We're all going on a summer holiday No more working for a week or two Fun and laughter on our summer holiday No more worries for me or you For a week or two

I guess it dates me to quote that song. But I think most of us know it and can hum along... It brings to mind the idyllic summer holiday that each of us dreams of. Though I guess if we all wrote down our idyllic summer holiday, it would vary hugely. For some of us it might simply be being quiet at home, for others it might involve visiting friends or family, for others it might mean travelling to an exotic place for a few weeks.

I read recently that there has been a huge rise in expeditions (and they are called them this - not holidays) that push people to their boundaries - with ever increasing levels of risk and extremism - the recent Titan submersible disaster being an example of this.

What happened to enjoying the simple things in life? Simply being? In a sense this was imposed on us during lock down and we struggled with that, but to an extent it did give us an opportunity to draw breath. Incredibly, I don't know about you but I feel that now things are 'back to normal' we are all charging around in ever more frantic circles! And I include myself in this.

I would like to recommend a book that I found really helpful in thinking about this, for your summer reading. It is called '*The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry - how to stay emotionally healthy and spiritually alive in the chaos of the modern world,*' by John Mark Comer. He recommends four practices for unhurrying our lives. Silence and solitude, Sabbath, Simplicity and Slowing.

He says 'Hurry kills all that we hold dear; spirituality, health, marriage, family, thoughtful work, creativity, generosity ... name your value. Hurry is a sociopathic predator loose in our society.'

'Hurry is not just a disordered schedule. Hurry is a disordered heart'

Did you know that tucked away in the middle of the ten commandments God tells us to Sabbath - yes it really is one of the ten commandments, to STOP and breathe! To rest. To take a holiday. A holiday not just a break away from work but dare I say it, from electronic gadgets and devices, from whatever it is that you have been rushing around doing frantically filling your every hour with.

Pressing the pause button and reconnecting with who you are. Reconnect with God, with friends, with family with the beauty of the world around us. Leaving your worries to one side and simply BEING.

So I hope at some point over the next month you are able to rest, enjoy a little fun and laughter. Certainly all the end of term activities across the parish have helped me with that. This afternoon I was fortunate enough to go to Hemington Primary School and see their excellent production of Ali Baba and the Bongo Bandits - laugh? We all, most certainly did that. You may have heard the bells ringing quite a few times during July. Not only were we holding our regular Tuesday evening practice but on the 18<sup>th</sup> July we welcomed a group of visiting ringers from the north of the country to come and ring as part of their tour of the West Country.

We also participated in the ringing celebration as part of the Frome Festival on the 15<sup>th</sup> July and were delighted to welcome ringers from near and far plus locals who wanted to learn more about bell ringing. It was great that the Frome Festival had such a focus on bellringing throughout the week and we're always keen to celebrate and promote church bell ringing.

You may remember we collected bottles for our bottle stall which was supposed to be held as part of the Coronation Celebrations in May but we were thwarted by the weather. Rode Chapel kindly invited us to hold our bottle stall as part of their Summer Garden Party (unfortunately the weather made it more of an indoor garden party) and we raised £111 for St Lawrence. Many thanks to Rode Chapel and all the people who supported the event.

As regards the roof renovations, the outcome of the bat survey is awaited as this is written. The bats have legal protection and we must work around them once we have established precisely where they are in the church and how they get in and out.

If you use the outside tap for filling flower vases, you will find that the one to the right hand side of the porch is no longer functional. There is another one outside of the north wall of the vestry, by the door into the vestry. Please use that one instead. This change is necessary because of the installation of a water meter.

### **Church Reflection, News & Events** UPDATE FROM BETHANY BOWERMAN

Latest news from Bethany, the daughter of our former Associate Priest, Andy, is below and I hope of interest to those who knew them.

Hi all,

I've spent the last two weeks catching up with friends and family, readjusting and processing all that the last 6 months has held. Firstly, I want to sincerely thank all of you for prayerfully and financially supporting me in this time. This season of teaching and mission work has been so special for me full of challenge, growth and learning. I've cultivated a personal relationship with the Lord and met some of the most amazing people.



In terms of personal growth, I think that there are three main areas that I have developed: confidence, vulnerability with God + others and hearing God's voice. These, I think, have all come from building a dependency on God and an intimacy in my relationship with him. I've learnt so much, from how to share the Gospel with someone to how to balance cultural differences and work together as a team. All my teammates have taught me so much too.

My favourite place of ministry was Seoul, South Korea. As a team we spent the most time here, meaning we were able to build friendships and come alongside a local church for a whole month. We got to see the way God was moving here over a period of time rather than just one event or moment. Also this church is sending a team on outreach in the UK this summer which meant I could share about British culture and tips for evangelism with them.

Another highlight for me was partnering with Dwell House, a ministry that I mentioned earlier on in my newsletters. This group of young adults were so encouraging for me, especially in terms of what life can look like after doing a discipleship school.

They've shown me how I could use the skills I've learnt and the resources I now have and share them with those around me.

A notable moment is when all of the contacts we'd been working with, in different areas of South Korea and varying ministries, came together at a weekend conference called Brave Love.

It was amazing to see them all meet and share how God has been moving in what they are each doing in the nation of South Korea. In addition to this, being with Korean missionaries in Japan was really powerful. Particularly, witnessing God shift their perspective of the nation who'd so deeply hurt their country in the past to one of love and forgiveness, this was very moving.

I will be starting University in September, studying philosophy with sociology at York. I'm both excited and nervous for this next season but am looking forward to meeting new people, learning new things and finding another Christian community to be involved in. The past 6 months have really helped me to build a firm foundation of faith and equipped me with useful tools for this next step.

Thank you again to all who have been supporting me in the past six months, it really has meant so much to me and this time has been such a marking season for me.



My last prayer requests are:

- that the transition back to the UK would be smooth for me
- that I would find a strong Christian community
- that starting university would not be too challenging, especially in terms of academics and socially
- For my teammates in their next steps, that they would continue to follow God
- For the mission team coming from Seoul, that they would have courage and learn so much about their relationship with God while they're here

The Parish Council has purchased a new defibrillator which is now in the phone box on the High Street next to the shop/post office.

A new team of people has been recruited to monitor the defibrillator to ensure that should it be required it is in working order. Regular checks to ensure it is working enable the ambulance service to know that the equipment is working and ready for use; faulty equipment could endanger life.

The Parish Council is thinking of running an awareness session on the defibrillator and what to do in case of a sudden cardiac arrest for residents. Information on this will follow.

### JULY REPORT - SOMERSET COUNCILLOR DAWN DENTON

#### July's been a full month and I have been working on the following:

- Merlin Theatre had some issues with their landlord, the Somerset Council, so I met with a member of their board of trustees.
- As part of a planning application in Frome (just off Adderwell Road), I attended a site visit.
- At the Planning East meeting we approved this development of 25 houses and debated (and voted on) other applications across the old Mendip area.
- The Frome Town Council planning meeting had Packsaddle as their first item on the agenda. I was there in my capacity as their local representative and as a member of the Planning East committee, so was only there to listen.
- Met with Secretary of State for Education, Gillian Keegan MP at Berkley School to chat about opportunities for this much-loved village school.
- The Police and Crime Commissioner, Mark Shelford, and I, chatted about policing in Frome and the opening of a public access point (as the library desk did not get much traffic).
- The Showfield play area is being redesigned with a contractor and I was invited to attend the briefing before it went into consultation.
- The Somerset Chamber and the Frome Chamber business breakfast was, as always, a useful opportunity to connect with local businesses and charities and discuss their needs.
- Met with a national Banking Group PR officer to discuss the bank closures in Frome and opportunities to explore through the post office / banking hubs.

# **Parish Environment**

### RODE MEMORIAL HALL LAND REWILDING

As part of the Parish Council's commitment to improve our impact on the environment, it was decided (about 18 months ago) to run a trial project on the patch of land outside the front entrance to the Memorial Hall. Originally proposed as a "no-mow May" initiative, it was decided a bigger positive impact would be had by turning the area into a wildflower area, with no mowing until late July/early August. This provides excellent habitat for a wide range of insects as well as enabling native wildflowers and pollinators to thrive.

Our first attempt was not a success (sown in Autumn 2021) with very few of the wildflower seeds germinating. On obtaining advice from an expert who lives in NSP, it turns out the ground was too rich and the lawn grasses too established. We decided therefore to remove the top 4" and sow an entirely new "meadow" mix of native grasses and wildflowers.

In February 2023 therefore, greatly assisted by John Findall, who, with Sharman, has been really supportive of the initiative, I removed the top with a mini-digger hired from Sydenhams Tool Hire in Frome. The seed mix was then scattered in late March, and as can be seen from the photo below, is creating a fantastic display over the summer months.



The plan is to cut this back, just the once, in late July/early August and cart away the cuttings, having left the flowers for a few weeks - hopefully in the late summer sun - so that the flowers ripen and shed their seeds first.

The hope is we will have an established wildflower "meadow" - albeit of some 80-odd square metres only - which will delight the local insect, pollinator and human population of Rode alike!

One request please - PLEASE do not allow your dogs to foul in this area. It may seem relatively innocuous in the long grass, but one can only imagine how unpleasant the strimming process will be if you do, and I do not want to find out first hand! Thank you.

### **Parish Cricket**

#### TWO RODE CLUB MATCHES TO REPORT ON THIS MONTH

Firstly, Warminster away on 5th July. With all the dry weather in the run up short boundaries and a very short outfield, this was always going to be a high scoring affair - as it was last year. We had more success with the ball this time around, taking 5 wickets as Warminster racked up 189 runs in 20 overs. Once again, Rode started strongly, keeping up with the challenging run rate but losing wickets steadily. Ollie Tucker starred with the bat, scoring a blistering 40 before being caught in the deep, ably supported by Lawrence Gripper - scoring a quick 23 before being run out going for the win. Zac Thomas then came in a smashed 33 of just over 4 overs, but eventually we ran out of steam, totalling a credible 147 for 4 off our allotted 20 overs. A good performance with both bat and ball against a very good local league side.

On 19th July we hosted The Star, another local league side. We were playing for the Lee Edwards trophy again, with Lee's parents kindly re-donating the trophy which had been given to them when the club folded in 2015. It was a joy to be playing for it again and re-starting that great tradition of the two clubs, a feeling shared equally by both teams. Rode batted first and frankly struggled. Kienan Cooper and James Pickett got us off to a quick start, but when they parted for 16 and 34 (not out, retired on reaching 30) respectively, the run rate slowed considerably. Lawrence Gripper with 14 was the only other batsman to score double figures, as we rather struggled to 112 for 6 off 20 overs.

When we took to the field we knew we had to take wickets to have any chance at all. James Goldstraw bowled absolutely magnificently, getting two wickets in two balls at one stage, and ending with figures of 2 for 27 off his four overs. Kienen Cooper bowled well without luck, ending with figures of no wickets for 20 off 4. Things took a turn for the worse when the author, having created problems for the batsmen in his first over then had to bowl to Charlie Rustell, a local Rodent but playing for the away team. Off five balls he smashed five sixes, and looked like getting a maximum 36 off the over until he mistimed the last, smearing it away for a single. Retiring almost immediately, having scored his 30 limit off the one over, the remaining batsmen for The Star scored 5 off the next two overs, reaching our meagre total in just 13 overs and 2 balls. A chastening experience, but a match played in great spirit, one which lived up to the traditions of this fixture.

After a brief comfort break, we were soon off again and heading for Devon. My roasted salmon, with new potatoes and pesto sauce was delicious.

The beds and the garden rooms nearer to the entrance were magnificent. I particularly liked the restful shades of blue and pastel shades, with grev foliage in the Cool Garden, which now at 5 years old is established. The informal planting and elegant flowing water feature encouraged quiet reflection. It was a striking contrast to the Hot Garden with cannas, dahlias and echinaceas and tropical foliage jostling for attention. It was very beautiful too. The rose garden was inspiring with a profusion of flowers in every shade, some of which were highly scented. Another area of inspiration was the parterre garden, where flowers and fruit grew in harmony.

Something I will look forward to growing next year are peach flowered runner beans, which contrasted delightfully with purple curly kale. The more established areas, where wildflowers now enhance the grass lawns in front of borders stuffed with unusual shrubs and trees, were also a joy to observe. Many members probably noted varieties they would like to acquire.

### **Parish History**

#### RODE -SOME OLD VILLAGE CUSTOMS WILLIAM WALTER WHEATLEY, ARTIST, 1802-1885

Having recently watched (and joined in!) the Bathampton Morris Dancers performing on the village green, I was reminded of the following note by W. W. Wheatley (stored with his paintings in the Somerset archives), describing some of the local customs.

#### Road Somersetshire

The custom of carrying about the Wassail Bowl on the last day of the old year takes place on the night of the last day of the old year. singing some doggerel verses which I have collected but this custom is I understand not singular it being kept up in some other villages in the county.

-----

A singular custom which I have not heard of having been practised elsewhere, takes place in this village on Shrove Tuesday. The children of the village assemble in the afternoon of that day at the village Pound, they join hands and as they term it Clip the Pound that is they surround it and after having 3 or 4 times danced round it two of them separate and they play a game all through the village known by the name of Thread the Needle. When it grows dark they procure candles light them and place them in their hats, they then with join'd hands proceed to the village Church which as they term they Clip dancing and making as much noise as they can and after going through the village – the lighted-candles moving with rapidity round the Church have a curious effect – What this custom has arisen from I am at a loss to make out I know nothing as relates to any ceremony as connected with the Catholic Church without it has any reference to Candlemas when they used to make a procession with the candles blessed on that day (Candlemas Feb<sup>y</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup>) W.W.W.

W. W. Wheatley was a watercolourist famous locally for his depictions of the churches, old houses and other antiquities of Rode and the wider Somerset. His early life is not clear but he married his 2<sup>nd</sup> wife Emma Walker in Bristol in 1829. Emma was from Rode and they moved to the village shortly after their wedding.

In the 1830s Wheatley was commissioned by G. W. Braikenridge, a collector of antiques, paintings and ephemera, to illustrate a new edition of J. Collinson's *History and Antiquities of the County of Somerset*.

In 1841 at the time of the census, he was living at No. 1 Union Cottage, Union Cottage Lane, (Marsh Road) in Rode with his wife Emma and children Caroline and Claude.

# **Parish History**

Wheatley's paintings of the clypping of St. Lawrence and the baptism of his wife Emma in the river Frome at Rode Bridge are displayed in St. Lawrence Church and Rode Baptist Chapel respectively. Two of his lesser-known works are shown below.



Other known Rode antiquities captured by Wheatley are Pucks Well, the Devil's Bed and Bolster, the wall tomb in St. Lawrence and the poor box.

Emma died in 1859 and William moved to Bath the following year, where he lived until his death in 1885.



#### MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON TUESDAY 10<sup>th</sup> JULY 2023 AT 7.30 pm

#### **UNCONFIRMED**

#### Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon (MS) – Chair, Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB) and Cllr Moira Punt (MP)

**In attendance:** Hugh Williams – Clerk, Cllr Adam Boyden (County Councillor) and 11 parishioners.

**<u>1. Parishioners Participation</u>**: Thanks were given for moving the SID to the top end of the High Street and a request was made for the data to be made available. A question on moving the 20mph limit to beyond Crooked Lane was raised to which the Chair said that he had just heard from Somerset that this could be done provided the hedge was cut and the Police agreed.

A number of Parishioners were attending the meeting to express their concerns over the proposed licensing changes applied for by Butcombe (application gives it as Butcome) for The Mill. A notice in the hedge had been seen which alerted them to a proposal to change to layout of The Mill, use of 'the island' and to host an increased number of outdoor events (from 3 to 10) which could run until 1.00am on Friday and Saturday evenings and to midnight on Monday to Thursday inclusive. Currently outdoor events could not run beyond 11.00pm, be run concurrently and also had to have two weekends between them, the new license would remove these restrictions if granted. The use of 'the island' was of concern (no tables, chairs or other structures are allowed on this land) as it was protected under an S106 agreement for wildlife/environmental reasons and had been hard won many years ago in exchange for a patio area outside The Mill. A deadline for comment was 21st July. It was disappointing that only Tellisford PC had been made aware of these changes, not local residents or Rode PC. The license changes would also allow for indoor events (up to 75 including the 10 outside) with doors and windows open. It was mentioned that already advertising for a 4-day cinema event in September was available, indicating that Butcombe assumed the licensing changes would be waved through. A request was made for Rode Parish council to support the local residents in opposing these changes which would create noise that could be heard across the village and impact on other businesses. The meeting agreed to oppose the proposed new license and to ask Tellisford if it could request an extension to the comment deadline. AP and Grant Slade agreed to draft initial comment opposing the

license changes for agreement for submission. (Clerk's Note: No extension is allowed and all comments must use the Representation Form).

**<u>2. Apologies for absence</u>**: Cllr J McAuliffe and Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)

**3.** Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 13<sup>th</sup> June were approved.

#### 4. Declarations of interest: None.

#### 5. Wessex Water:

Marc Chalk was welcomed to the meeting and he gave an update on the work that was being carried out at the Rode Water Recycling Centre. This was part of a £3 million upgrade of the facility to meet phosphorus limits and increase flow capacity of the site to meet the growing population. The work should be completed by 2025. The changes made had converted the site from a gravity system to a pumped site with increased power supply and new back-up generator. The pumped system generated more sludge and therefore increased tankers taking this away for treatment and eventual agricultural use. Currently new biological treatment equipment was being installed. The area still had a combined sewage and surface water set up which could lead to some overflow in cases of prolonged heavy rain. A site visit later in the year would be offered to the Parish Council.

**<u>6. County Councillor's Report:</u>** Cllr Adam Boyden reported that the Bradford Road/Rode Hill junction should have the vehicle activated signs installed soon on Bradford Road and the Wingfield Road. He said an internal enquiry on the efficiency of Highways responses had started at Somerset.

He asked if there were any issues to raise with Low Carbon on the proposed solar farm as a meeting was planned. Comment was made that residents were hopeful the area on the Bradford Road could be taken out of the scheme and information on how the agricultural land had been assessed needed to be supplied and possibly independently assessed.

He said that the High Court had asked the Mendip area how it was going to meet its 505-house shortfall that had been taken out of the Local Plan Part 2 and that sites had to be called for development, this would start later this month. These sites would have to be put forward for consultation. Consultation on the proposed sites should then start in early 2024.

### 7. Actions from prevous meeting:

i. Christchurch graveyard: To be chased up

**ii. Hoedown:** Further work had been done in June and it had been agreed a contractor was needed to clear the grass etc. on the orchard area on the S106 land. Another Hoedown was planned for 30<sup>th</sup> July.

**iii. Defibrillator:** Following the last meeting it had appeared that the defibrillator was not working and reports had not been submitted to The Community Heartbeat Trust. This had resulted I the defibrillator being decommissioned by them. Email correspondence within the PC had agreed a new defibrillator and pads should be ordered and installed in the phone box. The Clerk reported that a new defibrillator should be delivered tomorrow. This would become a Parish Council asset and the PC would be responsible for it.

**iv.** Path from Barrow Farm to allotments: Matthew has cut this but it requires further cutting and meeting agreed this should be done.

**v. Dog bin near Playing Field:** A request for a dog waste bin to be put near the playing field had been made. The meeting approved this but the location needed to be specified. There were already bins further up Church Lane and at the bottom of Marsh Road.

**vi. A361 Grass verge:** The Clerk reported that Somerset should be cutting the grass verge between Churchfields and Bradford Road as the grass was currently blocking the view onto the A361.

vii. Path from Church Farm: The maintenance of this was still to be explored with Somerset.

**<u>8. Climate Change Group:</u>** The meeting agreed to meet the outstanding costs (£166) for advertising the event. This might be split with Norton St Phillip.

### <u>9. Highways:</u>

**i. 20mph speed limit and village gates:** The Chair had spoken to Sara Davis (Somerset Highways) regarding the delays and had been informed that contact with Simon Taylor at Autograph had been made regarding the funding of the gates but this would not be discussed fully for a couple of weeks due to his holidays.

**ii. Street Lights:** The Clerk reported that the Police had no objections and that the decision remained with Somerset. However, discussions with Somerset indicated that if some lights in a road were to be turned off at midnight then all the lights in that road should go off. This had not been clear at the start of discussions. There was some concern over this and it was agreed the Clerk and Cllr Adam Boyden should clarify this with Somerset before proceeding.

iii. A36 Slip Road: Still chasing this up with National Highways.

10. Planning: i) New applications: None ii. Somerset decisions:

### None

### Other:

A request to have the large copper beech by the garages on The Mead be cut back due to its size causing light problems to the houses nearby. It was agreed to get a quote to cut the tree back by 3-4 metres all round.

**<u>11. Buses:</u>** A new timetable for the bus services should come out in September. PT agreed to remain in contact with the bus companies to ensure the good service was maintained.

**12. Playing Field:** It was reported that the Osbornes had offered to cut back the grass and weeds on the S106 land and this was greatly appreciated. The repainted pavilion was now fully operational but its life expectancy was limited.

### 13. Financial matters:

**i. Income and expenditure:** The revised income and expenditure for 2023-24 had been circulated and was noted.


