#### **REFLECTION**

There was an excellent play at the Theatre Royal Bath recently called The Score. I know several people who saw it but for any who didn't, the plot concerned a visit of Johannes Sebastien Bach to the court of Frederick the second (the Great) of Prussia.

The King had invited him as he was an admirer of Bach's music and also intrigued about the man. Bach is loath to go as he abhors the behaviour of Frederick's troops who commit only what can be described as war crimes as they rampage through the area conquering region after region. Bach does visit and the play culminates in a massive row between the king and the composer. The two men thunder at each other across the stage, Bach accusing Frederick of his wicked assault on innocent people and the king robustly defending his position saying he has to recapture lost lands to create a greater Prussia, sounding very like the rhetoric of Putin! It was a great piece of theatre, and very thought provoking the thought I came home with was that in spite of war and turmoil surrounding his town and region, Bach was able to create the most sublime music. The world seems to be in terrible turmoil today. It's worth remembering that it always has been. Is it worse today or do we simply hear more about it? I'm not sure.

We are coming close to the Christmas season now. Lights are beginning to twinkle and soon we will be hearing Christmas music, jingling bells, and familiar carols. We will be told its "The most wonderful time of the year" and for many that will feel true, although the gloss and glitter will start to fade soon after. The Christmas story that lies at the heart of all our celebrations is beautiful. We love the baby in a manger and Mary his mother all in blue. We love the docile gentle eyed animals, the shepherds with their lambs and the regal kings with their camels and expensive gifts. And the angels... Oh Hark the Herald Angels.

But all this beauty and loveliness is set against a backdrop of an embittered people living in an occupied territory, a distant emperor who orders people to move from place to place on a whim, and a despotic king who massacres baby boys in an insane fit of jealous insecurity. Jesus' parents had to run for their lives, taking him to Egypt, a familiar story even today. Jesus was born into this mayhem and yet it truly is the most beautiful story.

He was called the Prince of Peace and as a man he showed us how to live in peace, with justice for all. He cared for the poor and outcast as well as the rich and privileged, and foreigners. He showed us God's love and forgiveness and even cruel betrayal and death at the hands of the Romans couldn't keep him down. He came back and showed us that even death need no longer be the great

enemy. What beauty in the midst of such terrible times. And best of all he is with us all the year, not just Christmas, present in our world and walking beside us, if we wake up to his reality.

J.S. Bach believed all this. No wonder he wrote such sublime music.

#### **UPDATE ON ST LAWRENCE CHURCH ROOF WORK & FUNDING**

As some readers will have noticed, the scaffolding went up around the South Aisle on the 13<sup>th of</sup> November.

Removal of the existing stone tiles from that part of the church started on the 20<sup>th of</sup> November.



Work will continue until mid-March and then cease for the summer, because that is when the bats take up residence again.


It is good to see work under way. Phase 1 of three phases to take place over three winters will then be complete.

Since last month we have received £250 from the village pantomime committee for which we are very grateful.

Many people assume that massive grants are available to fund this kind of work, but this is far from the truth.

However, we have just received the fantastic news that the Garfield Weston Foundation are going to make us a grant of £20,000.

We are not there yet as far as the funding for the whole project is concerned but this is a huge help.



For those who are interested, Garfield Weston was the founder of Associated British Foods (ABF) and gave away 80% of the Weston Family's wealth for the benefit of the nation. ABF continues to be a very successful company.

The Foundation shares in that success and so now do we!

#### **RODE VILLAGE HAS A NEW WEBSITE!**

As many will know, Rode Parish Council has had a website for a number of years. However, we recognised that it was probably not as visually enticing as we'd like and was fairly basic. It compared relatively poorly to other local Parish Council websites (e.g.: Beckington, Southwick...). There were some other challenges with the old site (including accessibility).

Earlier this year, therefore, the PC decided to put together a new website – primarily aimed at widening engagement with what the Parish Council is doing, but also acting as a portal/information hub for a whole range of activities in and around the village. This includes things like the school, scouts, buses, cricket club, local businesses, community groups, comedy nights, Climate Emergency Group, Playing Field etc, etc.



Of course, we already have a couple of great sources of local information - The Link, plus the village Facebook site. The new website is not designed to replace either of these – hopefully it will complement them and provide information in a different way.

To produce the new site, we've used a local web design agency who specialise in town and parish council websites (they do the Frome Town Council website, amongst many others). The site follows a very standard template, which is pretty fixed, but we will be responsible for the content.

The new site is now live at **www.rodevillage.com** – take a look and feel free to provide feedback (either to myself: jim.mcauliffe@btinternet.com or Hugh Williams: clerk.rodeparishcouncil@gmail.com )

You will see there are a few gaps.... we're still working on completing the content - in particular, although the History section is huge, there's still quite a bit more to transfer over from the old site (we're aiming to have this completed by the end of the year).

At the end of the day the website is aimed at meeting the needs of Rode residents, so if you have ideas for improvements, please let us know. We're actually keen to have a village logo on the home page – if you've got an idea or a design, feel free to pass this on!

#### PROPOSED SOLAR FARM UPDATE

The planning application for the proposed Solar Farm in Rode has now been published, and anyone who registered to receive progress updates on the website should have received a short confirmatory email with details of how to access the planning documentation. If you haven't got the email, but would like to better understand the proposed development, full details are available on the Somerset Council website: https://publicaccess.mendip.gov.uk/online-applications/applicationDetails.do?activeTab=documents&keyVal=S3WYXFK PIAOoo

Or go to the "View and Comment on a Planning Application" section, select "Mendip", then "Find an Application" – the application number is 2023/2183/FUL: https://www.somerset.gov.uk/planning-buildings-and-land/view-and-comment-on-a-planning-application/?district=Mendip

The Parish Council requested an extension to the deadline for responses, and Somerset Council initially confirmed an extension to 15<sup>th</sup> December. However, it appears that this may now be 21<sup>st</sup> December.

Notwithstanding these extensions, it would be very helpful if local residents could also copy any submissions made to the Parish Council\* to enable the PC to better understand local views. [\* clerk.rodeparishcouncil@gmail.com]

The PC will be debating the application at its next meeting on 11th December.

#### SOMERSET COUNCIL UPDATE

Greetings all. As one of your local Somerset Councillors I need to update you all on a few things.



**Environment and Climate Change:** As part of Somerset Council's response to the climate and ecological emergency we have introduced a new Tree Strategy, and a Local Area Energy Plan is being prepared to promote renewable energy opportunities. A Local Nature Recovery Strategy is also being prepared and there is a current public consultation on securing 'biodiversity net gain' from new development, to deliver nature recovery. An earlier consultation also took views on proposed more sustainable future transport and planning policies for new developments.

Somerset Council's climate strategy is being refreshed, but it has just been recognised as a leader in its work to respond to the climate emergency, with an 'A-' grade for its performance in 2023 from CDP, a global sustainability disclosure charity, based on its projects, strategies and activities.

Recycling is also increasing, and Somerset Council achieved its highest ever recycling rate in 2022/23, with 56.6% of all household waste being recycled, and 96.6% staying in the UK for processing.

The Climate & Place Scrutiny Committee (which I Vice-Chair) has been reviewing the Councils economic development, planning, transport, energy and environmental policies and initiatives. We will look into water quality in Somerset (including phosphate pollution of the Levels, and the need for mitigation in the planning system, which is holding up planning permissions in the Somerset Levels *Ramsar site* catchment) early in the new year.

**Solar Farm:** I am keeping abreast of this application and its progress – please see page XX for the latest news on this development from Rode Parish Council. **Road Safety And The Local Community Network:** We are still awaiting the proposed extension of the 30mph zone along the A361, and a new 20mph speed limit for Rode village, but Somerset Highways have given reassurances that the public consultation on this should be very soon now.

Road safety issues and issues surrounding a potential future reorganisation of schools in the Frome area were the subject of the very well-attended October meeting of the 'Vale of Frome' Local Community Network (LCN) in Buckland Dinham.

The Vale of Frome LCN covers 18 parishes around Frome, including Rode, Tellisford/Woolverton and Farleigh Hungerford. LCNs are a way of bringing together all the parish councils and other public, voluntary and community organisations in an area with their Somerset Councillors and officers, to work out issues and ideas on a more local level, to counteract the inevitable centralisation effect of having a single unitary council for Somerset.

The next meeting is on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> December in Wanstrow Village Hall (and online). We will hear about the work to improve road safety by council highways officers and the Police and discuss the Somerset Council financial situation and how parish and town councils might take on more local services. As Vice-Chair I can say all are welcome, so please come along and join in if you have any interest in these issues (please see my website for details).

**Local Plan:** The Local Plan for the former Mendip District is also being updated in the next few months, after a call for sites was required to replace the sites previously allocated for housing but which were removed from the plan in Norton St Philip Parish Council's successful High Court challenge. Having a site allocated for development in a Local Plan really helps get planning permission. Somerset Council officers are currently assessing over 140 sites that were submitted into the process by landowners, including several sites around Rode, Beckington and Norton St Philip. We will soon know which sites have been judged suitable, sustainable, available and deliverable by 2029 in a draft Preferred Options report to committee which will be available online before a 6 week public consultation begins. No doubt there will be great interest in this, so I will post details on my website when they are available.

**Somerset Council Finances:** The rumours were correct; Somerset Council is now in a financial emergency. Somerset Council's projected overspend for 2023/24 is now close to £30 million and projections for next year suggest that budget gap could be £100 million. There is a danger of a Section 114 notice being issued under the Local Government Finance Act - this is what happens when a council's chief finance officer judges (independently of councillors) that the council is no longer able to balance its budget because it does not have sufficient resources (either income or reserves) to meet its outgoings. Unless the Council takes significant action, we have been warned that a \$114 could be issued in or before February's Full Council budget setting meeting, which would mean a halt to all non-essential spending, and expensive appointed commissioners coming in to make financial decisions without democratic accountability.

The vast majority of the overspend and projected cost increase for next year come from adults and children's social care, which take up about 2/3rds of the council's budget, looking after some of the most vulnerable members of all our communities. Central Government is neither resourcing councils properly to afford to provide these care services, nor giving councils the flexibility to raise the funds themselves.

Much of this is driven by forces outside the council's control, especially the cost of residential care, which has risen enormously (from roughly over £500 a week to over £900 a week) largely as a result of the Government's own aborted Fair Cost of Care policy which opened the books and revealed previous low costs. Other budget pressures include inflation (which is hitting local government particularly hard) and the difficulty recruiting staff in many areas (such as social workers and planners). Somerset also has a relatively low council tax base (with

a high number of properties in the ABCD bands), and the six year Council Tax freeze in 2010-16 by a previous County Council administration reduced Somerset Council's income by over £200million.

Local Government has seen grants from central government fall by about 40% over the past few years. The recent Autumn Statement indicates further budget cuts are coming. There have been discussions with the Department for Levelling up, Housing and Communities about the financial sustainability of the Council, and the Government has a chance in their Local Government Settlement in December to show that they understand the situation and care about the residents of Somerset, so we will see if they do.

Somerset Council intends to avoid a s114 being issued if at all possible, so officers and the Executive teams are drafting proposals for the December  $6^{th}$  Executive meeting. These are likely to include:

- financial controls to reduce projected overspends.
- disposal of the Council's commercial investment portfolio.
- bringing forward the disposals of some of the Council's non-commercial assets and the rationalisation of the council's offices.
- work with city, town & parish councils & voluntary, charity, faith & social enterprise sectors to seek alternative ways of safeguarding many services.
- reductions to some non-statutory service levels.

Setting a budget for 2024/5 (at Full Council meeting Feb 2024) is going to be extremely challenging, some very difficult decisions about services look likely. I have discussed the situation with Parish Councils, and Somerset Council has written to all parishes setting out the situation and inviting discussions on how some services could be supported and/or devolved locally. By the time you read this the details of the above should be public, so please see my website for updates. I and other local Councillors will be scrutinising the proposals for the likely effects on local public services and working to get the best outcomes possible for our communities.

**Keeping In Touch:** As one of your Somerset Councillors I need to keep in touch with you on what's going on and what your concerns/issues are. I do an email newsletter and an online Residents Survey so you can have your say directly, both are on my website (see below). This magazine is another important way to keep in touch. I can always meet residents in person, so please just get in touch. To subscribe to my newsletter or contact me about any issue please email me (see below for website and email addresses).

#### **MESSAGE IN A BOTTLE**

On 10 November I did my usual check to see if there was any rubbish on the screen at Tellisford Mill. I noticed a glass bottle floating and hooked it out to recycle the glass but imagine my surprise when I saw an orange piece of paper inside saying "Message". I opened the bottle and read the message which said it had been thrown "in Nunney Brook by the bridge". There was also an email address.



My message to that email address produced an immediate reply from Ron, who lives in Nunney, and is a retired merchant mariner who over his maritime years threw bottles into the sea in the hope that someone would find them. One that he had thrown into the mid-Atlantic eventually washed up in Ireland. Since he retired to Nunney he has thrown several into Nunney Brook, usually to amuse his grandchildren. He said this was the first time anyone had responded.



It was pure serendipity that I found it: a few moments later, the trash cleaner did an automatic screen clean and its sluice gate opened. If the bottle had still been in the water, it would have washed away downstream.

The bottle had travelled 9.5 miles down Nunney Brook, into the Mells River above Hapsford, down the Mells to join the Frome at Spring Gardens and on to Tellisford at an average sedate 2.9 yards per hour. On this journey it went over 17 weirs, any one of which might have broken it.

Ron says he will put more bottles with messages in the river and I will keep an eye open. So, if you see a bottle floating by, retrieve it. It may contain a message.




#### RODE AND NORTON ST. PHILIP FIRST SCHOOL FEDERATION

#### **RODE OVER 60'S**

On Friday 10th November our members listened to Rachel Boothroyd-Walker from Cooper & Tanner give a talk with slides on her specialist subject of Gemology.

First thing we learned was there are no semi-precious stones as previously known. There are classifications regarding mineral based gems and plant based (eg amber, which is a resin from trees). She explained the various tests and tools that she used to determine genuine from imitation. How diamonds and sapphires can come in different colours. How rubies and garnets differ. Where in the world the best stones are found. She talked about how stones like diamonds are measured for quality using the 4 "c's" cut, carat, clarity and colour. Blue John which is only found in Derbyshire is a beautiful stone with blue/purple striations and yellow streaks, the supply is all but mined out. She asked did we know what was the oldest known stone? Someone guessed correctly, it was Zircon. A very illuminating talk! Afternoon tea and the raffle concluded the meeting.

Many people coming to exploit the riches its trading position, created gardens that are open to visitors today. Plants grow profusely: pelargoniums the height of trees, huge poinsettia shrubs and bougainvilleas in a variety of shades, including a very attractive pale orange. Even the planting of agapanthus, when roads are reconstructed, reinforces the structure of banks at the side and adds colour and lushness to this fascinating place.

Definitely a place worth a visit but sadly too far to put on our list for trips next summer.

# **Parish Gardening**

Storm Debi did her utmost for a couple of days, but generally this has felt like quite a slow-burn autumn and it's only over the last week or two that we've enjoyed some beautiful autumnal colours. So it feels like it's been a quiet time in the garden - apart from the thousands of bulbs I've been planting – and that has made me think about the quiet plants that take a supporting role in the garden until just this moment, when they shine for a brief few weeks.

There are many plants that deserve to be celebrated for their autumn fireworks, but the one I'm particularly thinking about at the moment is Euonymus.

Lots of you will already know about Euonymus alatus or the winged spindle - fairly anonymous spring/summer foliage and greenish flowers, turning a fabulous red in the autumn.



Best of all, it has extraordinary purple-red fruits with orange seeds - such an unexpected and exotic sight in late autumn.

However, I've recently been discovering the huge range of Euonymus and appreciating their terrific variety and also their adaptability.

They're definitely worth a few minutes of googling and scrolling time while the next rainstorm batters at the windows. There's a good article from Gardens Illustrated that you can view online and check out colours, sizes etc., but here are a few great options:

- Euonymus hamiltonianus 'Pink Delight' (to 3m height x 2m spread)
- Euonymus carnosus 'Red Wine' (to 4m x 4m)
- Euonymus europaeus 'Red Cascade' (to 4m x2.5 m)
- Euonymus hamiltonianus 'Indian Summer' (to 3m x 2.5m)
- Euonymus alatus 'Compactus' (to 1m x 1.5m)


Surely you can find room for one of these beauties.

#### HAVE A GREAT CHRISTMAS - BUT MAKE IT SUSTAINABLE!

There are plenty of guides to having a greener Christmas – a good starting point is the WWF guide ( www.wwf.org.uk/top-tips-sustainable-christmas ). And if you're buying a real tree, ideally buy local. Osborne's grow their trees locally and supply them in the village – an ideal combination!



And once the decorations are down, if possible, recycle your tree. A two metre tall real Christmas tree, with no roots, has a carbon footprint of 16kg CO2e if it ends up in landfill. This is because the tree decomposes and produces methane gas, which is 25 times more potent as a greenhouse gas than carbon dioxide.

If you have it chipped to spread in public parks and gardens it will significantly reduce the carbon footprint by up to 80% (around 3.5kg CO2e). And if you sign up for a tree collection through Just Helping, you can donate the collection charge to with Dorothy House: https://just-helping.org.uk/







There's a famous quote from Rev Sydney Smith "It is the greatest of all mistakes to do nothing because you can only do a little. Do what you can."



From as little as a couple of hours a fortnight and less than a week's quality training, you could be making purposeful contact with a young person and make a positive difference for them through outings, conversations, activities and more...

Your volunteering can be arranged to suit your availability. Your life experience will be highly valued, and you will be trained and supported in developing key skills.








# MINUTES OF MEETING OF RODE PARISH COUNCIL HELD IN RODE MEMORIAL HALL ON MONDAY 13th NOVEMBER 2023 AT 7.30 pm

#### ON MONDAY 13th NOVEMBER 2023 AT 7.30 pm

#### **UNCONFIRMED**

#### **Present:**

Cllr Mike Salmon (MS) – Chair, Cllr Ann Edney (AE), Cllr Peter Travis (PT), Cllr Jim McAuliffe (JM), Cllr Andy Pickett (AP), Cllr Pat Restorick (PR) and Cllr Moira Punt (MP).

**In attendance:** Hugh Williams – Clerk, Cllr Adam Boyden and Cllr Dawn Denton (County Councillors) and 6 parishioners.

1. Parishioners Participation: Concerns were expressed over the proposal to build two houses on The Mead. These would not be in line with existing properties and would be very close to an existing property, and even closer as this house had an extension agreed (yet to be built). The erection of a high fence would be out of place and there were concerns over parking and access to these two houses.

There was concern over the amount of water on Crooked Lane with blocked drains, the Parish Council (PC) was asked to report these.

The length of grass on the playing field was too long for junior football and required cutting.

It was brought to the PC's attention that there were plans for a village day on  $13^{th}$  July 2024 and there could be a request for seed funding.

- **2. Apologies for absence**: Cllr J Bowler
- **3. Approval of the minutes**: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 9<sup>th</sup> October were approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest: None.
- **5.** County Councillors Report: It was reported that there had been 140 sites identified by landowners for meeting the shortfall of 505 houses within the 'Mendip' area. Somerset were currently reviewing these and would be issuing a consultation document to identify those to accept. It was added that there was a good chance none would be in Rode or Beckington as the Beckington roundabout on the A36 had been identified by Highways as requiring improvement and this could prevent any house building not being completed before the end of 2029 deadline.

The other major concern was the current financial situation faced by Somerset Council, this had been the result of large increases in care costs for the elderly and children. Somerset was looking at cuts across the board and a draft budget was being prepared. The Council had until February to agree a budget for 2024.

Somerset was approaching Councils to see if they were interested in taking on any services from Somerset.

Night speed monitoring had been carried out in Berkley and Rode Hill was being looked at as a location for it to be carried out on.

Discussions were still ongoing regarding the slip road onto the A36.

Tellisford and Woolverton Parish Councils had raised the possibility of merging with Rode.

#### 6. Actions from previous meeting:

- **i.** The Mill: It was reported that the appeal submitted by the Parish Council had been rejected as it was a day late. It was agreed that the Parish Council still required clarification over the wording of the new licence. Therefore, Somerset would be approached for clarification.
- **Defibrillator:** It was noted that a Defibrillator Awareness Course was to be held in the Memorial Hall on Monday 27<sup>th</sup> November starting at 6.30pm.
- **iii Grass cutting:** The length of the grass on the playing field had been an issue this year along with the frequency of cutting. Also, concerns were expressed that Eagle had only been contracted to cut until the end of October and with the continuing mild weather cuts in November are required. Quotes had been received from Eagle and J H Jones for 2024. After discussion it was agreed to go with J H Jones for 2024 due to the greater flexibility they offered over cutting schedules. The unpredictability of the climate made flexibility of cutting a major factor now.
- **iv.** Paths at playing field: A quote for laying scalpings and boarding the path round the back of the children's play area had been received. The alternative was to cut through the fence and insert a gate and put down short path to join up with the skateboard area. It was agreed that one of these would be done but to refer to the Playing Field Committee to agree which route to proceed with.
- <u>7. Climate Change Group:</u> JM reported that the Group were now keen to do something beyond informing people about the issues. Thoughts on possible community energy projects were being considered along with encouraging residents to install solar panels etc.

On the request to support the Climate and Ecology Bill the meeting agreed Rode PC should register support for this.

### 8. Highways issues:

- i. Street Lights Turn off: Discussion was held over the agreed street light 'turn off list' and Somerset requirements. It was agreed that another circular would be sent to all householders to seek approval for the Somerset compliant switch-off lights and give possible costs to residents.
- **ii. 20mph limit:** The Chair reported he had just had a discussion with Sara Davis at Somerset and had been informed that the TRO should be issued before the end of November. However, with Somerset moving to a new highways

contractor is unlikely the 20mph would be installed until the next financial year - i.e. after April.

iii. A361: Chevrons are to be installed near the bends by the church.

iv. SID posts: These are to be installed as agreed a couple of years ago.

**v. Signs at Rode Hill/Bradford Road:** These are still to be straightened/undergrowth cut back.

#### 9. Planning:

#### i) New applications:

**2023/2036/TCA:** Fell apple tree and reduce another by 1m to leave height and lateral branch length of 3m - 13 High Street. No objections.

**2023/2103/FUL:** Erection of 2no. semi-detached houses – 4 The Mead. It was agreed with these not being in line with other properties, their closeness to 6 The Mead, parking and access issues that the Parish Council would register a recommendation for refusal for this development.

**2023/2135/TCA:** To fell cherry and reduce cypress by 50% - 25 Lower Street. No objections.

#### ii. Somerset decisions:

**2023/1817/TCA:** Crown lift holly by 2-3m, re-pollard limes and fell elm to approx. 2m – Christchurch House, Rode Hill. Approved.

**2023/1870/TPO:** Cedar – crown clean and remove significant deadwood – Christchurch House, Rode Hill. Approved.

#### iii Other:

**2022/1516/OUT:** Outline planning permission for residential development at rear of 41A Church Lane. It was noted that Somerset Highways had recently registered a rejection to this application as well as Somerset Ecology recommending rejection unless conditions were implemented to protect bat presence. However no final decision had yet been made by Somerset.

<u>10. Website:</u> It was agreed this should go live even though there were still some missing content. It was hoped that once live organisations could complete their sections. It was agreed that an article would be put in The Link and information would be put on the Village Facebook. It would also be advertised on the questionnaire regarding street lights going to all residents.

11. Conservation and Neighbourhood Plans: AP reported he still had to work on the Conservation Plan and would approach Concept Planning. It was agreed that Councillors would review the Neighbourhood Plan and initial discussions on it would be held before the January Parish Council meeting (15<sup>th</sup> January).

**12. The Link:** Gill Leonard was going to give up compiling The Link in early 2024 and although the PC was unable to help it was agreed that AP would approach the Church to see if they could help.

**13. Solar Farm:** Concerns over the access and current archaeological work near Monkley Lane had been expressed by parishioners. JM agreed to send contacts for Low Carbon to them to make direct contact.

#### 14. Any other business:

- i) It was reported that Gigaclear had had a compressor stolen from the village. Gigaclear had asked if there was anywhere to store equipment when they came to install ultrafast broadband. It was agreed that possibly the container near the pavilion could be suitable and would be investigated.
- **ii)** A request for assistance regarding a fence by the closed entrance off the bridge to The Mill had been made. The PC was not in favour and suggested Tellisford was approached as The Mill was outside Rode PC.

#### 15. Financial matters:

- **i. Precept:** Due to increased grass cutting commitments and possibly less support from Somerset due to its financial crisis it was agreed to amend the agreed precept for 2024 to £30,000.
- ii. Payments: The following payments were agreed:






