REFLECTION

"We can't afford to not believe there is hope". These were the words of a representative of the Red Cross and Red Crescent in an interview following the appalling events in the Middle East, which are dominating the news at the time of writing. However, he was clearly finding it very difficult to maintain that belief. How can we work for peace and reconciliation in our world when attitudes appear to be so fixed? In a season of Remembrance, it is, perhaps, especially discouraging to feel that little changes in our troubled world. The same can unfortunately be true closer to home, in our communities and even in our families.

Last year some of us in the Parish took part in the Difference Course, which has been developed to help everyone explore and develop approaches to reconciliation in society. In this course we learned about three essential habits:

- Be curious: this is about "listening to others' stories and seeing the world through their eyes". The reluctance to listen to opinions and outlooks which differ from our own can be so strong it takes a deliberate decision to stop, suspend our arguments and see and hear the other.
- Be present: this is about "sticking around and learning to encounter others with authenticity", being honest about our differences but committed to developing relationships across divides.
- Reimagine: this is about "finding hope and opportunity in the places where we long to see change". Are we prepared to look for those openings for positive change, however small, which may lead to healing?

We heard case studies of people in current conflicts, including Israel and Palestine, who, against the odds, were putting these habits into practice. We also looked at examples from the life of Jesus; one that stood out for me was when he encountered a Samaritan woman who was an outcast in her own community (St John chapter 4). In one conversation Jesus flew in the face of religious, racial and misogynistic prejudices, including her own, and in so doing introduced her to the worship of God and initiated the transformation of a community.

Charles Péguy was a French poet in the days before the First World War, when storm clouds were gathering. He wrote that Faith, Hope and Love are "three sisters, two adults and a little girl. They go down the street holding hands, Faith and Love on each side and Hope in the middle. Everyone, seeing them, thinks that it is the two adults that drag the little one between them. They are wrong! It is she who pulls everything along, because if hope fails, everything stops."

In these challenging times, let's allow hope to flourish in our hearts and across our communities. As St Paul put it in the letter to the Romans:

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

NEWS FROM ST LAWRENCE

The church was decorated so beautifully for Harvest Festival and it was a perfect setting for our Harvest Supper at the beginning of the month.

The purpose for the supper was to come together and enjoy a meal together and to celebrate the harvest and share some harvest poems and stories.



A side benefit of the supper was also to raise £250.00 for the St Lawrence roof project. We hope to continue this event in future years.

Work on Phase 1 of the church roof repair (the South Aisle and South side of the Nave) is due to start on 20th November. It will take several weeks and probably continue until March.

It is anticipated that there will be two more phases taking place over the winters 2024-5 and 2025-6. Working over the winter is not ideal, but is dictated by the bats, which are active in the summer months.

For anyone who is interested, the main species within the church are brown long eared bats and Myotis bats. At the top of the tower staircase there is evidence of a night roost of long eared and Pipistrelle bats. The redundant basement area is used by Greater Horseshoe bats as a night roost and feeding perch. The foregoing is based on the bat survey which has recently been received.

We are very much indebted to the Heart of Rode Committee (who fundraise for the upkeep of the fabric of the church and the churchyard) for starting up the Rode Roxy again. The first showing of the season will be on the 3rd November and there are more details on page 31.

On the weekend of the 13^{th} - 14^{th} October, about 30 people from Hardington Vale made their way to Sheldon – a Christian retreat centre just south of Exeter.

We were blessed with beautiful sunshine (and a couple of sharp showers!) as we joined together to listen to some Christian teaching, enjoy beautiful worship music courtesy of Steve and Becky Rhodes and have meals together and some evening games. It was a special time to get to know each other a little better and to enjoy the beautiful Devonian countryside. I also managed to go out and enjoy an amazing Devon cream tea!

Remembrance Service falls on the second Sunday of the month in November so there will be no Breakfast Church on Sunday the 12th November at St Lawrence.

Breakfast Church in December falls on the same day as the Outdoor Nativity so that will not take place either. Which brings me onto my next point...

DEFIBRILLATOR AWARENESS TRAINING

Rode Parish Council recently purchased and installed a new defibrillator in the phone box by the village shop, replacing the old one which had been there for ten years.

In order to help as many people as possible understand what the new defibrillator can do and how it could be of help to you or someone you know in an emergency; an awareness seminar has been arranged.

The Community Heartbeat Trust will be running this two-hour awareness training event in the Rode Memorial Hall on:

Monday 27th November starting at 6.30pm.

The event will cover the following:

- What is a Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA): '5 minutes to save a life' and physiology of the heart how to recognise an SCA
- How to dial 999: what to expect and the questions you will be asked
- How to do CPR and why: Practical Demonstration; How to use your community defibrillator (AED); Recovery position/turning a patient; Handover to Paramedics; and Governance and support programmes.

This seminar, which will help you understand the village defibrillator will be open to everyone and you are all encouraged to attend. However, it will not commit you to anything, just help to give you the confidence to use it.

Lil Maxine gives rise to an unmistakable sound of her own. Mellow, soulful, and progressive, she flirts with balladic sounds and tight grooves, and tells timeless stories of love, longing and hope. Lil's journey as a jazz vocalist began growing up immersed in the sounds of her parents' eclectic music collection. Finding herself captivated at the young age of seventeen, she started performing and writing her own songs. At 21 Lil embraced Vienna's independent art scene in which her burgeoning talent was able to grow and blossom through inspiring collaborations with diverse artists within improvisation, theatre and music.

The Explorers joined a contingency from Guernsey for an amazing weekend on the guide/scout narrowboat based in Aldermaston learning how to do locks and swing bridges.









Every Mind Matters is a campaign and digital resource designed to empower people to look after their mental wellbeing and support that of others.

It focuses on promoting mental wellbeing as well as addressing the four most commonly reported, subclinical mental health concerns: anxiety, low mood, stress, and trouble sleeping. The programme offers a range of evidence-based self-care actions and free resources designed to help people take care of their own mental health and prevent common concerns from escalating into mental health disorders.

Every Mind Matters recently launched a campaign to encourage people to 'find your little big thing' and highlight that 'doing the little things can make a big difference to your mental health.' Making time for your mental wellbeing is important - and embedding these little things as part of your routine can help you feel better and more in control. Little things like:

Get active - Getting active is a natural mood booster – try making it part of your routine

Talk to someone - Talking to someone we trust about our feelings can improve our mental wellbeing

Better sleep - Awake at night? Getting the most from your sleep – like avoiding screen-time an hour before bed or getting out of bed and doing something simple until you feel tired again

Get in nature - Spending time in nature can boost your mood, help you relax **Manage your feelings -** Learn to catch, check, and change unhelpful thoughts with Cognitive Behavioural Therapy

CLIMATE EMERGENCY UPDATE

• Proposed Solar Farm - I wrote last month that the delayed planning application for the proposed new Solar Farm in Rode was due to be submitted around the end of September. - **Community Energy** At our most recent Climate Emergency Group meeting we agreed to start exploring the potential for a community energy project in Rode and the surrounding villages. Community energy refers to the delivery of community-led renewable energy, energy demand reduction and energy supply projects, whether wholly owned and/or controlled by communities or through a partnership with commercial or public sector partners. There are over 500 community energy organisations in the UK, and the sector is growing rapidly. Here in Rode we are at the very early, exploratory stage and there's much to investigate before anything concrete emerges. However, if you would be interested in getting involved in the project, let us know by emailing me (address at the foot of the article).
- Environment-Themed Activities for November If you're wondering what to do with your spare time in November, here' some eco-friendly ideas! Learning? The B&NES Green Open Homes Weekend is a great way to find out about the reality of getting solar panels, insulation, triple glazing, or new heating options. You can have a good look at the technology, ask the homeowners about the installation and find out how much they're really saving on their energy bills as a result. There are around 15 properties opening their doors see https://greenopenhomesbanes.org/ for more info. Walking? Frome Walking Festival runs from Friday 10th to Sunday 12th November take your pick from 18 wonderful walks (14 of which are free), varying in length from half a mile to a whopping 12 and a half miles! Pick up a programme from the Town Hall, Frome Library or download from the Frome Town Council website.

Cycling? The Frome Community Bike Project will be opening their doors at Station Approach in November. The new site is around the back of Station Approach in front of Frome Reclamation. The workshop is a shared space to learn about fixing bikes, or you can book your bike in for a service. They also sell refurbished bikes, teach bike maintenance courses, run cycle confidence sessions, and lead social group rides. Frome Community Bike Project will also be offering free e-bike loans and cycling support through Frome Council's Cycle Together initiative. You'll also be able to hire ebikes, at a low cost, for a few hours or days.

Slow Marching? For the first 3 weeks of November (and possibly longer), Just Stop Oil are arranging slow marches in London. This may not be your cup of tea, but the government's own advisors have concluded that, if we are to remain within 1.5 degrees of warming, we need to stop new gas and oil exploration. If you'd like to get involved, check out the Just Stop Oil website. Reading? The latest UN Climate Change conference (COP28) starts at the end of November. Sometimes we might question the effectiveness of our own individual actions, faced with the power of multinationals and governments to do so much harm. COP28 is the chance for politicians and world leaders to commit to taking genuine action to address the climate emergency. If you'd like to do some background reading, the World Wildlife Fund has produced a Climate and Energy Policy Manifesto setting out what it believes governments and multinationals must do. It's only six pages, and worth a read, and is available on the WWF website.

Get Involved/Keep in Touch - The Climate Emergency Group has a monthly newsletter, which now reaches nearly 90 subscribers! If you'd like to join them, drop me a line at the email address below, or enter this link in your browser: https://mailchi.mp/4b503eoba2oc/initial-sign-up (sorry for the rather unfriendly web address!)

The Climate Emergency Group is still small, and therefore the capacity to deliver projects on our own is limited. Primarily we aim to "initiate, inform, educate, encourage..." AUTUMN INVENTORY ALL SAINTS CHURCHYARD PLANTS

For the last four seasons of mowing, Wellsford churchyard's volunteers have been using ideas promoted by the charity "Caring for God's Acre". These are helping us to address the Anglican Church's 5th Mark of Mission, which is 'To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth'. We have undertaken to attempt to boost biodiversity in the churchyard - an ancient sward - by adjusting when and how we cut the grass.

Our initiative follows guidance from the Diocese of Bath and Wells, Somerset Wildlife Trust, and A Rocha UK (see https://ecochurch.arocha.org.uk/).

Following advice about wildflower meadows, the mown grass is collected (not left on the ground as mulch) and composted under the yew tree. In the spring, this compost was removed and used as garden mulch on a "no-dig" bed elsewhere in the village. The churchyard has been unusually busy recently, requiring flexibility in how we manage the vegetation so that we can accommodate the needs of families of loved ones buried or interred there. In addition to the fortnightly summer mowing of the area south of the church (either side of the concrete path), of the footpath to the east, and of paths to recent burials to the north, we strimmed sections of the boundary and areas required for new burials. The old Tellisford Millenium Bench (moved to the churchyard when the Platinum Jubilee Bench replaced it at the crossroads) is now positioned where it is used regularly by visitors refreshing the flowers on a recent grave.

This September, through Hardington Vale's EcoChurch Group, I met a knowledgable person to help with inventorying what could be seen on Monday 25th September (too late for October Link copy!). Jean and Paul Richardson came from Hemington, and I spent a happy three hours with them identifying flora. Jean's field kit included waterproof trousers, clipboard with a list of the churchyards 67 plants identified in 2020, several books, tape-measure, and a loupe (magnifying glass) with its own light, to check on details such as whether stem hairs were straight or hooked. In alphabetical order, here is a preliminary list of plants (+ means further identification is needed to pin down the exact species):

Ash+, Autumn Hawkbit, Black Bryony, Black Medick, Bramble, Broad-leaved Dock, Bugle, Cinquefoil+, Common Cat's Ear, Common Knapweed, Common Ragwort, Common Sorrel, Cow Parsley, Creeping Buttercup, Cuckoo Pint, Daisy, Dandelion, Dogwood, Elder, Enchanter's Knightshade, False Brome, False Oat-grass, Field Bindweed, Geum+, Goosegrass, Greater Celandine, Greater Plantain, Ground Elder, Ground Ivy, Groundsel, Hazel, Hedge Bedstraw, Hedgerow Cranesbill, Herb Bennet+, Herb Robert, Hoary Plantain, Hog Weed, Ivy, Jack-by-the Hedge, Lady's Bedstraw, Lime+, Laurel, Lesser Burdock, Mallow, Mouse-ear Hawkweed, Common Nettle, Nipplewort, Ox-eye Daisy, Pelitory of the Wall, Polypody, Prickly Sow-thistle, Red Clover, Ribwort Plantain, Rough Hawkbit, Scotch Thistle+, Shining Cranesbill, Smooth Sowthistle, White Bryony, White Clover, White Dead-nettle, Wood Avens+, Yarrow, Yew.

We are planning to make another detailed inventory in the spring. If you would be interested in joining us, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

RODE & DISTRICT GARDEN CLUB OCTOBER MEETING

The first meeting of the Garden Club in the hall for six months was well attended. Members and guests were keen to buy and swap the range of house and garden plants on offer. Having tea and coffee at the start of the meeting also proved popular.

Our speaker was Julia Robb, who lives in Rode. She talked about her love of dahlias. Apparently, her wedding was planned for September so she could use them in arrangements. Her mum, who grew the flowers for her wedding, also provided a beautiful vase of different dahlias for this talk and joined Julia at the Hall.

Julia talked about the range of different types of dahlias available to grow with the key ones being single, anemone, pompom, ball, cactus, semi-cactus, decorative and watermelon. Within these groups are numerous different varieties so the choice for gardeners is immense. Julia showed some of her favorites. Their main growing and flowering period is May to October, and they really bring colour and excitement to the garden from August when other plants are tired and going over.

Dahlias are not hardy, so they need protection from frost. Once the frost blackens the foliage it should be removed. Then they can be lifted and stored somewhere frost free till next spring or here in the South most years they will survive in the ground if well mulched. There was discussion about what members who grow dahlia did with theirs.



Julia explained how to start dahlias off in spring, pointing out the eyes on the neck where new growth starts once the weather begins to warm up. She also detailed how to increase the stock of them by splitting tubers or taking cuttings. She outlined how to produce strong sturdy plants and what were the main problems growing them. They have lots to offer any grower, including being edible, both the tubers and the flowers. The latter dry well for arrangements in the winter. There were lots of questions for her and her suggestions of dahlias to try as an introduction to growing them were noted for next year.

Next month on 13th November our speaker is Alan Eason, who will talk about Madera and its plants. The doors open at 7:00pm with refreshments and the talk starts at 7:30 pm. Visitors are welcome.

RODE HISTORY

Earlier this year we learnt about Commander Arthur Mayne Noad, a former resident of Rode. We also saw a letter written by him to his mother Emily, at Southfield House, Rode in May 1835 when he was a young Midshipman serving in the Mediterranean Fleet.

Thanks to our Rode historian, Peter Harris, we now have a second letter by Midshipman Arthur Mayne Noad RN whilst on duty in the Mediterranean Fleet.

Cruising off Cape St. Angels June 29th, 1835

My dear Mother,

We left Salamis on the 6th of June for Paros, to complete water in company with the Squadron and a Russian Corvette which came out to try rate of sailing with the Brig; we soon beat her & she bore up again to rejoin her Commodore at the Piraeus. We had very blowing weather and lost sight of the Admiral during the night. At daylight we saw the Medea steamer which had also parted company. We made the best of our way to the anchorage at Paros, where we found the Squadron just anchoring, they having run down to leeward whilst we kept to windward which accounts for our losing sight of them. The Thunderer 84. carried away her main yard.

On the $7^{\rm th}$ at 4am the Admiral ordered us to proceed to Naxia one of the most fertile islands in the Archipelago, to enquire into the quarantine laws and the price of fresh beef; we remained only a few hours, having made the necessary enquiries and ordered one day's fresh meat, we rejoined the Fleet, found all the ships busy watering. On the $9^{\rm th}$ a boat was employed from each ship surveying the Anchorage which was a very disagreeable job, as it was blowing very fresh.

I had the luck of being in our boat and a good ducking. I got on one of the islands called Pigeon Island; we caught a great number of young gulls nearly able to fly and a nest in nearly every bush, the sailors caught a great number of them and roasted them. By the noise that the old birds made I think we were very unwelcome visitors. The Edinburgh very kindly sent us 18 tons of water which was all we wanted. All the ships having filled their water the signal was made to prepare for sea, and at daylight of the 10th we weighed our anchors and made sail for Anti Paros celebrated for its famous grotto one of the wonders of the world. We anchored about 9 o'clock, at 10 we out boats and all the officers but three went on shore to visit the grotto, with blue lights, torches, candles & ropes etc. to lower ourselves down and assist in the descent. It was very near the top of a high hill, very steep and very rough walking. I was very glad when I found

myself at the entrance. We found already arrived nearly 100 officers and a request from the Admiral that no one would enter the eave till-interior of the cave till he came up (equal to an order), with which we were not at all pleased. However we made the best of it, and considered ourselves in high luck in being able to get some milk, which with a little brandy and a few cigars we amused ourselves till the old Gentleman made his appearance accompanied by Mrs Rowley (sister-in-law) and all (9) the captains of the Squadron, with a boat's crew carrying a long rope about 300ft, with several rope ladders, called in Sea terms "Jacob's ladders." The rope was soon secured at the entrance of the grotto and in several places below, the ladders were placed in the most difficult parts. The Admiral then went down and remained a short time below, he appeared very glad when he found himself in the open air, it was a great undertaking for an old man, but he did not appear to feel any ill effects from it. As soon as he came up the fun commenced. All hands made a rush to see who would get down first, by this time our numbers had increased to more than 300, every other man with a candle and here and there a torch. We found the descent very difficult owing to the number of loose stones and earth which the people above kept kicking down. However with the assistance of the rope ladders we all descended quite safe with the exception of a broken head or two to about 300 ft. The grotto in this part appeared to be about 250 ft high & 300 ft broad, the roof well arched. I think it was one of the most magnificent sights I ever saw; the immense number of lights and the beautiful stalactites which formed the roof and the crystalline substance which formed the side, representing a vast variety of figures repaid us well for the trouble we had taken. We remained about 2 hours below. When we came up we were quite black with the smoke from the lights and port fires(?). I must confess I was not at all sorry to find myself in the open air again. The next morning we left for Naxia which (having a foul wind) took us the whole day. We remained here all the 12th to survey the anchorage and started on the 13th at 4 in the morning for Delos to see the ruins of a temple dedicated to Apollo and the remains of the old town. We fell in with the Portland 52 on her way to Paros to complete her water; we anchored about 1/2 7 in the evening. the next day being Sunday, after divine service we went on shore, but had scarcely landed when our signal was made to prepare for sea. We were obliged of course to return immediately. We were ordered to Syros a small island about 15 miles from Delos with despatches for the Consul. We anchored about 10pm close to the town; this island is very mountainous, but famed for its fertility and salubrity. Their principal town is Syra which covers a conical hill at the foot of which is the harbour. At 10 in the morning the Consul came onboard with two of his daughters. We saluted him with 9 guns and immediately made sail to join the Admiral who was waiting outside with the Squadron. The Consul and his daughters visited the Admiral on board the Caledonia and having seen all that was to be seen returned onboard the brig and were by us safely landed. They were very much pleased with their jaunt, it being the first time they were ever on board so large a ship. We then parted company with the Squadron for Zante



to bring the Mail with a foul wind on the 17th. In the afternoon we picked up a small boat drifted out to sea with nobody in her. We hoisted her in. I do not know what we shall do with her but I suppose sell her to buy paint for the Brig as we have not room to stow her. We did not anchor at Zante till before the 21st they gave us 21 days quarantine much to our annoyance as we expected to have pratique. On the 22nd H.M.S. Orestes arrived with Sir Howard Douglas, Lord High Commissioner for the Ionian Islands. We saluted him with 19 guns; he was graciously pleased to shorten our quarantine by 7 days; and as the passage was included we struck the yellow flag. On the 23rd the Confiance Steamer arrived with the Mail which was immediately put onboard and we started to join the Admiral. We fell in with him next evening off Cape Matapan.

Cruising on the 25th the Columbine joined us from Malta by which vessel I received your letter. We are now cruising off Cape Angels, waiting for Cutter with despatches from Constantinople, as the packet ought to leave this for Zante tomorrow. By the bye I forgot to tell you that last Saturday the Admiral made the signal for Frigates & Brigs to try rate of sailing; when after hard race of 6 hours we came off Victorious. However you will see all the particulars in the papers for there will be a great war about it! I am so very sorry to hear that you have been so very sickly at Road; but hope that by this time all are restored to health. I believe I have told you all the news from this quarter. You see Sir J Rowley does not allow us to be idle. Everything is perfectly quiet and I believe the Squadron will leave the Archipelago for Corfu, and "Childers" to Gibraltar.

I will now bid you adieu my dearest Mother with kindest love to all friends and believe me as ever your affectionate Son

Once a month, on a Sunday...A group of Guests over 75 will gather at a volunteer Host's home. There, they meet with the rest of their Group to share a lovely Afternoon Tea, companionship, and a change of scene for an afternoon.

Why Sunday? It's because we know this can be a lonely time of the week. Many of our volunteers also work during the week so Sundays are the perfect time for most Groups.

Could you become a Re-engage Tea Party Host - Our Tea Party Hosts are a vital part of the Re-engage Team. Tea Parties provide friendship and a regular weekend social event for the Guests that belong to the Group.

Your local Group Coordinator needs more Tea Party Hosts for a growing Group which restarted earlier this year, having gone on hold when Covid hit.

Being a Host is a flexible, voluntary role that can easily be fitted in around your own lifestyle and availability. As a volunteer Host you will run a local Re-engage Tea Party one to two times a year and host a group made up of volunteer Drivers, the Group Coordinator and Guests. The Tea Parties last around one and a half to two hours.

The role includes:





CARE 4 CALAIS

Do you have any unwanted men's coats, gloves, hoodies, etc? Or an old tent, sleeping bag, or blankets that you no longer need?

Last year, thanks to the generosity of many Rodents, I managed to take a car full of clothes, sleeping bags and small tents to Calais.... and I'm planning on doing the same this year! The majority of refugees in Calais are from Syria, Afghanistan, Iraq, Iran, Eritrea, Sudan (all amongst world's top 10% most dangerous countries) and virtually no legal ways for such individuals to reach the UK (where most have some family link). Many have fled war or oppression and are now at the mercy of the winter weather.

So, if you've any of the following which you no longer need, it would be great if I could collect them from you: Men's & boys' coats/Hoodies & jumpers/Small tents /Sleeping bags & blankets/Gloves, scarves, hats, socks/Rain ponchos/Backpacks /Trainers

They need to be clean and in good condition (especially any tents, which should be free from tears, and include necessary poles, etc)as winter approaches there is a desperate need for such items in and around Calais. Your old tent or sleeping bag can help keep families warm over winter. Can you support your local charity to provide healthcare for communities in East Africa?



The charity CHASE (Community Health and Sustainable Environment)
Africa is based in Rode. We support 14 local partners in East Africa to improve the health of women, families, communities and their environment.

The remote, rural communities we support have inadequate access to healthcare. Many live far from healthcare clinics, they cannot afford to travel or pay for the services, and the frail, elderly, and people with disability simply have no way of getting the support they need.

Furthermore, many people are not aware of the benefits of family planning and their right to choose the number, timing and spacing of their children. Many families become trapped in a cycle of poverty as they struggle to provide for their children.

Low demand for and use of contraception can also be caused by myths and misconceptions. We see high levels of unintended pregnancies among teenagers and women, maternal death, child mortality, and unsafe abortions as a result.

How CHASE Africa makes a difference



CHASE Africa delivers vital healthcare and improves knowledge, attitudes and access to contraception.

Our Community Health Workers raise awareness of healthcare and family planning by visiting people their homes encouraging them to attend our community dialogues. The dialogues are an open, educational discussion which address the community's healthcare needs

Our outreach clinics and Backpack Nurses bring services to the people. For example, the photo above is an outreach clinic in the Rwenzori foothills organised by our local partner, RCRA Uganda.

We also run child right clubs both in and out of schools to raise awareness, as there is currently no sex education in schools.

The communities we work with are heavily dependent on natural resources and many rely on agriculture for their income. So some of our partners engage communities in activities to build resilience to climate change and teach the importance of protecting biodiversity.

What is the impact of our work?

Since 2012, we have delivered over 500,000 rights-based family planning services and nearly 1.2 million healthcare services to rural communities. Our services positively impact women's health, family wellbeing and subsequently reduces poverty, conflict and pressure on local natural resources.

In 2021, Nashiru*, who sells groceries at market to support her family, attended a mobile clinic run by our partner, The Maa Trust. It was here where she heard a nurse talk about Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR), including the value of family planning, and she began her journey of using contraception.

"I started using family planning after my fifth child in 2021. I had never used any family planning method, increasing my chances of getting unwanted pregnancies. I am now telling other women in the village that it's very important that we go for family planning. The moment you plan your family size, you'll have enough strength and time to go and do other activities which will improve the standard of your family. I don't want any more children as I'd like to provide a quality life for my five children." *Name has been changed to protect her identity.

Parish Council Meeting Minutes

MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON MONDAY 9th OCTOBER 2023 AT 7.30 pm

UNCONFIRMED

Present:

Cllr Mike Salmon (MS) – Chair, Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Jonathan Bowler (JB), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP) and Cllr Pat Restorick (PR). **In attendance:** Hugh Williams – Clerk, Cllr Adam Boyden (County Councillor) and 3 parishioners.

- 1. Parishioners Participation: It was brought to the meetings attention that a 20mph limit in the village would not be enforceable and should not be attempted. This was a case of a minority imposing their views over the majority. The Chair indicated that when this was proposed a couple of years ago it was widely supported and that the Police had approved it and that it could be enforced. A TRO (Traffic Regulation Order) had still to be issued and this would be publicised with the opportunity for Parishioners to comment. Concern was expressed that the school bus blocked the High Street when picking up children and it was questioned whether it could pull into the school to do this.
- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr J McAuliffe, Cllr M Punt and Cllr D Denton (County Councillor)
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 11th September were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.

5. Actions from previous meeting:

- i. The Mill: The new licence was granted at the Hearing in September, however there was some concern over the process. The Parish Council (PC) employed a barrister to have a look at the new licence and the procedure. Following his report, it was agreed that the PC would lodge an appeal before the deadline of 4th October on the following grounds: the extension of the licenced area, the fact that there is now no discrimination for outside events and that there was mis-direction by the Butcombe solicitor at the Hearing. It is hoped there could be a resolution prior to the appeal going to the Magistrate's Court, which would probably be in 4 to 6 months. The new licence is now in abeyance as an appeal has been lodged. The Chair and AP plan to meet the tenants to discuss this issue. It was agreed to let Tellisford know of the PC actions.
- **ii. Defibrillator:** It was agreed to propose three dates towards the end of November to Community Heartbeat Trust for Defibrillator Awareness training. Once the date was known this would be widely publicised to get as many people to attend as possible in the Memorial Hall.
- <u>**6.** Climate Change Group:</u> The meeting agreed to pay meeting costs incurred by the Climate Change Group as this Group was reporting back to the PC.

7. County Councillor's Report: Cllr Adam Boyden reported that 140 sites had been proposed to Somerset for the building of the 505 dwellings that had originally been assigned to NE Mendip. These sites all had to be able to complete construction by 2029 and were currently being assessed. A consultation on the selected sites would be starting in early 2024 but until then the sites would remain unknown.

He said that a much better LCN meeting had been recently held; with issues covering road safety and schooling being the main topics. The solar farm application had now been delayed until the end of October/early November. Somerset could offer help to parish councils putting in EV charging points and this would be investigated.

He asked about making people aware of planning applications and was impressed at the service AE and PR did in alerting neighbours and seeing what each application involved on the ground. It was agreed that circulation of the Consultees to any application should be circulated by Somerset.

There was a possibility that a night camera speeding person could come to Rode and if they did it was agreed Rode Hill and Bradford Road would be the best places for this to be done.

The Bell roof and out buildings have been inspected and declared okay, it was agreed the Frome Civic Society should be made aware of the current condition of the building.

National Highways have acknowledged concerns over the slip road onto the A36, but it was down their list of priorities.

8. Highways issues:

- **i. Street Lights Turn off:** There was still concern that Somerset had indicated that on any street, lights either had to be on or off and there could not be isolated lights on while most were off. The Clerk was asked to check this to see if this was a Somerset and/or national policy.
- **ii. SIDs:** JB reported that although Gloucestershire had approved the new SIDs, Avon and Somerset Police were still evaluating them. He agreed to put together costs for these new Auto SIDs. It was also agreed Somerset should be chased up for the agreed new SID posts promised over a year ago.
- **iii. Bradford Road/Rode Hill:** It was reported that the stop signs were not easily visible due to vegetation growth and, also some signs were not correctly aligned. Somerset Highways would be contacted to correct.

9. Planning:

i) New applications:

2023/1747/LBC: Single storey glazed rear extension – Mayfield Mill, 4A High Street. No objections

2023/1817/TCA: Crown lift holly by 2-3m, re-pollard limes and fell elm to approx. 2m – Christchurch House, Rode Hill. No objections.

2023/1870/TPO: Cedar – crown clean and remove significant deadwood – Christchurch House, Rode Hill. No objections.

ii. Somerset decisions:

None

10. Website:

It was agreed this should go live in two to three weeks to a limited circulation and live to all at end of November. The Clerk reminded those who had not sent 'mug shots' to do so asap.

11. Creating Spaces for People:

It was agreed the response prepared by Jim McAuliffe could be submitted to Somerset in response to the consultation.

12. Footpaths:

Complaints about the path round the back of the children's play area on the playing field had been received. It was agreed this was not suitable and that in winter it became impassable. After discussion it was agreed the best solution would be to cut the fence and put in a gate to allow access into the playing field to join up with the concrete path that goes to the skate board area. Some improvement over the short stretch of grass might be required along with suitable 'dogs on lead' signs. This would be relayed to the Playing Field Committee for their approval.

13. Grass cutting:

An alternative quote had been received for all the grass cutting around the village (including the playing field). It was agreed the Clerk would get a quote from Eagle for 2024 for comparison and this would include the extra area of the playing field. Also quotes for keeping the undergrowth back on the path from Barrow Farm to the allotments would be sought.

14. Items for next agenda.

The following would be discussed at the November meeting: grass cutting quotes, Conservation area for Rode and Auto SIDs.

15. Financial matters:

i. Precept: After discussion it was agreed to raise the precept by 8% to £27,000 for 2024.

ii. Payments: The following payments were agreed:


