REFLECTION

Bringing in the Harvest!

On 1st April 1957, Panorama - a new programme on the BBC - featured a farm in 'Switzerland' and the narrator explained that 'the past winter - one of the mildest in living memory has led to, most importantly of all, an exceptionally heavy spaghetti crop!' After watching the programme many people wrote into the BBC wanting to know how to grow their own Spaghetti trees! It was arguably the greatest public April fool's hoax of all time!



I've been thinking quite a bit about food recently... and no cheeky comments please! One of the reasons is because we have been looking at the Lord's Prayer during our Breakfast Church slots (incidentally – Breakfast Church is literally a feast and you are so welcome to join and eat with us!) Anyhow, when it came round to my week to lead, I got the phrase 'give us this day our daily bread'—which made me think about where our food comes from. And, unlike those viewers in 1957, we know where all our food comes from don't we?

The Guardian did a survey and bought a basket of 20 fresh foods from the major retailers on one day - including pears from Argentina; tomatoes from Saudi Arabia; broccoli from Spain; baby carrots from South Africa; salad potatoes from Israel; sugar snap peas from Guatemala; asparagus from Peru, brussels sprouts from Australia; prawns from Indonesia; peppers from Holland and grapes from Chile!

They clocked up the distance all the items had travelled and the total for the basket was 100,943 air miles – that's a big carbon footprint!

But most of the food we consume food doesn't arrive by air, road, or rail but by sea - 60% of all food miles comes from ship travel – so a much lower carbon footprint. The news reports of the grain blockade in Ukraine, have helped us realise how important sea transportation is.

On Sunday July 31st at our United Parish Church Service, Rev Canon Andrew Wright, the Secretary General of Mission to Seafarers, spoke about the men (it *is* mostly men) who crew ships that transport most of the things we buy from overseas - including food.

These are some of the things that we learnt:

- Seafarers provide us with 90% of the things that we consume
- 25% of global seafarers are from the Philippines and on average each Filipino seafarer supports between 18 and 20 family members back home
- Most seafarers spend 9+ months at a time at sea living apart from family and friends and with limited medical care
- during the pandemic many countries refused to recognise seafarers as essential workers
- many countries still refuse to allow them to disembark at ports which means they spend months at a time without even leaving their ships

Having heard those shocking facts it was then really encouraging to hear about the work of the Mission to Seafarers, working across 50 countries, 200 ports and providing much needed support. In places where shore leave is forbidden, the local mission teams offer shopping trips for the seamen including buying them essential items such as sim cards and medicines – last year those shopping trips amounted to over US\$3 million!

It seems ironic that those who transport so much for others are unable to shop and access basic necessities themselves. In some countries the mission has successfully lobbied governments to provide seafarers with covid vaccines and has also provided mobile covid clinics to dispense the vaccines.



As well as practical help, they provide much needed pastoral and spiritual care for people who are a long way from home and who might be dealing with issues such as poor mental health or bereavement. www.missiontoseafarers.org

It was an inspiring and informative talk and if you would like to hear the whole talk do go to the parish website – www.hardingtonvale.org.uk and click on the podcast link where all our talks are available.

So, as we celebrate Harvest Festival this month, it might be interesting to look in our shopping trolleys and learn about where our food comes from and how it is transported (and perhaps about how we can decrease our carbon footprint).

And when we pray 'give us this day our daily bread' we can be thankful for our local and overseas farmers who grow the food during these challenging times of climate change and also be grateful for the seafarers and transporters who sacrifice so much to bring food to our tables.

UPDATE FROM FROME DEANERY

Recent changes in the Bath and Wells Diocese have meant that all the deaneries in the Diocese are renewing their structure and vision.

Frome deanery has agreed a vision looking at 'being a transforming Christian presence in all our communities.'

The change for us in Hardington Vale means that we are welcoming Buckland Dinham parish into our benefice.

This has been agreed by Deanery Synod and Diocesan Area Pastoral and Mission Group (AMPG).

We have had discussions with both the Hardington Vale PCC and the Buckland Dinham PCC and our HV Patron Revd Peter Owen Jones.

A further directive from the diocese is shortly to be sent out for consultation to confirm that everyone is happy with this decision. That all being agreed it will be submitted to the Church Commissioners for their final legal approval.

Change is never easy - but I believe that actually this is a positive addition to Hardington Vale and a good way forward for Buckland Dinham.

Recently members of Buckland Dinham led a beautiful Iona style Service in St Philip and St James, Norton St Philip.

You will also see from the Service Pattern in this month's magazine that Buckland Dinham's Services are now also being shown and add a further option of where you can go to worship on a Sunday.

They also hold a coffee morning in the church on every third Saturday of the month, so if you would like to visit the church and enjoy coffee and cake a warm welcome awaits you then too. Next one is Saturday 16th September.

RODE IS WINNING ITS 8-YEAR BATTLE FOR BETTER BUSES

August 2015 saw First Bus announce it was pulling all its Bath and Trowbridge bus services out of Rode. The battle to protect our buses began. Our fight made headline news in the press and onto TV.



Finally, we persuaded First to keep a skeleton Bath service through our village. Faresaver also agreed to divert some of their X34 buses through Rode.

Ever since then, we have gradually been improving our bus services both from First Bus and from Faresaver. The bus companies have liked how we have tried to support and encourage bus uses and they've rewarded us with steadily improving bus services.

Our village now has one of the best bus services of any village in Somerset. That's because people in Rode use buses ... long may that continue as that's how we will keep our bus services.

So, please, BUS IT whenever you can!

This September, both First (with the Bath D2 service) and Faresaver (X34 with its Trowbridge/Chippenham service) are announcing new bus timetables with even better services for Rode. New early morning Frome-bound D2 buses are being introduced plus tweaks to many of the X34 and D2 bus times.

Rode Parish Council has long spearheaded Rode's fight to have a 'fit for purpose' bus service. It's charted a new way in Somerset with its production of a customised Village Bus Timetable that's delivered (by parish councillors) to all houses in the village. This month, Rode PC is again producing a new Rode Bus Timetable. It will be popping through your letterbox shortly - if it hasn't already.

RODE CHAPEL UPDATE

Windows - The Work is almost complete. At the time of writing this piece, the project is on target for completion by the time you read it!

The task has progressed more or less as planned despite the "iceberg effect". Beneath the surface lurked a number of complications caused by issues left for another day at some time in the distant past and then forgotten about. Some of the glass is clearly original...much of the timber frames are similarly ancient and have been the subject of quick fixes...and all needed to be put right. What else could we do? The Chapel is a grade 2 listed building and we were beginning to find evidence of water damage inside as the window frames ceased to be weatherproof. But we're nearly there. It has cost quite a lot more than the original estimate. We've spent all the money so far raised but have secured a private interest free loan so the work could be completed. Applications for grant aid are out there, but obviously we are still hoping to receive more donations in support of this essential work so please feel free to donate whatever you can afford!

Garden - Despite our trusty lawn mowing friend having left the village, the garden has been kept looking wonderful through the joint attentions of a new Mowing Man and two particular friends of the Chapel, Gail and Pauline. A huge thank you to you both, your efforts are really appreciated.

The Quiet Garden is surrounded by the rest of the memorial yard and while the mowing is in hand, the edges and borders do need to be looked after as well. Is there anyone out there who could lend a hand, please?

Ideally, the task needs a few volunteers to take individual responsibility for looking after an edge, or a border, so no-one has to do too much. We are planning to place a shed to store tools, so you won't have to bring your own, necessarily, so please give it some thought.

We are delighted to be welcoming our new Minister - Rev Andrew Prout will be the minister for Rode Chapel, Wesley Church in Frome, Norton Down and Coleford. His Welcome Service is at Wesley Church on 1st September at 7pm with refreshments beforehand.

He will be taking his first Service in Rode Chapel on 10th September at 10:30am and our Harvest Service on 23rd September. Everyone is welcome. So do come along to meet him and to admire our beautifully restored windows.

AUGUST REPORT FROM SOMERSET COUNCIL

"It will be a quiet month," they said. "Everyone is on holidays." Well, let's just say that it was far from quiet. The rainy weather has kept me indoors, working more than normal, but getting through a lot of things that, in a busier month, would be pushed to the bottom of the 'to do' list.

The last week of July and the month of August

- The pre-LCN (Local Community Network) meeting, I met with the officers and councillors who will be taking this project forward. I have chosen to step down from having an official title on the Frome LCN, to support the others with whatever they need from me. And of course the first official LCN meeting at the Frome Town Hall, which I was not able to attend in-person (due to Covid symptoms), was held, and a chair (Frome Cllr Max Wide) and vice chair (Cllr Adam Boyden) have been selected. The Steering Committee with include Cllr Helen Kay and Cllr Claire Sully. For more information visit: democracy.somerset.gov.uk/ieListDocuments.aspx?CId=902&MId=6996
- I met the Frome Town Clerk, Paul Wynne, to see if there are areas I can support him, and for a regular catch up on my 'to do' list, which includes the markets, the cleaning contracting in Frome and the issues around the tourism information centre (which will impact our whole community)
- It was wonderful to attend the Frome Festival volunteers party at the Silk Mill. This Festival brings the community in and around Frome together and gives our local businesses so much needed support. It also generates a large income from those visiting the town from further afield. I hope to encourage the villages and parishes around Frome to get more involved in 2024.
- I did a lot of planning application reading (legalities, strategies, reports, objections, support and undertaking site visits) in preparation for the Planning East Committee in September.
- I met with Mind Training (Woolverton) to discuss their access onto the A36.
- Planning East where planning applications were considered for:
 6 dwellings in Street / 4 dwellings in West Pennard / Floodlights for Millfield School in Glastonbury / Construction of driveway and change of use of land to garden in Street
- Cllr Adam Boyden and I met with the Bluebell Low Carbon who are putting in an application for a solar farm in the Rode parish.
- I met with the Frome planning officer, Jane Llewellyn, and the chair of the Frome Planning committee, Cllr Steve Tanner, to get the details of the issues around land at Edmund Park in relation to the Berkley First School
- I attended (Virtually) the Communities Scrutiny meeting where we delved into Housing and Homelessness and the council's customer service systems.

- I met with Cllr Tessa Munt (Lead Member for Children, Families and Education) to go over my report about the issues with the location of Berkley School and the land designated to a First School at Edmund Park.
- I met with Royal British Legion Frome branch to discuss Remembrance Day and other community events and funding for local area football development.
- The end of the month will include a meeting with Frome Cllr Fiona Burrows about Green projects in Frome and a members' meeting about Packsaddle.

Since Hannah's death a small team of volunteers have carried on her work.

The Band in a Barn volunteer organising committee presented a donation of £5,000 to each of our main beneficiaries for 2023 during a lovely evening reception at The Forester's Arms, , Beckington on Friday 28^{th} July 2023.

As well as supporting these three fantastic charities, The Band in a Barn team are delighted to have raised sufficient funds this year to give £3,000 to our Small Grants Scheme.

This funding stream considers applications for unrestricted grants of up to $\pounds 500$ for a wide variety of charitable and other, often local, good causes. Applications to the Small Grants Scheme are invited periodically and considered on a first come first served basis.

SOUTH KOREA WORLD SCOUT JAMBOREE 2023

We set off on 27th July - 27 Scouts and Explorers from Somerset to go on an adventure of a lifetime to the World Scout Jamboree in South Korea. The intention was to spend 4 nights in Seoul, 10 nights at the Jamboree site (which is a 4 hour drive from Seoul) and then go back to Seoul for the last 4 nights.



It all started off well as we met up at Heathrow with our fellow Scouts from Bermuda who had joined with us to form our group: Someruda. We flew to Seoul and checked in to our hotel. Those first few days allowed time for adjustment to the heat, humidity, jet lag and being together as a group. When we headed to the Jamboree site four days later there was a feeling of excitement and anticipation. What happened next has been widely reported on the TV and in newspapers.

After just 2 days the UK contingent decided that the site wasn't suitable for the 4500 British Scouts (of the 43,000 who were there), due to problems of sanitation, lack of shade (in the 40 degree heat), dietary requirements not being met and that due to flooding before the arrival of the Scouts the site wasn't completely ready. It was hoped that by removing the British Scouts, this would relieve pressure on the organisers to accommodate the remaining Scouts.

We were gradually bussed back to Seoul over the next 48 hours and we were really lucky to get put up in a 5 star hotel, with air conditioning! This was particularly welcome after the heat of the tents on the Jamboree Site.

Despite only being at the Jamboree for four nights, we did have a chance to take part in some of the activities available. There was a large variety in the on-site activities, ranging from huge inflatable slides and water fights to more peaceful puzzle based games. As well as that, our unit was taken to an off-site activity area, where we were taught more about Korean culture. There were activities on Korean carpentry, making prints depicting parts of Buddha's history and a session about drinking tea and meditation.











Although our Jamboree experience was not as expected, we did lots of excursions and activities in Seoul including a theme park, museums, temples, a visit to the Demilitarized Zone and lots of shopping!

We also had a fabulous closing ceremony at the World Cup Stadium where all the other Scouts from around the world were now also gathered. The theme of the closing ceremony was K-Pop (Korean pop music), which was a lot of fun.

SEASONAL INFLUENZA CAMPAIGN 2023

September sees the start of our Flu Vaccination program. We encourage those who are eligible for a free NHS flu vaccine to take up the offer (patients aged 65 and over and eligible patients at high risk, e.g., with certain long-term health conditions).

It is also available to pregnant women, carers and frontline health and social care workers or those who live with someone who is more likely to get a severe infection due to weakened immune system. Children aged 2 and 3 will be eligible for vaccination at the surgery, children in primary school will be vaccinated through the school programme. Usually children aged 2-17 are offered the vaccine as a nasal spray. Please visit nhs.uk/conditions/vaccinations/fluinfluenza-vaccine/ for further information.

Special arrangements are made for patients who are housebound or in residential or nursing care.

Help us help you Heart and circulatory disease, also known as cardiovascular disease, causes a quarter of all deaths in the UK and is the largest cause of premature mortality in deprived areas. This is one of the biggest areas where the NHS can save lives over the next 10 years.

However. there evidence that many do not fully understand the symptoms of a heart attack. While people act upon chest pain, heart attacks manifest themselves in different ways, and people may recognise other symptoms, such as a squeezing across the chest. sweating. shortness of breath. feeling weak lightheaded or a feeling of unease.



A HOLIDAY BY TRAIN

As Southern Europe is devastated by forest fires and suffers record-breaking temperatures as the planet inexorably warms, it's definitely time to think a lot more seriously about alternatives to flying (amongst many other things, of course). I'm afraid I'm no paragon of virtue here, but we've begun to do some serious long-distance rail travel (last year we went to a wedding in Catalonia by train and discovered it's relatively easily get from Barcelona to Rode in a day!)

Interestingly, recent research has shown that train travel emits THIRTEEN times less carbon than flying, and TEN times less than travelling by This detailed car. analysis (undertaken by the consultancy. Thrust Carbon) more accurate than



previous studies, and indicates that train travel is even better for the environment (compared to the car or plane) than we previously thought.

But travelling by train has always been more than just an environmental choice. It cuts out all the airport agro and makes travelling seem civilised once again with train travel you feel like you're <u>exploring</u>, rather than just enduring the journey. So, earlier this year I contemplated my options for getting to Norway, where I'd booked a short kayaking and wild-camping break in the fjords.

By far the quickest and cheapest option was to fly to Oslo and take the train to Voss ("The Adventure Capital of Norway"). But this was also, clearly, the least interesting! So I opted for the train – and ferries, and a fascinating taste of seven different countries in just over a week. I should say straightaway that I'm fortunate that my work nowadays is very flexible, and I had the time to allow for the two and a half days' travel each way (in fact, ideally I would have taken longer – my journey gave just the briefest of glimpses of some wonderful places). And, although train travel by and large is cheaper in continental Europe (compared to the UK), after factoring in overnight accommodation, the total cost was significantly more than if I'd flown.

All rail travel to Europe has to start with Eurostar at St Pancras, so it was there that I began my journey with the evening service to Amsterdam. The direct train

delivers you to the centre of the Dutch capital in around 4 hours - in time for a beer before bedding down at Pension Homeland (which I can thoroughly recommend – for location, cleanliness, and the general laid-back vibe!). The next day I made my way to the northern German port of Emden and boarded the ferry to Kristiansand. It's an 18 hour overnight crossing – but forget any reference-points you may have to cross-channel ferries. This is more like a cruise! The ship is huge, with several very decent restaurants and a great theatre (where I watched a multi-lingual bingo/cabaret show – all announcements in German, Dutch, Norwegian and English!).

Helpfully, the ferry terminal at Kristiansand is in the centre of the town (and conveniently just a few hundred metres from the railway station). But Kristiansand itself is well worth a stay – there's a lively street market (plenty of fish!), pleasant "old town", a cathedral, port, gardens and a spectacular arts centre. In the afternoon I took the train to Stavanger – and discovered another Norwegian gem. Again, the railway station is very central...a ten minute stroll takes you to the harbour front, with myriad vibrant cafés and bars on the quaysides. Ideally I would have had several days to enjoy the town, with its cobbled streets, white clapper-board houses, and fascinating maritime history.

However, next morning I needed to catch the early ferry to Bergen...and an opportunity for a leisurely 5 hour cruise up the Norwegian coast. By booking early, I got my ferry ticket for €44...and again, it's more like a mini-cruise than a ferry journey. The sea was like a mill-pond, but I imagine even in high winds it would be reasonably calm, as most of the route weaves in and out of islands, hugging the coast.

After a brief walk around Bergen (a slight disappointment, after Kristiansand

and Stavanger) I hopped on the train to Voss

– ready for my long weekend kayaking [I
won't go into detail here, suffice to say the
scenery was extraordinary – and the whole
experience very memorable. I booked
through Much Better Adventures
(https://www.muchbetteradventures.com/)

– check them out – they provide adventurebased holidays all over the world in
conjunction with small companies, helping
to sustain local communities).



I opted for a different route back, taking the train from Voss to Oslo (which, incidentally, is a memorable journey on its own), and the next day travelled to Hamburg via Copenhagen. I'd visited both the latter cities several times and can

thoroughly recommend them for either a long weekend or a lengthier break – both have substantial cultural offers, with plenty to explore in the surrounding regions.

The final leg of my journey took me from Hamburg to Brussels (via the splendid city of Aachen), and then to London on the afternoon Eurostar. Amazingly, every train and ferry was pretty much on time (a couple actually early), and there were precisely zero travel glitches — at least until I reached Chippenham! Fortunately the delay here was only around 30 minutes — a tree had come down near Westbury, and traffic on that line had been diverted, causing congestion between Chippenham and Bath.

My top tips for train travel are:

- 1. Book early! Fares can be incredibly cheap if you book 3/4 months ahead (most rail companies don't allow booking much earlier so start searching as soon as seats go on sale). As an example, my advance purchase ticket from Hamburg to Brussels was €29...compared to the price on the day of €136.
- 2. Use the relevant national carriers' apps. These will provide the most up-todate journey info, and also store your ticket electronically. The Norwegian Rail app (vy) is particularly good. And Deutsche Bahn is not only great for Germany but is excellent for booking tickets right across Europe.
- 3. Use the buffet cars. In almost every case these are far superior to anything we have in the UK (indeed, GWR seem to have got rid of them entirely). And they're generally quite reasonable...sitting at a table with a sandwich and a beer, watching the world go by is one of life's simple pleasures!
- 4. If, like me, you're going to be spending a decent amount of time on the train, take a few books ideally with some relevance to the countries you're visiting. I had a few physical books, plus several lined up on the Audible app. I also downloaded a bunch of podcasts and You tube videos, which helped with some of the less interesting parts of the trip.

RODE & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB VISITS

We were fortunate that the weather was kind to us on Monday 14th August, when we visited Gasper Cottage near Stourton in lovely evening sunshine to discover a beautiful garden.

As we followed the waymarked path, up the hillside to the house an impressive pond and a large sculpture whetted our appetites.



We were met on the patio by the owners, Bella Hoare and Jonnie Gallop.

Bella explained the cottage had been altered over the years to meet the needs of the occupiers and a photo board showing the house in different periods and the most recent adaptations was there. The back rooms where we were stood were constructed in the Georgian period when the cottage was the Stourhead land manager's home.

In 2008 when they acquired the house it needed complete renovation, with rewiring and new plumbing essential, and they chose to move the driveway and add a new kitchen area, increasing the size of the house at that time.

Once the house was ready to move into, they were ready to tackle the garden, which was very plain. Looking across the areas we could see there had been a complete transformation here too. This has been an ongoing venture as new areas are developed. Mrs Hoare took us around the garden identifying plants and talking about her planting choices.

The planting was beautifully co-ordinated, so colours blended and contrasted delightfully. Most areas had a profusion of flowering plants: some lusciously planted with large leaved plants and hot colours, others in cooler pastel shades, creating a calm restful mood.

Mrs Hoare although a banker by profession is also a talented artist as was obvious by the way plants were chosen and grouped together. We also went through her gallery studio and saw her recent skilled paintings.

She works and so to achieve her garden plans she employs a gardener four days a week. Together they raise over 1500 plants from seed every year to fill the beds.

Above, the hillside has been planted with forest and fruit trees. These trees are young and are just starting to provide fruit and nuts for people and animals.

The space between has paths looping through wildflower meadows. We all agreed this had been a great place to visit.

On Monday 11th September at 2.30pm members and guests are invited to West Lavington Manor, about 35 minutes from Rode.

This 15th century manor house with a five-acre walled garden, herbaceous border, Japanese garden, orchard with 25 varieties of apples and pears, lake with duck house plus outstanding specimen trees should have something to attract most garden lovers. There are no refreshments, but we have been invited to bring a picnic to eat in the garden if we wish.

FREE CALL BLOCKING UNITS

PCC Mark Shelford has welcomed a national rollout of free call blocking units to help protect people falling victims to phone scams.



Led by the National Trading Standards (NTS) Scams Team and in partnership with trueCall Secure+, the aim of the rollout is to prevent the public, especially vulnerable individuals, from receiving phone calls from fraudsters who are looking to obtain personal or financial information.

A call blocker is a unit that filters out unwanted scams and nuisance phone calls from a landline phone (the unit does not work with mobile phones). In previous call block projects run by the NTS Scams Team, the units have blocked 91% of scam and nuisance calls. The unit plugs into an existing landline phone and phone line and can work alongside broadband and lifeline pendant devices that are already installed.

Those interested can find out more about call blocking units and how they work here: www.friendsagainstscams.org.uk and you can check your eligibility for a free call blocker by completing the questionnaire on the website.

PCC Mark Shelford said: "It's great to see that NTS Scams Team have received funding to rollout call blockers, a key tool to help prevent people from falling victim to scammers and rogue traders."

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON MONDAY 7th AUGUST 2023 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon (MS) – Chair, Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB) and Cllr Moira Punt (MP)

In attendance: Hugh Williams – Clerk, Cllr Dawn Denton (County Councillor) and 1 parishioner.

- 1. Parishioners Participation: It was brought to the Parish Council's attention that there was danger the village speed watch group could fold as it was now down to 5 volunteers and the leader of the group was standing down at the end of the year. The meeting agreed that it would help in recruiting new members to this important group; and agreed to fund a door drop leaflet asking for volunteers. In connection to this a question was raised over the new automatic SIDs. In response it was reported that Gloucester police had completed its trial and Somerset and Avon were assessing the results and it was possible that the Police could take this on and fund it, therefore the PC was waiting for a decision before purchasing any automatic SIDs.
- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr A Pickett and Cllr A Boyden (County Councillor)
- <u>3. Approval of the minutes</u>: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 10th July were approved. An agreed amendment to the Parishioners section was agreed (see under minute 6i below) and this would be published in The Link as well.

4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. County Councillor's Report: Cllr Dawn Denton reported that she had obtained a contact at National Highways regarding the slip road onto the A36; however, with holidays she had not yet been able to progress.

The recent concerns raised by a resident at Church Farm regarding the access and exit from the site onto the A361 had been forwarded to Somerset, who had already agreed to improve the speed signage. It was agreed to ask Somerset if it could count the traffic on the A361, and whether HGVs could be separately counted as it was felt these had increased considerably.

6. Actions from previous meeting:

- i. The Mill: A correction to the July minutes regarding the new license application was noted. The application to change the license had included the fact that they were applying to have the whole of the outdoor area, including the 'island' and car park, licensed; which would allow The Mill to have an unlimited number of outdoor events. This was because the limit of ten outdoor events proposed in the license variation request specifically excluded events within the licensed area. A hearing date for the license application had been set for 6th September and details of this would be circulated to all who had sent comments on the license application. There was some concern expressed that this was beyond the 20 working days limit and had probably been extended to give Butcombe time to defend the application. It was reported that Environmental Protection and the Police had submitted objections along with the Parish Council and a number of residents.
- **ii. Hoedown:** Limited work had been done on the July Hoedown due to the rain. A further Hoedown was planned for 20th August (avoiding the Bank Holiday weekend). Work had started on repainting the phone box and the purchase of paint brushes was approved.
- **iii. Defibrillator:** The Clerk reported that the new defibrillator had been installed and was now working. A new team of checkers had been set up to ensure it remained in working order.

It was agreed that an awareness training event should be carried out in the village either run by Frome Hospital or Community Heartbeat Trust and the Clerk agreed to progress this. The PC agreed to fund it.

It was also agreed that the PC would fund the formation of a VETS (Voluntary Emergency Telephone System) in the village following the awareness training. This system would form a group of people who could be alerted to take the defibrillator to a patient when needed.

- **iv.** Path from Barrow Farm to allotments: Matthew Lucas had suddenly left the village and therefore the PC did not have anyone to continue keeping these paths clear. It was reported that the local footpath officers were keeping the paths clear, however, it was agreed that these paths required considerable work to keep fully open and that the PC should find someone to do this work.
- **v. Church Lane and Clay Lane:** The footpath on Church Lane was very overgrown as was Clay Lane and although Somerset carried out an annual cut of Church Lane it was agreed the land owners should be approached to carry out a cut to keep these open. The narrowness of the Church Lane footpath was discussed as the undergrowth had encroached considerably over the years and Cllr Denton agreed to approach Somerset to see if anything could be done.
- **vi. Dog bin near Playing Field:** The location suggested by the Playing Field Committee was considered unacceptable as it was next to the entrance of the path to the children's play area and under a no dog sign. A new location would

be requested. (Clerk's Note: a new location on new post on the right by the entrance to the car park has been proposed.)

7. Climate Change Group: It was reported that there were now 85 subscribers to the Climate Change email group. JM reported that the key issue identified was to try and ensure Rode had some off-street electric car charging points; although no suitable location had been found. Other parish councils were still to be approached to see if they would help fund the cost of the Big Green Week.

8. Highways:

- i. 20mph speed limit and village gates: The Chair had spoken to Sara Davis (Somerset Highways) regarding the implementation of the 20mph limit within the village. He said that agreement had been reached to extend this to the far side of Crooked Lane. The current delay was regarding the village gates as Autograph Homes had said they were not going to fund these. The Parish Council agreed the TRO to implement the 20mph limit in the village should go ahead and that the village gate situation be resolved at a later date. The PC would review the gates agreed and consider the cost implications that might fall to the PC to proceed.
- ii. Bradford Road/Rode Hill crossroads: A delay on installing the vehicle activated signs was due to equipment needing repair, this should be completed by 11th August and work restart after then.
- **iii. Street Lights:** The Clerk reported that Cllr Boyden had, following discussions with Somerset, confirmed that on a street, lights had to be either all on or all off. The Clerk was waiting to hear from Somerset regarding revised street light lists he had sent in.

9. Planning:

i) New applications:

2023/1379/TCA: To pollard hornbeam to 10 feet – 33 High Street. No objections

2023/1403/TCA: To reduce gingko by 2-3m – Paviours Well Cottage, High Street. No objections

ii. Somerset decisions:

2023/1015/HSE: Erection of single store rear extension – 1 Fairfield. Approved

iii. Other:

i. The Planning Inspectorate had rejected the application to build four dwellings at the rear of The Bell. There was continued concern over the state of The Bell which appeared to being left to fall into disrepair. Questions were raised whether Somerset had any powers to ensure this listed building did not deteriorate further.

- **ii.** The unauthorised development of the building in the grounds of The Coach House on Rode Hill was raised as no retrospective planning application had been submitted. Cllr Denton agreed to contact Enforcement at Somerset. (Clerk's Note: Somerset have sent a breach of Planning Letter to the owners)
- **10. Buses:** A new timetable for the bus services should come out in September. PT reported that possibly a few D2 services could be reallocated to the D2X which do not come through Rode. Somerset are expected to continue to fund the evening D2 services.
- 11. Website: JM reported he had been uploading a large amount of the history of Rode material from the current site to the new site as well as amending photos etc. A link had been circulated to all members of the PC and he requested feedback. He had also approached most of the local groups (all had shown interest) for them to populate areas on the new website. It was possible the website could go live in September. The meeting thanked him for his work on the website.
- **12. Solar Farm:** The application had still to be submitted. The triangular field on the Braford Road had been taken off the application but another field added on the far side of the A361. A Teams meeting was planned for 17th August for an update for the PC.

13. Financial matters:


