins, Martin Cragg, Helen Irving

For the record the current PCC members are now:

3 years still to stand: - David Lockley, Paul Richardson, Martin Cragg, Helen Irving 2 years still to stand: - Mark Baines, Anthony Powell, Andy Filkins, Susie Filkins 1 year still to stand: - David Mayell, Peter Stratford, Diana Lucas, Brenda Graham.

It was noted that the Rectors last service is on 30<sup>th</sup> June at St Philip and St James NSP.

Thanks were given to all those who work tirelessly for the parish.

The Rector said it had been a privilege and a joy to serve in Norton St Philip for eleven years.

## St Lawrence Roof Project - Progress Report

As previously mentioned, the work on the church roof is divided up into three phases.

The first phase (South Aisle and South side of the Nave) is complete and looks really good. If you are at the church, go to the south side of the churchyard and

take a look.

The second phase is the North Aisle, the Porch and the North side of the Nave. Unfortunately, a further check on the bats is required and this is under way. Subject to that, it is hoped that the work can start in August.

The third phase will be the Chancel and the Vestry, but that will require additional funding because not all the finance for that phase is yet in place. It



has not gone out to tender yet, but we anticipate that we are going to need a further £50,000 approximately to complete the job.

Needless to say, all donations (preferably with gift aid) will continue to be greatly appreciated as will your support at our fundraising events.

Our grateful thanks go to all who have supported our efforts to date.

## **Highlights from Tellisford Parish Meeting**

On Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> April, 14 residents of Tellisford and Woolverton attended the Parish Meeting's AGM, held at Meadow View, Woolverton by kind invitation of Ray Floyd. Eight households sent apologies. One of our two Somerset Councillors, Dawn Denton, was also present.

Ray Floyd was re-elected Chairman, Ash Morrell was re-elected Vice-Chairman, and Anthony Battersby was re-elected Parish Clerk. Four residents were nominated to serve on the Planning Sub-Committee: Anthony Battersby, Nicholas Diggle, Thom Gorst and Clare Parfitt, and they were elected unanimously. Rowena Smith had resigned from this committee earlier in the year.

Thom Gorst continues to fill the role of Honorary Footpaths Officer. His detailed report had been circulated to residents before the AGM. He drew attention to unsafe hardware and poor signage, especially on FR15/11 which crosses the A36. Charles Helps brought news that on the day of the AGM new Bristol gates (a 5-bar gate plus small side-gate) had been installed on part of that footpath, and more are expected to arrive soon. Terry Dredge had photographed a new plank bridge with handrail installed by Mendip Ramblers two days previously on FR15/6 (at 34315). Thom said that his meeting with Rights of Way Warden (East Mendip) Clare Haskins had been very helpful, but Somerset Council's budget is extremely constrained. He has made contact with other local Footpath Officers and is trying to put together more circular routes.

The Planning Sub-Committee's report since the last Parish Meeting (on 15<sup>th</sup> May 2023) is summarized the 20 planning applications submitted since then, (detail supplied but not included....Editor).

The progress of plans for users of Rode Memorial Hall, Rode Scouts and Rode Playing Field to share a redesigned, combined facility was discussed. Captain Batten-Pooll (who donated the land for Rode Memorial Hall) was resident in Rode Manor, which is in Tellisford-with-Woolverton civil parish, and current residents of this parish are entitled to use the existing Memorial Hall. An action point was agreed to find out whether TPM could use the Hall for a parish meeting.

The problem of insufficient parking space for residents of West Terrace in Woolverton was discussed, including the impending closure of the Red Lion whose car park was likely to be closed by concrete bollards. At present, buses are having considerable difficulty in getting round the corner when cars are parked there. Councillor Dawn Denton said she would raise the matter with the brewery (Wadworths) to see whether progress can be made.

In her report to the meeting, Councillor Denton confirmed that Somerset Council is in a financial emergency; budgets for Statutory responsibilities are ring-fenced but Ancillary activities are not, yet both are needed for Statutory elements to function adequately.



## **Bussing it for Rode**

A return trip by bus to Bath costs £4. That's less than half of what it cost a couple of years ago. £4 is in fact about what it now will cost just to park in Bath for a couple of hours. Then you need to factor in the actual cost of driving there ... a return journey of 22 miles to Bath costs upwards of another £11 (depending on your car).



So, there's a really powerful economic case for 'Bussing it'.

And if you 'Bus it', you'll also be reducing your carbon footprint thereby doing something towards saving our planet.

But the most powerful reason to BUS IT FOR RODE is you'll be playing your part in keeping our village bus services to Bath and Frome. And it's now a very good service, currently 7 days a week, with late night buses too and more buses through the daytime than we've had in years. Rode has battled hard for the past 10 years to restore our village bus service, so we don't want to lose it now.

But the D2 through Rode is currently under threat. First Bus is saying not enough people in Rode are using the D2.

For the sake of those who are too young to drive ... perhaps too old ...or simply don't own a car ...

- ...the people in our village who are entirely dependent on a bus to get about ...
- $\dots$  whether that's to work, to college, to school in Bath, to the RUH, to the doctor or to get to the shops  $\dots$
- ... or perhaps just someone who simply wants a night out in Bath or Frome without having to worry about drinking and driving.

For all their sakes, we need us all to go by bus just whenever we can.

We'll shortly have a stash of "I'm bussing it for Rode" stickers. You'll soon start to see these up around the village. If you'd like one, we'll put some in Rode Post Office, which is where you'll also find extra copies of the Rode village bus timetable.

#### Some Help for Those with Mental Health Concerns

Jo Robinson and I recently attended an event run by the Somerset Dementia Wellbeing Service, a collaboration of over 60 organisations that regularly meet to improve services for those affected by dementia. Visit <a href="https://somersetdementia.org">https://somersetdementia.org</a>

We talked to representatives from the NHS, Local Government, charities, libraries, and care facilities, all of whom are engaged in helping those with mental health issues and their carers.

Jo founded the Forget Me Not Café that meets every third Monday afternoon of the month at the Church of St. Philip and St. James in Norton St. Philip, but has now moved on to become Vicar of the Beckington Benefice. I'm part of the Café Team and attended the event to collect information that might be helpful to our guests, here summarised for those who would rather not visit the Café.

As one of the last to introduce himself, I confessed to being totally bewildered by the vast array of organisation names and job titles from those who preceded me: What do you all do? How do you help? How do you work together? Who do you contact first? Thankfully, they took pity on me, and after a very sincere welcome said the first place to start is your GP. They can give advice and provide any referrals, including access to Social Services. You can also register as a carer with your GP, for support when looking after a mental health patient. One thing I didn't realise, was that you can also call your local GP if concerned about someone else, even if they are not a family member, or directly contact Social Services if it's a safeguarding issue.

Tailored advice and information for those with dementia, their families, and carers can also be obtained within Somerset from the Dementia Support Service of the Alzheimer's Society. They offer help for you to retain your independence and improve your well-being. Contact them on 01458 251541, or email <a href="mailto:somerset@alzheimers.org.uk">somerset@alzheimers.org.uk</a>.

Health Connections Mendip also exist to support your health and well being. They'll help you manage long-term health conditions, improve social connectedness, or change health-related behaviours. Call their Frome Team at 01373 468368 or visit <a href="https://healthconnectionsmendip.org/">https://healthconnectionsmendip.org/</a>.

Frome Dementia Action Alliance holds a Memory Café at The Masonic Hall, Frome on the last Wednesday afternoon of each month. The café is for those having loved ones with Dementia or Alzheimer's and their carers. Details are at <a href="https://www.frometowncouncil.gov.uk/directory/memory-cafe/">www.frometowncouncil.gov.uk/directory/memory-cafe/</a>.

There's also a Frome Carers Group that meet for a few laughs, and to swap ideas and experiences on the first Wednesday morning of each month at the Cricket Ground Social Club on Rodden Road. If you'd like to join call Tricia on 01373 301369. They're part of Somerset Carers, a charity offering help and advice to careers on 0800 3168600, and practical support to community groups through their Village Agents on 01823 331222.

Also in Frome, Rossetti House run a dementia friendly cinema club every Thursday afternoon, a Knit and Natter group every Tuesday afternoon, and a Carers Cafe on the

last Friday of each month, so for more details call 01373 887955 or email helen.cross@careuk.com.

If you like singing, try Songs for the Memory, a fun group for those with dementia, memory loss, and their carers, that meets every Tuesday afternoon in The Masonic Hall, Frome. For details call 07747 544773 or email songsforthememoryfrome@gmail.com.

Music can really help brighten your day, so why not develop your own personal playlist of songs and melodies that are meaningful to you? If you or your family carer served in the British Armed Forces, the Royal British Legion Admiral Nurse service provides advice and support through their network of registered nurses who specialise in dementia. Call them on 0808 8028080 or by emailing <a href="mailto:ANSupport@britishlegion.org.uk">ANSupport@britishlegion.org.uk</a>.

Looking for a good book about living with dementia? Well, 'Somebody I use to know' by Wendy Mitchell was recommended as the best read by those at the event.

I was surprised by the range of free services offered by Somerset Libraries for those with dementia, their families, and carers, and not just books! Interactive projectors that promote movement, coordination, and socialisation, including music, quizzes, games and TV shows; loaned iPads pre-loaded with e-books, e-audio books, and links to helpful health information; support for creating personalised playlists, as mentioned earlier; and access to the Somerset Dementia Collection, a range of books offering advice to those with dementia, their families, friends, and carers. Their free Home Library Service arranges for volunteers to deliver books, audio books, e-magazines, e-newspapers, and iPad loans to your home. 'Reading Well Books on Prescription', an array of books recommended by heath professionals, are also available at libraries for those with dementia, their carers, or those wanting to know more about the condition. All the above are available at Frome Library, or can be requested by emailing frolib@somerset.gov.uk if unable to visit.

Finally, what was my biggest 'take away' from the event? Well, during my introduction, I said we were thinking about ending the Forget Me Not Café at Norton St Philip, given its relatively low attendance over the last three years, even though it's free. Their unanimous response ... "Don't stop!" and "There's such a need for this support in our communities!". Safe places where you can relax over a cup of tea, know you are being listened to, swap notes with other carers, and laugh among friends. So, I guess we'll carry on, at least for now. Why not?

Hope to see you there. All are welcome.

## **Climate Emergency Update**

#### **Proposed Solar Farm in Rode**

The planning application to build a large-scale Solar Farm in Rode was discussed at the May meeting of the Somerset Council Planning Committee (East). Councillors had a number of concerns about the application and agreed (by 11 votes to one) to defer a decision for a maximum of three months to allow the applicant to address these concerns.

The decision notice states that "The reasons for deferral are for reconsideration of access on Monkley Lane. Also, for reconsideration of the scale of the development in terms of the quantum of the application scheme and its impact on the landscape and heritage assets, in particular the conservation area and listed buildings. A site visit for Planning Committee Members will be arranged."

The Parish Council is keen to engage with the applicant to constructively seek improvements to the scheme and will in particular want to take account of local residents' views. If you have already commented on the application your views will already be known to the PC. **However**, **if you haven't yet responded to the consultation**, **you can still do so (whether you support the plans or oppose them).** The level of support or opposition to the proposal was highlighted as an important consideration during last month's Planning Committee meeting – so: make your views known! Whilst the original deadline for comments has passed, Somerset Council will still consider additional comments as a "late submission".

If you wish to comment, you can do so via the Somerset Council website: https://www.somerset.gov.uk/planning-buildings-and-land/

Make sure you are logged in (if you haven't previously logged in, simply register first). Select "View or comment on a planning application", choose "Mendip", then go to "Find an application".

The application reference is **2023/2183/FUL**. You should see an option to "make a comment" towards the top right of your screen.

- South Wood Farm, Devon is a bit further afield and is another small-scale delight, designed by world-renowned Arne Maynard. - Sissinghurst and Great Dixter: I feel sure I've written before about trips I've

## **Rode Cricket Club Update**

After a long, very wet winter, it's great to see the sun shining and to hear the sound of willow on leather once again!

Our first game this season was an encounter against Red Star on 9<sup>th</sup> May. It was a night for the young guns to shine — Nick Wotton (last year's most improved young player) picked up where he'd finished last season, opening the bowling and finishing with admirable figures of 2 wickets for 3 runs; his brother William going one stage further and ending up with 3 wickets for 8 runs! Man of the match however went to Charlie Blanchet, bowling for the first time for Rode and snaring a wicket with his 8<sup>th</sup> ball! As a result, Red Star were restricted to a total of 135 — not bad for 20 overs, but a gettable target nonetheless, as it proved. Lawrence Gripper (13) and Keinen Cooper (32) put on a brisk opening partnership of 30 off 3 overs, before Nick Wotton, batting at 3 played the anchor role with 26 not out. Not to be outdone by his brother, William Wotton hit a quickfire 17 not out to win inside 18 overs. A convincing win for the opening game, and particularly encouraging given the performances of our younger players.

A depleted team rocked up at Urchfont – one of the more picturesque grounds we get to play on – the following Sunday and restricted the home team to 165 for 6 off 30 overs batting first in ideal conditions. Nick Wotton (2 wickets for 26 runs off 4 overs) continued his great bowling form, ably assisted by young Harry Medlicott (1 for 19 off 3). Rode made a good fist of the chase initially but ended up well short with a total of 107 all out. Wickets fell regularly, with the highest scores being Lawrence Gripper and Julian Wotton both with 15.

Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> May was a wonderful late spring day to play at the beautiful Ditcheat ground. The sun shone as we took the field and restricted the home side to 131-5 with Kienan Cooper the pick of the bowlers with 2 wickets for 5 runs off his 2 overs and Julian Wotton with 2 for 13 off his.

Rode's reply started shakily with Lawrence Gripper falling in the first over, but new recruit Felix Harrison playing a blinder on debut scoring 25 put us in a reasonably strong position at the halfway stage. Rich Bealing played with uncharacteristic circumspection initially but opened up when the required rate started to rise, falling for a creditable 18. All looked lost when 62 was needed off the last 6 overs but enter Ollie Tucker and Julian Wotton. On a smallish ground, both timed their crescendo to perfection, Ollie scoring 27 not out (including 3 sixes and 2 fours) and Julian scoring 30 not out (including 3 sixes), with Julian hitting a 6 off the final ball with 5 needed for victory and 4 needed for a tie. A perfect end to an excellent match played in great spirits. The beer always tastes sweeter after victory and today was no exception!

So, as we reflect on the early part of the season, 3 games with 2 excellent hard-fought victories in which our young players played instrumental roles, the future looks bright for Rode Cricket Club, especially as the new square/ outfield starts to take shape.

Those not wanting a long walk will return to the car park by the same route. This walk is two and a half miles and there is a cafe at the car park.

The longer walk continues on from MB Church by turning onto a lane and heading south for about a mile before turning left again back towards Tytherington across fields. This walk is approximately 5 miles.

Directions to the car park:- Follow the A361 Frome bypass towards Shepton Mallet. About 500 metres before the final (Sainsbury) roundabout, turn sharp left towards Tytherington. Go past a large wood/builders merchant on the right and then take the next right (about 400 metres) towards the car park.



## Rode and District Gardening Club - Garden Visits

On the afternoon of Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May members met for our first visit of 2024 at a lovely garden at Forest Wood, Pen Selwood. Sadly, it was raining, but we had a warm welcome from the owner, Lucy Nelson, and one of the gardeners, who does the hands-on work of looking after the garden. When Lucy moved to the property 25 years ago there was no garden but some established trees, such as the handkerchief tree. She wanted the garden to reflect Gertrude Jekyll's love of curves and to use the slope to enjoy the view of the nearby countryside. Her original designer's plan is still evident today, but over time it has been adapted and tweaked. Because the house is not connected to mains water, they were able to use the springs on the site to create a lake and stream.

Below the terrace is an attractive herbaceous border, which will be fuller in the coming months but the plants that were impressive at this time were the magnolias, camassias, azaleas and rhododendrons. Having acidic soil enables them to grow a wide range of different range of plants. In complete contrast was a quiet green space with a stainless-steel rill through the centre and hedged on each side.

The return route took us past several unusual Chinese shrubs and elegant white birch tree trunks with the scents of azaleas and a feast of colours. The final area we visited is a new area, where vegetables are being grown amongst flowers and it looked very smart. Despite the weather we all enjoyed this very attractive garden, with many beautiful and unusual plants.

Next month we have an evening visit to Milton Lodge Gardens, at Wells. We will meet there at 6:30pm on Monday  $10^{th}$  June. Please let Averil know or use the club's email below to advise us if you are joining us. Guests are welcome too. The cost for them is £10.

On **Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> June**, it is **Rode Open Gardens**. There will be ten gardens plus allotments to visit from 11am to 4:00pm. 

## Want to be part of an Outstanding volunteer service? Then Route1 is looking for you!

Route1 Advocacy and Independent Visitors service supports children and young people who are in care or have a social worker. They do this by matching volunteers with young people as either short term Advocates, or longer term Independent Visitors.

Route1 helps children have happy childhood memories, and ensures their views are listened to and acted upon.

- Independent Visitors: These volunteers make a long term commitment to one child in care. They visit the child once or twice each month to build a trusting, supportive relationship and friendship that can sometimes last many years. This can bring life-changing experiences and opportunities to the child or young person and their Independent Visitor!
- Advocates: volunteers work alongside individual children to ensure their voices are heard, and their wishes and feelings are taken into account when decisions are being made which affect them. Each child's support is usually short term and there is no expectation of a long term commitment to any particular child.



A recent trainee volunteer said, "I started out thinking 'what on earth can require 5 days of training?' I now know why and think you have it just right."

### Frome Toy Library Re-Opens

### **Making Less Waste and More Space**

In addition to its wealth of Holiday Events, the Children's Festival, an early years support group and two weekly Stay-and-Play pre-school sessions, did you know that local family support charity, Purple Elephant, also offers a low-cost, toy-lending service called The Toy Library?

Re-launched this month in partnership with the Frome Library, the Purple Elephant Toy Library will be open to all for borrowing each Wednesday afternoon. Located within the children's reading area, on the ground floor of the Frome Library building itself, staff and volunteers of both organisations welcome local families to join this newly revamped venture.

With over 50 'Play Sacks' to select from, suitable for babies, toddlers and youngsters up to approximately aged 6, the brightly coloured drawstring bags provide a wonderful experience for children who can, along with a parent/carer, make their own choice from the onsite picture catalogue (also viewable online) and then take that home to play with. The contents of the bags have been selected to support learning and development through play, with the borrowing of up to two Play Sacks per family at any one time available, from 1pm to 3pm on a Wednesday.

Ranging from a simple bag packed with nearly a hundred building blocks, to texture toys with shapes and colours for very young learners, to Brio train tracks, a marble run or outdoor circus skills equipment, the Toy Library Play Sacks are a simple but effective way of offering little ones 'new' toys every week, changing with their developing characters. Arguably even more important, this sharing and re-use system also helps reduce wastage and landfill dumping, as well as saves money on unnecessary purchases and stops the family home becoming cluttered with even bigger mountains of discarded toys.

Frome and area families who would like to borrow toys simply need to join the Frome Library as a member (which is free; a parent/career will need to bring their id/address proof to the Library and complete a simple form) and then come along on Wednesday afternoons to select a take-home-toy.

A fee of £2 (£1 if on Universal Benefit), paid in cash, is chargeable for a fortnightly loan but as Purple Elephant's organising team tell us "We are keen to let people know that the Toy Library, like all our services, is about encouraging families to play together, so there is no deposit needed or any penalty for breakages. Accidents happen, toys wear out – that's all part of play. We are delighted that Frome Library has joined with us in this exciting venture. The Library in our town is so much more than just a book-lending place. Each year it becomes an increasingly vital part of our community, a hub of activity for even the very young, so we can't wait to play...more!" The Frome Library, where the Play Sacks are kept for selection and collection, is located on Justice Lane, near the Market Yard carpark. ### Minutes of Meeting of Rode Parish Council Held in Rode Memorial Hall on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May 2024 at 8.20 pm

### UNCONFIRMED

### **Present:**

Cllr Mike Salmon (MS) – Chair, Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB), Cllr Moira Punt (MP), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr J McAuliffe (JM) and Cllr Pat Restorick (PR).

**In attendance:** Hugh Williams – Clerk, Cllr Adam Boyden (County Councillor).

- 1. Parishioners Participation: No Parishioners present for meeting
- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 15<sup>th</sup> April were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.

### 5. County Councillor's report:

Cllr Adam Boyden reported that the Somerset Planning Committee had deferred the decision on the solar farm (2023/2173/FUL) for three months. Low Carbon had been asked to reconsider the access along Monkley Lane and to consider reducing the size of the solar farm to remove some areas close to Rode and the listed buildings. The Planning Committee were also to make a site visit to see for themselves the area for the planning application. It was not known if Low Carbon would be making any changes as there was no obligation to do so. Cllr Boyden agreed to ask Low Carbon to contact Rode Parish Council to discuss any possible amendments. The meeting discussed whether it should engage with Low Carbon and whether further consultation with residents should be undertaken. It was agreed that initial contact should be made to see if Low Carbon are willing to make any amendments to the planning application.

He reported that the Farleigh swimming area had been added to the DEFRA water monitoring sites and this would put pressure on Wessex Water to improve the water quality.

The issue regarding the new licence for The Mill was still ongoing.

### 6. Actions from previous meeting:

- **i. Bench on Lower Street:** The new bench had been installed and thanks were given to JB for purchasing and installing it.
- **ii. Paths at playing field:** The new path was almost complete and thanks were expressed to Grant Slade and Mike Moore who had installed the new path and gate. The cost had come in under budget and a request had been made for the Parish Council (PC) to donate the difference to seed fund the Village Day in July. The meeting agreed to make a donation.
- **iii.** The Mill: AP was to discuss with Grant Slade before going back to Phil Wake to seek clarification on what the new licence covered.
- **iv. Drainage:** CALM Engineering were still to complete the work around Crooked Lane. JB reported that he had attended a flood meeting in Frome and this had turned out to have a wider scope than anticipated. It was about parishes setting up Neighbourhood Emergency Plans (which would also cover flooding). Rode does not have an Emergency Plan and he agreed to draw up a draft for further discussion by the PC.

### 7. Climate Change Group:

It had been agreed to defer the Repair Café to September, and volunteers to help were still being sought. JM reported that a webinar with Transition Bath had been very good, although not well attended and this was to be repeated in September. A new Chair was still being sought for the Group.

### 8. Highways issues:

- i) Autospeedwatch: Statistics were still being kept which showed a frightening number of speeding vehicles going up the Bradford Road, with a considerable number of repeat offenders. JB had contacted Ashley Reay to try and see what action could be taken with all these statistics. Discussions were held over who to approach to get some action taken over these data, should the new Police Commissioner or Somerset Highways or Police be contacted. Gathering the data alone was not beneficial some action was required.
- **ii) Speed Limit in Rode:** The Chair reported that Somerset Highways had informed him that the new 20mph speed limit and extension of the 30mph limit on the A<sub>3</sub>61 should be done in late July.

### i) New applications:

None

### ii) Somerset decisions:

**2023/2103/FUL:** Erection of 2no. semi-detached houses – 4 The Mead. Refused.

**2024/0365/TCA:** Walnut tree, reduce crown by 1-2m – Mayfield Mill, 4A High Street. Approved.

**2024/0492/TCA:** Sycamore, pull back house side by 2-3m and crown lift to 5m; sycamore, crown lift to 5m; horse chestnuts, fell – The Millers House, 1 Rode Hill. Approved.

**2024/0421/CLE:** Application for an existing lawful development certificate – Slodbrook Farm, Rode Common. Approved.

**2024/0356/HSE** and **2024/0357/LBC:** Works in association with the conversion of 2010 outbuilding (garage) to annex accommodation to include breach of rear boundary wall to install pedestrian gate – Mayfield House, 4 High Street. Approved.

### iii) Other

**2023/2183/FUL:** Application for photovoltaic (solar farm) on land south and east of Rode (discussed under minute 5).

10. Footpaths: The local Rights of Way Officer, Clare Haskins, had met the Chair to discuss the re-routing of path 13/1. It had been agreed to reroute this path to avoid it coming out on the A361 in a dangerous place and it would now be rerouted round the Church Farm estate with Andy Fussell's agreement.

The other path discussed with Clare Haskins was the path from the Church Farm estate to the Playing Field. This was across Andy Fussell's land and he was reluctant to make this an official public footpath and wanted to leave it as a permissive path. The meeting agreed that it should be redesignated as a public footpath as this would be a more permanent solution.

Rights of Way maintenance questionnaire had been received for Somerset with the aim of helping Parish Councils put together a tool kit for footpath maintenance. The Clerk agreed to complete.

- **11. Neighbourhood Plan:** AP had just circulated a brief to consult Context Planning to look at the current Neighbourhood Plan. Those present agreed to review the brief and comment. AP would then approach Context and the meeting agreed an initial budget of £1,000 to progress this review.
- **12. Buses:** There was a need to encourage use and PT reported that stickers for residents to display were being prepared. Somerset had no spare funding to help support buses. The plea was please use the buses.

### 13. Any other business:

- **a)** Tree on The Mead: It was reported that a tree was growing over a garden in The Mead, this would be investigated to see if it was on Parish Council land.
- **b) Stones on Marsh Road:** It was reported that some stones had been put on the edge of the road and it was thought these were on Council land.

### 14. Financial matters:

- i) Insurance premium: The meeting agreed to remain with Clear Insurance Management (renamed BHIP) for the coming year.
- **ii)** Annual Governance and Accountability Return Section 2: The meeting agreed that Rode Parish Council complied. The internal audit would be completed.
- **iii)** Payments: The following payments were agreed:






